WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the fourteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

Finance Committee recommends \$3500.00

3. To see if the Town will vote to accept special State Aid for highways and appropriate money for the same.

Finance Committee Recommends \$1500.00

4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and breaking snow for the ensuing year.

Finance Committee Recommends \$5000.00

5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges.

Finance Committee Recommends \$1500.00

6. To see if the town will raise and appropriate \$300.00 for cutting bushes along the highway.

Finance Committee Recommends article be passed over

7. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance. Finance Committee Recommends \$10.00

8. To see what sum of money the town will vote

to raise and appropriate for Blister Rust destruction. Finance Committee Recommends \$300.00

9. To see if the town will vote to take over the maintenance of the Tamworth Village "Precinct Fire Department" so called, and acting as a part of the Town Fire Department, and raise by taxation the amount necessary in addition to the Town owned Fire Department.

All money received shall be turned over to the Town Treasurer, and all bills shall be paid by him subject to the approval of the Board of Selectmen and the foregoing Precinct Commissioners.

Finance Committee Recommends article be passed over 10. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to divide the town into three (3) districts for the purpose of electing road agents.

Each district to be as nearly equal as to mileage as practical. The districts shall be classed as East, West and South. Said division to be made not later than May 1, 1933.

The bounds shall be recorded in the records of the Town Clerk and a copy given to each road agent. This division shall remain, unless changed by vote of the town.

Finance Committee Recommends this article 11. To see if the town will vote to enact the following ordinance in conformity with Chapter 385 of the Public Laws, as amended by Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of 1931:

Section 1.

It shall be permitted for any retail merchant to expose for sale and sell, on Sunday, at his or her regular place of business, such goods and merchandise as are handled in the usual course of business, provided such sale does not conflict with any other existing law. Section 2.

Out-door sports, games, and athletic contests are

hereby permitted at any time on Sunday, and admission thereto may be charged after one o'clock in the afternoon, in conformity with Chapter 385 of the Public Laws, as amended by Chapter 155 of the Session Laws of 1931; provided that such sports, games, athletic contests shall be conducted in an orderly manner, and provided further, that public dancing, horse-racing, and prize fights be not included in the provision of this section.

Adopted and approved subject to majority vote of the legal voters present and voting at the Town Meeting of March 14, 1933.

12. To see if the town will vote to prohibit the use of trucks owned by the highway agents for repairing the town highways.

Finance Committee Approves this article 13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library.

Finance Committee Recommends total of \$125.00 14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

Finance Committee Approves this article 15. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the services of a community Nurse.

Finance Committee Recommends \$500.00 16. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the purchase of snow removal equipment.

Finance Committee Recommends \$700.00 17. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise for an unemployment fund to be expended under the supervision of the selectmen.

Finance Committee Recommends \$1200.00 18. To see if the town will authorize the selectmen to appoint a finance committee for the ensuing year.

Finance Committee Approves this article 19. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise the taxable property.

Finance Committee Approves this article 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Tarvia.

Finance Committee Approves this article 21. To see if the town will vote to take over the maintenance of the Wonalancet Fire Precinct fire fighting equipment and raise by taxation the necessary sum of money.

Finance Committee Approves this article 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to appoint one or more highway agents with the approval of the Finance Committee.

Finance Committee Approves this article 23. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK FOR

TAMWORTH

To the Townspeople, School Board, and Superintendent of Schools:

Tamworth, along with many other towns, is suffering some of the effects of the present economic crisis. Some of these effects are plainly visible. Others are not visible at present. Perhaps the most subtle of all the effects is that upon the health of the children. Few realize this because it cannot be demonstrated by statistics. We do not refer merely to nutrition needs, for few actually go hungry, nor do they go cold. There are too many interested people watching for this obvious need. It is the deferring of the correction of physical defects until better times that is doing the great damage to the health of the children. No subsequent period of prosperity can replace teeth neglected now. The best eve specialist in the land cannot restore vision to eyes growing progressively worse with daily strain without the proper glasses. Many adult ills will be traceable to diseased tonsils that are slowly undermining a child's health. The school health program is concentrating upon this need. Great difficulty is being encountered in the correction of the physical defects of the children. However, with limited funds for the purpose of financing clinics, and with the cooperation of parents some progress has been made as a review of the available records of the past few years will show:

Last year a dental clinic was held in which about 45 children were treated. A few of these received complete correction. Many others were limited to the small amounts that they could afford. There was no money available to finance this work, therefore it was only partially successful. At present there are 72 children who need dental work. There are 38 cases of bad tonsils, some of which need immediate attention. There are only two cases of defective vision left, however, seven cases having been corrected this year. Eight tonsil operations were done last Summer, which reduced the number of tonsil cases somewhat.

Working in close cooperation with the town nurse, Miss Eva Heney, some of the depression problems have been solved. Medical aid was planned and clothing distributed. Food problems have had attention, and seeds for a garden were obtained for one family.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board of Tamworth:

I herewith submit my tenth annual report as superintendent of schools.

School Property

Fortunately for these times, a wise school board had kept the school property in good repair and made improvements so that little was demanded during the past year. Cement steps were placed at Pequaket and all buildings were cleaned and furniture varnished. Our school buildings are in excellent condition, being, I believe, among the best equipped of the rural schools of the state.

Statistics

For the year ending June 30, 1932, we had an

average attendance of 152.6, an average membership of 161 and a percent of attendance of 94.7. We have gained a little over last year. This is encouraging, but we want to go higher than 95 percent. Schools having an attendance last year of 95 percent or above are as follows:

> Whittier 95% Downs 95.8% Bennett's Corner 98.6% Chocorua 96.7% Pequaket 97.9%

Health Work

The health work goes forward under the care of Miss Ruth S. Langille. Dental and eye clinics have corrected a good number of defects. The annual examinations have been made and parents notified. More clinic work will be done during the latter part of the year. Parents are urged to cooperate whenever possible by personally attending to correction of defects. Health habits are being emphasized by daily inspections in the schools. Calisthenics with victrola music is a part of the work of nearly every school. Several motion picture reels bearing on health have been shown in the schools.

During the year Miss Grace E. Shannon, after forty years of faithful service in the town of Tamworth, was taken ill and is not yet able to resume her duties. It is a pleasure to speak of the loyal and true spirit of this teacher who conscientiously served the schools, never slighting her hours or her teaching as far as her strength would allow.

High School

Under the earnest leadership of Principal Hatch, our high school is doing good work. An especially pleasing feature of the extra curricula activities was the orchestra developed last year, becoming proficient enough to play in public.

It looks now as though the school would be larger than ever next fall. A small class goes out and a large class should enter. The suggestion has been made that it would not cost a large sum beyond the tuition now paid to other towns to run a four-year high school after building and equipment were provided.

A list of teachers and schools follows:

Osman P. Hatch at the High School has 18 pupils.

Edwin A. Blackey at the Grammar School has 21 pupils.
