

March 7, 1897 the dwelling house of E. O. McCarthy was destroyed by fire. April 13, the barn of D. P. Jennings caught on fire. The fire was soon extinguished. Loss about \$5.00. August 13, the saw mill of E. C. Boynton, was destroyed. Oct. 18, a forest fire on S. D. Jewell's required considerable labor, but with small damage. Oct, 21, a slight fire in partition back of stove caused about \$25.00 damage.

The fire extinguishers are very useful as was proved at the fire at Jennings' and at Boynton's. The town now has a set of fire ladders one at the Center and one at East Jaffrey. Two extinguishers are also placed at each village. There is 800 feet good linen hose. The new hose and ladder wagon is proving a good addition to the apparatus. It should be painted to complete it. It now has one coat.



Mr. J. H. Poole, made a report of progress, as Agent for the town in the Parker Legacies.

Voted to accept as a Report of Progress.

Voted to thank the Committee having charge of dedication of Clay Library Building, for the satisfactory manner in which they had performed their duties Voted to pay the Firemen the same per man as last year.

Voted the sum of \$300 00 in aid of the Conant High School.

Voted that the Selectmen draw money from the Treasury for guide boards as needed.

Voted to raise \$243 16 to pay for sidewalk and ditch made by E. C. Fletcher, Road Agent.

Voted that the Chief Engineer purchase ladders and buckets for Jaffrey Center Village in case of fire, and raised and appropriated \$75 09 for that purpose.

Instructed the Selectmen to purchase one Snow Roller to be used in Winter on the main roads of the town, and appropriated \$75 00 for that purpose.

Voted to instruct the Selectmen to build a highway 20 feet in width across the Common in East Jaffrey village, and to permit citizens to improve and beautify and fence the said Common at their own expense provided said work be done to the acceptance of the Selectmen.

Voted that the Selectmen put the heating apparatus, at the Library Building first class condition and draw from the Treasury to pay for same.

Voted that the Selectmen be instructed to invest the Cash Trust Funds according to law.

Adopted a code of By-Laws for the Government of the Trustees of the Clay Library.

## The State of New Hampshire.

To the Inhabitants of Jaffrey, qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at The Town Hall in said Town on the Second Tuesday of March next at nine o'clock in the forenoon to act upon the following subjects:-

1.--To choose a Town Clerk and all other necessary town officers.

2.-To hear all reports and act thereon.

3.—To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools the maintenance of the poor, building and repairing highways and bridges, to pay the town debt and interest thereon, for the town Library, Fire department, Memorial Day, and all other necessary town charges.

4.—To see if the town will pay its firemen the same as last year, or take any action relating thereto.

5.—To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum not exceeding two hundred dollars for the purpose of transcribing the records of the town previous to 1841, or act in any way relating to the transcription of the same.

6.—To see if the town will raise aud appropriate a sum of money to assist in supporting the Conant High School, or act in any way relating thereto.

7.—To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to light the streets in East Jaffrey Village, or act in any way relating thereto.

8.—To see if the town will vote to provide for housing their roller, road machines and other tools belonging to the town, and raise and appropriate money to pay for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

9.—To see if the town will instruct its Selectmen to complete the grading in connection with the new road and Blake road in a safe and proper manner, and to build a concrete sidewalk in connection with the same from N. W. Mower's Block to the railroad, and raise aud appropriate two hundred fifty dollars to pay for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.

10.—To see if the Town will vote to grade the hill south of J. B. Shedd's house, raise and appropriate money for the same, and choose an agent to look after the work, or act in any way relating thereto.

11. —To see if the town will vote to move the school house in district No. 4 from its present site to the four corners between the residences of A. S. Butler and M. C. Adams, to some central location for the west part of the town, which place the School Board may determine, and raise and appropriate money for the same.

12.--To see if the town will raise and appropriate money for the building and repairing of the side walks in the village of East Jafrey, and grade and finish the same with gravel, ashes, or conclete, and appoint or instruct an agent to do the same, or take any action relating thereto.

13.—To see if the town will vote to instruct their Selectmen to lay out and cause to be built a certain piece of new highway decribed as follows; viz:—

Beginning at a point on the highway near Daniel A. Field's house, thence northeasterly ab out 30 rods to a point on the highway leading from Daniel P. Adams' house to Troy, and to raise and appropriate money to pay for the same; and, upon the completion and acceptance of said new highway by the Selectmen of Jaffrey, to discontinue the present highway from the northern end of said new highway to the intersection with the highway leading from said Field's house house to Troy, being about 112 rods in length, or take any action relating thereto
