TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire Town Warrant

THE POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 10:00 A.M. TO 7:30 P.M.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Newton, N.H. in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said Newton, on Tuesday, the thirteenth of March next, at ten o'clock in the forenoon, to choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year, by official ballot, and to take other action required to be inserted on said ballot; the polls to be open at ten o'clock in the forenoon and to close not earlier than seven-thirty o'clock in the evening, and thereafter to reconvene at the Sanborn Regional Middle School in Newton, on Wednesday, March 14, 1984, at seven o'clock in the evening for the purpose of acting upon all other matters to come before the Meeting.

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing, Question on Official Ballot.
- 2. Are you in favor of the adoption of the amendment to the existing Town of Newton Zoning Ordinance as proposed by the Planning Board?

To comply with State of New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated 674:31 and 674:32, to allow for the placement of mobile homes on individually owned lots in subdivisions specifically established for this purpose.

All other requirements currently placed on RESIDENTIAL A dwellings will be applied in any of these subdivisions. Question on Official Ballot

- 3. To hear reports of Town Officers and pass any vote relating thereto.
- 4. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to transfer tax liens and convey property acquired by Tax Collector's deed by public auction (or advertised sealed bid) or in such manner as determined by the Selectmen as justice may require. RSA 80:42
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell any property of the Town, excluding Real Estate, not used for public purposes by advertised sealed bids.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or another governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in RSA 31:95-B.

8. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate and authorize the withdrawal from the Revenue Sharing Fund established under the provisions of the State and Local Assistance Act of 1972 for use as set-offs against budgeted appropriations for the following specific purposes and in amounts indicated herewith or take any other action hereon:

Town Hall \$10,000.00

Fire Department 10,000.00

Highway Maintenance: Summer 6,000.00

Winter 6,000.00

- 9. To see if the Town will vote to grant a discount of 2% on property taxes if paid within fifteen (15) days from date of tax bill.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote a twenty-five cent (.25) per hour increase for all Town employees as included in the printed budget, effective March 1, 1984.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,000.00 to be used for renovations to the vestibule and Selectmen's Office, and replace storm windows in the Town Hall. All work will require a minimum of three sealed bids.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$6,000.00 to re-side the Center Fire Station. All work will require a minumum of three sealed bids.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,700.00 to insulate the Center Fire Station. All work will require a minimum of three sealed bids.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$3,500.00 for the construction of a fire pond and dry hydrant on North Main Street near Goulds Hill Road.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the future purchase of fire apparatus and equipment.
- 16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the future purchase of Police vehicles and equipment for said vehicle.
- 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 to be placed in a Capital Reserve Fund to be used for the future addition to, or renovation of, the Gale Library.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to accept and expend State of New Hampshire Highway Block Grant Aid in the sum of \$29,085.73 for the maintenance, construction and reconstruction of Class IV and Class V highways.

- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,000.00 to purchase a new copy machine for the Selectmen's Office. Purchase will require three sealed bids.
- 20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$450.00 to assist the elderly for a bus trip, open to all elderly residents of Newton.
- 21. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Conservation Commission to expend up to \$3,500.00 of its woodcutting program money for the purpose of surveying parcels of Town-owned lands.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$7,500.00 to pave an additional portion of Bancroft Road.
- 23. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,291.80 for annual dues for the Rockingham Planning Commission.
- 24. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,031.00 to assist the Rockingham County Community Action Program.
- 25. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$550.00 as a contribution to the Newmarket Health Center bus for the elderly.
- 26. On a petition of ten or more legal voters, to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$65.00 to assist Rockingham Child and Family Services.
- 27. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,765.00 to purchase Visiting Nurse Services for the residents of Newton from the Medicare certified Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association, Inc., and authorize the Selectmen to appoint two (2) representatives to serve on the Board of Directors of the Association.
- 28. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,000.00 to join the Family Mediation Program of Southern Rockingham County. Said Program has lowered the cost of Juvenile Care, offering an alternative to court placements and Juvenile Officer's overtime work load.
- 29. To see if the Town of Newton will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to help defray expenses, of Seacoast Task Force on Domestic Violence/A Safe Place, incurred while providing services to residents of Newton and expend for purposes provided by law.
- 30. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,110.30 for the support of the work of the Center For Life Management.
- 31. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$485,145.00 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year, including all charges as shown in the Town Budget as posted with the Town Warrant.

- 32. To see if the Town will vote to institute the policy that the senior member of the Board of Selectmen, in a three-year term, will be the Chairman of the Board for the ensuing year.
- 33. To see if the Town will vote to accept and adopt the New Hampshire Civil Defense Radiological Emergency Response Plan.

34. To see if the Town will vote to adopt the following resolution:

"Given that the Board of Selectmen conveyed title to a parcel of land, located on Thornell Road, which had been taken by the Town in default of redemption from a tax sale, to Ida Hanson in 1935 without approval of the Town, and Given that the subject parcel of land was purchased by Judith Raymond in 1969, who learned that because the Board of Selectmen did not have authority, the parcel of land has a cloud on the title, now therefore, Be it Resolved that the Board of Selectmen is authorized to issue a Confirmatory Deed for the property, in order to remove the cloud on the subject parcel of land."

35. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

Dear Members of the Board:

We have examined the financial statements of the various funds and account groups of the Town of Newton for the year ended December 31, 1982 and have issued our report thereon, dated July 14, 1983. As part of our examination, we reviewed and tested the Town's system of internal accounting control to the extent we considered necessary to evaluate the system as required by generally accepted auditing standards. Under these standards, the purpose of such evaluation is to establish a basis for reliance thereon in determining the nature, timing and extent of other such auditing procedures that are necessary for expressing an opinion on the financial statements. Such study and evaluation disclosed the following which we believe to be a material weakness in internal accounting controls.

FIXED ASSET ACCOUNTING

As in many New Hampshire communities, Newton does not maintain formal accounting records for its investment in fixed assets. Records are needed for control of the assets, as well as the insurance program and long-range planning. We offer the following program for your consideration.

- Adoption of a formal capitalization policy by the Board of Selectmen.
- * Inventory existing fixed assets and maintain records of identified items at a central location under the control of the Selectmen.
- Establish fixed asset accounting records for all new acquisitions and a certain percentage of existing items annually.
- * Establish a program for periodically verifying existence of items in the fixed asset accounting records or on the inventory.
- * Adopt formal procedures to delete items from the record.

While we recognize that undertaking a program such as the one above represents a major investment of resources and that benefits should not outweigh costs in any system of internal control, we believe that control of assets, particularly moveable equipment, should receive a high priority from Town officials.

PURCHASING PROCEDURES

Internal control over the purchasing function appears to be weak. While we do not advocate that the Town adopt an encumbrance accounting system at this time, we strongly urge the Board of Selectmen to require compliance with the Town's existing purchasing procedures. We offer the following suggestions to assist the Board in controlling purchasing.

- * Establish control over blank purchase requisitions.
- * Notify vendors that
 - ** Invoices will not be processed without a purchase requisition number.
 - ** Invoices must be mailed directly to the Selectmen's Office.
- Establish a policy prohibiting accommodation purchases of any type.
- * Include a copy of the purchase requisition with transaction documentation.
- * Formally cancel paid invoices.

OTHER

The objective of internal accounting control is to provide reasonable, but not absolute, assurance as to the safeguarding of assets against loss from unauthorized use or disposition, and the reliability of financial records for preparing financial statements and maintaining accountability for assets. The concept of reasonable assurance recognizes that the cost of a system of internal accounting control should not exceed the benefits derived and also recognizes that the evaluation of these factors necessarily requires estimates and judgment by management.

There are inherent limitations that should be recognized in considering the potential effectiveness of any system of internal accounting control. In the performance of most control procedures, errors can result from misunderstanding of instructions, mistakes of judgment, carelessness or other personal factors. Control procedures whose effectiveness depends upon segregation of duties can be circumvented by collusion. Similarly, control procedures can be circumvented intentionally by management with respect either to the execution and recording of transactions or with respect to the estimates and judgments required in the preparation of financial statements. Further, projection of any evaluation of internal accounting control to future periods is subject to the risk that the procedures may become inadequate because of changes in conditions and that the degree of compliance with the procedures may deteriorate.

Our study and evaluation of the Town's system of internal accounting control for the year ended December 31, 1982, which was set forth in the first paragraph, would not necessarily disclose all weaknesses in the system. Town of Newton Page 3

The recommendations on administration and operational matters not directly related to internal accounting control, as listed below, were developed from our observation of the Town's operations during our examination. They are not the result of a special study.

INSURANCE REVIEW

As part of our examination, we reviewed current levels of insurance coverage being carried by the Town. While we do not believe that the Town is grossly underinsured, our review indicates that a complete review of current coverages might be in order. There are currently several reputable insurance consulting firms who review the adequacy of current coverages, prepare bid specifications and review bid proposals for municipalities. They have been able in many cases to reduce the cost of insurance with increased amounts of coverage because of the competitive nature of insurance in today's economy. The benefits of such a study are two-fold. First, update current coverage levels and deductibles, and second, obtain competitive pricing and expert review of proposals to obtain the best coverage at the lowest price from a reputable firm.

REVENUE SHARING COMPLIANCE

Our compliance audit of Revenue Sharing Funds disclosed several items of non-compliance with the Revenue Sharing Act which we have noted in our separate Revenue Sharing Compliance Report. While none of these violations should require actual repayment of Revenue Sharing Funds, it is extremely important that future compliance be mandated in order to show "good faith" to the Office of Revenue Sharing.

MODERNIZATION OF ACCOUNTING SYSTEM

While the accounting system used appears to meet Town requirements for accurate financial information, it appears to require much duplication of bookkeeping effort. We recommend that the Board review the possibility of purchasing one of several available "one write" cash disbursements systems designed for governmental units. The Tax Collector's office should also investigate the feasibility of posting cash receipts in summary form in order to conserve clerical effort.

TAX COLLECTOR - TOWN CLERK CHANGE FUND

Both the Tax Collector and the Town Clerk are required to provide change from their personal funds. We do not consider this to be a sound business practice and recommend that the Town provide these officials with adequate change funds.

RECREATION COMMISSION SPECIAL REVENUE FUND

The Town has established a separate fund into which certain recreation related revenue is deposited for an unidentified future special project of the Recreation Commission. We are not aware of any state law which permits the establishment of funds of this type.

CONCLUSION

The purpose of this commentary letter is to provide constructive recommendations to improve Town operations in the future. We noted many positive aspects of the Town's management and procedures which are not mentioned due to the nature of a letter of this type. We want to commend the efforts of all Town officials for their efforts and dedication in attempting to perform their difficult and sometimes complicated responsibilities and duties.

The provisions of R.S.A. 71-A, Section 21, require that this commentary letter must be published in its entirety in the next annual report of the Town. Publication of the general purpose financial statements and auditors' opinion is optional at the discretion of the Board.

We would like to acknowledge all of the assistance and many courtesies extended to us by Town personnel.

REPORT OF THE CHIEF OF POLICE

This is my first year as your Police Chief, and it has been a challenging and rewarding one. In going over the many files, records and Reports of former Chiefs it is apparent to me, and of great concern, that the most serious crime; and other negative acts which directly affect the welfare of the community remain real problems. I specifically refer to juvenile problems, burglaries, thefts, vandalism and traffic accidents. In spite of everything that my predecessors and I have done to bring these destructive activities under control the continue to plague us, and there is much more that can be done.

The statistics at the end of this Report show that during the past year burglaries came down from 40 to 22, a reduction of 45%. Many factors contributed to this, and I believe that one of the important ones is that a much more aggressive patrol program was put into effect and visibility of our patrol vehicles in the neighborhoods is much higher. Thefts dropped from 59 to 40, a decrease of 32%; and vandalism (criminal mischief) cases went down 26%, from 47 to 35. While I am very pleased at the reductions, these figures are still much too high

Former Chiefs made repeated pleas to the townspeople for their cooperation in conducting neighborhood crime watches and reporting any suspicious incidents or vehicles to the Department immediately. Again, I am appealing to all citizens of Newton to become involved in our Neighborhood Crime Watch Program.

One of the important aspects of the Program is that I have obtained educational and visual aid material in the form of slides, sample locks and pamphlets, and am available to talk to any group in Newton upon request. The talks will cover all phases of how to make your homes and businesses more secure. By the time you read this, I shall have given the first talk to a group of interested citizens, and it is my hope that from there, other groups of neighbors will become interested in the Program and call me to arrange for a time at which we can get together. In addition, pamphlets and other self-help information are available at the Station. It is only through being observant, careful and caring about our neighbors that we can begin to bring down the incidence of crime in Newton. The Police cannot keep you, your homes and property safe without having your consistent help and cooperation.

In 1983 we logged 1469 requests for service. I think it important to point out that whenever we receive a call, either by radio dispatch or telephone, an Officer must physically do something. The responding Officer may spend from 15 minutes to many hours on one incident, depending upon the problem. At present the Department has a complement of 2 full-time and 8 part-time Officers, 1 part-time Matron and 1 part-time Secretary. We provide coverage to the Town with Officers on duty 18 hours a day. Also, an Officer is always available on call for the few hours after we go off duty until the day shift starts. Based upon last year's Budget all Police services were provided at an average cost of \$1.07 per household per week. Our 1984 Budget reflects a slight increase in this figure at \$1.11 per household per week.

We are fortunate to have 2 Police Officers who have contributed their time and skills to the Department throughout the year, repairing and working on our emergency equipment and radios. Officer Gerald Easson has given countless hours of his own time working on our vehicles and equipment; and Officer Frank Cook has put several of our 2-way radios back into good working order.

As a result of your solid support at last year's Town Meeting we hired a full-time Officer and purchased a new Police vehicle. Both were badly needed. Having the second full-time Officer has greatly contributed to the smooth operation of the Department, giving consistency and continuity in handling cases.

Officer Kathleen Marino also serves as our Juvenile Officer and devotes many hours, as do I, to juvenile cases. Because they are so important juvenile cases are given a lot of time.

In 1981 an excellent training program for all Officers was instituted by my predecessor. This year a comprehensive Firearms Training Program was initiated and all Police Officers must qualify periodically and demonstrate a proficiency in all phases of the Firearms Training Program as a condition for continued employment. All of our Officers have completed qualification requirements during the past year. The program will remain in effect permanently.

Lastly, I want to discuss traffic accidents and speeding. During the past year we had 65 motor vehicle collisions, 51 of which involved personal injury and/or property damage over \$500. Our vehicles were out on radar checks frequently; we issued 218 traffic citations and 53 warnings; we patrolled the roads; and still the accidents keep occurring much too often. Here again, the Police Department cannot prevent accidents unless we have cooperation from drivers. I may aware, of course, that not all of these statistics involved residents of Newton; but neither can I tell you that none of our residents ever speed and get caught. They do. Please slow down - drive defensively - buckle those seat belts. And please remember that the law now requires that all children age 6 and under be buckled into a safety carrier or device.

This year has been one of learning, growth and change for me and my Officers. I believe that we have made good progress. I appreciate the foresight and cooperation which the Board of Selectmen and Townspeople have given me through the year. I am proud of my Officers and what we have accomplished; and we are all looking forward to another productive and successful year.

NEWTON FIRE DEPARTMENT

Over 4,900 of the more than 6,000 civilians who died in fires in the United States in 1982 were victims of residential fires. Fall and winter are bad months for home fires, largely because winter cold leads to the use of alternate heating. Rising energy costs in recent years have dramatically increased the sale and use of alternate heating devices in the United States, with a corresponding growth in numbers of heating related fires.

The above figures could have been reduced considerably if more people had been aware of potential fire hazards and were prepared to react properly during emergencies.

Adults should learn the following safety tips:

- --Whatever your home heating method, you should be prepared for fire emergencies, and every family member should know how to behave in case of fire.
- --Don't try to fight a major fire yourself. One large cause of deaths and destruction of property is delay in evacuating the house and calling for professional help.
- --Make sure your family knows how to get out of the house quickly. Sit down with each family member and plan an escape route from every room. At least two exits to the outside should be planned for each room -- especially bedrooms. Emphasize that exiting should be rapid, almost a reflex action, since seconds often count.
- --Have a pre-selected meeting place outdoors, safely away from the house, for everyone to get together.
- --Make certain all family members know the appropriate emergency phone numbers. Arrange with neighbors to call for help if either of you see the other in trouble.
- --Emphasize to family members that they must stay out of the house once they've left it. Many people have died returning to a burning building for a small keepsake.
- --While you are calm and can think about it, practice the escape plan so it becomes second nature.
- --If you are caught in a burning home, feel the door for heat before trying to open it. If the door panel or knob feels warm, do not open the door.
- --In a smoke-filled room, drop to the floor and crawl under the smoke. Fatalities often occur from smoke inhalation instead of the fire itself.
- --Smoke detectors should be in all critical locations -- one for each level of your home and, if the bedrooms are not grouped together, a detector unit should be outside each sleeping area.
- --Periodically check each smoke detector as recommended by the manufacturer to make certain it is operating properly.
- --Alternate heating devices are not the only source of home fires. Check all wiring of appliances, lamps and other electrical equipment periodically to make sure there are no frayed cords, that plugs are solidly into receptacles, and inflammable material is well insulated from sources of heat and open flame.

REPORT OF ANIMAL CONTROL OFFICER

The Animal Control Officer received many calls during 1983. Progress toward better control and voluntary cooperation with the Town's Leash Ordinance was noted. However, problems continue to persist in some areas of Newton. These areas will be targeted for improvement during 1984.

For the year 1982, more dogs then ever were licensed in Newton. The total number was 512. For 1983, the number licensed through December 31, 1983, was 425. There remain approximately 140 known dogs in Newton still unlicensed for 1983. Letters of warning and subsequent court summons are currently being prepared. In the past this method has proven successful in obtaining dog owner licensing compliance.

1983 was somewhat of a "take it apart and put it back together" year for the Library. We have made it through the disruptions and head into 1984 eager to meet the challenges which lie ahead.

The Library's new heating system and pump were installed over the summer and fall, resulting in a comfortably warm building without frequent boiler breakdowns, and a reliable source of water with no leaks!

Nancy Marden's resignation in August came as a surprise, but she has moved on to a new career as Library Aide at the High School. Our thanks to Nancy for her four good years of growth, creativity and expansion of the Library and its services.

After a long fall of interviews, in November the Trustees appointed Irene Nally as Library Director and Susan Peterson as Librarian. Their complementary skills, interests and enthusiasms will make the Library an exciting place.

Trustees and staff have been working to develop formal job descriptions for all positions at the Library. These are now complete, and are available at the Library.

As a result of the three months without a Librarian, the Library ended the year with excess funds: about \$4,000 in the salary and media line items. The trustees plan to use this money in our continuing effort to make the Library as energy— and space—efficient as possible. Planned projects include: additional shelving for the Marion Kalashian Room, renovation of the Trustees' Room and staff workrooms to provide more usable space, redesigning the bookdrop to alleviate heat loss, and possibly closing in part or all of the front porch to create an air—lock entry.

We are attempting to use every available inch of space as well as we can, to delay the time when an addition will become a necessity. Against that day, however, we are again asking for an addition of \$5,000 to the Capital Reserve Fund set up for a Library addition.

Thanks go in many directions - to our ever wonderful Friends of Gale Library who support us in so many ways; to the Lions Club for their donation to the Trust Fund; to the MM Club for their most generous donation; and to CFR Associates, Inc. of Haverhill, (whose President, Charles Rogers, lives in Newton) for their donation of a Word Processor to the Library.

NEWTON PLANNING BOARD REPORT — Year Ending 1983

The Newton Planning Board held 27 meetings, 10 of which were Public Hearings, and 3 Special Work Sessions.

There were six plans signed for Recording Purposes Only. Eight plans presented and approved for Subdivisions were signed and a total of twelve lots released.

The Board worked with Rockingham Regional Planning Commission to present to the Selectmen the views, concerns and recommendations for Customary Home Occupation.

Also, the Board worked on and will present to the Towns People another proposal for the location of Mobile Homes. Legislation which the State has mandated and as of this time the Town does not comply.

The Board meets the second and fourth Tuesday of the month at 22 South Main Street, the A. Marian Hatch Building. The Planning Board will be looking at issues such as growth, water, septage management, industry and re-zoning. The members can not do the best job possible without the participation of the Towns people. All the meetings are open to the Public and all residents are welcome to put forth their concerns and thoughts.

RECREATION COMMISSION

Last year saw some changes at the Town Beach. We've had a section of fence installed as a first step to close in the public beach. We hope to add another section of fence this year and keep on adding to it yearly until the beach area is fully closed in. Some beach sand was brought in and spread around and also an emergency driveway of crushed stone was added in the event of an emergency. A used raft was purchased and added to the beach area. With a few minor repairs, it should last for a few years. There was also some trees and brush cut down and removed from the area.

A swimming program was held at the Town Beach through the coordination of Virginia Bartlett under the direction of Julie Richard, W.S.I. and Andrew Richard, W.S.A. The program ran for five weeks; June 27, 1983 through July 29, 1983. There were fifty-six people who signed up for swimming lessons. Forty-four were from Newton, three from Kingston, six from Plaistow and three from South Hampton.

At the Heath Street Recreational Area, a tennis program was held under the direction of Nelson Currin of East Hampstead. Two five-week sessions were held with twenty-one students participating in the program. Thirteen students received their Advanced Beginners Certificates and two received Advanced Intermediate Certificates. A video tape was made of the last tennis session and will be used for instructional purposes. Mr. Currin is planning to start off the 1984 season with a tournament, using last year's participants. Trophies will be awarded to the winners. Mr. Currin would like to have it known that the Towns' people responded very well to the courts being used for lessons. We are looking forward to Mr. Currin returning and conducting another fine season of tennis.

Due to the inclement weather, our Memorial Day Parade was canceled. However, we will try again this year.

Our special thanks goes to the Newton Community Youth Program. They have in the past three years been able to conduct a more worth while and beneficial program for a larger majority of children than our Heath Street facilities had enabled us to do.

This year we would like to have the Heath Street tennis court fence repaired as well as have the basket ball hoops and nets installed in time for the spring season. Due to vandalism at the two areas, we find it necessary to replace several of the broken picnic tables and we ask the cooperation of the Towns' people in helping us to protect your tax dollars by informing the authorities of any vandalism to properties and/or equipment.

The Recreation Commission is totally committed to maintaining town recreational properties and improving the facilities. We need the continued support of the Towns' people to realize our goals.

EXETER AREA VISITING NURSE ASSOCIATION, INC.

The Exeter Area Visiting Nurse Association experienced a year of growth and change in 1983. The EAVNA operated with the largest budget, caseload and staff in the history of the Agency. The two new services, speech and occupational therapy, were very well utilized. The other disciplines, nursing, physical therapy and home health aides all show a marked increase in visits. Needs are changing. People are staying in hospitals for shorter periods of time and frequently staying at home rather than being cared for in nursing homes. HOME CARE now requires increased skills and up to date technology to meet the needs of the acutely ill as well as the chronically ill. Service was provided as needed 7 days a week, 24 hours a day.

In addition to the HOME CARE program, the MATERNAL & CHILD HEALTH PROGRAM was ever responsive to the needs of its population, working closely with local pediatricians and the state and federal policy makers.

The Agency's ADULT HEALTH PROGRAM was expanded to meet the needs of the adult population. Foot Care Clinics provided a new service for people needing assistance caring for their feet. Self help sessions were held to assist elders in independent living. Immunization clinics for adults were added to the program and blood pressure clinics were increased to serve the middle and younger adult.

The EAVNA continues to promote a clinical setting to students of health care as well as provide continuing education for its own staff to enable the Agency to continue to meet the changing needs of its clients and of the community.

592 visits were provided to residents of Newton as well as 125 residents were served at clinics between January 1, 1983 and December 31, 1983.

In the 80's, the shift of health care is to the HOME and the COMMUNITY. The EAVNA is meeting the challenges and will continue to collaborate and coordinate with other health providers to assure that quality health care is available to residents of the area.

NEWMARKET REGIONAL HEALTH CENTER, INC.

Utilization of the Senior Citizen Transportation Service has enabled seniors to remain independent, self-sufficient and active through the provision of transportation to needed services, including medical, shopping and recreational trips. It is the goal of this service to eliminate barriers which frequently obstruct elderly and handicapped individuals from maintaining self-sufficiency.

Over 821 rides have been provided to Newton senior citizens in 1983. The Newmarket Regional Health Center now has three vans equipped with hydraulic lifts to accommodate individuals confined to wheelchairs. This service is available to Newton residents.

Rockingham County Community Action Program, Inc. is a private, non-profit agency which has been dealing with the needs of low-income people since 1965. Our activities are of two kinds:
(1) those directed at serving immediate, individual needs, and

As an anti-poverty agency, Community Action addresses the needs of the low-income community by providing direct services, mcbilizing community resources and encouraging people to advocate on their own behalf. While the goal of Community Action remains constant, the specific services offered vary somewhat from year to year in accordance with local needs and the availability of funding. The programs offered to Rockingham County residents during the past year included the following:

FUEL ASSISTANCE PROGRAM - 61 Newton residents received \$28,513 Description: The Fuel Assistance Program provided a financial grant of up to \$500.00 to income-eligible households during the 1982-83 winter to assist with energy-related expenses. Severe hardship recipients also qualified for up to \$150.00 of additional aid through a supplemental fuel assistance program.

<u>WEATHERIZATION PROGRAM</u> - 5 Newton residents received \$5,094 Description: The Weatherization Program provides quality materials and a trained staff to weatherize homes of incomeeligible individuals in order to reduce heating costs and conserve energy.

HEAT SOURCE REPAIR PROGRAM

Description: The Heat Source Repair Program provides for the repair or replacement of furnaces and heating units for low-income homeowners.

HOME REPAIR PROGRAM - 5 Newton residents received \$2,058
Description: The Home Repair Program provides home repair work
not covered by the Weatherization Program such as major roof
repairs, foundation repairs and minor structural repairs for
low-income homeowners.

WOMEN, INFANTS AND CHILDREN (WIC) PROGRAM - 14 Newton residents received \$4,788

Description: The WIC Program offers supplemental nutritious foods, nutrition education, breastfeeding support and health care referral to eligible pregnant women, nursing mothers, infants and children up to age five (5).

CENTER SERVICES - 196 Newton residents received \$813

Description: Center Services include a wide range of services offered by the outreach center personnel such as information and referral, advocacy, direct client assistance and crisis services.

Total value of assistance to Newton residents received during 1983 was \$41,266.
