WARRANT.

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the inhabitants of the Town of Freedom in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Freedom on Tuesday, the 12th day of March next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To elect a delegate to the Constitutional Convention.
4. To see if the Town will vote to raise money to pay for breaking roads the past winter.
5. To see if the Town will accept State Aid for the construction of roads.
6. To see what sum of money the town will raise for maintenance of State roads.
7. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for use of hydrants.
8. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for the extermination of Gypsy Moths.
9. To see what sum of money the Town will raise to build new snow roll.
10. To see if the Town will raise any money to destroy the White Pine Blister.
11. To see if the Town will raise a special appropriation to repair the road from Danforth Bridge to Branch Bridge.
12. To see what sum of money the Town will raise for Old Home Week.
13. To see if the Town will raise any money for cutting bushes.
14. To see if the Town will exempt the creamery from taxation.
