REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To The School Board and Citizens of Warren:

It is with pleasure that I hereby present my annual report as superintendent of schools. This last year has seen but little change in the school program. The work has followed as closely as possible the Program of Studies as outlined by the State Board of Education.

There was but one vacancy in the teaching force last summer. Miss Myrle Kinney was elected as teacher in the Primary room. The teachers have shown a fine spirit of work and cooperation and good progress has been made.

The attendance last year averaged 86 per cent of the membership. During the previous year 89 per cent. The average attendance for the state, during the past year was 93.4 per cent. There were 123 different pupils registered during the period covered by this report.

At present we have a music teacher for part of one day each week. Miss Lamb of Plymouth Normal School, gives her time in the morning to the Warren schools and in the afternoon to Wentworth. Thus far this work has been limited to the Village School.

Standard tests were given last Spring in arithmetic, reading, language and history, as well as tests to show mental ability. These tests make it possible for us to compare the progress made by our children in a given subject with the progress made by large groups of children rather than leaving it to individual judgment. By this means I hope to eliminate haphazard judgment of progress, and find out how our children and schools compare with others. Last October tests were given to the 8th grade in arithmetic and spelling. This same test was given to all of the grade 8 pupils in the state, and the average rank for the state was thus found. I am happy in being able to say that the average for our group was in both cases higher than the state average.

The medical inspection and follow up work has been done by Miss Underhill, the district nurse. As school

nurse she has been zealous in her work. Considerable attention has been given to children that were underweight. In order to arouse the interest of the pupils a plan has been arranged for charting the weights of the pupils each month. Each child is instructed in what should be his proper weight. Inasmuch as the weight related to the height gives a good indication of the condition of health, it is very helpful to have the pupils' interest aroused in this direction. Plans are discussed for increasing weight and for healthy living. Parents should give attention to the notices sent them regarding physical defects, for no child can do the mental work of the school properly if physically handicapped.

I wish that more parents would find time to visit our schools, and thus become better acquainted both with the teacher and the work being done. Teachers and superintendent welcome the opportunity of talking over with parents, the work of their children. Such talks should create and foster that cooperation between home and school which is so necessary for good work.

The chemical toilets that were installed last summer have been very satisfactory and have done away with a very objectionable condition.

The two most important steps in improving schools are to improve the teaching and increase the actual attendance. Both teachers and superintendent are working together for these objectives.

In conclusion I wish to thank the teachers, school board and citizens for helpful support and loyal cooperation.
