### REPORT OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

### To the Residents of Belknap County:

Your Commissioners are happy to report on the accomplishments of the year 1971 and to assure you that we have kept in mind the need of frugality in every area.

The parking area, off Academy Square, has been paved and fenced and is used extensively. The law library was moved to the small conference room and the library space was renovated for the quarters of the Lakes Region Fire Dispatch Center.

Welfare costs have increased due to the economic situation. All able-bodied recipients are working on programs in Laconia, Meredith, Alton and in Tilton where a serious fire destroyed the Town Hall. The Donated Food program has doubled over the amount estimated at the beginning of the year. This has caused some difficulties but every effort has been made to contact all those eligible under Federal regulations, and all complaints have been investigated. Laconia and the towns have given good cooperation and the food given out has been of help to many in need.

Our Infirmary continues to be a good home under the competent supervision of Superintendent and Mrs. Beach with their corps of dedicated help. They have expanded the Physical and Occupational Therapy departments, providing new interests for the occupants. Dr. Eckels resigned after several years of fine service, then we secured Dr. Trapp's services only to lose him shortly by his untimely death. Other losses which have been felt are those of our long time Therapist, Elise Caswell, and our R.N., Aileen Shepard. The County is fortunate in having a fine staff at the home.

In line with the increase of crime, our Courts and Law Enforcement facilities have been sorely taxed. Both departments should be commended for the protection of our citizens with efficiency and dispatch. The Governor's Crime Commission has aided these services with substantial grants. In September of 1971 we joined with Merrimack County in a one year Pilot Program for the evaluation and possible rehabilitation of the House of Correction prisoners. We are unable to judge the results of this program, financed by the Crime Commission, as yet. The House of Correction continues to be seriously overcrowded, and the Commissioners are recommending a bond issue that we may correct this condition as well as to cover needed repairs to the Jail. Superintendent Myatt is taking an active part in these plans and in his effective rehabilitation work.

Throughout the year we have received constant support and encouragement from delegation members as well as from all county departments. To them all we extend our thanks. And, without the help of our competent and all-too-small staff, the achievements of 1971 would have been impossible. So, to our Secretary, James H. Pringle, our Welfare Director, Arlene T. Dodge, and Our Custodians, Edwin D. Harvey and Roger E. Morrison, goes the appreciation of Belknap County.

We extend a personal invitation to every citizen in the County to visit us at any time.

## BELKNAP COUNTY DELEGATION MEETING

Wednesday, February 3, 1971 FISH & GAME ROOM, STATE HOUSE, 1:00 P.M.

Meeting called to order by Vice-Chairman Mutzbauer at 1:10 P.M. Chairman George Roberts, Jr. later presided.

Present:

H. Thomas Urie Marshall French Robert M. Lawton County Jail and House of Correction. Total \$78,449.50. Mr. Myatt explained the increases.

Budgeted Debt: Total \$41,080.00.

Miscellaneous Budgets. Extension Service. Increase due to salary increase \$2,500.

Airport Authority. Reduced to \$7,500. Moved (French), second (Charles Roberts), voted unanimously that the \$7,500 amount budgeted be for capital improvements only. Subject to accounting.

Delegation Expense. no increase.

Capital Outlay. \$15,000 for paving parking lot, basement entrance to sheriff's dept.

Social Security, Blue Cross. Payments for B.C. increased from one-half to 100% single membership—in lieu of salary increase.

Machine Rental. Moved (Charles Roberts), second (Prescott), voted unanimously to purchase the Zerox machine within the time limit. Price \$7,375.00. Also Guaranteed Maintenance Agreement for \$695.00.

Lakes Region Mental Health. Tom Urie wished to be recorded as reducing the budget to \$20,000. A motion to accept the total budget of \$25,275.00 was made by Charles Roberts, seconded by George Roberts, and voted unanimously.

Total budget \$1,174,354.98.

Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Association. Rep.

French had been instructed to vote for the service if towns vote affirmatively at town meeting. Franklin may come in—Plymouth also with increased amount. It was suggested that selectmen send a Letter of Intent.

\$52,273 will be paid by County — \$20,243 will be returned by towns. Starting up costs—personnel and equipment will be delayed. Since there is a discrepancy between sheriff's deputies salaries and operators of M.A., it was moved (French), second (Nighswander), to have the Chairman find out about the salaries and have them in line between the two departments, taking into account all benefits. Voted unanimously.

Moved (George Roberts), second (Wuelper), voted unanimously, that the Executive Committee recommend the expenditure of \$50,273, with the provision if at the time the full Delegation meets we have the information as to which

towns have articles in their warrants and those which have not accepted this article, that that amount of money be deducted from the \$50,273 in anticipation that the dispatch service start-up would be delayed to that extent.

The Executive Committee agreed that all monies dispersed will be done by the Commissioners.

Plans for House of Correction: Presented by Mr. Myatt from sketches made by Douglass Prescott to cost \$60,000.

Since the plans presented were regarded as inadequate and a better and more permanent set of plans should be considered, it was moved (Mutzbauer), second (Prescott), that the Chairman appoint a committee with at least one Commissioner, the Correctional Supervisor, and several members of the Delegation to discuss the requirements for a new House of Correction. Voted unanimously.

\$60,000 will have to be deleted from the County budget.

Bonding capacity of the County was discussed. Assessed valuation of Belknap County is \$266,656,454. Can borrow up to 2% or \$5,333,129.08.

Salaries budgeted for six months period. County to underwrite at present time. Hope to have about 20 towns participating — inside towns have about 303 million valuation outside towns, 176 million — 1/3 cost would come from outside county — about \$20,000.

Speaking in favor of the Association — George Currier (Sanbornton), Bordeaux (Belmont), Forsyte (Gilmanton), Thompson (Gilford), Manville (Center Harbor), Weeks (Meredith), Scantze (Gilmanton).

Cooperative Extension. Total \$28,689. Federal funds of \$26,000 are added to total budget. Increased from \$24,082. H.B. No. 65 in Legislature would increase salaries for extension workers. This footnote was added.

Airport Authority. Total \$15,000. No increase.

Capital Outlay. Total \$35,000. For paving and renovating lawyer's room in basement of Court House.

Machine Rental. Total \$8,075.00. \$7,000 is purchase price — remainder rental. Used by 3 departments — supplies divided.

Lakes Region Mental Health. Total \$25,275.00 Crime Commission Officer. Total (for rent), \$600.

Belknap County Home. Total \$576,196.28.

House of Correction. Total \$78,449.50. Institutional Welfare — Jail and House of Correction. Requests \$60,000 to put an addition on to House of Correction. Daily average for 1970 - 29 people - only one toilet, insufficient number of beds, small quarters — occupants mostly young. Need better facilities.

Commissioners asked the Delegation to authorize them to consult with an architect for suggestions and proposals for an addition to the House of Correction.

County Attorney. Mr. Decker agreed that an addition to the House of Correction should be built — to increase sleeping arrangements, toilets should be increased in number, vocational rehabilitation classes should be held.

Mr. Brouillard would like to see the juvenile program continue.

Mr. Decker favors continuing the Mental Health program.

Recommends a full-time investigator, especially in manslaughter and embezzelment cases. Item No. 287 in budget for \$2,000 was not used but could be used for legal and investigative services.

Sheriff's Department: Sheriff Crockett asked that a contingency fund be established for out-of-state travel. Moved (George Roberts), second (Prescott), voted unanimously—footnoted under #326 (General Expense), that \$2,000 be added as a contingency fund for travel for return of prisoners, subject to Superior Court approval. Item #329, Juvenile Delinquency Officer fund was explained. \$3,000 for seminar in California. Salary is #229.

County Jail and House of Correction. Total \$78,449.50. Mr. Myatt explained the increases.

Budgeted Debt: Total \$41,080.00.

Miscellaneous Budgets. Extension Service. Increase due to salary increase \$2,500.

Airport Authority. Reduced to \$7,500. Moved (French), second (Charles Roberts), voted unanimously that the \$7,500 amount budgeted be for capital improvements only. Subject to accounting.

Sources of Revenue. \$1,181,854.98. The Executive Committee has recommended acceptance of that figure. Moved by Marshall French, seconded by David Huot to accept the revenue estimated as amended. Voted unanimously.

Expenditures. \$100,225.70. The Executive Committee has recommended acceptance of that figure. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Jacob Mutzbauer that the General Government Expenditures be accepted. Voted unanimously.

Bookkeeping Office. \$11,180.00. The Executive Committee has recommended to accept this figure with the increase. Moved by David Whittemore, seconded by Marion Wuelper that the Bookkeeping Office figure be approved. Voted unanimously.

Court House. \$20,000. The Executive Committee has recommended approval of this figure with the increase of approximately \$2,000. Moved by Marshall French, seconded by Frank Maguire that the Court House figure be accepted. Voted unanimously.

Superior Court. \$71,200.00. The Executive Committee has recommended approval of this figure. Item #287, Contingency Fund, has been transferred to the Sheriff's Department. Moved by Frank Maguire, seconded by Marion Wuelper to accept the recommendation of the Executive Committee with the deletion of the \$2,000 contingency fund subject to approval of the Superior Court.

General Welfare. \$123,385.00. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this figure. There is an increase of approximately \$13,000. Moved by David Whittemore, seconded by David Huot to accept the total figure with the increase. Voted unanimously.

Register of Deeds. \$14,976.00. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this figure. Moved by George Head to delete the item for the air conditioner. No second. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Florence Drouin to accept the budget of the Register of Deeds. In favor (14)—Opposed (1).

Institutional Welfare. County Home and Hospital. \$576,196.28. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this figure—must be an adjusted figure. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Frank Maguire, to approve of the above figure for the Belknap County Home and Hospital.

Institutional Welfare. Jail and House of Correction. \$78,449.50. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this figure. Moved by Marshall French, seconded by Marion Wuelper to approve of the above figure. Voted: In favor (14) — Opposed (1) Rep. Hood.

Institutional Welfare. Total \$654,645.78. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Marion Wuelper to accept this figure. Voted unanimously.

Sheriff's Department. \$39,498.45. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Marshall French that a new line item be established under the Sheriff's Department for a contingency fund of \$2,000 for travel, subject to Superior Court approval. Voted unanimously.

Moved by Marshall French, seconded by Oscar Prescott that the total figure of \$39,498.45 for the Sheriff's Department be accepted. Voted unanimously.

Budgeted Department. \$41,080.00. The Executive Committee approves of this figure. Moved by Oscar Prescott, seconded by Marion Wuelper that this amount be accepted. Voted unanimously.

### Miscellaneous Budget.

Extension Service. \$28,689.00. The Executive Committee approves of this figure which includes a \$4,607 increase. Moved by Marion Wuelper, seconded by David Huot to accept this amount. Voted unanimously.

Airport Authority. \$7,500. The Executive Committee recommends cutting the original figure of \$15,000 to \$7,500. Moved by Frank Maguire, seconded by Walter McCarthy to restore the figure to \$15,000. Discussion followed. Moved by Marshall French, seconded by Frank Maguire that \$7,500 of the proposed \$15,000 be for capital improvements only, pending the outcome of the main motion. Voted unanimously.

The main motion was again made, with the amendment, to restore the figure of \$15,000 to the Airport Authority. Voted unanimously.

Delegation Expense. \$600. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this amount. \$3.00 for Delegation meetings, plus 8 cents a mile. Voted unanimously.

Capital Outlay. Basement and Land. \$15,000. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Walter McCarthy that this amount shall be appropriated.

Social Security, Blue Cross—County Share. \$12,000. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this figure. It includes 100% of family membership in this budget. Moved by David Whittemore, seconded by David Huot to accept this figure. Voted unanimously.

Non-Payroll Items. \$2,000. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this amount. It is a "wash" item with #219. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Frank Maguire to approve of this amount.

Machine-Rental. \$8,075.00. The Executive Committee recommends the approval of this amount. It is for purchase and maintenance. Moved by David Huot, seconded by Charles Roberts to accept this figure. Voted unanimously.

Lakes Region Mental Health. \$25,275.00. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this amount. Moved by George Head, seconded by David Huot, that a cut to \$15,000 be made in the above figure. Discussion followed. Voting in favor (1) — Opposed (14).

Moved by Esther Nighswander, seconded by Marion Wuelper that the County appropriate \$25,275.00 to the Lakes Region Mental Health Association with the stipulation that it be used for professional personnel only. Voted unanimously.

Crime Commission Officer-Rent. \$600. The Executive Committee recommends approval of this amount. Moved by Esther Nighswander, seconded by Charles Roberts that this amount be accepted. Voted unanimously.

The total amount budgeted is to be left open. Moved, seconded, and voted unanimously that no figure be submitted. Moved by George Roberts, seconded by Marshall French that the budget with the changes made as recorded in the minutes be accepted. Voted unanimously.

Mutual Fire Aid Communications Center. Moved by David Huot that in 1971 the sum of \$48,000 be appropriated for the Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Assoc. subject to any corrections in the items for salaries for operators, retirement benefits, Blue Cross, and Workman's Compensation resulting from a decrease in the salary of the operators from \$16,008 to approximately \$14,000. Chairman Roberts explained that the purpose of the meeting was to revise the County budget since additional funds are required by the Sheriff's Department under the Crime Commission program.

Mr. LeMay, Coordinator of the Crime Commission explained that the Radio Communications program under Phase I, originally indicated matching funds "in kind." However, under Phase II, matching funds must be in cash. Suggested amount is \$10,000. Total amount received by the County is \$99,344.

Commissioner Atwood reported \$7,500 in capital reserve fund, postponing the \$4,000 expenditure for the parking lot, and \$5,000 for the study of the House of Correction could be considered.

MOVED by Rep. French, seconded by Rep. Urie, to increase the staff at the County Jail in order to have two men on duty at all hours, the employees to be hired on a permanent basis. Voted unanimously.

Chairman Roberts will appoint a committee to study the House of Correction and the consolidation with the Jail.

The Clerk was instructed to proceed with the notices for vacancies on the Belknap Area Commission.

#### BELKNAP HOUSE OF CORRECTION AND JAIL

To the Commissioners of Belknap County:

I hereby submit this report of activities at the Belknap County House of Correction and Jail for the year ending December 31, 1971.

The number of inmates this years was less than the previous year. Average daily count was twenty inmates. Lowering of the daily count relieved the over-crowding of the House of Correction to some degree and improved security of jail prisoners.

Operation of the institution improved due to increase of the staff from seven to nine. Two additional guards were hired to insure safe working conditions by having two personnel on duty at all times.

The services of Mr. William Ellsworth was made possible for a period of one year, beginning in October. This demonstration project in prisoner rehabilitation was funded by a Federal Grant, administered by the State Mental Health Clinic.

Belknap County was again first in the State to establish a position, that of a Juvenile Officer, within the Sheriff's Department. Phillip "Bud" Daigneault of Barnstead was appointed and immediately received three months of training at the Juvenile Delinquency and Control Center at the University of Southern California. Several valuable programs are underway now and more to follow in the field of Juveniles. This is also a federal funded program with 60 per cent of the cost being absorbed by the Federal Government, the balance supported by County tax.

The Belknap County Sheriff's Department participated in the Cadet Program offered by the Governor's Commission on Crime and Delinquency. Two female cadets were hired for the ten week period of the program. Janet Cote, 18, graduated June 1971 from Laconia High School, Laconia. New Hampshire; and Carol Cunningham, 17, a Senior at Tilton Northfield High School, Tilton, New Hampshire. Both girls have been trained in all phases of the Communication Center, typing, filing and have had several hours in firearm instruction, both verbal and actual use of the Smith and Wesson .38 revolver, .45 automatic Resing Sub-Machine gun and the .12 gauge Mosberg Shot Gun. In a report submitted by these Cadets, they stated that they found the program "most beneficial and more young people should have the same opportunity that they had to see the other side of the law, and the best way to understand an officer's side of the law, is to be on that side."

The Sheriff's Department is constantly striving to improve its efficiency by appointing only the most qualified deputy sheriffs and to provide them with the best possible training. In 1971, thirteen weeks were spent in police training.

In closing. I wish to thank David R. Decker, County Attorney, and the Board of County Commissioners for their help and cooperation during the past year.

#### JUVENILE OFFICER'S REPORT

Rodney S. Crockett, Sheriff County of Belknap 64 Court Street Laconia, New Hampshire

Dear Sheriff Crockett:

The Juvenile Officer's Program for the year 1971 initially got under way during the month of May. The preceding four months consisted of training the officer at the University of Southern California.

Although the program, at its inception, appeared to be making very little progress, the summer months and the beginning of the 71-72 school year proved to be very time consuming and a period of substantial growth. Utilization of the County Juvenile Officer by the townships increased with the increase in workload realized by the respective police agencies.

Although individual caseload and background investigations proved to be the most significant responsibility undertaken by the program, there was considerable time allotted to classroom instruction in a number of the local schools and speaking engagements at various community organizations. The subject of which centered around the duties and responsibilities of the juvenile officer on a county level.

As can be seen in the activity report on Chart I, the greater percentage of cases came as a result of referrals from the Town of Belmont. As a result of Chief Earl Sweeney's praise for the program and continued support and use thereof, other agencies throughout the County began to make use of the juvenile officer.

The percentage of cases that were of a counsel and release nature appeared to be pretty much in keeping with the recommendations of the President's Commission on Crime and the Administration of Justice. The percentage of referrals to other agencies is somewhat low in comparison to the desired level. This can be attributable, in part, to the lack of available referral sources. Conversely, the percentage of court referrals may be somewhat high and again, attributable in part to the lack of referral sources.

The rate of recidivism is calculated at roughly eight per cent but the validity of this figure is questionable due to the short period of time the program has been in operation. A more realistic interpretation of the rate of recidivism can be viewed over a period of at least one year.

The continued success of the County Juvenile Officer Program will be greatly enhanced by the increased cooperation of the local law enforcement agencies.

#### ACTIVITY REPORT

A total of seventy-six cases were handled by the County Juvenile Officer during the time period indicated. The following information reflects the nature of the dispositions:

The above statistics include seven child neglect cases which resulted in the placement of six youths in foster homes and three committals to the State Industrial School.

# REPORT OF BELKNAP COUNTY COOPERATIVE EXTENSION SERVICE

#### 1971

#### **COUNTY FORESTER**

The Belknap County Extension Forestry program is charged with the responsibility of providing technical and educational information which will assist landowners to achieve their management objectives in their woodlands. Each acre of the more than 200,000 acres of privately owned woodland in Belknap County has a potential for forest products production, watershed protection. wildlife habitat, recreational use or a combination of all of these. With a sound management program the landowners' objective may be achieved and maintained indefinitely.

Much of the forester's time is spent in the field examining forest land with the owner. In the field, discussions help the owner define his objectives and technical information is made available to him on how to reach these objectives. In meeting this need the County Forester contacted 179 landowners and examined 15,155 acres of forest land. Formal management plans were prepared for 14 landowners as a guide.

In providing assistance to the landowner desirous of improving his woodland, the County Forester approved 329 acres of timber stand improvement work done under the Rural Environmental Assistance Program.

In this day of increasing awareness of environmental and ecological problems, the County Forester has tried to keep people informed through a monthly newsletter, newspaper articles, and meetings. In particular, the monthly newsletter, received by 400 forestry oriented families, has met with some degree of approval for which the forester is grateful.

The total requests for assistance handled during the past year numbered 297. This includes the forest land requests as well as such requests for assistance as shade trees, Town Conservation Commissions, Planning Boards, and speaking engagements at schools throughout the County.

#### 4-H YOUTH DEVELOPMENT

4-H is . . . a voluntary educational program designed to meet the needs and interests of young people. Our major objective is to assist youth to become more happy, useful skillful and successful citizens of a rapidly changing world. 4-H is made possible through the cooperative efforts of Federal, State, and County governments, which means that all taxpayers are helping to support the program. It is also supported by the private donations from Business, Industry, and Individuals.

One of the great qualities of 4-H is that it is an ACTION program — members "learn to do by doing". In 1971, 504 regular 4-H members, 67 4-H TV club members, and 221 other youth were served by the Professional Workers of your County Cooperative Extension Service. The regular and TV members completed 1293 individual projects in 43 categories. 78 boys and girls attended 4-H camp and 400 took part in the County 4-H Fair.

The real strength of the 4-H Program can be attributed to its dedicated corps of Volunteer Leaders. This past year 95 Adult and 44 Teen Leaders guided the 4-H youth in Belknap County. Adult leaders receiving special recognition in 1971 were: Mrs. Robert Annis of Belmont. Mrs. Lewis Woodaman of Center Harbor, Mrs. Robert Clifford, Mrs. Emile Decato, and Mrs. Robert Robertson of Gilford; Mrs. Richard Stevens of Gilmanton, Mrs. Robert Buckley of Meredith. and Mrs. Edwin Huckins of New Hampton.

#### THE DISPATCH CENTER

The Lakes Region Mutual Fire Aid Associaton Dispatch Center opened its doors and started operations at 5 p.m. on September 20th, 1971. Since then it has expanded and can definitely be called a communications center.

The center handles 15 towns with a total of 21 separate departments and 18 base stations with approximately 500 plectron receivers. There are 61 radio equipped vehicles in the system. 29 of which have two frequencies.

The four dispatchers at "Lakes Region" have received and logged 2,496 telephone calls including emergency and non-emergency calls. They have logged 5,910 radio messages including non-emergency and emergency transmissions with tone activations during these emergencies. They have dispatched 190 emergencies receiving 166 by phone, 18 by street fire box alarms, and 6 from the Sheriff's Department via the intercom system.

#### HOME ECONOMICS

Extension Home Economics reaches families with an educational program designed to meet their needs at different stages of the life cycle. Emphasis is placed on consumer education, health, housing, family stability, and community development.

During 1971, meetings and/or workshops were held to help homemakers:

- understand nutrition, good food habits and their relationship to health.
- increase knowledge of purchasing, preparation and nutritional value of seafood, milk, and yeast breads in the family diet.
  - gain insight into family life in Korea.
- maintain satisfying personal relationships inside and outside the home.
- accept and adjust to the expanding and changing roles of family members.
- gain knowledge in the care and cleaning of upholstered furniture.
- develop a better understanding and appreciation of New Hampshire's furniture heritage.
- obtain the most satisfaction from money spent for goods and service.
- make active decisions about family estates and realize the importance of keeping family estate records.
- realize the importance of safe driving and learn to drive defensively.
- learn the specific construction skills of slipcovers, leathercraft and lampshades.
- learn specific sewing construction skills in beginners and tailoring classes.
- understand use, care and cleaning of the sewing machine.
  - develop potential leadership abilities.

From the above, plus educational bulletins, individual help, newsletters, newspaper columns and radio, Extension meets a need.

The greatest challenge is reaching young homemakers and disadvantaged families, because this must be done on an individual basis, it is slow but rewarding.

#### AGRICULTURE & RESOURCES DEVELOPMENT

The Agricultural phase of County Extension Service work provided educational assistance to Belknap's one and one half million dollar farm business and to an ever increasing number of city, village and rural families. Everyone's increased awareness of ecology and environmental concerns very definitely involve problems of soils, plant culture, protection and management.

Particularly challenging to the Agricultural Agent's work are changing land use potentials brought about by seven years of vineyard development in central New Hampshire. There are 68 acres now in existence with planning projections showing 1000 acres in 1980. Such new industry development helps keep farm lands, families and equipment farming; to maintain open space so important to our recreation industry; to slow down developmental commercialism; and to provide raw products for a new processing industry of wine manufacturing.

Additionally, Cooperative Extension's assistance has helped to move via the apple wine industry thousands of bushels of quality off-size, off-color apples. Such an operation has unlimited economic potentials.

#### Resources Development

The above indicated grape and apple developments are resource development of the first order. Closely akin are significant problems encountered in the marketing of New Hampshire wines through the state liquor commission system.

The Extension Service has traditionally assisted with marketing problems and with the fruit industry of the state helped design legislation which would establish a "New Hampshire Fruit & Wine Marketing Committee". Our Legislature set this aside for legislative study. Extension will continue to work in this important arena.

The Agricultural Agent is a member of the Lakes Region Planning Commission technical action panel. By special permission of the County Extension Service Council, he and his office provided to the Commission sorely needed educational, administrative and office assistance activities prior to July 1, 1971 when a full time Planning Director and office became established by the member towns of the Commission.

Other forms of assistance to the Commission continues as does other work by all the County Extension agents toward the general area of Community Resources Development.
