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# REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD

TO THE DISTRICT AND TOWN OF CHESTERFIELD  
FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1889.

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## *Citizens of Chesterfield:*

In presenting to you the third report under the new school system, we are able from a longer trial of the law to emphasize the statement made in the first report, that "all the scholars in town have had the opportunity of attending a term of school, averaging one third longer" than under the old regime, "for nearly the same amount of money expended."

Any one who will take the trouble to compare the reports of years previous to 1887, with those since that date, will find that the figures prove the above fact.

At the last annual meeting two hundred dollars were appropriated to be used in supplying globes and maps for the several schools, also one hundred dollars to furnish cabinets in the school houses for the better preservation of school apparatus.

In obedience to your vote we have purchased eight sets of Maury's maps, and globes as needed for each school, and have had cabinets and easels placed in the school houses at an expense of about one hundred and sixty dollars.

During the year a new and commodious school house has been completed, in the Southwestern section of the district,

known as No. 2, but a lack of pupils has to this time, rendered it useless. Only five scholars were so situated as to be accommodated by a school therein, and they were conveyed to No. 9 at about one-half the expense of a separate school.

Five hundred dollars were raised for repairs on school house No. 5, and for building a suitable outbuilding, in connection with the same. The amount proving insufficient, your board deemed it best to appropriate the needed sum (\$65) from the school money to complete the work rather than call another meeting of the voters of the district.

Hence our schools the present year are one week shorter than they otherwise might have been.

The same series of geographies having been used for almost a generation, and the various editions in use in the same schools differing so materially as to interfere greatly with the proper classification and correct teaching of the pupils, a change to a new series was made at the beginning of the winter term, much to the gratification of the teachers, and we have reason to believe with substantial gain to the scholars.

During the year you have had twenty-two terms of school each ten weeks in length, except one, which on account of sickness was only eight; giving, to what has practically been seven sub-districts, three terms of ten weeks each during the year.

All have been fairly and some eminently successful.

In the eastern section of the district No. 7 was taught the first term by Miss L. L. Hinds whose services were as heretofore, highly appreciated by the school. The two following terms taught by Miss N. I. Cheney, a young and promising teacher, were satisfactorily successful.

No. 13 Primary was taught by Miss C. E. Smith, and No. 13 Grammar by Miss M. M. Marden, who have taught the same schools six consecutive terms. Their continuous service is sufficient commendation of their ability and success.



## SCHOOL No. 1.

Summer term.—Taught by Miss Hattie J. Newton of Keene, a normal school teacher, full of resources to present principles and ideas to the young mind. The scholars did well under her instruction.

Fall term.—Taught by Miss Ola A. Hubbard of Walpole. She worked hard for the interest of her scholars, and they advanced well in their studies. The conduct of the school was good.

Winter term.—Taught by G. B. Frost of Brattleboro', Vt. A young man well qualified to teach such a school,—the discipline good and the school was successful.

## SCHOOL No. 2.

Summer term.—Taught by Miss Ola A. Hubbard. This was her first term of teaching. Five scholars, and four of them small. Visited the school only at the close—she gave satisfaction to the patrons. There must have been one half of her time lost.

## SCHOOL No. 5.

Grammar, Summer term.—Taught by Miss Cora B. Hubbard. A teacher of excellent qualifications and large experience. The scholars advanced well in their studies.

Summer term, Primary.—Taught by Mrs. Nellie F. Wells. This school closed with eight scholars. Sickness of the teacher for two weeks and sickness of scholars in both schools injured the progress very much.

Fall term.—It was thought best in view of the small number in both schools to place the two in one school with Miss Hubbard, teacher, and combine school No. 2 with No. 9. The advancement of the scholars continued good,—near the close some unpleasantness occurred, but was soon allayed so that the winter term commenced with nearly all the scholars attending.

Winter term.—Miss Hubbard, teacher. At the outset

hard work seemed to be required and performed. A teacher should not require more of one scholar than another in discipline, and show no partiality, and scholars ought not to be allowed to leave school because they think they have not been treated just right.

#### SCHOOL No. 9.

Fall term.—Taught by Nellie F. Wells. A primary school in fact. Mrs. Wells worked hard for the interest of her pupils. The advancement with most of the scholars was good—with a few it seemed not so good, or very slow.

Winter term.—Teacher, Mrs. Wells. The progress seemed about the same as in the fall term.

The rhetorical exercises at the close were good.

#### SCHOOL No. 10.

Summer term.—Teacher, Miss Alma P. Davis. The discipline was good, but the advancement of the scholars was slow.

Fall term.—Teacher, Miss Dora J. Farr. The teacher worked hard to get the scholars interested,—to put more force into studies, and a substantial gain was made.

Winter term.—Teacher, Miss Dora J. Farr. The scholars seemed more interested, exerted themselves and made better progress than usual. The teacher was painstaking and conscientious.

The close of the school year is an opportune period for surveying and criticising work attempted, and accomplished. The public schools are every bodies babies. Have we as citizens taken our share of interest in them? Have we visited them? Have we strengthened the teachers' hands? Have we given our influence to lead the children to often consider the fact that a good education is indispensable to business, or social success? Have we made proper efforts and sacrifices that our children might be promptly and constantly at school? If not let us renew our efforts and do better in the future.



As we have looked over the young who have grown up around us during recent years, we have often wondered why there were not more of our young ladies and gentlemen securing a thorough education. In many instances it could not have been for a lack of means. Was it lack of go-be-and-do in the children, or lack of interest in the parents?

Whilst the progressive communities around us have sent their scores to colleges and seminaries, that they might secure the best educational advantages, where have our sons and daughters been?

Do we all sufficiently realize that position is due to education, and that the man who toils up and down the ladder, with his hod of mortar, for a pittance, while the architect sits in the shade and enjoys a princely income, frequently is the brainiest man and but for lack of education would outshine and lead his superior?

The need of our schools is a thoroughly united push by parents, teachers and pupils. Shall they have it?

And shall the impetus be strong enough to carry many of our children through all that can be acquired in our common schools and leave them in the higher institutions of learning?

## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the town of Chesterfield, in the County of Cheshire, in said State, qualified to vote in town affairs:*

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Chesterfield, on Tuesday, the twelfth (12th) day of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

ARTICLE 1.—To choose a Moderator to preside in said meeting.

ART. 2.—To choose a Clerk for the year ensuing.

ART. 3.—To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing.

ART. 4.—To see what sum of money the town will raise for the support of schools in addition to what is required by law, or act thereon.

ART. 5.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to work out on the highway the ensuing year.

ART. 6.—To see what sum of money the town will raise to defray town charges the ensuing year, or act thereon.

ART. 7. To determine the method of collecting taxes the ensuing year.

ART. 8. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen not to appoint an agent for the sale of spirituous liquors the ensuing year.

ART. 9.—To see if the town will vote to build the road as laid out by the Selectmen, beginning near a white oak tree on the highway north of John B. Fisk's house, thence south to the house of Comfort Crowningshield, and to raise money for the same, or act thereon.

ART. 10.—To see if the town will vote to build the road as laid out by the Selectmen, beginning on the old Gulf road near a butternut tree, thence westerly to the new iron free bridge, and raise money for the same, or act thereon.



ART. 11.—To see if the town will vote to sell the old school house in district No. 2, or act thereon.

ART. 12.—To take the sense of the qualified voters whether the alterations and amendments of the constitution shall be approved.

ART. 13. To see if the town will vote to raise \$200.00 to raise the road on Keene Hills, or act thereon.
