The undersigned submits the foregoing as a true statement of the affairs of the town as shown him by the Selectmen and Treasurer whose books and papers are found in good shape.

By vote the Auditor was instructed to make "an itemized report." I found there would not be time to make such a report, have it printed and ready to distribute before the next meeting of the town, and further that the cost would be many times more.

Thinking the voters and tax-payers would rather have it in usual form before meeting I have so made it.

I find all the bills for material, supplies, labor, etc. for the use of the town are at the usual market prices. They are in the

hands of the Selectmen open for the inspection of any taxpayer.

There was raised last year to defray town charges, pay debt, interest, etc., the sum of \$1000, (against \$5000 year before,) and there has been a slight reduction of the debt notwithstanding the extraordinary expense of new bridge at So. Littleton, \$1000, and about \$1000 more of old claims that have been cleaned up.

The Selectmen say they do not think there can be claims to the amount of \$100 outstanding that are not reported, and that unless something unusual occurs the coming year the debt may be largely reduced without raising any sum to defray town charges.

REPORT.

Fellow Citizens of Littleton:

In presenting my third annual report of the schools in town, I wish, first of all, to say that as a general thing our schools have been attended with very satisfactory results. The prudential committees have been on the alert to secure the services of competent teachers, and with but few exceptions have been successful in their efforts.

The sum of two hundred dollars in addition to the usual amount raised by the town for the support of schools, and divided between the six smaller districts, appears to have been a wise and judicious expenditure, as under this arrangement each district is enabled to give its scholars the annual amount of instruction required by law, (*i. e.*, twelve weeks.) It is to be hoped the same wise provision may be continued.

It has been my earnest endeavor in visiting our schools, and in examination of teachers, to secure to the average boy and girl of our town, such practical instruction as would fit them for the ordinary affairs of common life. In order to the attainment of this end, we think it absolutely essential that the child be well grounded in what are known as the rudiments of a good English education. A good, practical knowledge of arithmetic, and of how to read, write, and speak the English language, together with a knowledge of the geography and history of our own country, are the first and principal things. Very few among the graduates of "*the best schools*" possess these to day, while the smattering of a hundred and one things to which these are sacrificed is a very poor compensation for their lack. In attempting to do too much nothing is done thoroughly, and well. Every school supported by

the public money, should, first of all, see that its pupils are able to read well ; that they are fair penmen, and can write a good letter in good English, correctly spelled ; know the first principles of business and are capable of keeping accounts. These things, at least, should be done. Any system of training which fails to fit the great mass for real life work, must be looked upon as an absolute failure. Better do one thing and do it well, than attempt much and accomplish little of practical value.

SCHOOLS.

DISTRICT NO. 1.

Two terms. The first taught by Miss Hattie Cushman, the second by Miss Eva J. Dunbar, both young teachers of much promise. Their efforts in each term gave very general satisfaction.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

Three terms. The first term was taught by Miss Lizzie Tuttle. Miss Tuttle's first efforts as a teacher was highly satisfactory, and with experience, aided by her natural aptitude for teaching, we predict for her a very promising future.

The second and third terms, taught by Miss Georgie E. Stoddard, a young teacher, gave very good satisfaction.

DISTRICT NO. 3.

Three terms. First taught by Miss Alice M. Moffett, a thorough and hard working teacher, of much experience. The improvement in this school was evident from the beginning. Second term was taught by Miss Eloise A. Mansfield, an excellent young lady, a superior scholar, and only lacks experience to place her among our very best teachers. The third term, under the instruction of Miss Mattie J. Miner, a teacher of some experience, was very generally considered a success.

DISTRICT NO. 4.

Three terms. The first and second, under the instruction of Miss Mattie J. Miner, were productive of very satisfactory results. The third term, taught by Miss Eloise A. Mansfield, was abruptly brought to a close on account of measles breaking out among the scholars, hence the term was a short one and was not visited the second time.

DISTRICT NO. 5.

Two terms. The first taught by Miss Nellie M. Curtis, a very acceptable teacher; her efforts in this school were attended with a fair degree of success. Second term, under the instructions of Miss Lucy M. Brooks, a teacher of some considerable experience, diligent and persevering in her efforts. A very marked improvement was perceptible in this school.

DISTRICT NO. 6.

Three terms, taught by Miss Nell A. Cleasby, a teacher too well known to need commendation. Naturally adapted to the school room, a lover of children, and her large experience, insures her eminent success as a teacher.

DISTRICT NO. 7.

Two terms, taught by Miss Alice I. Allen. This school was a success.

DISTRICT NO. 10.

Two terms. First term taught by Miss Lillian D. Galer, her first effort. Very well for a beginner. Second term was taught by Miss Nellie E. Farr to the general acceptance of the district.

DISTRICT NO. 11.

One term, taught by Miss Edna B. Streeter, to the general acceptance of the district.

DISTRICT NO. 12.

Two terms, taught by Miss Emma M. Elliott. Success was apparent from the beginning, both in progress and discipline.

DISTRICT NO. 13.

One term, taught by Mrs. M. E. Sanborn, a very excellent teacher, giving general satisfaction.

DISTRICT NO. 14.

Two Terms, taught by Miss Kate I. Lyford, with results commendable and satisfactory.

DISTRICT NO. 18.

One term, taught by Miss Marcella M. Copp. This school was well disciplined, and for progress attained the school was a success.

DISTRICT NO. 19.

Two terms. The first taught by Miss Eva L. Dunbar. The second term was taught by Miss Carrie J. Lewis. The first effort at teaching by Miss L. was a very commendable and successful one, and with experience she will doubtless take high rank as a teacher.
