STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Milan qualified to vote in town affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at Knights of Pythias Hall at West Milan Village in said town on the second Tuesday of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk.
2. To choose by ballot and major vote three Selectmen.
3. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Treasurer.
4. To choose Road Agents and all other necessary Town Officers including Fish and Game Wardens.
5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor, to apply on town debt and other necessary charges arising within the town.
6. To see what sums of money the town will vote to raise for laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges.
7. To see if the town will vote to build a bridge across Chick-wolnepy stream, near N. B. Wheeler's, and what kind of a bridge, wood or iron and raise money to build the same.
8. To see what sums of money the town will raise for breaking roads during the winter of 1906 and 1907.
9. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools.

10. To see if the town will vote not to distribute inventory blanks until such time as the Selectmen shall examine and appraise property to be taxed.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the Library.

12. To choose a Library Trustee to serve for three years.

13. To see if the town will vote not to have a liquor agent.

14. To see if the town will vote to put in a sewer from the residences on the hill above the store of Joseph Nay.

15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

16. To hear the reports of agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

## CHAIRMAN'S REPORT.

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### TO THE INHABITANTS OF THE SCHOOL DISTRICT OF MILAN.

The custom established in the past, of making report at the close of the fiscal year, I believe to be a duty incumbent on every member of the board of education, at the expiration of their term of office. Therefore in accordance with that which I believe to be a duty, I respectfully submit, not only a brief review of the progress of our schools in the past year, but also matters which I believe to be incident to, and of the most vital importance to the best interests of our schools in the future.

The general tendency of the times is toward progression, and pronounced improvement in our public school system.

Notwithstanding we have been working under difficulties in some ways, yet by judicious and conservative management of our district affairs, I believe we have been, in some degree, progressive, and have a right to claim that we are keeping pace with the general trend, along the line of improvement. If any school has not been as profitable, in the past year, as it should be, the teacher alone is not to be blamed, for without exception, I believe they have worked hard and in the interest of their respective schools. Collectively, in many ways, we may safely say, they have been unusually successful, establishing records for our district, unequaled

since the adoption of our present school system, if not in the history of our town. By comparing our records, for the past fiscal year, with statistical tables in the New Hampshire School Report for the year 1904. I find the average percent of attendance in our town to be three percent more than that of the state; four percent more than that of the county, and eight percent more than the average for the school years of 1903 and 1904 in our own town. Taking into consideration the fact that our town is thinly settled, that it has more miles of highway according to its population than most towns in the state, this record is indeed a commendable one, and reflects great credit upon both parent and pupil, as well as teachers.

In view of the fact, that the amount of money we receive from the state, toward the support of our schools, depends to a great extent on the percent of attendance, I consider that to be of the most importance of all statistics in our school records. In connection with this subject, let me say: I believe the most important matter that confronts the school board to-day, is the law governing the compulsory attendance of scholars between the ages of 14 and 16 years; the law requiring the attendance of all scholars under fourteen years of age is absolute. It also provides that school boards may prescribe rules, requiring them to attend up to the age of sixteen. In my judgment, action should be taken in this matter and such rules adopted before the beginning of the spring term. I have learned from observation, that a boy past the age of fourteen, who attends school, loiters about public places, or goes fishing at his pleasure, and without restraint, not only detracts from the interest of other scholars, and lures his classmates into habits of truancy, but becomes a detriment to the whole school.

I would respectfully ask of the parents, that you give the above subject more than a casual thought. Remember, you have the first and most direct influence over your children as scholars. That that influence is as evident in the school-room as in the home. That encouragement and support from you, will be helpful to, and

and fully appreciated by the teacher. That the school tax is the investment which yields the richest returns. That you are responsible to a great extent, for the failure or success of our schools.

Owing to the favorable condition of roads and weather, during the fall and winter months, the expense of conveying scholars has been much less than usual. The money saved from that expenditure, together with favorable conditions, enabled us to have more weeks of school than ever before, and the attendance in the last weeks, in most schools was good.

Although our school-houses have been painted throughout within the last few years; the old blackboards replaced with Lithoplate, and may be called in fairly good repair, yet when appropriating money for general repairs, it should be remembered that some need shingling at the present time.

As I remember the law, we are not allowed to change text books at the expense of the district oftener than once in five years. Such a law would bar the school board from making any important changes the coming year, and as our books are in fairly good condition probably it would not be advisable to do so.

In view of the fact that a taste for good reading is a product of cultivation and not a natural gift, and that our rural schools bear evidence of the lack of cultivation, I would suggest that a liberal amount of supplementary reading be furnished them, and that teachers be required to give that study more attention in the future than has been given in the past.

It may be noteworthy, that all our schools are now provided with U. S. flags of good quality and dimensions, with poles and appliances for displaying the same, and on pleasant days, when schools are in session, may be seen flying above our school buildings, giving to them an attractive and progressive, as well as patriotic expression.

In compliance with instruction given the school board at the last annual meeting, suitable fire escapes have been placed on

our village school buildings, affording ample protection for our scholars and teachers in case of accident by fire.

Some good work has been introduced into our village schools the past year, along the lines of cleanliness and improvement in and about our school-rooms and grounds, "Improvement Leagues" having been formed for that purpose; and the work begun by them is certainly suggestive that it should be continued in the future, and taken up by our rural schools. Geographically, our school district is divided, which has a natural tendency to divide the people socially. But we should ever bare in mind the supreme importance of our public schools. That in the education of our children, our interests are identical and the same, and that only by harmonious and cooperative work by the school board, with parents as an auxiliary, can we expect to attain the highest standard of efficiency and success.

In the discharge of my duties during the past six years, I have endeavored in every respect to act impartially, actuated only by the purest motives; and if, by such service, our schools have been benefitted in some degree, then I may well feel amply repaid.

In closing, I wish to thank both school board and parents, not forgetting the scholars, for the hearty support I have received from them in the past, and to wish them prosperity in the future. I respectfully submit the foregoing, not for prestige, but in the interest of our children, and our children's children.
