We herewith submit the report of our proceedings for the past year, for the candid consideration of the tax payers. We are pleased to report a decrease in the town debt, and a closing up of all old matters that have come to our notice. The Treasurer's report will show the financial standing of the town.

A State law requires all towns to print the records of marriages, births and deaths, so we have felt compelled to condense the report as much as possible, and give a clear statement of what has been done.

The County tax, for the next year, amounts to the very large sum of \$2,368.88, an increase of \$1,348.58 over last year; and the State tax must necessarily be larger than last year; hence the appropriations for town purposes should be made as small as possible.

We were instructed, last year, to issue bonds to refund the town debt. This we were unable to do in a satisfactory manner. We found that \$2,000.00 and \$4,000.00, hired by the Selectmen for 1886, of S. E. Paine, was hired on two (2) and four (4) years' time, at an average rate of five (5) per cent interest, and exempted from taxation; and we did not think it proper to interfere with contracts made by our predecessors; and the money market was in such condition that bonds could not be

sold at reasonable rates. The Buck Note is refunded at four (4) per cent.

We think the debt should be refunded, by issuing bonds as soon as it can be done at reasonable rates.

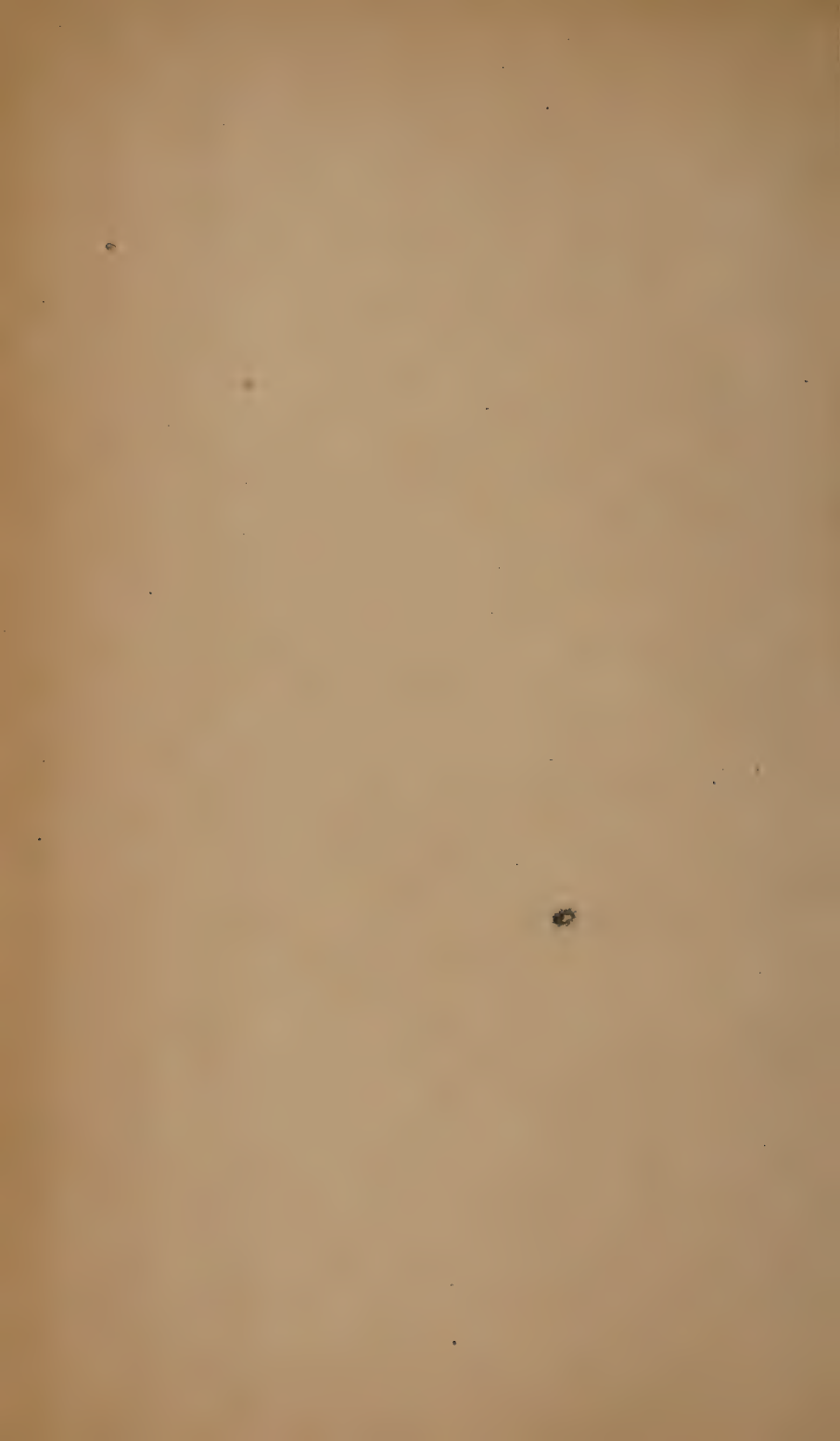

# REPORT OF BOARD OF HEALTH

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 5, 1888.

---

*To the Citizens of Berlin, N. H.:*

The Board of Health for said town respectfully submit the following report of their proceedings for the year ending March 1, 1888, together with certain recommendations suggested by the prevalence of that dread disease, diphtheria, in the summer of 1887, peculiarly dependent, for its origin and existence, on the bad sanitary condition of the premises where it prevails. The disease first made its appearance at the northerly end of Second Street in Berlin Mills Village, the latter part of April, 1887. Your board, upon being advised of the presence of the disease by the attending physicians, took immediate steps to arrest its progress by quarantining the afflicted families, making a thorough use of disinfectants about their premises, and providing for their immediate wants, through a person employed for that purpose. Next, a careful inspection of the infected premises was made, disclosing a most deplorable sanitary condition of same, the drainage of sinks and privies, and decomposed animal and vegetable matter being deposited on the surface of the ground, with a seeming utter disregard for the consequences.

This condition of things seemed to call for immediate action, and we at once laid a six-inch sewer pipe the entire length of the street, and caused each resident to lay branch pipes leading from his buildings to the main sewer for drainage purposes. The effect seemed magical. The disease, which had, in a short time, spread with wonderful rapidity, and caused the death of many children on the

street, almost immediately discontinued its fatal work, and not a case of diphtheria has made its appearance on this locality since, thus demonstrating the fact that the disease must have its inception in filthy accumulations and improperly drained residences.

Our attention was next called to the meagre facilities for drainage of the street leading past the residence of Thomas W. Pickford, to Mason Street, and thence to the main street, several cases of fever having occurred there. We at once caused sewer pipes to be laid on the route described, emptying into the canal, southerly of the Clement building, with a like satisfactory result, the distance being about 600 feet. The residents along both streets, have, with one or two exceptions, connected their private drains with the main sewer. We felt restrained to appropriate a small amount of money for the purpose of filling up the long existing boghole near Harriman Oleson's, at Berlin Mills Village, which, during the hot weather, emitted a most disagreeable and unhealthy smell. This was done, and a good drain made, well covered on top, for the passage of water from the marshy land beyond. Another boghole fully as detrimental to the public health, existed near the buildings occupied by Mrs. Hodgkiss, on Green Street, which was constantly filled with a large quantity of stagnant water and other filthy accumulations. From this, an open drain was dug to Dead River Pond, completely drying up the place, and furnishing a temporary means for drainage along its course. We would recommend to our successors that a sewer pipe be laid in the ditch already prepared. We also put in a sewer pipe from a point just beyond the house occupied by Hiram Cordwell, and thence past his house and Lewis N. Clark's premises, to a stone sewer leading from John W. Green's new building, to Dead River Pond, thereby directing a stream of fresh water through same, and furnishing fine sewerage facilities along its course. We would recommend to our successors the importance of draining certain de-

pressions in the ground, in the village of St. Jiles, and particularly a mudhole on land of the Mason estate, from which a disagreeable stench arises in hot weather.

During the season just passed we caused notices to be posted at houses where diphtheria prevailed, notifying the public of the location of the disease, and looked after the sanitary condition of such premises, personally, a general clearing up of such places, and the free use of disinfectants always being attended with the most beneficial results. We have carefully noted "causes and effects" since our appointment, and are fully satisfied that all contagious diseases, which have prevailed here during that period, could be accounted for in the filthy deposits on or near the premises where such disease prevailed. Consequently, we exhort the citizens of Berlin to awake to the importance of the situation, and without further delay meet unflinchingly this gravest of all questions, the public health, and provide for a good system of sewerage in our village. The future prosperity of our town largely depends on the prompt and efficient action of her citizens in this behalf, and that can never be better taken than at the coming March meeting.

In conclusion, we trust the good citizens of the town of Berlin, in measuring our labors for the past year, will bear in mind that we were limited, in our expenditures for sanitary purposes, to the nominal sum of \$500.00. This sum, after crediting the board with amount of collections, was exceeded by only a few dollars, and this excess, over the appropriation, will disappear and a handsome surplus take its place on the payment of the "assessments" appearing in our financial report. The parties, with but few exceptions, have expressed a willingness to pay the assessments before our annual meeting.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS.

*1st.* The incoming Board should, as early in the spring as possible, insist that all privies, drains, sink spouts, etc., be well cleaned and disinfected.

2d. To have the drains from Fiber Village, on north-erly side of Berlin Mills Branch Railroad, continued to Dead River.

3d. To give particular attention to the drainage of the swamps on land of the Mason estate, back of Cole School House.

4th. We also recommend that the Highway Surveyor open the Culvert in front of Harriman Oleson's residence, Berlin Mills.

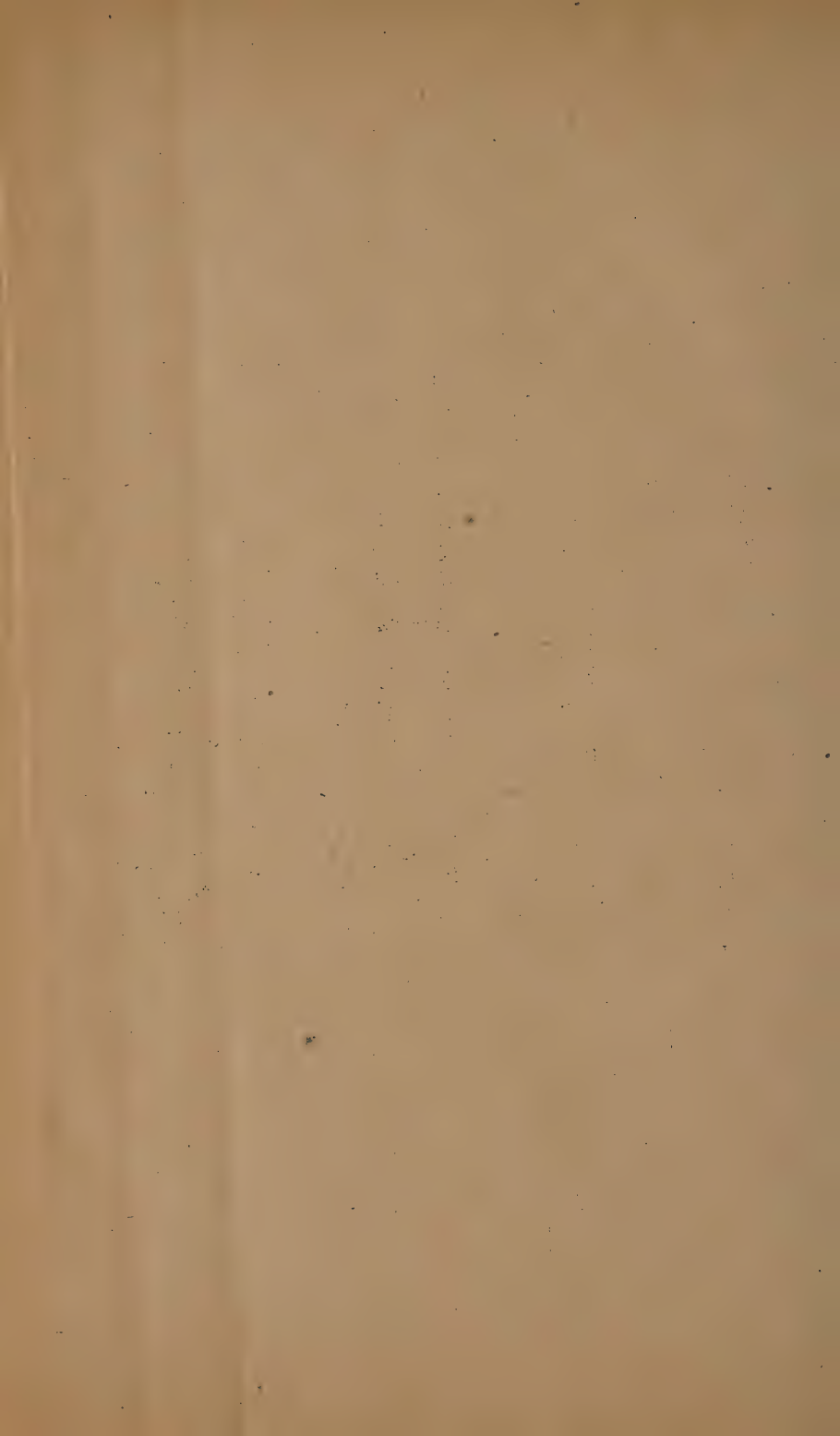

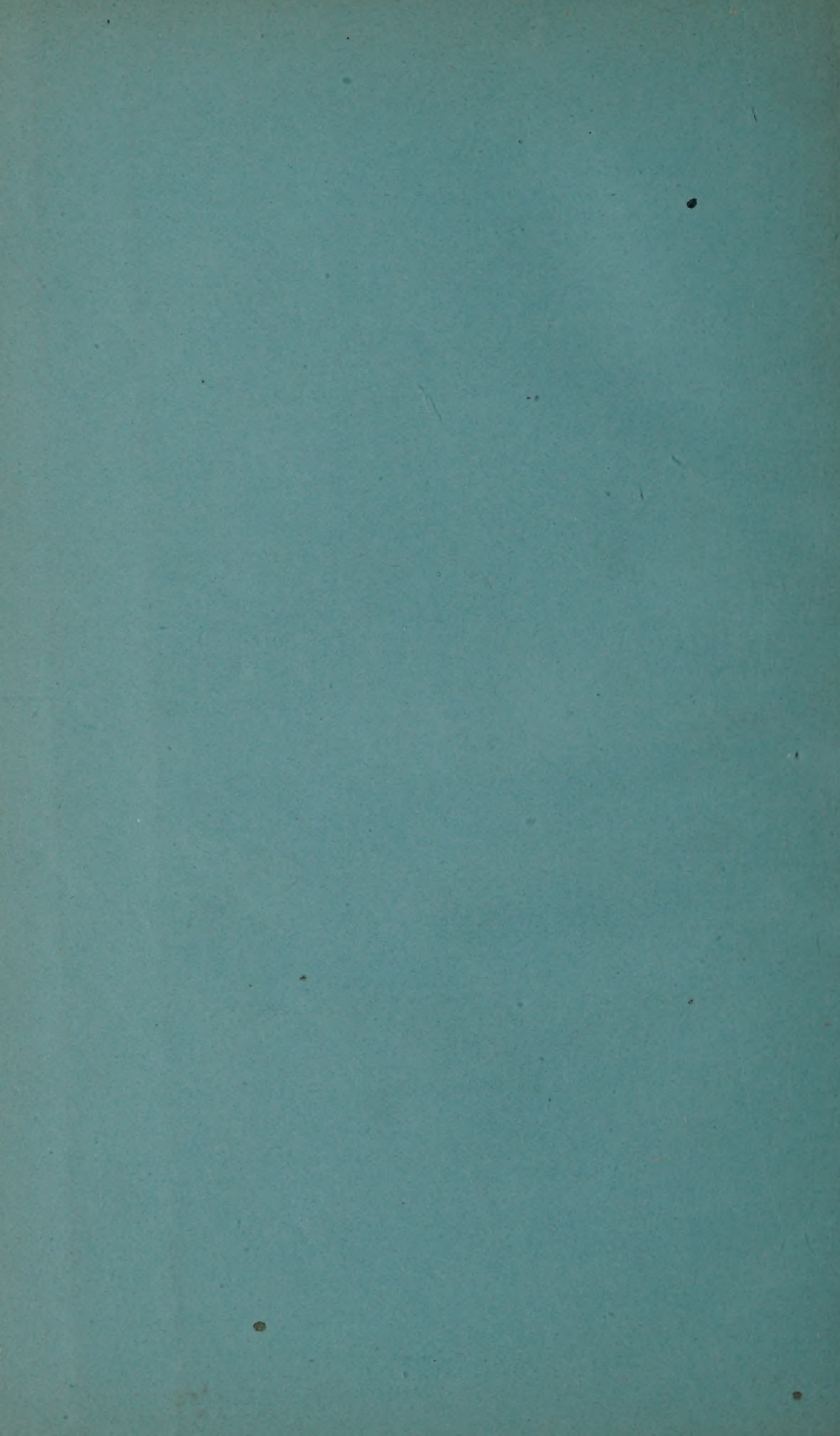
