TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the eleventh day of March, next at seven-thirty of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To hear the reports of all committees and take any vote relative thereto.
4. To see if Town will vote to close permanently the cross road in Perham Corner from the gate of the cemetery to the four corners near Joseph Rudis' or take any vote relative thereto.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate \$100.00 to be used by the Town Police Officer for traffic duty. (By Petition)
6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to have a street light installed at the junction of N. H. Rt. 31 and the town road running to the Kinnvall residence. (By Petition)
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 to help pay Lyndeborough's share of the expenses for the current year of the Wilton-Lyndeborough Summer Swimming Program, or take any action relative thereto. (By Petition)

8. To see if the Town will vote to rescind the motion passed at a previous Town Meeting whereby the Town should plow driveways, or take any vote relative thereto.

9. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow sums of money not exceeding \$20,000.00 in the anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee or make any alterations thereto.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE LYNDEBORO VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT

There were fourteen fire calls for the year 1957, five chimney fires, one flooded oil burner, six grass and brush fires, one auto fire, and one house fire. One chimney fire was answered by the Francestown department, and a chimney fire and the auto fire by the Wilton department. The Lyndeboro Fire department also had one call for the resuscitator.

During the year 1957, the Fire Department purchased five new lined raincoats, and five new firemen's helmets which are a great asset to the comfort and safety of the men when on call. Also during the past year the Selectmen authorized the Fire Department to contract the Motorola Company to install a remote control fire alarm system at a cost of \$350.00. This system which is now in use enables Mr. Fred Nelson to sound the fire alarm from his home in Wilton, as soon as a fire call is received, and the new installation has proven to be a great time saver.

The Town is fortunate to have such a capable volunteer fire department whose members give many hours of time for the protection of the townspeople, and their property. Each member gives at least one Sunday afternoon during the summer months for standby duty at the fire station so as to insure the quickest response to an alarm.

Three members of the fire department attended a fire school course at the Meadowood Drill Yard in Fitzwilliam, N. H., last fall.

FOREST FIRE PREVENTION IS EVERYBODY'S BUSINESS

New Hampshire faces a continuing challenge in its forest fire problem — 97 percent of all our forest fires being man-caused and preventable — a serious indictment of interest in our own welfare and that of our neighbor. Both the State and the towns are striving diligently to effectively meet the challenge through education of the public to the threat fire presents to our woodlands; by maintaining a well trained corps of wardens and deputy wardens in every community and by providing ample opportunity for all who wish to dispose of unwanted waste materials. Carelessness and perverseness, however, continue to be the big hurdles.

Thoughtlessly discarded lighted cigars, cigarettes and matches from moving vehicles, by hikers, hunters and fishermen; careless burning of debris during hazardous periods in dangerous locations; illegal burning; improperly extinguished debris, camp and cook fires — all result in serious loss of property, disruption of in-

dustry and farm work and unnecessary expenditure of town and state funds.

To meet the challenge successfully, the state, your community and your local forest fire warden need YOUR thoughtful and cooperative effort — the rules are simple.

1. Don't burn at home — use your town dump and avoid all fire problems.

2. If you do burn, be sure to secure a written permit from your local forest fire warden when the ground is not covered with snow. Permits are required for open debris fires, home incinerators, outdoor fireplaces and camp fires. Your warden is instructed to permit burning if weather conditions, site and type of burning are safe.

3. Be sure that all lighted material — cigars, cigarettes and matches — are completely out before discarding them. Use ash trays in automobiles.

4. Make certain that your debris, camp and cook fires are completely out before leaving them.

5. Insist that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

6. Call the warden promptly when fire is detected and aid him to extinguish it.

REMEMBER — The fire you prevent might be the one which could burn your property.

REMEMBER — Forest Fire Prevention is everybody's business and our most important undertaking.

LIBRARIAN'S REPORT

To the Citizens of Lyndeborough:

This is my first report to you since I became your Librarian in June, 1954. As you no doubt know, there have been a great many changes in the Library. We are now open on Mondays. During the summer our time is 2:30 to 5:00 p. m. in the afternoon and from 7:00 to 8:00 in the evening. During the winter months we are open from 2:30 to 6:00 p. m.

In the winter of 1955, Mr. Charles D. Maurer of

the State Library staff, came and weeded out a great many of our old and obsolete books; making room for new books. For this we have been criticized; however, before assuming this responsibility I had permission of the Library Trustees.

We are grateful to so many kind friends for gifts of books and magazines. To name a few: Mr. and Mrs. Herbert Kimball gave "The American Heritage," a historical magazine which is so helpful to the school children and is also interesting for adults; Mr. and Mrs. Charles Whiting gave "Peterson's Field Guide to the Birds," "The Great Days of Piracy of the West Indies," by George Woodbury, and **The Horticultural Magazine**; Mr. and Mrs. William P. Kimball gave a fine collection of young people's stories; Mr. and Mrs. William H. Kimball, Mrs. Charles Wilcox, Miss Olive Phraner and an anonymous friend gave some fine fiction; Mrs. Herman Swartz has kept our little folks shelf well supplied with all types of stories for small children. All of the gifts have been greatly appreciated by the Librarian and the Trustees and we thank everyone for their donations.

The Bookmobile makes about six visits a year. To me it is an asset for it brings books we otherwise would not have a chance to read.

Another helpful service is being able to borrow books from the State Library at Concord. Namely reference, histories, and genealogies, etc. They pay the postage down and the borrower pays the postage back. There is no expense to the Library. The staff has been very cooperative in filling my requests.

At one of our meetings, my Trustees and I discussed fines and decided to charge ten cents a week for books that were overdue instead of two cents a day. The children have done very well and bring their books in before they are due.

There are many things we could use, such as a larger bulletin board, another bookcase in the reading room where we could stack our old magazines making

the table less crowded. When the children use the table for study it is difficult for the space is very limited.

Also rest room accommodations would be most helpful. Many time the children ask where the rest room is and I have to say we have none and this is rather embarrassing.

I have attended several neighborhood meetings and they have been most helpful, instructive and interesting.

We do wish more people would use the Library. I feel we have some fine books and magazines. I know several people go out of town for their reading material and I am sure we have some fine books which they have never read.

We trust we can carry on and be of service to all for years to come.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lyndeborough School in said district on the 8th day of March 1958, at 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or agent of the district.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.
8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state aid foundation aid fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appro-

priation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeborough:

I respectfully submit my first annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Staff and Instruction

Our school opened this fall with the same staff as last year. Mrs. Adelaide Herrick teaches in grades 3 and 4, and acts as Principal of the building. Mrs. Alice Smith teaches in grades 1 and 2 and Mrs. Mildred Peters in grades 5 and 6.

Miss Sybil Beatham continues to supervise the health of our children with the assistance of Dr. Edward Sheris, the school doctor. A full account of health activities is given in the School Nurse Report.

Mr. Harry Holt continues as school custodian and favorable comments relative to the condition of our building are regularly being made. We are indeed fortunate to have such a conscientious and dedicated person handling this important area of the school program.

Mrs. Barbara Shinn continues to operate one of the finest lunch programs in this Union. Her efforts, beyond regularly required duties, are well known and it is believed appreciated by all. A feeling of doing more than the bare minimum, by Mrs. Shinn, has brought about the exceptional results with this program.

This year from funds available for music instruction, Mr. Edward Hamilton has been spending an hour or two a week in providing instruction on various instruments, such as saxophone, clarinet, trumpet and drums. Quite a few children started in the program, but the numbers have finally settled to about six who are currently active. It is wonderful that Lyndeborough is providing such instruction for children interested in this facet of education. Progress has been very good and the program insures that some children from Lyndeborough will be trained and ready to move into

the Wilton School Band in Grade 7 along with similarly prepared elementary Wilton children.

The holding together of our staff for another year continues to develop a sound and stable school, one of which Lyndeborough can well be proud. Year after year children from our school have moved to High School and not only easily adjusted adequately to High School life, but invariably have been among the leaders of their classes academically and socially. This certainly should assure citizens of the quality of work being performed by our teachers day in and day out.

Building and Grounds

The building and grounds are in good condition, with the exception of the old school roof. This roof has been a source of difficulty almost since it was first constructed, and it seems it will continue to cause difficulty until it is carefully repaired. A sum of money has been put into the budget to provide for repairs to the primary room roof, but this will be a patch job to take care of the present.

Money is also provided within the budget to tar walkways about the buildings. This expenditure is being made to prevent the tracking of mud and dirt into the building and also to make it easier to take care of snow in this area in the winter.

Special Articles

Article 9 is being placed in the Warrant to make it possible to combine the school and town checklists and have the list supervised by the town supervisors. The Article, in other words, helps to do away with a needless duplication of effort.

Article 10 makes provision for an additional teacher, if one is needed on a full-time basis. It is estimated that next year the number of children in grades 1 and 2, under the direction of Mrs. Smith, will be so great that a half-time teacher must be hired to do any kind of a

job with these youngsters. Present plans call for a teacher to come in to school in the morning to help with fundamental areas such as reading, writing and arithmetic, since individual help is needed. In the afternoon, Mrs. Smith could handle all the children in areas of science, health, social studies and literature.

The Article is written as it is to take care of the possibility of the number of 1st and 2nd graders exceeding 40. If this situation occurs, and Lyndeborough's pupil population has steadily been increasing beyond census estimates, then funds would be available for hiring a full-time teacher, without having to hold a Special District Meeting, or provide for a special appropriation. If class size does not exceed 40 a half-time teacher only will be hired. The State Board of Education has set up the policy of limiting class size to 40 or fewer youngsters, and this seems to be sound from an educational point of view.

To show the way Lyndeborough's pupil population has been growing, and perhaps will continue to grow, in December 1955 it was estimated that in 1957-58 there would be 76 pupils in grades 1-6. In October 1956 it was estimated that there would be 85 in grades 1-6 this year. Actually Lyndeborough had in grades 1-6 as of this past October not 76, not 85, but 98 pupils. If this kind of growth, 11-12 pupils per year, continues, there could well be over 40 children in grades 1 and 2, which will require another full-time teacher.

Article 10 provides for this eventuality but also provides for a part-time teacher on a half-time basis if a full-time teacher is not needed.

Finance

The School Board's budget calls for an appropriation of \$42,783.85, an increase of \$2,909.34 over the current appropriation. This increase is due primarily to increased Tuition costs \$1610; Transportation \$663;

Teachers' Salaries \$600, and Scholars' Supplies \$320. Tuition and Transportation costs are both statutory obligations and have increased because of rising costs and increased numbers of children.

High School Tuition costs at Wilton next year are set at \$285 per pupil, this figure being \$72 less than the State Average Tuition rate of \$367. At the elementary level the tuition costs have been set at \$215 for 7th and 8th grade pupils, \$17 less than the State Average Elementary Tuition charge of \$232.

In spite of this fair rate Lyndeborough should look forward to the day when tuition costs will be higher and also the numbers of pupils. In 1962-63 it is expected that elementary pupils in grades 7 and 8 will number 34, and high school pupils will number 50. If costs of tuition at Wilton are estimated at \$275 for elementary tuition and \$350 for high school tuition, at that time the total tuition bill will be about \$30,200 or a bit more than this current year's total assessment. It seems proper to alert the people of Lyndeborough to the financial burdens they might well have to face in the near future. Naturally as these tuition costs rise due to increased numbers, likewise transportation costs will have to increase to some extent just because of added numbers.

The increase in Item No. 8, Scholars' Supplies, has come about because the money set aside for this item for this current year has already been exceeded by over \$300. This increase has been caused by increased numbers of pupils in our school, and also because such a comparatively small amount was spent for this item in 1956-57. Next year's enrollment will exceed this current year's by at least seven.

The final area of increase is in the item of Teachers' Salaries. This increase is absolutely necessary to keep our salaries somewhat comparable to those in this area. Actually the average salary for our teachers this year

is \$423 less than the State Average for Elementary School teachers. This is a considerable difference.

The State Average for the percentage of Total Current Expenses given to Teachers' Salaries is approximately 56%, and has been for several years. The part of Current Expenses in Lyndeborough's budget devoted to Teachers' Salaries is 29.5%. Would you believe that in 1919-20 Lyndeborough was spending 59.2% of Total Current Expenses for Teachers' Salaries. This was not an unusual year in this respect since every year in that decade had percentages in this item of from 52.1% to 59.5%. Even at the height of the depression in 1932-33 the percentage was 45.2%. This means that Lyndeborough will pay about as little for teachers' salaries in 1958 percentage-wise as it ever has.

Lyndeborough will indeed be fortunate to keep intact the fine staff it currently has. It is a credit to the community to hold such fine instructors in spite of the financial factors noted above. Undoubtedly other factors have kept our staff happy and on the job year after year.

Conclusion

In closing, note should be made of the passing from the Lyndeborough School District scene of Ray P. Bishop, who so conscientiously served as Treasurer for so many years.

I wish to thank the Lyndeborough School Board, Staff, Budget Committee, parents, and friends, for their help and cooperation in continuing the fine educational program of our school.

REPORT OF SCHOOL NURSE

I made sixteen visits to the Lyndeborough Public School during the year 1956-57. The biggest problem was to complete the Salk Polio Vaccine program that was started in May 1955, and three shots of the vaccine were given to most of the children in the school, as well as the pre-school children and others who were eligible for the vaccine. Mrs. James Stearns and a committee of townspeople assisted in doing the clerical work and also in providing transportation and lollipops for the children. Many thanks are due those interested for their assistance in these clinics.

The children were weighed and measured during the year and most are showing a progressive gain. By means of the telebinocular I began the testing of the children's eyes and also with the aid of the Puretone Audiometer I completed the screening of the pupils for loss of hearing. Two children are to be re-checked in September to confirm some loss of hearing, as required by rule before reporting as deaf. One had an ear infection which was under treatment.

Some pediculosis was present during the school year but with the cooperation of the parents it was not transmitted to the other children. Diarrhea was present during the month of February but seemed to be associated with upper respiratory infections.

Dr. Sheris examined the children in February 1957 and found the following defects:
