REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

February 15, 1950

To the Voters of New London:

In accordance with the Municipal Budget Law of the State of New Hampshire, the New London Budget Committee has prepared a town budget for the current year which is herewith submitted to you and set forth in the following pages of this report.

The Committee held two public hearings on the appropriations proposed for the town budget and received petitions for the various articles, all of which are included in the Town Warrant as submitted. We are confronted this year with an unusual number of special articles to consider. Some of them are of compelling nature and represent considerable appropriations. The Committee felt, therefore, in order to avoid an unwarranted increase in taxes, that certain of the special articles of less necessity, though desirable in themselves, should not be recommended to the town for adoption. Those articles that are submitted without recommendation are so indicated in the warrant.

The Committee recommends a reduction in the appropriation as submitted by the Sewer Commission for additional Sewage Disposal Plant facilities. It believes that \$10,000 is an adequate amount to effect the required improvement in the water pollution condition as demanded by the state authorities, and that this amount should be paid annually in five equal parts.

The entire school budget and all the regularly recurring items and other special articles appearing in the Town Warrant, exepting as otherwise noted therein, are recommended to the town for adoption.

TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the

County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in

Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March, next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.

3. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$11,755.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,300.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for the care of Town Poor.

.9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for Summer maintenance and \$4,000.00 for Winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$574.74, the State to contribute \$2,298.95 for Town Road Aid.

*11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropri-

ate the sum of \$700.00 to tar a portion of Lakeside Road beginning at Main Street and continuing to the last residence. (Joseph Tilton's).

*12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$350.00 to finish tarring the Barrett Road from the residence of Mr. Bush to the hydrant beyond the residence of Mr. Charles Wheeler.

*13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 to tar the road on North Shore Drive on Pleasant Lake, including the property of Dr. George Parks to and including the property of M. Roy London a distance of one half mile.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purpose of sidewalk repairs.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000 to be paid in five equal payments over a period of five years for the purchase of a Power Loader with Backhoe Attachment and Power Sander.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropripriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$650.00 for Hydrant service.

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the continued support and maintenance of a Skating Rink.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of maintaining an Information Booth. It being understood that any balance at the end of the season will be turned back to the Town.

*20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for Band Concerts to be held each week during July and August 1950. The selectmen to appoint a committee of three to make arrangements and have charge of said concerts.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four hundred and fifty dollars (\$450.00) to increase town officers' salaries as follows—for each Selectman \$100.00, Tax Collector \$100.00, and Treasurer \$50.00.

22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to install four (4) street lights, beginning at the residence of Rufus Lamson and ending at the residence of Edith Thurston. Estimated annual expense \$100.00.

23. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to install one (1) street light between Homan's Corner and Cricenti's corner on the Sunapee Road. Estimated annual expense \$25.00.

24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,509.37 for sewer maintenance for the ensuing year.

*25. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$31,500.00 for the purpose of constructing improvements of a permanent nature in the Town Sewer System, as directed by the State Water Pollution Commission: and to raise said sum by authorizing the selectmen to borrow the same in the name of the Town by the issuance of serial notes or bonds as provided in Chapter 72, Revised Laws, as amended, and for this purpose, to authorize the selectmen to determine the time and place of payment and rate of interest of such notes or bonds and to provide for the sale of the same.

26. To see if the Town will vote to authorize and empower the planning board to approve or disapprove, in its discretion and judgment, plats showing new streets, or the widening thereof, or parks in acordance with Chapter 53, Sections 19-29 inclusive of the Revised Laws of New Hampshire 1942 as amended by the General Court of 1949. Following the adoption of the ordinance, the Town Clerk shall hereafter file with the register of deeds of Merrimack County a certificate or notice showing that the planning board has been so authorized, giving the date of such authorization.

The purpose of this ordinance shall be to provide against such scattered or premature subdivision of land as would involve danger or injury to health, safety, or prosperity by reason of the lack of water supply, drainage, transportation, or other public services, or necessitates excessive expenditure of town funds for the supply of such services and to provide for the harmonious development of the municipality and its environs, and for the proper arrangement and coordination of streets within subdivisions in relation to other existing or planned streets.

27. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.

28. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

29. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

ANNUAL REPORTS

NEW LONDON SERVICE ORGANIZATION, INC.

The New London Service Organization, Inc., was incorporated on February 8, 1944. Its purposes were (1) "To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women of New London . . . who have served in the armed forces of the United States and its Allies in the Second World War," and (2) "To give, grant, or contribute money or property, both real and personal, to such patriotic, civic, eduational, religious, or eleemosynary organizations, activities, or institutions, as now or hereafter may be in New London."

During its sixth year, as the attached reports reveal, the Organization sought to carry out both these purposes for which it exists. Much progress was made. The Memorial Athletic Field project, when completed with the help of Town funds, will give New London a permanent recreational area adjacent to the Central School, unequalled by any community of New London's size in New Hampshire. The Organization bespeaks the active interest and support of all the citizens of New London in an effort to push this project through to completion.

In other ways, too, the Organization has sought to serve the Town and its residents. As the Clerk's report shows, and as the plans for 1950 make clear, real accomplishment has been made and will be made in the coming year. The New London Service Organization has proved itself in its first six years, and seems assured of a useful part in the future growth and development of our Town.

Report of Clerk for 1949

During 1949, the New London Service Organization held monthly meetings at the Tracy Memorial Building. We started the year with a banquet at Edgewood Inn, where we were guests of Vice-President Herbert D. Swift.

There have been several changes during the year in the personnel of our directors and officers. Mrs. Ann Pardy, Mrs. Emma L. Colby and Mr. Frank Cordtmeyer, Treasurer resigned, and Mr. Fred A. Todd was taken by death. Mrs. William F. Kidder, Mrs. G. Winchester Dean and Mr. Robert Wallace were elected to fill out the unexpired terms.

Our fund raising projects this year consisted of a magician show May 6, netting \$87.50, a Hallowe'en Jamboree, October 29, netting \$25.00, and summer movies, netting \$34.25. The movie project was undertaken primarily for the entertainment of our summer guests. Mr. C. Vance Allyn was engaged as manager. Our organization was to assume any losses and to have 10% of any profit that there might be. This amounted to \$34.25 as stated above.

Having spent practically all our available funds on the Veterans' Memorial Field, approximately \$1900, and realizing that we were far from attaining our goal, we decided to ask the Town for \$2000 with which to continue the work. This money was readily voted and spent under the direction of the School Board and our own athletic field committee. The results are very gratifying and only serve to make us more eager to go on with the project.

In July, we purchased three settees to be placed along the Main Street for the comfort of pedestrians. We had the name of Karl M. Sholes, Spanish War veteran, inscribed on the soldiers' monument; we again subscribed to the National Geographic Magazine for the Elkins School; and we donated \$10 to the New London School dental clinic.

The Organization has likewise continued its function of making loans to veterans.

ANNUAL REPORT

NEW LONDON PUBLIC LIBRARY

TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

A report of the year 1949 at the Tracy Memorial Building is an account of a definite growth in the use of the facilities of the library and the community building.

A consideration of the statistics compiled for the year show:

Juvenile non-fiction	571

Thus our total circulation has been 14,825 while the total number of visitors has been 11,083.

The use of the library by the New London Central School is constantly growing, and the members and faculty of Colby Junior College are frequent visitors and borrowers.

The price of new books continues to rise, and though we have tried to keep our best-seller purchases up to date, some of the more expensive non-fiction books are missing from our shelves. Books added during the year have numbered 458, of which 95 have been gifts. People generously contributing books to us have been: Miss Gertrude Jones, Miss Emma Stanley, Mr. Frank Cordtmeyer, Mr. William Shurtleff, Mrs. Fred Sladen, Mrs. Phillip Parker, Rev. William Reid, Mrs. Margaret Blake, Mrs. Nellie Stimson, Mrs. Christine Morey, Mrs. Mary Prescott, Mrs. H. W. Shedd and Mrs. T. M. Jardine.

Our regular contributors of magazines and periodicals have kept our table in the reading room generously supplied, and with our own subscriptions, our list of current magazines is now 58. Among those giving magazines are: Mrs. Robert Sawyer, Miss Sallie and Miss Elizabeth Waite, Mr Earle Clark, Mrs. Kenneth Lord, Mrs. Velma Champion, Mr. Herbert Swift, Miss Betty Nichols, New London Outing Club, Mrs. Mary Macomber, and Mrs. Helen Holcomb.

We continue to send books to the Elkins School as often as they wish them. We lend supplementary reading to the grade school teachers at the Central School and book report requests to the teachers of the High School classes. We would like, at this time, to express our thanks and apprecia-

tion to these teachers for their co-operation and kindness in bringing their book lists to us before submitting them to their classes. This has been a great help to us in getting the books ready before we were deluged with demands.

We have been glad to respond promptly with inter-library loans to the State Library and Colby Junior College. The Bookmobile calls on alternate months and, though their appropriations were so reduced by the Legislature that they can no longer carry adult books, we can still borrow some juvenile ones from them. These help greatly our circulation in the children's room.

The librarians attended the Regional meeting held in Newport on the seventeenth of May. The head librarian also attended the New Hampshire and Vermont Library Institute for one week in June at Franklin.

During the writing of source themes at the High School and at the College the requests for material for reference come steadily. We have answrd 134 requests with books, pamphlets, and pictures covering many subjects. There is a great need at the library for more space in the upper stack room to take care of our growing reference material and magazine files.

Though the kindness of Mr. Frank Cordtmeyer and Mr. Seth Lamson, we have had a plentiful supply of colored book marks this year. These have proved very popular with everyone and we would like to thank these gentlemen for their thoughtfulness.

Our committee room is in constant use, not a week going by without at least two meetings being held there. Organizations using it have been, Junior and Adult Stamp Clubs. The Selectmen, Red Cross, American Legion Auxiliary, Supervisors of the Check List, Hospital Board, New London Service Organization, Planning Board, Old Home Day Committee, Rebekahs, Garden Club, Boy Scouts, and Budget Committee.

From October to May the Woman's Club held two meetings a month in the Auditorium. The Garden Club met each month through the spring and summer.

In January the assistant librarian, Mrs. Jennie Lull, resigned, and her excellent work in the Children's Room has been missed this year. Mrs. Velma Champion was ap-pointed by the trustees to fill her place.

Nearly one hundred relatives and friends attended the yearly recital of Mrs. William Colburn's piano pupils on June thirteenth. This event, which always attracts a large number, proved to be again a most enjoyable evening. Beginning with the youngest children and finishing with a duet by Mrs. Colburn and her most advanced pupil, Laura May Homan, these students were certainly a credit to their teacher.

A hobby show was held in the auditorium during Hospital Day Week which was enjoyed by one hundred and five guests.

During the month of August the former librarian, Miss Lennie Messer, took charge of the library with Mrs. Champion serving as her assistant.

The Vacation Reading Club, held through the months of July and August, contained an enrollment of twenty-seven children. On August thirty-first a party for twenty-two of its members took place at the library where six diplomas and ten certificates were awarded the children finishing the course. Games were played, a book quiz conducted, and refreshments served to the children by the librarians. This club not only helps in supplementary reading but also keeps the children's interest in books alive during the summer months when their reading has a tendency to flag.

An exhibit of oil paintings by Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard was on display in the auditorium from August 29 through September 10. On the opening day tea was served to many friends and visitors.

National Book Week was observed in November with a display of books to meet all tastes. The theme for this year was, "Make friends with books." Beginning with the first friendly books for the youngest children and progressing through animal and Walt Disney books, to sea tales, adventure, biographies and mysteries, the exhibit seemed to hold the interest of every child visitor. The teachers of the first six grades at the Central School brought their classes to the library on alternate afternoons throughout Book Week. Arranged about the room were handicraft articles made by the children during Saturday afternoons. Prominent was a show case with miniature dolls from many lands and a collection of valentines, featuring a century-old one with its embossed envelope in contrast to the modern valentines around it. We were honored by the presence of nearly 200 visitors during this week.

Mr. Soucy, the teacher of the seventh and eighth grades at the Central School, has brought his classes to us for instruction in using and knowing the library. We have been glad to instruct them in where and how to find reference

material, the use of the Reader's Guide and the book catalog, and to answer all questions possible.

Our Children's Room has had a happy and successful year under the guidance of Mrs. Velma Champion. The number of children attending the Story Hour every Saturday afternoon attest to its popularity. We have instructed and entertained 424 children at these sessions this past year.

Our gardener and janitor, Mr. Edward Dexter, has faithfully kept our lawns, shrubbery, and flower beds beautiful throughout the year, and our building clean and in good repair. The Garden Club has also contributed to the outside work in the gardens.

During Christmas time, holiday decorations and lights have added to the festive spirit of the season.

Hospital Day, under the direction of Mr. Thomas Wistar, brought in the largest amount of money ever earned. The receipts for this day totalled \$6,046.22 (This figure does not include the money collected by the Summer Residents' Committee.) Members of the board and the hospital administration offer their heartfelt thanks to Mr. Wistar and the many members of his committee for their outstanding success.

The most important single addition to our hospital building during the past year was the installation of the sprinkler system. This was made possible through the generosity of the Summer Residents' Committee and Colby Junior College. The Summer Residents' Committee gave \$3,000.00 toward this project and Colby Junior College gave \$1,377.00. The sprinkler system is installed in all the rooms, the corridors, the basement and the attic. Mrs. Sargent anticipates that this will effect a reduction of about fifty percent in the cost of our insurance.

The Summer Residents' Committee has also purchased a new washing machine for the hospital at a total cost of \$803.72. We are deeply indebted to the members of the Summer Residents' Committee for their continued interest and generosity to the New London Hospital. It would indeed have been difficult to continue without their support.

The Hospital Aid Society has continued their work in making improvements in the Nurses' Home. In addition to these activities, they have given \$500.00 for the purchase of new linen at the hospital during 1949.

Individual gifts of money, equipment, food, etc., have been too numerous to itemize here. However, our Superintendent, business manager, members of the staff and the board wish to thank all those who continue to do so much in support of the hospital.

Mrs. Sargent reports that the total number of patient days for 1949 was 5,625. 607 adults were admitted during the year and 58 births were recorded. These figures show an increase over last year.

Miss Dorothy Hale, laboratory technician, reports that 2,808 laboratory tests were performed during 1949. This figure shows an increase of 200 over 1948.

The New London Hospital continues to look to you as individuals and as club or association members for support. Because of your loyal and generous interest, the hospital is enabled to continue its role of service to the area.

NEW LONDON HOSPITAL AID ASSOCIATION

Annual Report October 1, 1948 To October 1, 1949

Meetings of the New London Hospital Aid Association were held the first Wednesday of the month, with an average attendance of 20. Hospital mending was done at each meeting, and work on articles to be sold on Hospital Day. Mending during the summer was cared for by Mrs. George Lenz.

Money-raising activities of the Association included the annual Rummage Sale, membership drive, Donation Day, and rental of pillows at the Barn Theater, and at movies shown at the Town Hall and at Soo-Nipi Park Lodge. Grateful acknowledgement is made to the Sutton Woman's Club for \$25 received from that group on Donation Day.

The Association table on Hospital Day, 1949, was unusually successful owing to the large amount of saleable material given both by local and summer residents. About 400 letters requesting such contributions were sent out by the committee in charge. Appreciation is extended, also, to the women of Georges Mills who gave a number of aprons to be sold at the Hospital Aid Association table.

Assistance to the Nurses' Home included the payment of \$700 toward the reduction of the mortgage on that building; \$250 for a new hot water heater; the purchase of a secondhand electric refrigerator; and minor repairs and improvements.

The Hospital was voted the annual sum of \$500 to assist in the buying of linens.

As a community endeavor, the Association continued its sponsorship of Blue Cross and Blue Shield.

Since the work of the Hospital Aid Association is greatly facilitated by the support of many outside the small group directly connected with it, the officers and members wish to thank all who have given so generously of their help and cooperation.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Forest Fires—Our Most Shameful Waste

Everyone apparently fears fire but too many are careless with it. This is particularly true of fires in and near woodlands. Official figues show that more than 98 percent of all forest fires result from human carelessness and can be prevented. Consequently, we may say "Forest Fires are our most shameful waste."

Annual forest fire losses are tremendous and their effects far reaching. Such fires destroy the raw products of the forests, the protection forests provide for game and the supply of ground water. They upset local economies by drawing men from gainful employment and requiring the expenditure of public funds to extinguish them.

Our forest fire organization is doing a good job in keeping the sizes of fires small but the number of fires is increasing. In 1949 there were 100 more fires in New Hampshire than in 1948, but they burned 500 acres less. For the warden and his deputies to do the job they are capable of, they must have the cooperation of the public—YOU!

The primary objective of all fire fighters is PREVEN-TION—fire stoppage. This is the goal toward which your local forest fire warden and his deputies are constantly working. It can be achieved ONLY if YOU and YOU and YOU cooperate with them. It is worth YOUR effort and can be accomplished by:

1. Being careful with fires in or near woodland, being particularly careful with matches and cigarettes.

2. Securing the required written permit from the warden when the ground is not covered with snow.

3. Insisting that others be careful and comply with burning requirements.

4. Calling the warden promptly when fire is detected and aiding him to extinguish it.

Let's reduce the number of forest fires and eliminate our most shameful waste.

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.

2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.

3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.

5. To determine and appoint the salaries of the School Board and Truant Officer, and fix the compensation of any other officers or Agents, Auditors, Committees, or Officers chosen, and pass any vote relating thereto.

6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

7. To choose Agents, Auditors and Committees in relation to any subject embraced in this warrant.

8. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.

9. To see if the district will raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000 for continuing the work on Memorial Athletic Field, and pass any vote relating thereto.

10. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New London School Board:

I herewith submit my second annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Enrollment

The enrollment for the school year 1949-50 is 222. This represents an increase of 13 students over the enrollment figures of a year ago. It is broken down as follows:

Central School:

Grades 1-8	114
Grades 9-12	90
Elkins School: Grades 1-8	18

There are 37 tuition students in the High School and 5 in the grades. There are also 3 tuition pupils at the Elkins School. Without this group from the surrounding towns, the High School would have only about 50 students. Such a sized high school could not offer as wide a variety of courses or provide the necessary competitive spirit for New London students in the classroom, athletics or extra-curricular activities. We can still accommodate additional students in the High Shool without overcrowding.

Teachers

The supply of teachers at the high school level is much greater and with the exception of one or two fields—such as home eonomics and commerce—does not constitute a real problem.

The supply of elementary teachers is quite a different matter. We are faced with a serious shortage of lower grade teachers. With increased enrollments in these grades and still an insufficient number of people in the colleges taking elementary work, this situation is likely to continue for many years.

If we expect to get good elementary teachers in our schools, each of us should urge young people desiring to teach, to train at this level. Employment opportunities will be much better for grade positions than for high school.

A year ago there were six replacements in the staff at the Central School—this year there were but two changes. A satisfied, contented group of teachers is an asset to any school system. We hope to be able to offer inducements—

financial and otherwise—to hold good, professionally-minded teachers and to secure competent, qualified replacements—when necessary.

In-Service Training

Dr. Anna Philbrook, Director of the N. H. Child Guidance Clinic, conducted a course in Mental Hygiene through the University of New Hampshire Extension Service. The course was held in Newport during the first semester. It attracted social workers, nurses, clergymen and housewives as well as teachers. All four of the elementary teachers took the course.

Repairs

During the summer all classrooms (5) and the corridor on the second floor were painted. The variety of room colors, chosen on the basis of light-value as well as general appearance have caused much favorable comment.

Other painting included the basement corridor, the portion of the Auditorium not painted a year ago, and the completion of the painting of the outside trim.

The woodwork at the front of the stage was also refinished.

All windows in the laboratory and on one side of the gym were weather stripped

The work of the janitor, Mr. Weston Ray, should be noted. His interest and concern for the proper maintenance and cleanliness of the school is far beyond the regular call of duty.

New Equipment

The major items of new equipment include:

Venetian blinds for all second floor windows on the front side of the building.

Handwriting

We have endeavored to concentrate this year on improving the handwriting of the students. This is something that involves all grade levels but is particularly important in the elementary grades where the proper writing habits must be formed.

It is hoped that next year we may offer a specialized handwriting service. Many New Hampshire communities have adopted this writing system and the actual progress shown in a year is remarkable.

Conclusion

The work of the school touches many phases of community activity. It is my hope that our accomplishments will be such as to merit the continued interest and generous support of the citizens of New London.

REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

January 10, 1950

Supt. Gordon B. Flint Newport, New Hampshire Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my report as Headmaster of New London Central School.

The annual Open House, which is held as an integral part of the National Education Week, offiers an opportunity to see and to hear about activities that are a regular part of the daily program. However, there are many other activities that are a functional part in the life and education of our young people in their endeavor to gain a full life. It is my desire to present some of these activities at this time.

Within a week after school opened in September the Seniors picked their annual play and started plans for their Yearbook, *The Exodus*, and their Senior Trip. This year they presented "We Shook The Family Tree" under the direction of Miss Eleanor Parker.

As a part of their program to raise money for their class trip they put on a Harvest Supper in October. The 1949 Seniors went to New York for five days with Miss Parker and Mr. Curtiss as chaperones.

Visual Educaiton is no longer an added attraction in a classroom, but has become a permanent part of the regular program. Mr. Soucy acts as the Director of the program and helps the other teachers in planning their film needs. In addition to movies in the classroom many are used for assembly programs and this year movies are shown during one noon hour each week. We have a small library of film strips which find an important part in many classes.

Last year a Student Assembly Committee with the assistance of Miss Parker and Mr. Livingston arranged a series of programs consisting of outside speakers. Among the speakers were Dr. J. Duane Squires and four students from one of his classes at Colby Junior College, the directors of admission from the University of New Hampshire, Keene Teachers' College, and Plymouth Teachers' College, a group of nurses from the Concord Hospital, and the assistant director of the Sunapee State Park. In addition to these programs each English class presented a one act play as an assembly.

During the spring a Student Council Constitutional Com-

mittee was elected by the student body and many long hours were spent in writing a Constitution for a Student Council. The constitution was presented to the students for criticism and after necessary changes had been made it was voted on and accepted. Each class nominated several members for the Council and a regular election patterned after town elections was held under the supervision of the Constitutional Committee. The Student Council now is an active part of our regular program.

Several educational trips were taken by various classes to gain information relative to their class work. Some of the places visited were: The Laconia State School, The State's Prison, The State Mental Hospital, The Rumford Press, the Citizens National Bank in Newport, and the Dorr Woolen Mill.

A large number of students entered the annual New London Woman's Club Essay contest. The results were as follows:

1st. Barbara Holteen

2nd. Nancy Gilson

3rd. Alice Beals

In addition to this contest four students entered the Elk's Regional Essay Contest and three of them won prizes. They were: Alice Beals, Lois Enman and Evelyn Bickford.

The results of the eleventh annual Heidelburg Prize Speaking Contest were as follows:

1st. Alice Beals—"The Soul of Caliban"2nd. Fred Rich—"The Brotherhood of Faith"

3rd. Norma Oksa—"A Secret For Two" Honorable Mention. Henry Meinecke—"The Interlopers"

Thirteen students entered the first State Speech Tournament in February 1949 at the University of New Hampshire. Lois Enman and Evelyn Bickford placed in the finals and Evelyn tied for second prize. This is to become an annual affair and plans are under way for entering again this year.

The Music Department, under the direction of Mrs. Alberta Fisher, was busy throughout the year as may be seen from the following. The High School Glee Club joined with the Sunapee High School Glee Club for a joint concert which was presented in New London and in Sunapee. The Elementary Grades presented the Operetta, *Tom Sawyer*. Four boys represented the Glee Club and three boys represented the Orchestra at the State Music Festival. The entire Glee Club and a Boy's Glee Club with the student director, Wallace Williams, went to the State Auditions. The first and second grades presented a Garden Party in June. The Glee Club and Orchestra made several public appearances in addition to the above. The band was given new life when school opened in the fall when Mr. Herwood Curtiss accepted the leadership. It will make its first public appearance in the spring.

The University of New Hampshire Testing Service conducted a series of guidance tests with the Juniors and Eighth Grade. At the same time they gave the State Senior tests. The results of the tests are used during the personal conferences with the students. Every student has at last one conference during the year and more if needed.

When the athletic field is completed a more rounded athletic program will be possible. Mr. Neal Wells and Miss Eleanor Jackson have supervised the athletic program. Miss Jackson inaugurated girls' softball last fall and the girls showed a great deal of interest in it.

The Home Economics classes under the supervision of Mrs. Herwood Curtiss put on a dinner for a Regional Lunch Program meeting in October.

The Sophomore English Class started a school paper called the Sophmoronics which has found an important place in our school affairs.

The Lunch Program, under the able supervision of Mrs. Wesley Woodward, continues to be an important part of our regular program.

The usual class parties and school dances were held during the year with the Junior Prom being the highlight of the year.

The cooperative spirit of the faculty and the students and the fine support of the school by the community and the school authorities assure the fulfillment of a year of accomplishment.
