# Exeter Notables

Sculptor Daniel Chester French (Minuteman statue at Lexington, Mass and the statue of Lincoln at the Lincoln Memorial, Washington, DC.), locally designed the War Memorial at Gale Park (represents "Mother Town" and "Soldier Son"). Ambrose Swasey, who gave us our Bandstand and Parkway, also assisted in the invention of the reflector telescopes at Mount Palomar (California) and McDonald Observatory (Texas).

#### Points of Interest \*

American Independence Museum (the State's Revolutionary Capital) features the Ladd-Gilman House and the Folsom Tayern. Open to the Public. Exeter's Historical Society, 47 Front St, was designed as Exeter's Public Library and Civil War Memorial. Open to the Public. The Powder House, seen across the Squamscott River from the Swasey Parkway, stored some of the powder captured at Fort William & Mary in 1774 (one of first hostile acts of Revolution). Unique as it's square -(most powderhouses were round) & the brick goes all the way up the roof. (Recently renovated) Swasey Pavilion (The Bandstand) given by Ambrose Swasey and designed by Henry Bacon, architect of Lincoln Memorial. Gilman Garrison, 12 Water St, formerly licensed as a tavern by John Gilman, Jr. Open to the Public.

- Completing plans for the renovation of the Webster Avenue pump station

- · Replacing the Town Hall and the Town Office Building roofs
- Replacing the original furnace at the Public Safety Complex
- Installing new traffic lights at the intersection of High Street and Portsmouth Avenue, including Exeter's second set of pedestrian crosswalk lights and a new control mechanism for the intersection.

As Selectmen, we are individually honored to be elected to serve each of you and to be afforded the opportunity to bring positive change through all of these projects.

# TOWN MANAGER

One of the first things I do before writing this report is to take a look at last year's version. I discovered that last year's report began with a reference to my not being able to remember "...a much busier year than 1999." Well, looking back at this year I'd say we certainly kept up the pace in 2000.

A great deal of time and effort went into maintaining what we have for buildings and streets. Structural repairs were made to the Town Hall, repairs to the Powder House were completed with help of some very energetic volunteers, the Public Safety Complex got a new furnace, the windows in the Nowak Room in the Town Office building were rebuilt, the State constructed a new fish counting structure at the Great Dam, and both the Town Hall and the Town Office Building got new roofs. And on top of all of this, the State widened Portsmouth Avenue to 4 lanes, new pedestrian and traffic lights were installed at the intersection of High Street and Portsmouth Avenue and Water Street was resurfaced after the "big dig" of 1999.

But it was not just construction that kept us all busy. The Y2K crisis proved to be a real bust in large part because everyone worked so hard to make sure that nothing happened, and it didn't. New three-year collective bargaining agreements were ratified by the Board of Selectmen and the respective unions and were funded at the March Town Meeting. We all survived yet another primary season and a heart stopping fire on the Town Hall. The fire turned out to be the catalyst for a real outpouring of volunteer contributions toward the purchase a thermal imager. One of these devices, which is very much like a video camera that records pictures in terms of how much heat is coming from an object, proved very helpful in fighting the fire.

On the personnel front, 2000 saw the retirement of our Fire Chief John Carbonneau, a real loss to the Town given the 25 years that "Carby" served the Town, the last 8 as Chief. Brian Comeau, Assistant Fire Chief for the past 8 years was appointed Exeter's new Chief. Also leaving Town employment in 2000 was John Sowerby, after 13 years of employment as Public Works Engineer Technician. Joining Public Works in January was Jennifer Royce, Exeter's new Town Engineer

Looking to the immediate future excitement is building over the arrival of passenger rail service. A project that has been in the works for a decade, all of the Town's rail crossings have now been rebuilt, bids on construction of the station went out in December, with plans calling for regular service to begin in April. Also moving ahead this year was completion of the plan for maintenance of the Swasey Pavilion, better known as The Bandstand, and the finishing touches were put on the long-range sidewalk plan.

Wow, what a year! A lot got accomplished, all of it with the help and understanding of all of you. Thanks so much for your continuing understanding and support.

As always a sincere thank you to the Board of Selectmen, the Department Heads and all of the Town's terrific employees for making my job so exciting and so much fun.

#### ASSESSOR'S REPORT

Keeping up with Exeter's housing growth has been the primary focus over the past year in the Assessing Office. New subdivisions, single family homes, commercial/industrial growth, hundreds of deeds transfers and the real estate appreciation have made for a busy year.

This year, as in the past eight years, all property values were reviewed and updated to stay parallel with market sales prices. The continued process of assessment updating on an annual basis creates proportionality and equity throughout Exeter's tax base. This procedure helps build confidence with the taxpayers that their taxable assessed values are approximately market value.

Exeter's tax base is 2000 increased approximately \$75 million. In 1999, the tax base was \$777 million and in 2000 it has risen to nearly \$852 million. This increase is attributed to \$16 million in new building construction and \$59 million in market appreciation for all types and styles of property including single family, mobile homes, condominiums, commercial, industrial and land.

Information available to the public at the Assessor's Office includes the tax warrant, street index, owners' report, tax maps and assessed values of all properties. In the upcoming year, we will be setting up a computer terminal for public use. This will give the public easy access to all assessment records.

The Assessing office has information and forms for elderly exemptions, veterans' credits and other methods of tax relief for taxpayers. Current Use and Intent to Cut Timber applications and procedures are also available in the office.

My staff and I are available to address ay concerns or questions regarding your property and encourage your participation in the education and understanding of the assessment process.

As another year passes, I would like to thank my fellow office employees and property owners for their support and understanding in running a successful assessment program. I am looking forward to a busy and productive year in 2001, and for better ways to make the property tax process more efficient for Exeter's property owners.

#### ROBINSON FUND

The Robinson Fund is a charitable trust for the benefit of the Town of Exeter whose citizens elect its seven trustees. The funds were given in trust to the Town in 1853 by the will of William Robinson, a native of Exeter who attended Phillips Exeter Academy and for whose sister there existed no similar educational facility in the area. The Will specified that the funds be for "the only and sole instruction of females... all other things being equal, always to give preference to the poor and the orphan". In September of 1869, the newly built Robinson Female Seminary opened its doors to females from the Exeter area.

From 1869 until 1955, the Robinson Seminary was the only public school in Exeter to serve postelementary females. (Males attended the Tuck High School). In 1954, the town passed a bond issue to build an addition to the High School. In 1956, the first co-educational class graduated from the High School. A fire in 1961 destroyed the Seminary building. The Lincoln Street Elementary School and its playgrounds now occupy the site.

Three of the current Robinson Fund Trustees attended the Seminary, two are graduates and the third a graduate of the then co-ed Exeter High School.

In the beginning, the Trustees managed both the school and trust funds. But by the 1940's, the income from the trust proved inadequate and the Town started assuming the deficit. In 1940, the Exeter School District formally assumed control of the school. Only the trust funds remained under the control of the Trustees.

In order to institute a co-educational system, the Town had to get permission of the Legislature who referred the matter to Judge Elwin Page. His 1947 Master's Report states that, in his legal opinion, Robinson's wishes could be met by using the trust income to pay pro-rated teachers salaries of coed or female only classes.

In the early 1990's, in order to avoid discrimination on the basis of gender, the Trustees went to the Probate Court. In 1996 the Court issued a new decree that discontinued the existing income distribution and established a new Trust purpose: "to create a fund to provide opportunities to enrich and enhance the educational experience of post-elementary age individuals within the area served by the Exeter Region Cooperative School District, through the development of programs, scholarships and grants". In June, 1998, acting under this new decree, the Trustees awarded the first Robinson Fund scholarships to graduating seniors of the Exeter Region Cooperative High School

In June this past year, the Robinson Scholarship Fund awarded scholarships to the following class of 2000 seniors: Brad Cook \$10,000, Rebecca Rawson \$4,000, Megan Edwards \$3,500, Greg Beaulieu \$2,000. To re-applicants, the following was awarded: Jessica Ward \$10,830, Jason Pool \$4,000, Brian Burbank \$2,000, Kristy Robshaw \$9,600 and Lauren Know \$4,600.

# TOWN CLERK'S REPORT

The busy election year of 2000 is over and fortunately we did not have to worry about "chads" of any type! (I could not resist writing that!) Seriously though, Exeter has over 10,000 registered voters and the participation varied among the 4 elections held this year. The February Presidential Primary had 50% participation; the March Town Elections/Meeting had 29% participation; the September State Primary had 22% participation; and the November General Election had 62% participation. The surge in voter registration for the November election was outstanding, with over 800 people registering to vote at the polls. It is important to exercise your "right to vote", whether it is in a Town, State, or Federal election. Let your voice be heard - be a participant and VOTE!

Many new people have relocated to Exeter and have found their way to our office to register their vehicle(s), register to vote, or gather information about their new community. Motor vehicle registration processing has increased over last year and, likewise, revenue is up. We licensed over 1700 dogs this year, an increase of 150+ dogs. The issuance of New Hampshire certified births, deaths, and/or marriage certificates is up as Exeter continues to be one of the pilot test sites for the computerized network with the State of NH's Bureau of Vital Records. Total Revenues collected in the Town Clerk's office amounted to over \$1,912,000 - a 9.5% increase over last year. There are no new State motor vehicle free increases anticipated at this time, but it is expected that revenue in this area will continue to rise as the motor vehicle prices ascend.

I take this opportunity to congratulate former Deputy Town Clerk Ann Titus on her new position with the Rockingham County Conservation District, and I announce the promotion of Lisa Buxton to Deputy Town Clerk. Lisa's knowledge of the duties of the position and her acquaintance with many of our citizens will serve her well. Julie Laurent joins our team as full-time Assistant Clerk, and Debra Unger continues with us as part-time Assistant Clerk. It is because of their support, knowledge, positive attitude, and willingness to assist our citizens that the Town Clerk's Office is able to operate with such success and efficiency. I am proud to have these ladies as my co-workers, and I thank them publicly for their assistance during this busy past year.

I thank our Voter Checklist Supervisors: Alice Dorman, Margaret "Peg" Duhamel, and Winifred "Fritzi" Bernard, for the many hours they spend updating the voter checklist and assisting the residents with voter registration. I also thank the many wonderful ladies and gentlemen who willingly gave their time working at the voting polls during the 4 elections this year. I know they were very tired at the end of each day, and certainly deserve our appreciation.

Thank you also to the Board of Selectmen members, the Town Manager, the Town Office employees, and members of the other Town Departments for your support and assistance during this past year.

And last, but certainly not least, I thank you the residents of this wonderful community for your support, your patience, your smiles and for the opportunity to continue as your Town Clerk. Together we will face the challenges of the future. We must do our best to become knowledgeable, stay informed, and secure the technical capabilities and manpower to keep up with the changes in technology, and the many other changes all around us.

May this new millennium bring us all peace, happiness, continued economic growth, and the best of health.

# **Exeter Police Department**

The Exeter Police Department is continually striving to meet the demands of the ever increasing population and growth. This growth brings an assortment of new concerns with it: increased traffic congestion, construction delays, additional criminal cases, and added calls for service. The Department is committed to moving forward to keep pace with the growth while at the same time presenting a reasonable budget.

In 2000, the department added a Communications Supervisor to manage the Communications Center. This in-house addition has increased the full time communication staff to five, manning the Communication Center 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. This Center handles all phone and radio communications for both the police and fire departments and includes answering all 911 emergency calls. A new computer-aided dispatch reporting system and Dictaphone are the top priorities in the 2001 budget. The additional position and the new equipment will help ease the strain on the center.

A very important new addition to the Detective Division is the "School Resource Officer Program". Funded in part by a federal grant, this program was started in August of 2000, with an officer assigned to the High School. In spite of some initial opposition and skepticism the short time the program has been in place, it has proven to be a great asset to students, teachers and administrators alike. Plans to evaluate the success and continuation of the program are being developed by both school and police officials.

The Department's uniformed division continues to be busy in the area of emergency calls, traffic enforcement and investigating criminal cases. Thousands of motor vehicle stops are made each year by uniformed officers. These result in over a thousand summonses for various motor vehicle offenses and thousands of warnings. Our ultimate goal is to make the roads safer for both the motoring public and pedestrians. The uniformed officers continue to respond to and investigate criminal investigations, as well as answering emergency calls for service. Officers have responded to over 600 alarms from both residential and business locations. The vast majority of these alarms are false and cause a considerable waste of time and effort and are dangerous for the officer. Though this is a decrease from last year, the community needs to continually strive to reduce this number.

Investigators in the Detective Division have worked on a number of major cases to include felonious sexual assaults, armed robbery, burglaries and 1st degree assaults. Most of these cases have resulted in an arrest and are waiting prosecution. Investigators also handle all computer/web crimes which are becoming more prevalent in society and in our own community. This specialized field will require further training for the investigators. They are also involved with the Exeter Crimeline organization, and other civic organizations within the community.

The Department's Juvenile Officer continues to be involved in a number of elementary school programs to include D.A.R.E, and many other safety related topics. The After School Program which involves officers interacting with children, continues to be a success, thanks to the New Car Dealers Association's generous support.

The long awaited new passenger rail service is nearly here. The four crossings in Exeter have all been upgraded with new rails and gates. The Police Department, in conjunction with Railroad Police, will be monitoring trespassing issues on the tracks. Along with enforcement, education will be key in dissuading both adults and juveniles from using the railroad tracks as they have in the past.

Special thanks goes to the Board of Selectman, Town Manager George Olson and the other department heads who I have worked with in the past year, for their support. Also a sincere thanks goes to retired Fire Chief John Carbonneau, who worked closely with the Police Department during his years of dedicated service.

I am particularly indebted to the men and women of the Exeter Police Department who, on a daily basis, strive for excellence. They are dedicated to their profession and continue to make me proud to work with them.

# DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS

I am pleased to submit my 16<sup>th</sup> annual report to the citizens of Exeter. Once again, this has been a very busy year for the department. We are all working hard to stay on top of an ever-increasing workload and at the same time preparing and planning for the future. In addition to maintaining more miles of roads, sidewalks, water pipes, and sewer pipes, we are required to deal with more stringent and complicated regulations and procedures. Our dedicated employees are required to be highly trained and more motivated than ever.

Our new Town Engineer, Jennifer Royce, has brought forth a high level of expertise and knowledge that is benefiting us all. In addition to handling the engineering work, she has been a great asset to me managing the department. The Engineer works closely with the Town Planner insuring that commercial and residential impacts and additions to our infrastructure are done appropriately and according to our standards.

The Highway Department has been very involved with the Court Street Infiltration/ Inflow Rehabilitation Project. This project is the last of many similar projects with the objective of removing storm water from the sewer system. The benefits will be less expensive sewer treatment costs and the elimination of untreated sewer overflows into the Squamscott River. The crews made a number of improvements at Swasey Parkway including building the new intersection, regrading of the lawn area in front of the stage and installing new brick pavers on the pier. We installed new signals at the High Street/Portsmouth Avenue intersection which, in addition to making the intersection more efficient, will provide walk signals for pedestrian crossings.

The Maintenance Department has kept busy keeping the municipal buildings and vehicles well maintained. Major projects included replacing the slate shingles on the town office and asphalt shingles on the Town Hall, repairing and painting the Town Hall portico, installing a new furnace at the public safety complex and repairing the trusses and beams in the attic of the Town Hall. Our maintenance technicians completed a number of important projects including building a new partition in the Tax Collector's office, front eave repairs at the Senior Center, replacement of the HVAC at the Public Works Complex, refurbishing the Town Office fire escape, completing the renovations and repairing the exterior siding at the Recreation offices, rebuilding the windows in the Nowak Room and the Town Office basement, and performing emergency repairs to the Town Hall following the fire.

The Water and Sewer Department staff has also been involved with the Court Street Project as well as the Portsmouth Avenue reconstruction, which included significant work on the water and sewer system. Work has started on a comprehensive water study and a modern sewer alarm and monitoring system. We are also in the process of upgrading the Webster Avenue sewer pump station making the station more reliable and efficient. In the past year, many employees have earned State Certifications that are above the required qualifications for their job, proving their commitment to increase their skills and abilities thus making them more valuable employees.

I believe that our employees are the best in the business and are truly dedicated to serving the community well. The department is working as a team better than ever before and morale is at an all time high. This is important because our employees are the ones that serve you, the customer, on a daily basis and I believe happy employees make happy customers. # Report of the New Hampshire Senate to the Town of Exeter

I appreciate this opportunity to report from the New Hampshire Senate to the residents of Exeter.

School funding continues to dominate the agenda. Although the Legislature has yet to agree on a sustainable means of funding the state's share of the cost of education, we have committed the state to financing more that half the cost of the public school system. This is a major divergence from past policy, where more than 90% of this cost was borne by the local property taxpayers. This commitment in itself will fundamentally change the relationship between the state and its municipalities. At an annual cost of \$1.4 billion, the public school system represents the largest single public expenditure in New Hampshire. By relieving cities and towns of this burden we hope to provide significant and lasting reductions in local property tax rates. I remain committed to developing an equitable and sustainable means of funding schools one that is fiscally responsible and beneficial to the students of New Hampshire.

This session I will serve as Vice-Chair of the Senate Finance Committee and as a member of the Insurance, Internal Affairs, and Ways and Means Committees. More than 1600 bills have been introduced, including legislation on such important issues as prescription drug pricing, school accountability, personal privacy, affordable housing, and health care coverage for the uninsured.

As I work on my first town report as the newly appointed Fire Chief, I look back to all of the changes the department has faced over the past year. The biggest change came from the retirement of Chief John E. Carbonneau, a member of this Department for 33 years. His experience will be missed and we wish John the best in his retirement.

The Department also received its first Thermal Imager. Our thanks go out the Board of Selectmen for spearheading this project and the generous contributions from the public and the business community.

Other challenges this department faces every day include the high volume of fire and EMS runs. Only 5 years ago this Department responded to 700 fire calls and 900 EMS calls. Today the department responds to over 1000 fire calls and over 1200 EMS runs. We meet these challenges by providing the highest levels of service and care. The Exeter Fire Department will have 8 Paramedics this year, the highest level of service to date.

Our Firefighters have also attended some of the most advanced rescue training programs in the State. We have trained all of our personnel in Flashover survival at the New Hampshire Fire Academy. This training adds valuable tools to our toolbox and allows us, as a department, to provide you with the best service possible.

I would like to thank the Board of Selectmen and the Town Manager for their confidence and continued support. Also I would like to especially thank the Officers and the members of the Exeter Fire Department for their dedication, commitment and for the great job they do every day.

# PARKS AND RECREATION DEPARTMENT

After an eight month stay at the old George and Phillips Sport Shop on Water Street, the Exeter Parks and Recreation Department moved back to the Recreation office at 32 Court Street in early March. With the improvements to the building we hope to be able to serve the public better. We now have two walk-up windows for the registration of programs and events. One major change this past year was the implementation by the department to accept Visa and Master cards; they may be used for program and trip registrations. The service has been well received and should make registrations a lot easier for those using our department. One of our goals is to be able to allow you to register over the Internet. We will keep you informed on this. The Town of Exeter web site is <a href="https://www.exeternh.org">www.exeternh.org</a>.

There were many improvements made this past year to our parks through the Park Study Advisory Committee warrant articles approved at town meeting. We were able to install irrigation in November at Brickyard Park. In May of this year we were able to install irrigation at Gale Park on Front Street. We continue to have the support of the taxpayers for these projects along with the approval of equipment that has been needed by our department for a number of years, therefore making the upkeep of our parks, commons, and historical cemeteries easier for our crews. We continue to have groups support our department through the "Volunteers Brighten Lives" program with two additional groups, the Exeter Women's Club and the Exeter Junior Women's Club, joining in to participate along with Churchill's Garden Center, Dana Wyman, and Shuchman & Krause-Elmslie Law Firm.

Planet Playground continues to see large numbers using the facilities throughout the year. The summer programs saw large numbers in the PlayCamp program, swim lessons, and our various sport camps. The support of sponsors for our six week summer concerts in the park series was very good again this year. Our pool use was down some with the wet summer months this year, but the revenues were very close to what we received in 1999.

Some of the activities that saw increases this year included our high school age basketball program and our karate program. There was a slight drop in fall soccer and spring baseball/softball. However, with the continued growth in our community we expect to see increases in most of our activities.

Volunteers are a vital link to many of our activities, including trips, special events, and programs. More than three hundred adult and teen volunteers donated their time this year, and we thank you all for your continued support and good work.

With the approval of funding through a warrant article we were able to replace our old used bus with a newer 1984 model MCI in excellent condition that should serve our community well for the next few years. Those using the bus to date have been very pleased with the ride and comfort that it provides. We thank those who supported the warrant articles the past three years. The senior citizen monthly mystery trips, the show trips, flower shows and ice show trips continue to provide a much needed service to our community.

One of the highlights this summer was the three murals that were painted by residents of River-Woods At Exeter at the pool bathhouse. The murals add so much to the facility. We thank the residents of River-Woods for their continued support for community events and activities.

Over the years we have had many new park benches donated through our "Remember a Loved One" or our "Honor a Loved One" program, where you purchase a bench and we engrave the boards on the back honoring a person(s). We have had more than 30 benches donated to the Town under this program.

Something that I would like to include in this year's report is that the Town of Exeter has two time capsules. One is located at Gale Park and was placed at the park in 1976 as part of the Bicentennial celebration to be open one hundred years from that date, 2076. The second one is at Park Street Common, placed for Exeter's 350<sup>th</sup> celebration held in 1988 to be opened in fifty years, 2038. As this Town Report serves as historical record, we do not want the residents in Exeter to forget these two time capsules.

I would be remiss if I did not thank our department staff for their support and help during my absence this past spring. The gang included Jan, Grace, and Dick and members of the Parks & Recreation Advisory Board. A special thank you to all for your cards, letters and flowers - it meant a great deal to me and my family.

I would like to thank my fellow department heads, Town Manager, Board of Selectmen, our Parks & Recreation Advisory Board and Park Study Committee for their support this past year.

# Water and Sewer Advisory Committee Report

Exeter's Water and Sewer Advisory Committee was involved on a variety of significant projects during 2000. The year began with the Committee working to support a \$715,000 bond issue in support of rebuilding the Webster Avenue pump station and the upgrading of the alarm system for our nine sewer pump stations. The article was supported by you, the residents, and work on the project will begin early next year.

Early in 2000, the Committee welcomed Jennifer Royce as the Town's new Engineer. Her arrival coincided with the initiation of a Water Study for Exeter. The study will provide the same kind of comprehensive look at our water utility as was provided by last year's Sewer Study. The Water Study will, among a variety of material, provide a computer model for determining water used by new development, a list of utility needs and a listing of priority projects and associated costs.

In June, the Board of Selectmen acted on a new policy developed at the request of the Water and Sewer Advisory Committee. In April of 1999, the Committee asked the Board of Selectmen for help in providing direction on the issue of water and sewer service requests made by developers in adjoining communities. A Special Water and Sewer Advisory Committee was formed, took a look at the issue and presented its report to the Board of Selectmen early this year. In June, the Board of Selectmen accepted the Committee's report as policy for the Town. Basic to this new policy is the provision of water and sewer services first to residents of Exeter, with water and sewer services to be provided to neighboring Towns only when it is clear that a surplus of water and sewer is available.

In the late summer, the last of the Town's sewer separation projects was begun on Court Street. The project, just like the Town's other sewer separation efforts focused on getting sanitary sewer out of the storm drain system. The project should mean that the Town no longer has to worry about the cost of treating storm water, nor have the need to divert mixed storm and sanitary sewer to the holding pond during heavy rains.

The year ended with the Board of Selectmen agreeing to a request from the Committee to amend its policy on adjustments. Now bills showing excessive water use will be adjusted only if the customer can show that there was a problem with the Town's system or if the customer had an infirmity that precluded them from recognizing that there was a leak.

Our budget process in the Fall included input from other departments such as Public Works, Finance and Planning in order to coordinate work with that of other potential projects. We were successful with incorporating several infrastructure improvement projects and equipment upgrades into the budget while keeping overall expense increases relatively flat. This approach was considered a prudent strategy in advance of major near term capital improvements to both water and wastewater treatment facilities.

The Committee looks forward to next year when the results of the Water Study are received and implemented. Much time will be spent with this information and that contained in the Sewer Study. The goal is the preparation of a comprehensive Capital Plan for water and sewer improvement over the coming years.

In closing, the Committee would like to thank Don Brabant for his years of service as Chairman. After 5 years as Chair Don decided to pass the baton of leadership. Much thanks to Don for sharing his initiative and knowledge with us all. We all look forward to his continuing service on the Committee.

### **BUILDING INSPECTOR**

The Building Department is still as busy as ever. New homes are about one-half of last years' total, approximately 40 new homes for the year 2000. Although as homes get larger, they require more inspections. The larger homes seem to be the "norm" by today's standards, averaging about twenty-five to three thousand square feet in size. Additions and renovations are still a big part of our work-load as residents are improving their property for expanded living or upgrading to newer conditions.

One of our biggest projects this year was the new Phillips Exeter Academy Science Building on Tan Lane that has required many inspections. When completed, this will represent another magnificent architectural building added to the Phillips Exeter Academy campus. With the completion of the NH Route 101 Reconstruction project, Portsmouth Avenue businesses are moving closer to the highway: even Epping Road has a new Gas & Food Mart, "Mobil On The Run". We are expecting more development on Epping Road as well.

As usual, we are bracing for another busy year. The Electrical Inspector, Art French, and I would like to thank the office staff – Barb McEvoy, Lois Mazurka and Pat Turner for their hard work in helping us keep our many records in their proper places. We always welcome residents for questions about building or zoning issues, or suggestions they may have.

As always, the Building Department works closely with other Departments within the Town. Also, we administer the Zoning Board of Adjustment (ZBA) and Historic District Commission (HDC), assist the Planning Department with respect to zoning issues, and are considered an informational center for contractors and residents regarding building, planning, zoning and code enforcement issues.

#### PLANNING DEPARTMENT

Similar to the previous year, 2000 proved to be a very busy, interesting and challenging year for the Planning Department. Early on we set several goals for the Department's on-coming building and planning season. Three of these goals included updating our reference documents, improving our technical review process and improving communications with other departments and Town Boards.

One of our goals was to update our reference documents. Land use and land development are subject to Exeter's Zoning Ordinance, Site Review and Subdivision Regulations. Our department recognized that these documents needed to be updated and revised. We also wanted to make them more "user friendly". Together with much assistance from Planning Board members Bob Eastman and Peter Valade, and review assistance from Public Works, other Planning Board and Conservation Commission members, and of course Planning Staff, we met this goal. We have incorporated all past amendments into the Zoning Ordinance, reformatted it and made it easier to read. Our Site Review and Subdivision Regulations were also given new life. First we combined the two documents, revised many sections, and also reformatted the document to create an easy to use guide.

Another goal of the department was to further improve our technical review process. For the Town's Technical Review Committee (TRC), reviewing plans is time consuming and demanding. Still, it is the TRC that helps to steer the developer to the best design and ensure the Town's interests are met. Prior to this year, plans went through one technical review meeting where revisions were advised, plans were resubmitted and finally the public hearing process began. Often problems arose because revisions were not complete or TRC comments were not adhered to. Over the course of this past year, I have insisted that large subdivisions and major site plans go through a second technical review meeting to insure revisions have been made according to TRC comments. Although this has created additional work for our TRC up front, I believe the additional review has helped to shorten the public hearing process, improved the overall quality of proposals and decreased the number of future revisions during and after the public hearing process.

Last but not least, the Planning Department has sought to improve communications with those who work with us. Aside from more typical land use issues, there are many other projects we work on that involve a variety of Departments, Boards and Schools. To improve communications with these groups and to create a stronger partnership, my staff and I continually meet with Board members, School officials, Town staff and others to discuss the issues involved. Our Department plays an essential role to keep everyone informed. As an example, the Town's Capital Improvement Program (CIP) and the creation of Zoning Amendments are two areas of considerable work in which tasks cross the paths of many. This year, we began reviewing issues related to these projects two months earlier than last year. We followed up memos with phone calls and meetings to let interested parties know what was required of them. Although this was time consuming, the results were better projects and better informed staff, volunteers and associates.

As a final note, I would like to thank all those who worked with the Planning Department over the course of the year: our inspectors and all other Town employees, School officials, staff at the Rockingham Planning Commission, our many consultants, all the Applicants and their engineers, counselors, and especially the many volunteers for their countless contributions to our department.

### PLANNING BOARD

Along with the other planning and land use boards and commissions of Exeter, the Planning Board has the responsibility to encourage the appropriate and wise use of the Town's land in order to enhance the health, safety and general welfare of the citizens of the Town. To do this, the Planning Board has three sets of responsibilities.

- 1. It is responsible for the preparation and amendment of the Town's:
  - a. master plan
  - b. capital improvement plan
  - c. subdivision regulations
  - d. site plan review regulations
- 2. Within these plans and regulations, the Board is responsible for the review and approval of all:
  - a. subdivisions
  - b. lot line adjustments
  - c. site plans for non-residential uses and multi-family dwelling units.
- 3. Annually, the Board reviews and then recommends, as appropriate, amendments to the Town's zoning ordinance for consideration by the Town's citizens.

This past year the Board has focused on improving its regulations to protect the Town's wetlands and water supply and to manage growth. Additionally, sub-committees of the Board are considering how to amend the Master Plan, working on how to manage growth and developing an effective capital improvement plan in conjunction with the school districts and water and sewer department.

The Board generally meets every second and fourth Thursday of each month at 7:00PM in the Nowak Room of the Town Office building. The Board encourages the public to attend and participate. These meetings are also televised on EXTV, channel 22, the Town's government and education channel.

The Board is very appreciative of the support, cooperation and participation of the citizens, Town employees, other town boards and commissions, consultants and petitioners. ### HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION

The Historic District Commission (HDC) had a very busy year. We have had a variety of proposals to review and decisions to make concerning the preservation of the Historic District. These requests have varied from signs, doors, and stained-glass windows to cellular towers. We continue to receive great support from the community.

In addition, Commission members dedicated many hours to developing a set of guidelines for use by the HDC in making its decisions and to inform residents of appropriate changes to their properties within historic districts. The town is required by state law to have such guidelines. These will enable commission members to apply a consistent standard for historic preservation in Exeter.

The HDC's next task is to explore the Certified Local Government Program in New Hampshire. This is a certification process that will enable the Town of Exeter to be eligible to apply for Certified Local Government (CLG) federal matching grants set aside for the exclusive use of CLGs. These grants are directed toward eligible non-construction preservation activities such as walking tours of the district. In addition, the HDC will also explore expansion of the Historic District to include High Street, out to Park Street and east to Court Street. Community involvement will be an important part of this discussion.

Commission members are dedicated to supporting the best interests of the Exeter community as we strive to retain its unique, historic character. We meet on the third Thursday of each month. All citizens are welcome to attend. We encourage community input, support, and participation.

### EXETER ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

The Exeter Zoning Board of Adjustment sits as a five member quasi-judicial body to hear and decide on four types of applications: variance, special exception, appeal from an administrative decision and equitable waivers of dimensional requirements.

An application for a variance alleges that a literal enforcement of a particular provision of the zoning ordinance would result in an unnecessary hardship. An application for a special exception is a request to permit a specific use subject to meeting certain criteria set forth in the Zoning Ordinance. An appeal from an administrative decision involves a request for review of a decision by an administrative official with respect to enforcement of any provision of the Zoning Ordinance. An equitable waiver of a dimensional requirement may be granted if the Board finds that a zoning setback requirement has mistakenly been violated despite a good faith effort to comply with the regulations.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment met twelve times in 2000 and considered a total of 19 applications. Ten applications were granted. One was conditionally approved. Three were denied and five are still under review.

The Zoning Board of Adjustment meets the third Tuesday of each month at 7:00 P.M. in the Nowak

Room of the Town Office Building.

# Exeter Health Department

As of October 31, 2000 the Exeter Health Department has handled at least 267 health related activities. Throughout the year, the department was called upon to investigate various complaints and concerns. Complaints vary greatly in nature. Some took several days to investigate and follow up on. Issues this year included air quality, pool, well and spring water qualities, foreign matter in food, food recalls, trash and disease questions and monitoring. (State DHHS reported 5 cases of pertussis).

Exeter's Health Department conducts inspections and licenses all food service operations within the Town. The operations are inspected twice a year, as mandated by State regulations. Presently, the Town has 85 licensed food service operations. This year-to-date, 2 operations have changed ownership, 7 new licenses were issued and 6 operations closed. The department reviewed 5 plan reviews and 19 temporary licenses were issued. There was one fire at a temporary food operation.

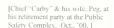
The department inspects daycare operations on initial opening and for their re-licensure, which is every third year. Foster care health inspections are done at initial licensing time.

The Health Department has hosted several training meetings for local Seacoast Area Health Officers. The department has attended 2 State Health Officer meetings, 3 self-inspecting City and Town meetings, 2 F.D.A. conferences and participated in this year's local Emergency Operation Center drills.

A further breakdown of health activities is included in the Exeter Fire Department consolidated report. Questions or concerns regarding public health issues may be directed to the Exeter Health Department at 772-1212.

# **Emergency Management**

Once again we have successfully completed Seabrook drills with no deficiencies. This is due in part because of the cooperation from all the Town's Departments who staff the Emergency Operations Center. Year 2001 has no Seabrook drills scheduled, however the Emergency Management Office has and will continually seek grant monies for the town in the areas of Hazard Mitigation and Disaster Preparedness. Several projects that were completed last year were:

- 1. New ham radio setup for the E.O.C
- 2. Funding for the Nextel cellular phone system
- 3. Training dispatch personnel in the Personnel Alert Notification System
- 4. Computer for the E.O.C

New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management funded all of the above items. Presently the Army Corps of Engineers is working on a Hurricane flood map of the Town of Exeter. Once completed, it will show the flood prone areas during hurricane related rains (October 1996 flood is still fresh in my mind). Once this map is completed I will secure a copy of it for the Town.

This Office is at present working with the New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management to secure resources to repair the Dam at great bridge and increase it's flow when the town experiences high water. Also, with the new passenger rail service available this year, we would like to take a pro-active approach with training critical personnel in passenger railcar emergencies in the event of a rail catastrophe. We are presently seeking federal funds for training all the necessary personnel, not only for rescue but also for E.O.C staff functions as well. This year we will also look into refresher training for all the town departments who have the responsibility of working in the Emergency Operations Center. As always I'm here to assist anyone who have questions about our Emergency Management Department or the New Hampshire Office of Emergency Management.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Exeter, in the County of Rockingham, in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the **Town Hall**, Front Street in said Exeter on **Saturday**, **February 10**, **2001** at **9:00AM** for the purpose of transacting all business other than voting by official ballot and, thereafter, to meet on **Tuesday**, **March 13**, **2001** between 8:00AM and 8:00 PM at the Exeter Town Hall, to elect officers, vote on zoning articles and to vote on all warrant articles from the first session by official ballot.

Article 1: To choose the following: 2 Selectmen for 3-year terms; 3 Library Trustees for 3-year terms; 1 Library Trustee for a 1-year term; 1 Trustee of the Trust Funds for a 3-year term; 1 Trustee of the Robinson Fund for a 7-year term; 1 Swasey Park Trustee for a 3-year term.

Article 2: Zoning Amendment #1: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 2.2 Definitions by deleting the definition of Coverage (Article 2.2.11) and adding a new definition as follows: "Building Coverage: That percentage of the plot or land area covered by the principal and accessory building area." In conjunction with the above definition change, amend Article 4.3 Schedule II and 4.4 Schedule III, by revising column title "Lot Coverage" to read "Building Coverage". Also amend Note 4 (Schedule II and III) by deleting the existing language and replacing it with: "See definition 2.2.# "Building Coverage". In conjunction with the above revisions, add new definition for Lot Coverage as follows: All impervious surfaces on a given lot including: paved, bricked or gravel areas, buildings or other structures, decks and patios, and recreational facilities such as tennis courts, inground pools or similar amenities. For the Exeter Shoreland Protection District shall be defined to include lawns or other manicured ground covers. Renumber Article 2.2 accordingly."?

Article 3: Zoning Amendment #2: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 2.2.40: Rooming and Boarding Houses definition by deleting the word "building" and replacing it with the phrase "dwelling or part thereof."?

Article 4: Zoning Amendment #3: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 3.2 Zoning Map and applicable sections of the Zoning Ordinance by rezoning 32,930 sq. ft of Tax Map Parcel 52-112 from the CT district to the C-2 district."? (See map as posted)

Article 5: Zoning Amendment #4: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 3.2 Zoning Map by expanding the Healthcare District boundary line to include Tax Map Parcel #65-132."? (This unimproved 13,068 sq. ft. lot is adjacent to the Healthcare District and was acquired by Exeter Hospital, Inc. in 1997.) (See map as posted)

Article 6: Zoning Amendment #5: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 4.2 – Permitted Uses by deleting "Churches and similar places of worship" from the list of uses permitted by Special Exception in the Industrial Zoning Districts."?

Article 7: Zoning Amendment #6: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 4.2 Schedule I by adding "Multi-Family Residential Use" and "Mixed Use" as a Permitted Principal Use in the C-I District; add "Mixed Use" as a Permitted Principal Use in the WC district. In conjunction with this revision, amend Article 2.2 Definitions by adding a new definition as follows: "2.2.31 Mixed Use: Any building or structure containing two or more uses. Residential uses allowed on any level with the exception of street level. Street level, the level most accessible to any street, is to be reserved for retail/commercial/office uses."? (Renumber the remaining definitions accordingly.)

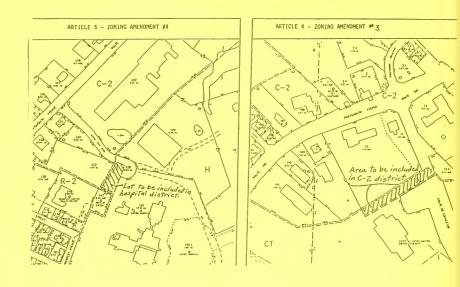
Article 8: Zoning Amendment #7: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Articles 5.5.4 Accessory Structures in R-Districts by revising subsection B. to read as follows: "Accessory structures shall comply with front, side and rear yard requirements: except one (1) accessory structure of 120 square feet or less is permitted within the yard setback areas with exception to the front yard setback and is limited to a height of twelve feet (12 ft)."?

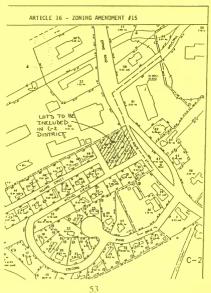

In conjunction with the above amendment, Amend Article 4.4, Schedule III, Revise Note #8 to read as follows: "A minimum of 35% of the lot shall be maintained for open space and landscaped areas. In the Healthcare District, these requirements shall apply to all lots owned by a single entity and its affiliates collectively and not to each such lot individually. Add Note #16 to read as follows: (within the following columns for the Healthcare District: "Municipal Water & Sewer", "Min. Lot Area", "Min. Lot Depth", "Min. Lot Width", "Min. Front Yard", "Min. Side Yard", and "Min. Rear Yard") Note 16 to read: See Article 6.15 Healthcare District."?

Article 11: Zoning Amendment #10: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 7.5.6 Open Space Development – Internal Setback Requirements by adding a new subsection as follows: 'E. Existing Open Space Development: Internal setbacks effective as of the date of the approval of any existing open space development shall be applied to future construction within the same existing open space development."'?

Article 12: Zoning Amendment #11: Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment #11 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Town Zoning Ordinance as follows: "Amend Article 9.1.7.C by deleting the existing language and replacing with the following: "If remaining soils impose only slight limitations to the construction of leach field sites and buildings with basements, and all setbacks are adhered to, then the twenty-five percent (25 %) limitation of this article may be increased to fifty percent (50%) for minimum sized lots in the RU or R-1 districts. BOCA National Fire Protection Code 1993" with "New Hampshire State Fire Code, as amended."?

Article 16: Zoning Amendment #15: On petition of Richard Bowen and others to see if the Town will vote to amend the Zoning Ordinance Article 3.2 Zoning Map by rezoning Tax Map Parcel #55-50, #55-51, #55-52 and #55-53 from MS (Manufactured Housing Subdivision) to C-2 (Highway Commercial) zoning district. See map as posted. (The Planning Board does not support this article).

Article 17: To choose all other necessary Town Officers, Auditors or Committees for the ensuing year.

Article 18: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,200,000 for the purpose of reconstructing the Great Bridge (Water St. Bridge), said funds to be added to the \$133,000 appropriated in 1998 via the passage of Article 16 of the 1998 Town Warrant, by the issuance of bonds and notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon, it being understood that State funds will reimburse the Town for 80 percent of the cost of this Project. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation. A three-fifths ballot vote is required.)

Article 19: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400,000 to carryout renovations to the Town Office Building, by issuance of bonds and notes in accordance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act (RSA Chapter 33) and to authorize the Selectmen to issue and negotiate such bonds and to determine the rate of interest thereon. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation. A three-fifths ballot vote is required.)

Article 20: Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes therein, totaling \$12,282,497? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$11,996,300 which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town or by law or the governing body may hold one special meeting in accordance with RSA 40:13,

X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 21: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$153,000, for the purpose of making repairs to the Public Safety complex, including, but not limited to its roof, overhead doors, and electrical system. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

(The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 24: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$75,420, for the purpose of purchasing replacement computer software for the Town's Police and Fire dispatch center, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 25: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$69,600, for the purpose of purchasing a replacement forestry vehicle and associated equipment for the Town's Fire Department, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 26: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$60,000, for the purpose of making repairs and improvements to the Town Hall, including, but not limited to, the front steps, the electrical and the fire suppression systems, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 27: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$40,000, for the purpose of supplementing funds raised at the March 14th, 2000 Town meeting to replace the heating, ventilation and air conditioning system in the Public Safety complex, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 28: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$39,187, for the purpose of implementing the year 2001 projects as described in the Town's

Park Management Plan, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 29: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$38,500, for the purpose of making repairs to the sluice-way at the Great Dam and the Pickpocket Dam gate, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 30: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$25,000, for the purpose of making repairs to the entrance to the Library, and to authorize the transfer of December 31, 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 31: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$18,000, for the purpose of undertaking a Library space needs assessment. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 32: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$11,000 for support of Child & Family Services, Inc., an agency providing counseling and support services for families. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 33: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$12,000 for support of the Rockingham County Community Action Program, an agency providing a range of support services to residents including but not limited to health insurance counseling, emergency food & fuel assistance and job training. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 34: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$11,340 for support of the Seacoast Big Brother/Big Sister Program, an agency providing the opportunity for matching children with appropriate adult mentors to assist with the development of self-esteem for the children. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 35: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$10,000, to be added to the Bus Replacement Capital Reserve Fund previously established for this purpose, and to authorize the transfer of December 2000 fund balance in that amount for this purpose, such transfer will result in no increase in the Town's portion of the 2001 tax rate. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 36: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$10,000 to be added to the previously established Town Retirement Sick Leave Expendable Trust Fund, and to authorize the Board of Selectmen to expend such monies from said fund. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 37: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$7,500 for support of the Seacoast Hospice, an agency providing support services to those families suffering through a terminally ill diagnosis. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 38: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$6,251 for support of the Rockingham Nutrition & Meals on Wheels program, a non-profit agency dedicated to promoting the health, well-being and independence of older and disabled adults throughout Rockingham County. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation).

Article 39: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, the sum of \$5,000 for support of the Richie McFarland Center, an agency providing developmental instruction to children under the age of 3. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation.)

Article 40: On petition of Bill Campbell and others to see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate, through special warrant article, \$100,000 to be added to the Exeter Conservation Commission Fund for the purposes of acquiring and managing open space land and easements to protect the natural resources of the Town and provide sites for passive recreation as authorized by RSA 36-A. (The Board of Selectmen recommends this appropriation).

Article 41: On petition of Nell B. Slawson and others, to see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to call upon the United States government and governments of all nuclear weapons states to secure on an urgent basis a nuclear weapons aboliton treaty. The treaty must include an early timetable for the elimination of nuclear weapons in a manner that is mutual and verifiable among all nations, and to further urge our State Senators and Representatives to introduce a resolution to this effect and send it on to the New Hampshire Congressional delegation for immediate action.

Article 42: To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

#### Bond Anticipation Notes Payable

State statutes allow the Town to incur debt up to the amount of the bond authorization in anticipation of the issuance of long-term debt in order to pay current expenses of a capital project. Notes issued in accordance with these statutes are general obligations of the Town.

#### NOTE 5 - OTHER INFORMATION

#### A. Risk Management

The Town is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees; or natural disasters. During fiscal year 1999, the Town was a member of the New Hampshire Municipal Association Property-Liability Insurance Trust, Inc. and the Compensation Funds of New Hampshire - Workers' Compensation Division. These entities are considered public entity risk pools, currently operating as common risk management and insurance programs for member towns and cities.

The New Hampshire Municipal Association Property-Liability Insurance Trust, Inc. is a Trust organized to provide certain property and liability insurance coverages to member towns, cities and other qualified political subdivisions of New Hampshire. As a member of the NHMA Property-Liability Insurance Trust, Inc., the Town shares in contributing to the cost of, and receiving benefits from, a self-insured pooled risk management program. The membership and coverage run from July 1 to June 30. The program includes a Self-Insured Retențion Fund (SIR) from which is paid up to \$500,000 for each and every covered property, auto physical damage or crime loss subject to a \$1,000 deductible, and each and every covered general liability and public officials liability loss.

The Trust maintains on behalf of its members the following reinsurance policies shared by the membership for the year ending June 30, 2000.

- 1. Signet Star Reinsurance Policy #9-02-AMD-07-0001-0 which provides excess package coverage in the amount of \$1,500,000 in excess of the Trust's SIR for each and every loss.
- Swiss Reinsurance Policy #2300895 which provides Excess Property/Excess Flood coverage in excess of the Trust's SIR.
- 3. Hartford Steam Boiler Policy #FBP-CH-2213346 which provides a \$50,000,000 limit resulting from any "one accident" subject to a \$1,000 deductible.
- 4. Royal Insurance Company Policy #RHD309238 which provides a \$51,000,000 limit resulting from Flood and Earthquake and \$7,000,000 resulting from any "one accident" for Flood in Zone A subject to a \$1,000 deductible.

As required by paragraph 69 of GASB 10, entities participating in a public entity risk pool are required to report certain information in their audited financial statements. In that regard, the Trust has provided the following information:

- Contributions paid in 1999 for FY2000 ending June 30, 2000, to be recorded as an insurance expenditure totaled \$154,781.
- 2. There were no unpaid contributions for the year ending June 30, 2000 and due in 1999.
- During November 1999, \$12,543 was returned to the Town in the form of a check as its 1999 "dividend" for the years 1992, 1994, and 1995.
- 4. The Trust Agreement permits the Trust to make additional assessments to members should there be a deficiency in Trust assets to meet its liabilities. At this time, the Trust foresees no likelihood of an additional assessment for any of the past years.

Compensation Funds of New Hampshire - Workers' Compensation Division is a Trust organized to provide statutory workers' compensation and employer's liability self-insurance coverage to member towns, cities, school districts, and other qualified political subdivisions of New Hampshire. As a member of Compensation Funds of New Hampshire - Workers' Compensation Division, the Town of Exeter shares in contributing to the cost of and receiving benefits from a self-insured pooled risk management program. The membership and coverage run from January 1 to December 31. The coverage is for the statutorily required workers' compensation benefits and employer's liability coverage up to \$1,350,000. The program includes a Loss Fund from which is paid up to \$350,000 for each and every covered claim. The Trust Agreement permits the Trust to make additional assessments to members should there be a deficiency in Trust assets to meet its liabilities. At this time, the Trust foresees no likelihood of any additional assessments for any of the past years.

The Town continues to carry commercial insurance for all other risks of loss, including employee and public official fidelity bonds, health and accident insurance.

#### B. Defined Benefit Pension Plan

Plan Description and Provisions

The Town of Exeter participates in the New Hampshire Retirement System (The System) which is the administrator of a cost-sharing multiple-employer contributory pension plan and trust established in 1967 by RSA 100-A:2 and is qualified as a tax-exempt organization under Sections 401(a) and 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. The plan is a contributory, defined benefit plan providing service, disability, death and vested retirement benefits to members and their beneficiaries. Provisions for benefits and contributions are established and can be amended by the New Hampshire State Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that may be obtained by writing the New Hampshire Retirement System, 4 Chenell Drive, Concord, NH 03301.

#### Description of Funding Policy

The System is financed by contributions from both the employees and the Town. Member contribution rates are established and may be amended by the State legislature while employer contribution rates are set by the System trustees based on an actuarial valuation. Police officers and firefighters are required to contribute 9.3% of gross earnings. For the period January 1 through June 30, 1999, the Town contributed 3.69% for police officers and 5.70% for firefighters. From July 1 through December 31, 1999, the rates were 4.93% for police officers and 5.70% for firefighters. The contribution requirements for the Town of Exeter for the years 1997, 1998, and 1999 were \$89,019, \$101,257 and \$111,419, respectively, which were paid in full in each year.

The State of New Hampshire funds 35% of employer costs for firefighters and police officers employed by the Town. GASB Statement No.24, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Grants and Other Financial Assistance requires this amount to be reported as a revenue and expenditure in the Town's financial statements. This amount \$55,738 has been included on Exhibit B - Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances - All Governmental Fund Types and Expendable Trust Funds and is reconciled to the budgetary expenditures in Note 1D.

#### Deferred Compensation Plan

The Town offers its employees a deferred compensation plan created in accordance with Internal Revenue Code Section 457. The plan, available to all employees, permits the employees to defer a portion of their salary until future years. The deferred compensation is not available to employees until termination, retirement, death, or unforeseeable emergency. The plan is administered by an independent company and the Town remits all compensation deferred to this administrator for investment as requested by the participant employees.

#### Cafeteria Benefit Plan

Effective 1997, the Town implemented a cafeteria benefit plan pursuant to section 125 of the IRS code.

#### NOTE 6- SUMMARY DISCLOSURE OF SIGNIFICANT CONTINGENCIES

#### A. Litigation

There are various claims and suits pending against the Town which arise in the normal course of the Town's activities. In the opinion of management, the ultimate disposition of these various claims and suits will not have a material effect on the financial position of the Town.

#### B. Grants

Amounts received or receivable from grantor agencies are subject to audit and adjustment by such grantor agencies, principally the Federal government. Any disallowed claims, including amounts already collected, may constitute a liability of the applicable funds. The amount of expenditures which may be disallowed by the grantor cannot be determined at this time although the Town expects such amounts, if any, to be immaterial.

To the inhabitants of the School District of the Town of Exeter, County of Rockingham, State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote upon District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet as follows:

**FIRST SESSION**: At the Exeter Town Hall in said Exeter on Tuesday, **February 6, 2001**, at 7:00 p.m. for explanation, discussion, debate, and possible amendment of the following warrant articles:

- 1. Shall the District raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the warrant, for the purposes set forth therein, totaling \$9,264,323? Should this article be defeated, the operating budget shall be \$9,169,363, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the District or by law; or the governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13, X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised operating budget only. (The School Board recommends \$9,264,323 as set forth on said budget.)
- 2. Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$250,000 to be added to the special reserve fund under the provisions of RSA 35:1-c established by the 1997 District Meeting for the purpose of creating a fund to be used to offset the Exeter taxpayers' share of the Exeter Region Cooperative School District's bond payments (principal and interest) for the new middle level cooperative school building for the fiscal years from July 1, 2007 through June 30, 2017? (The Exeter School District is receiving buy-out payments from the Coop for ten years. However, the Exeter taxpayers' share of the bond payments on the new middle school will continue for an additional ten years after the buy-out payments cease. The purpose of this Article is to reserve a portion of the proceeds from next year's buy-out payment to offset the Exeter taxpayers' share of the bond payment in years 11 through 20. A capital reserve fund for this purpose and the first appropriation were approved by the voters at the 1997 annual meeting.) (The School Board recommends this appropriation.)
- 3. Shall the District raise and appropriate the sum of \$240,000 to be added to the capital reserve fund under RSA 35:1 established at the 1988 District meeting, as amended by the 1996 District meeting, for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, or acquisition of school buildings and/or school ground site improvements, including associated engineering and architectural fees? (The purpose of this Article is to reserve a portion of the buy-out proceeds from the Coop to ease the future financial impact on the Exeter taxpayers for the cost of renovations to the Exeter School District elementary schools.) (The School Board recommends this appropriation.)

- 4. On petition of Alan C. Bailey and others: "Shall the voters of the Exeter School District vote to return to the taxpayers the Two Million Dollars (\$2,000,000.00) that was added to the Capital Reserve Fund at the 2000 District Meeting as Article #6. Inasmuch as there is no specific demand upon the Exeter School District to perform construction, re-construction, or acquisition of school buildings, said monies shall be returned to the taxpayers, for the purpose of reducing property taxes for the budget year 2001". (The School Board does NOT recommend adoption of this article.)
- 5. To hear reports of agents, auditors, and committees or officers heretofore chosen.
- 6. To transact any other business which may legally come before the meeting.

SECOND SESSION: At the Exeter Town Hall in said Exeter on Tuesday, March 13, 2001, to choose the following School District Officers: two (2) school board members for three (3) year terms; School District Moderator for three (3) year term; School District Clerk for three (3) year term; School District Treasurer for three (3) year term and vote on the articles listed as 1, 2, 3, and 4, above, as those articles may be amended at the First Session; by ballot, the polls to open at eight of the clock in the forenoon, and to close no earlier than eight of the clock in the evening.

#### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Members of the School Board Exeter School District Exeter, New Hampshire

We have audited the accompanying general purpose financial statements of the Exeter School District as of and for the year ended June 30, 2000 as listed in the table of contents. These general purpose financial statements are the responsibility of the School District's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these general purpose financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

The general purpose financial statements referred to above do not include the general fixed assets account group which should be included in order to conform with generally accepted accounting principles. As is the case with most municipal entities in the State of New Hampshire, the Exeter School District has not maintained historical cost records of its fixed assets. The amount that should be recorded in the general fixed assets account group is not known.

In our opinion, except for the effect on the financial statements of the omission described in the preceding paragraph, the general purpose financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Exeter School District as of June 30, 2000, and the results of its operations for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

Our audit was made for the purpose of forming an opinion on the general purpose financial statements of the Exeter School District taken as a whole. The combining and individual fund financial statements listed as schedules in the table of contents are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the general purpose financial statements of the Exeter School District. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the general purpose financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly presented in all material respects in relation to the general purpose financial statements taken as a whole.

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### INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF REPORTABLE CONDITIONS AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the School Board Exeter School District Exeter, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the Exeter School District for the year ended June 30, 2000, we considered the School District's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the general purpose financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the School District's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the general purpose financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

We are pleased to report that, during the course of our review of internal controls, no material weaknesses in the School District's accounting systems and records were identified. Minor weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to applicable individuals during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.

The financial statements of the Exeter School District have been prepared in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles (GAAP) as applied to the governmental units. The Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) is the accepted standard-setting body for establishing governmental accounting and financial reporting principles. The more significant of the government's accounting policies are described below.

#### NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

In New Hampshire, each town constitutes a school district except districts organized under special acts of Legislature. The Exeter School District serves the community of Exeter, New Hampshire and provides public education services for students in grades one through five.

#### A. Reporting Entity

The School District is a municipal corporation governed by an elected board. As required by generally accepted accounting principles, these financial statements present the Exeter School District (primary government). Component units are organizations for which the primary government is financially accountable or for which the nature and significance of their relationship with the primary government are such that exclusion would cause the reporting entity's financial statements to be misleading or incomplete. Based on the foregoing criteria, no other organizations are included in the School District's financial reporting entity.

#### B. Basis of Presentation - Fund Accounting

The accounts of the School District are organized on the basis of funds or account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, fund equity, revenues and expenditures, as appropriate. The various funds are grouped by type in the financial statements. The following fund types and account groups are used by the School District:

#### Governmental Fund Types

General Fund - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the School District. All general tax revenues and other receipts that are not allocated by law or contractual agreement to another fund are accounted for in this fund. From the fund are paid the general operating expenditures, the fixed charges, and the capital improvement costs that are not paid through other funds.

Special Revenue Funds - Special Revenue Funds are used to account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources (other than expendable trust or major capital projects) requiring separate accounting because of legal or regulatory provisions or administrative action.

Capital Projects Funds - Transactions related to resources obtained and used for the acquisition, construction, or improvement of capital facilities are accounted for in Capital Projects Funds.

#### Fiduciary Fund Type

Trust and Agency Funds - These funds account for assets held or established by the School District under a formal trust agreement or School District meeting vote, or assets held by the School District as an agent for student groups.

#### Account Groups

Account groups are not "funds." They are concerned only with the measurement of financial position. They are not involved with the measurement of results of operations. The School District uses the following account groups:

General Fixed Assets Account Group - General fixed assets have been acquired for general governmental purposes and have been recorded as expenditures in the applicable fund. These acquisitions are required to be capitalized at historical cost in a General Fixed Assets Account Group for accountability purposes. In accordance with the practices followed by most other municipal entities in the state, the School District does not maintain such a record of its general fixed assets and, accordingly, a statement of general fixed assets, required by generally accepted accounting principles, is not included in this financial report.

General Long-Term Debt Account Group - This account group is established to account for all long-term debt of the School District.

#### C. Measurement Focus/Basis of Accounting

Governmental, Expendable Trust and Agency Funds use the modified accrual basis of accounting. Under this method, revenues are recognized in the accounting period in which they become both available and measurable (flow of current financial resources measurement focus). Most miscellaneous revenues are recorded when received in cash. General taxes, intergovernmental revenues, charges for services, and investment earnings are recorded when earned (when they are measurable and available). Expenditures are recognized in the accounting period in which the fund liability is incurred, if measurable, except expenditures for prepayments, debt service and other long-term obligations, which are recognized when due.

#### D. Budgetary Accounting

#### General Budget Policies

General governmental revenues and expenditures accounted for in budgetary funds are controlled by a formal integrated budgetary accounting system in accordance with various legal requirements which govern the School District's operations. At its annual meeting, the School District adopts a budget for the next fiscal year for the General and Special Revenue Funds. Project-length financial plans are adopted for all Capital Projects Funds. Except as reconciled on the following page, budgets are adopted on a basis consistent with generally accepted accounting principles.

Management may transfer appropriations between operating categories as deemed necessary, but expenditures may not legally exceed budgeted appropriations in total except as described in the following paragraph. Unexpended balances of special articles for specific purposes may not be transferred and all annual appropriations lapse at year-end unless encumbered.

In the case of emergency expenditures, overexpenditures are allowed under the provisions of the Municipal Budget Law (RSA Chapter 32) if prior approval is obtained from the New Hampshire Department of Education.

State statutes require balanced budgets, but provide for the use of beginning unreserved fund balance to achieve that end. In the fiscal year 1999-2000, \$329,590 of the beginning General Fund fund balance was applied for this purpose.

#### Encumbrances

Encumbrance accounting, under which purchase orders, contracts, and continuing appropriations (certain projects and specific items not fully expended at year-end) are recognized, is employed in the governmental funds. Encumbrances are not the equivalent of expenditures and are therefore reported as part of the fund balance at June 30 and are carried forward to supplement appropriations of the subsequent year.

Amounts recorded as expenditures in the Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances - Budget and Actual - General and Special Revenue Funds (Exhibit C) are presented on the basis budgeted by the District. The amounts differ from those reported in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances - All Governmental Fund Types and Expendable Trust Funds (Exhibit B) as follows:

#### E. Assets, Liabilities and Fund Equity

Cash, Cash Equivalents and Investments

For financial reporting purposes, cash and equivalents include amounts in demand deposits and money market funds, as well as certificates of deposit and short-term investments with original maturities of 90 days or less.

The School District treasurer is required by state statute to have custody of all moneys belonging to the School District and shall pay out the same only upon orders of the school board. The treasurer shall deposit the moneys in participation units in the public deposit investment pool established pursuant to RSA 383:22, or in solvent banks in the state, except that funds may be deposited in banks outside the state if such banks pledge and deliver specified collateral security in value at least equal to the amount of the deposit in each case to a third party custodial bank or the regional federal reserve bank. Whenever the treasurer has in custody an excess of funds which are not immediately needed for the purpose of expenditure, the treasurer shall, with the approval of the school board, invest the same in obligations of the United States government, in the public deposit investment pool established pursuant to RSA 383:22, in savings bank deposits, certificates of deposit, and repurchase agreements of banks incorporated under the laws of the State of New Hampshire or in banks recognized by the state treasurer. Any person who directly or indirectly receives any such funds for deposit or for investment in securities of any kind shall, prior to acceptance of such funds, make available at the time of such deposit or investment an option to have such funds secured by collateral having a value at least equal to the amount of such funds. Such collateral shall be segregated for the exclusive benefit of the School District. Only securities defined by the bank commissioner as provided by rules adopted pursuant to RSA 386:57 shall be eligible to be pledged as collateral.

The School District participates in the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool established in accordance with NH RSA 383:22-24. Based on GASB Statement No. 3, investments with the Pool are considered to be unclassified. At this time, the Pool's investments are limited to short-term United States treasury and United States government agency obligations, State of New Hampshire municipal obligations, certificates of deposit from A1/P1-rated banks, money market mutual funds (maximum of 20% of portfolio), overnight to 30-day repurchase agreements and reverse overnight repurchase agreements with primary dealers or dealer banks. Under the terms of GASB Statement #31, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Investments and for External Investment Pools, the Pool is considered to be a 2a7-like pool which means that is has a policy that it will, and does operate in a manner consistent with the SEC's Rule 2a7 of the Investment Company Act of 1940. This rule allows SEC-registered mutual funds to use amortized cost rather than market value to report net assets to compute share prices if certain conditions are met. Therefore, the School District reports its investment in the Pool at amortized cost which would equal the Pool's share price.

#### Interfund Receivables and Payables

During the course of normal operations, the School District has transactions between funds, including expenditures and transfers of resources to provide services. The accompanying governmental and fiduciary fund financial statements reflect such transactions as transfers. To the extent that certain transactions have not been paid or received as of June 30, balances of interfund amounts receivable or payable have been recorded.

#### Prepaid Items

Certain payments to vendors reflect costs applicable to future accounting periods and are recorded as prepaid items.

#### Long-Term Liabilities

General Obligation Debt - General obligation bonds, notes, capital leases, and other forms of long-term debt supported by general revenues are obligations of the School District as a whole. Accordingly, such unmatured obligations of the School District are accounted for in the General Long-Term Debt Account Group.

Compensated Absences - Employees may accumulate a limited amount of earned, but unused, vested benefits, which will be paid upon separation from the School District's service. In governmental fund types, the cost of vested benefits paid or expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources is reported as an expenditure and fund liability of the fund. Amounts of vested or accumulated leave benefits that are not expected to be liquidated with expendable available financial resources are reported in the general long-term debt account group. No expenditure is reported for these amounts.

#### Fund Equity

The portion of fund balance which has been legally segregated for a specific future use, or which indicates that a portion is not appropriable for expenditures, is shown as reserved. The following reserves are used by the School District:

Reserved for Encumbrances - is used to account for open purchase orders, contracts and other commitments at year-end for which goods and services have not been received.

Reserved for Special Purposes - is used to account for the unencumbered balance of restricted funds. This consists of the School District's Expendable Trust Funds.

#### F. Total Columns (Memorandum Only) on Combined Statements

Amounts in the "Total (Memorandum Only)" columns in the combined financial statement line items of the fund types and account group are presented for analytical purposes only. The summation includes interfund transactions that have not been eliminated and the caption "amount to be provided," which is not an asset in the usual sense. Consequently, amounts shown in the "Total (Memorandum Only)" columns are not comparable to a consolidation and do not represent the total resources available or total revenues and expenditures of the School District.

#### NOTE 2 - ASSETS

#### A. Cash and Equivalents

All bank balances as of June 30, 2000, were insured or collateralized with securities held by the School District or its agent in the School District's name.

#### B. Investments

All of the School District's investments, totaling \$134,633 at June 30, 2000 are in the custody of the New Hampshire Public Deposit Investment Pool and are not categorized as to risk assumed.

#### NOTE 4 - OTHER INFORMATION

#### A. Risk Management

The School District is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts; theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors or omissions; injuries to employees; or natural disasters. During the fiscal year, the School District was a member of the following public entity risk pools, currently operating as common risk management and insurance programs for member entities.

The New Hampshire School Boards Insurance Trust is a trust organized to provide certain property and liability insurance coverages to member school districts and school administrative units. The pool is self-sustaining through member premiums and includes varying amounts of coverage for property, auto, general liability, crime, umbrella, and boiler and machinery. Reinsurance through commercial companies is carried for claims in excess of self-insured amounts. The trust agreement permits the Trust to make additional assessments to members should there be a deficiency in trust assets to meet its liabilities. At this time, the Trust foresees no likelihood that such action would be needed.

Compensation Funds of New Hampshire - Workers' Compensation Division is a Trust organized to provide statutory workers' compensation and employer's liability self insurance to member towns, cities, school districts and other qualified political subdivisions of New Hampshire. As a member of Compensation Funds of New Hampshire - Workers' Compensation Division, the School District shares in contributing to the cost of and receiving benefits from a self-insured pooled risk

management program. The membership and coverage run from January 1 through December 31. The coverage is for the statutorily required workers' compensation benefits and employer's liability coverage up to \$1,350,000. The program includes a Loss Fund from which is paid up to \$375,000 for each and every covered claim. The Trust Agreement permits the Trust to make additional assessments to members should there be a deficiency in Trust assets to meet its liabilities. At this time, the Trust foresees no likelihood of an additional assessment for any of the past years.

The School District continues to carry commercial insurance for all other risks of loss, including employee and public official fidelity bonds, health and accident insurance.

#### B. Defined Benefit Pension Plan

#### Plan Description and Provisions

The Exeter School District participates in the New Hampshire Retirement System (the System) which is the administrator of a cost-sharing multiple-employer contributory pension plan and trust established in 1967 by RSA 100-A:2 and is qualified as a tax-exempt organization under Sections 401(a) and 501(a) of the Internal Revenue Code. The plan is a contributory, defined benefit plan providing service, disability, death and vested retirement benefits to members and their beneficiaries. Provisions for benefits and contributions are established and can be amended by the New Hampshire State Legislature. The System issues a publicly available financial report that may be obtained by writing the New Hampshire Retirement System, 4 Chenell Drive, Concord, NH 03301.

#### Description of Funding Policy

The System is financed by contributions from both the employees and the School District. Member contribution rates are established and may be amended by the State legislature while employer contribution rates are set by the System trustees based on an actuarial valuation. All employees are required to contribute 5% of earnable compensation. For the year ended June 30, 2000, the School District contributed 2.97% for teachers and 4.24% for other employees. The contribution requirements for the Exeter School District for the fiscal years 1998, 1999, and 2000 were \$198,801, \$132,821 and \$139,188, respectively, which were paid in full in each year.

The State of New Hampshire funds 35% of employer costs for teachers employed by the School District. The State does not participate in funding the employer costs of other School District employees. GASB Statement #24, Accounting and Financial Reporting for Certain Grants and Other Financial Assistance requires this amount to be reported as a revenue and expenditure in the School District's financial statements. This amount \$58,119 has been included on Exhibit B - Combined Statement of Revenues, Expenditures and Changes in Fund Balances - All Governmental Fund Types and Expendable Trust Funds and is reconciled to the budgetary expenditures in Note 1D.

#### C. Newly Formed Exeter Region Cooperative School District

During the year ended June 30, 1998, The Exeter Region Cooperative School District was formed to provide the educational services for grades 6 through 12. The Exeter School District entered into a contract with the Exeter Region Cooperative School District under which a portion of all ten of the annual payments to be made under Article 4 of the Cooperative's Articles of Agreement would not be paid by the Cooperative to the Exeter School District in cash but, instead, would be applied by the Cooperative to reduce the amount to be raised by the Cooperative from the Exeter taxpayers. The portion to be so applied each year will be the sum of the Exeter taxpayers' share of bond payments (principal and interest) for the new middle level cooperative school building plus the Exeter taxpayers' share of the annual payments under Article 4 of the Cooperative's Articles of Agreement, net of Exeter's share of State Building Aid received by the Cooperative. At June 30, 2000, the total amount owed by the Exeter Region Cooperative School District to the Exeter School District was \$8,680,000. Of that sum, the Exeter School District will remit \$456,596 to the member towns over a ten year period as follows:

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#### PARKS ADVISORY COMMITTEE

The Parks Advisory Committee continued its work to fulfill the Board of Selectmen's charge to provide "...a five year timeline of specific activities leading to better maintenance of parks..." in Exeter. To this end, the Committee worked throughout the year to insure the implementation of the 5-year plan developed in 1999 and to oversee the completion of a variety of projects.

The year 2000 can be characterized as the Committee's year of design. Much effort was spent, with the help of landscape architect Liz Niebling, in looking over the details of what can and needs to be done at Gale Park, Stewart Park, the Town Hall and the Parks and Recreation Building. All of this in preparation for work to be undertaken next year and the year after.

In addition to making plans, the Committee pursued a number of park improvements over the year. These improvements included new benches at Stewart Park, an irrigation system installed at Gale Park, new granite seating and curbing at Water Street Park and relocation of the WWII memorial cannon from its hidden spot in front of the Parks and Recreation Building to the Winter St. Common. The Committee also provided funding to the Gilman Park Trustees toward the creation of a master plan for the Park's development.

In addition to these efforts, the Committee was pleased to highlight its Volunteers Brighten Lives program with plaques presented to the participants at the Selectmen's meeting of August 14<sup>th</sup>. This program, which encourages individuals and organizations to maintain a Town common, has been quite successful and continues to grow.

The Committee wishes to thank everyone for their support of this year's warrant article which has allowed for park improvements to occur and asks for Town support for the 2001 warrant article which will allow for the implementation of plans for improvement to Gale Park, the Winter St. Common Stewart Park, the Town Hall, and Founder's Park

Because of the higher Internet usage we have up-graded the hardware and software for the patron Internet access computers. We also now have AT&T Roadrunner Internet accesses that really speeds up searches without tying up a telephone line. When several patrons and staff are looking for information all at the same time Roadrunner really makes a difference and the connection is given to the library without charge. We also have access to various information resources through the new Granite State Information Connection. The Link is to ProQuest and gives access to general interest, business, newspaper, arts information, educational resources, health, and legal information, many in full text. We also added a computer with word processing and genealogy to the Special Collection Room for those patrons working on their family genealogy.

In Young Adult services several new items were added to the YA Summer Reading Program: a pizza and bowling party at Exeter Bowling Lanes, an origami program, T-shirt printing, and website design.

In the Children's Room Summer Reading 2000 "Reading Cats and Dog" was great fun with more children completing the program than in the past years. Once again we brought the Summer Reading Program to the children who attend the Exeter Recreation Department's Summer PlayCamp. The Little Red Wagon from the University of New Hampshire presented their newest fairy tale program for our summer party. Because of our theme we had a particularly heavy turn out for our seventh annual Stuffed Pet Show.

In addition to the usual children's programs this year, for the first time the library participated in the Chamber's Festival of Trees. The children made various edible ornaments for wild birds to decorate a tree nicknamed "A Gift for the Birds". The project was such fun and so successful that we plan on doing it again next year.

In the year 2000 we made several additions to the library collections; books on compact disks to the adult collection and music compact disks to the young adult and children's collections. We also added several computer learning CDs to the children's collection.

To the periodical collections we added several of the most often requested magazines including George, Book, Biography, AMC Outdoor, ESPN Sports, Dog Fancy, American Girl, and The John Hopkins Medical Newsletter. Many of these new magazines are subscriptions donated to the library by library patrons.

It will probably come as no surprise that the title most requested in 2000, by children, teens, and adults was Harry Potter and the Goblet of Fire. Many people who had not read the first book or two decided to read them to find out why Harry Potter was on so many lists.

All of this and so much more happens in your public library because of the Friends of the Exeter Public Library and a dedicated staff. Thank you all: Pam D., Judy, Denise, Jean, Gail, Sandra, Kathy, John, Connie, Pam G., Ken, Ellen, Michelle, Jeanne, Meaghan, Jen, and Dewey.

#### **Exeter Conservation Commission**

Perhaps the most significant accomplishment of the Conservation Commission in the year 2000, and the one with the most far-reaching effects for the Exeter community, was the completion of the Dearborn Brook/Waterworks Pond Watershed study. This study, performed under the auspices of the Rockingham County Conservation District by West Environmental, studied the watershed that provides about half our drinking water. It covers a large area, almost 2/3 of which is in Stratham and North Hampton. The report made several recommendations. One was to form a Watershed Committee involving Exeter with these towns. Another strongly suggested that the Town protect the remaining land in Exeter in the watershed area so that we can safeguard this source of our drinking water. This study will also be extended by the Exeter Planning Department under a warrant article passed last year by the Town.

The Town was also quite fortunate this year to acquire two important tracts of land. The first was a donation of land by the FGS Corporation, consisting of Florence Ruffner, Gerry Hamel and Soja Bennett. While many developers have wanted to give away only the wetlands, which we often do value, this group gave us 12 acres consisting primarily of uplands with some very beautiful trees. It also abuts the Dolloff easement and 212 acres we were given by the REDC. The Commission is now in the process of developing a network of trails and access points so that this area can be used for passive recreation.

The Town also became the owners of 88 acres off Old Town Road and Cubie Road in the northwest corner of the Town. This purchase of land was in partnership with the Great Bay Resource Protection Partnership, a large consortium of conservation groups including The Nature Conservancy and NH Fish and Game. This partnership received a grant from the North American Wetland Conservation Council, a federally funded program to protect migratory bird habitat to buy land and easements in the Exeter-Newfields-Epping-Brentwood area. Although the Exeter Conservation Fund contributed \$25,000 to the purchase price of \$130,000, the remaining money coming from the federal grant, the Town will hold the deed on the land. The Commission hopes to acquire more land through this partnership this coming year.

There were two major developments given conditional approval by the Planning Board this year, Christina Estates and Blackford Place. In both cases the Conservation Commission worked with the Planning Board and the developers to set conditions which would protect the wetlands on these properties and provide some open space. From Christina Estates the Town will eventually receive about 17 acres of open space and money to develop trails on the land. A homeowners association will manage Blackford Place's open space privately. However, the developer did give the Commission two right-of-ways that will connect the Jolly Rand Trail with present conservation lands.

Other noteworthy accomplishments include the establishment of a tree give-a-way program last spring. About 20 trees were provided for residents of Exeter to use to beautify their properties and thus the Town as a whole. We hope to be able to provide the same service once again this coming spring. We continued to monitor the waters in the Exeter River through the work of two of our Commission members working in conjunction with the DES. And finally, a map of the conservation and open space lands overseen by the Commission was hung in the meeting room of the Town Library so that the public might be more aware of what lands are protected.

As a final note, we have gone high tech recently. Our regular meetings, held on the second Tuesday of each month are now televised on Channel 22. We also have established a website in conjunction with the Town at <a href="https://www.exeternh.org">www.exeternh.org</a>. We have not got too much there yet, but we are working on it.

The Commission meets the second Tuesday of every month in the Nowak Room of the Town Office building. We invite anyone who is interested in our work to come and take part in our discussions.

#### GILMAN PARK

On July 12, 1892 Daniel Gilman deeded to "George E. Street, George W. Clark, H.C. Follansby, Henry A. Shute and William P, Chadwick and their successors in the Trust hereinafter mentioned" a parcel of land containing eleven (more or less) acres of land situated at the confluence of Exeter River and Little River. These trustees "shall have the power to choose their successors in trust"... and shall hold in trust these premises "for the use and enjoyment of said Town of Exeter as a public park".

The Park is reached on foot by a narrow bridge spanning Little River at the end of Gilman Street (which runs between the Academy gym and the Academy tennis courts). Vehicular traffic can reach the park from Bell Avenue off Court Street.

The Trustees are in the third year of a three-year lease with the Town. In his report to the Trustees, Doug Dicey, Director of Parks and Recreation Department, states:

"In 2000, our youth baseball/ softball teams used the two fields six days a week throughout the spring months of May and June. We had a large number of students and adults using the basketball court. We also continue to have small groups of students at the playground throughout the spring, summer and fall months using the swings at the Park. The Park was also used for family picnics throughout the summer months. The boat ramp was used more this year than in the past four years as use of the river has seen an increase in the numbers during this time. The department installed new fence post along the parking lot to protect the fence and made improvements to the Park, both with funding from the Parks and Recreation budget. A special thank you to Unitil for helping dig the postholes for our crew: it saved many man-hours for the department. The Parks and Recreation Department purchased ball field mix last fall and placed it on the ball fields, with more to be placed this spring once the area is free of water. The Department graded the entrance road and parking lot with the new tractor purchased through the Park Study Committee and the warrant article approved by voters last spring. The Park Study Committee has \$2,000 in its budget that was approved in March town meeting to be used for a landscape plan for the Park."

The Town's Parks Committee provided \$2000 for use in Gilman Park. The Trustees are using these funds to continue base mapping of the parkland, including wetlands and shoreland setbacks, 100 year flood boundary, contour mapping and all existing features of the park. These will be incorporated on a copy of the plot plan the original of which is recorded at the Registry of Deeds.

Townspeople wishing to hold large events (reunions, family gatherings, etc.) in the Park should schedule them through the Recreation Department to avoid conflicts.

#### SWASEY PARKWAY

# A REPORT OF THE TREASURER OF THE EXETER POWDER HOUSE COMMITTEE YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2000

The Exeter Powder House Committee was formed in 1999 and continued with fund raising activities and restoration of the Exeter Powder House through 2000. As of December 31, 2000, the Board of Selectman formally discharged the committee of its duties since the work at the site was completed.

During its tenure, the Committee was successful in raising over \$32,000 in cash for the restoration. In addition to cash, the committee was fortunate to receive donations in the form of goods and services. As treasurer of the committee I want to personally thank not only the people who were able to make monetary contributions, but to also thank the individuals and businesses that donated materials and their valuable time to make this project a success.

My personal satisfaction from this project comes from looking across the Swasey Parkway at the Powder House and seeing "Old Glory" flying proudly in the breeze. The flag can fly proudly day or night since part of our project was to install lighting on the flag as well as old-fashioned type street lighting along the road to the Powder House. Entering this road, there is now a wrought iron type gate to prohibit vehicular traffic with granuite pillars opening a pedestrian walkway. Once at the site, the granuite benches invite you to st awhile and gaze at Exeter's Powder House or to read about its history from the newly installed kiosk. New granite steps lead up to the small building and granite pillars and chain fencing complete the area. There were numerous parts of the project that were less obvious but no less important to the completion of it: a new slate roof with copper flashing, trenching for underground wiring, removal of large roots that threatened the foundation of the structure, a new wooden flooring for the interior, and other parts of the project that were completed in order to ensure that the Powder House will continue to stand for another 200+ years.

The committee's final gesture was to present to the Board of Selectmen, a framed picture of the completed project, for display in the Town Office Building Members of the Committee, Robert Swasey, Charles MacDougall, Kevin Smart, Wendy Stanley Jones, Dick Brewster, and I want to again thank everyone for the generosity of time and money which allowed us to complete this project in so fine a manner.

# Rockingham Planning Commission

The Rockingham Planning Commission is one of nine regional planning commissions in New Hampshire established by RSA 36 to promote coordinated land use and transportation planning at the local and regional level. Operating as a public non-profit agency, the Commission serves in an advisory role and provides a wide array of planning assistance to its member communities and to the region as a whole.

Specific assistance provided to Exeter during the year included the following:

- Organized the annual Household Hazardous Waste collection for Exeter, Newfields and Stratham. Tasks
  included preparing the grant application for state funds, making arrangements with the licensed hazardous
  waste hauler, coordinating volunteers and supervising the site.
- Researched and produced a report assessing the effectiveness of various forms of pedestrian crosswalk
  design and determining when and where crosswalks are appropriate.
- Provided assistance to the Town Planner in drafting a zoning amendment regarding the phasing of construction for large residential subdivision.
- Provided assistance to the Master Plan Committee
- Attended meetings and advised the Exeter Station Committee regarding various aspects of the impending Amtrak service and train station construction.
- Prepared a comparative summary of policies in other communities regarding the recovery of Town costs for sewer, water and other engineering review for subdivisions and site plans.
- 7. Prepared an updated zoning and land use coverage for the Town's GIS map.
- Monitored the status of town applications proposed to be added to the State's Ten Year Transportation Improvement Program.
- Responded to periodic requests from Planning Department, and Town Officials for research on planning related questions, including: impact fees and Capital Improvements Programming; highway corridor access management and traffic calming techniques for residential streets.

In addition to assistance provided specifically to Exeter, the Town benefited from the Commission's regional planning activities, including education and training for land use board members, regional land use and transportation planning and land conservation and resource protection efforts, and the review of developments with regional impact. This year, regional activities relevant to Exeter included: (1) the development of a scenic & and cultural byways management plan for the American Independence Byway; (2) participation with the Rockingham Economic Development Corporation in the development of a Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy (CEDS) for the county; (3) completion of a regional open space plan, including

identification of high priority natural and cultural resources in the Town and region; (5) administrative and planning support for the Exeter River Local Advisory Committee; (6) advocacy for the continuation of COAST Route 7, serving Exeter. We thank the Town of Exeter for its continued support for regional planning.

# Exeter Housing Authority

The *Exeter Housing Authority* administrates two (2) programs that assist low income elderly, disabled, handicapped and low income families. The *EHA* owns eighty-five (85) elderly units and twenty-two (22) family units in the Public Housing Program and assists a mix of households who currently occupy one hundred sixty-nine (169) privately owned apartments in the area.

Admission to both programs is by date and time of receipt of completed application from eligible applicants. Preference is given to Exeter residents, followed by Rockingham County residents, and followed by persons residing outside of Rockingham County. Section 8 is Exeter area (six (6) mile radius of Exeter), Rockingham County and other (outside of Rockingham County).

#### Eligible Income Limits are as Follows for 2000/2001

Very, Very Low Income 1-8 Persons \$11,000 - 12,500 - 14,000 - 15,700 - 16,950 - 18,200 - 19,450 - 20,700

Low Income

\$29,300 - 33,450 - 37,650 - 41,850 - 45,200 - 48,550 - 51,900 - 55,250

A copy of the latest income limits is posted at the office at 277 Water Street. Seventy-five percent (75%) of Section 8 admissions and twenty-five percent (25%) of Public Housing admissions must come from the very, very low income table. Applications for both programs are available at the main office at 277 Water Street, Exeter, NH and assistance will be given on Tuesdays and Thursdays between 1:00 – 4:00 p. m. or appointment by calling 778-8110.

Many elderly people have not filed an application because they felt or were told from sources other than the *EHA* that they were not eligible when in fact they were. Do not let this happen to you. Call or come in on Tuesday or Thursday afternoons and let us make the decision. There are many factors that are used to determine eligibility. These may be complex and are determined from information you give us on the application.

The Exeter Housing Authority Board of Commissioners approved a new, comprehensive Annual and 5-Year Agency Plan which states the mission and goals of the Exeter Housing Authority. It outlines in detail all aspects of the operation from housing needs to asset management.

The following new policies were adopted in conjunction with the Agency Plan: Public Housing Admissions and Occupancy Policy, Section 8 Administrative Plan, Public Housing Grievance Policy and a new Public Housing Lease. The Plan is a public document and may be viewed at the main office of the Exeter Housing Authority during office hours 8:00 a. m. to 4:30 p. m. Monday through Friday.

Property owners who would like to participate in the Section 8 Housing Program should call the office at 778-8110.

#### SAU 16 REPORT OF ADMINISTRATION

In July 2000, with the retirement of Assistant Superintendent Barbara Lobdell, SAU 16 welcomed Donna Marsden as Assistant Superintendent of Curriculum, and also Dr. Stephen Kossakoski as Assistant Superintendent of Technology. The SAU 16 Joint Board approved the new position of Superintendent of Technology in order to manage the growth and collaborative efforts of technology in the school districts. Recognizing the continued growth and responsibilities of staff and students in SAU #16, the Joint Board promoted Paul Flynn to Associate Superintendent of Schools. In August 2000, Joan Ostrowski assumed the position of principal of Swasey Elementary School in Brentwood, and former Exeter Junior High School Principal Thomas Meehan was appointed as the new interim principal for Kensington Elementary School. The schools opened their doors to continued record enrollments: Swasey Elementary School in Brentwood – 255; East Kingston Elementary School – 178; Exeter Elementary (Main Street School and Lincoln Street School) – 1056; Kensington Elementary School – 169; Newfields Elementary School – 164; Stratham Memorial School – 648; Cooperative Middle School – 1299; and Exeter High School – 1534.

March 2000 saw East Kingston open with their addition of three new classrooms and one kindergarten classroom. In November 2000, Newfields Elementary School also completed their addition of three classrooms and one kindergarten classroom. Lincoln Street School continued with renovations during the summer of 2000 in an effort to address building deficiencies. The school boards of Brentwood and Kensington are proposing building additions for their schools for March 2001.

The communities in SAU 16 approved the \$35.5 million renovation project for Exeter High School and the Seacoast School of Technology in March 2000. However, due to a legal challenge, the project has been delayed awaiting a ruling from the New Hampshire Supreme Court. Exeter High School culminated their three year self-study in preparation for the October 2000 visitation by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges' (NEASC) Accreditation Committee. In a preliminary NEASC summary of findings, the students, staff and school programs received high marks. The physical facility continues to be a major concern of NEASC.

In September 2000, the SAU Joint Board approved combining the Cooperative Business Office with the SAU Business Office. This is enabling more efficient and effective utilization of all staff and resources. The administration and Board of SAU 16 continues to work collaboratively to coordinate curriculum, technology initiatives, staff evaluation and other district-wide efforts. The funding challenges for the 2001-2002 school year

are the increased costs in transportation, gas, electric and oil prices, and special education. The SAU boards and administrators are working judiciously to present reasonable school budgets.

In an effort to continue community dialogue, the SAU sponsored a forum of town officials, state representatives and school officials to discuss the current population growth and its impact on the towns and the schools. Also, Dr. Stephen Kossakoski and Sam Bruno, the Government and Education Television Channel Coordinator for the town of Exeter, discussed with the attendees their efforts to initiate educational channel access to all SAU 16 towns. This would enable all residents of the six towns to view numerous ERCSD school meetings, activities and events now only available to Exeter residents.

The enormous responsibility of insuring that each student in our district receives an equitable education while coming from varying financial and demographic backgrounds, combined with New Hampshire's unresolved funding crisis, has unfortunately placed unwarranted emphasis on our financial needs versus our educational needs. Added with the availability of a plethora of technologies, the school district needs to stay focused to be certain that our students and staff are kept abreast, while at the same time not diminishing the fundamental needs of all students. SAU 16 continues its full commitment to educate all students in this fast-paced, ever-changing, ever-challenging  $21^{\rm st}$  Century.
