TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see what sums of money the Town will raise in addition to that required by law for building and repairing highways and bridges, or take any action relating thereto.

4. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$522.00 for State Aid Construction of Class II road known as the Sullivan Center Road.

5. To see what sum of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the removal of snow from the highways.

6. To see if the Town will vote to buy one or more road sanders and raise and appropriate money for the same, or take any action relating thereto.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for Old Age Assistance or take any action relating thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to pay for digging graves and going with the town hearse for residents.

9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise in addition to that required by law for the support of the public library.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise money for Memorial Day, or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate money for Old Home Day, or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for an honor roll of World War II Veterans, residents of Sullivan, or take any action relating thereto.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$17.00 for the Monadnock Region Association or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the Town will authorize the selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the Town in anticipation of taxes.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$36.00 for electricity in the Town Hall and Tractor House.

16. To see what action will be taken by the Town about street lights.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise the sum of \$200.00 to help to stamp out the White Pine Blister Rust.

18. To hear reports of agents, auditors, or committees heretofore chosen or take any action thereon.

19. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

I herein submit my third annual report as superintendent of schools.

The fundamental purpose of the American Constitution, as defined in the preamble, "to promote the general welfare," placed heavy responsibilities on all institutions for public education. Now that we have plunged into the Atomic Era, a higher level of universal education is imperative.

"The men and women in uniform are coming home having finished the gigantic job of making human freedom possible. Victory in the war against ignorance necessitates another great invasion in which the penalties of failure are as grave as that of a military disaster. The knowledge, the skills and the understandings gained by our young people in the next few years will determine whether this country can or will solve the difficult social, economic, and political problems that make peace possible. The implications of all of this is very clear. The teachers have a key position in the most essential business of all. These commandoes of the peace must be well trained and equipped if their mission of 'the general welfare' is to be accomplished."

At the White House Conference on Rural Education in 1944 some interesting facts were revealed. Although the rural children of school age constitute more than half of such children in the nation they have only 38 percent of the available funds for the support of schools. The average salary of rural school teachers is less than one half that of urban teachers. The number of high school graduates is about fifty percent higher in urban schools. The per pupil investment in equipment and property is lower in rural areas but the per pupil daily cost is greater than in urban areas. This idea of contributing more and receiving less would be much worse in

some districts if it were not for the State Equalization Fund in New Hampshire.

The teacher shortage is at present our most serious problem. The small community without an experienced resident teacher faces a critical situation.

The decrease in enrollment at the Sullivan Center School made it advisable to operate only one school building in the district under the present conditions. Due to the fact that Evelyn Osborn had resigned at the close of the school year in June 1945, Freda Hastings was transferred to the East Sullivan school in September 1945. This change in organization has reduced the operating cost per pupil to the district. However, the increased cost of transportation and the anticipated decrease in State Aid, due to the limited enrollment, are also factors to be considered.
