REPORT OF THE SELECTMEN

We hereby submit our annual report to the citizens of the Town of Lisbon:

The advent of the new year has found the fiscal affairs of the community to be sound. All of our obligations have been met and the town books indicate a prudently healthy surplus account.

The Town Tax Rate for 1982 levied a very modest one percent increase and the Board is confident that under the suggested appropriations and anticipated revenues that are to be acted upon at the Annual Town Meeting we can repeat another year of modest marginal increases well below the National inflation rate. This, we believe, should be welcome news to our citizens as one observes the unfortunate significant tax increases which burden many towns in the North Country Area and throughout New Hampshire.

The Town Highway Department accounts all were within or slightly lower than their budgetary limitations with the exception of the Winter Highway account which developed an overdraft of \$9,000.00. This was due to the excessively harsh winter weather conditions of early 1982. The Board is not asking for an increase in the general highway appropriation but is asking for permission to borrow \$27,000.00 to be repaid over a five year period, to be used for the purchase of a new truck. Presently our newest truck is a 1978 model.

In other departments and accounts the Board has found it necessary to request increases for labor, equipment and services. For example, we are told that our General Insurance account is estimated to increase 10% and our employees' Health Insurance account has already increased 24%. Inflationary increases in labor costs should also be met and purchase of equipment needed to operate the Town in an efficient manner needs to be addressed. In addition, as your electric light bill increases, our Street Lighting account increases.

Decreases in our request for appropriation will be found in the Town Hall and Other Buildings, Town Poor and Election accounts.

Much of the vitality that continues to set Lisbon apart from other communities springs from the many groups and organizations which always take into consideration the good of the Town when planning their objectives and activities. All of us are ever grateful to them.

The outstanding success of the First Annual Lilac Time Festival held in May gives enthusiastic testament to the force and might of our local organizations working together towards a common goal for the public good.

In summing up it should be noted that Lisbon like all other communities is to some measure at the mercy of the decisions made at the state and federal level. With proper planning and imagination we can guard against being held hostage to those levels.

TOWN OF LISBON TOWN MEETING WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lisbon, in the County of Grafton, and the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lisbon Town Hall in said Lisbon on Tuesday the eighth day of March next at ten o'clock in the forenoon; at which time polls shall open and not close earlier than nine o'clock in the afternoon to act upon the following subjects except 1 & 2 to be considered at seven-thirty o'clock in the afternoon.

ARTICLE 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.

ARTICLE 2. To hear reports of agents, auditors, and special committees heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

ARTICLE 3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes for the current year.

ARTICLE 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate twenty-three thousand four hundred ninety-six dollars and eighty-six cents (\$23, 496.86) for Town Road Maintenance and authorize the withdrawal of the amount required for this purpose from the Federal Revenue Sharing Fund. (\$21,966.00 Revenue Sharing and \$1,530.86 Interest.)

ARTICLE 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges and make appropriations for the same as set forth in the following budget:

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to sell and convey property acquired by Tax Collectors' Deeds in accordance with New Hampshire law.

- ARTICLE 7. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to apply for and receive Federal Disaster Assistance Funds through the State Disaster Coordinating Office and to expend the funds so received to repair the damage to Town Roads and/or bridges caused by any declared emergency and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow such sums as may be necessary to defray the cost of repairing damage in anticipation of Federal Disaster Funds to be received through the State Disaster Coordinating Office.
- ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,275.50 to provide for an annual contract with Ross Ambulance Service to make available 24 hour emergency service to the Town of Lisbon. Said money to be taken from surplus funds.
- ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed twenty-seven thousand dollars (\$27,000.00) for the purpose of buying a new truck for the highway department, and to authorize the Selectmen to borrow, upon the credit of the Town a sum of money not to exceed \$27,000.00 and to issue serial notes of the Town for the cost not to exceed said sum, to be negotiated by them through a bank; the dates, maturities, denomination, the interest rate, and other details of said notes, to be delegated to the discretion of the Selectmen as may be for the best interests of the Town, and as may be necessary, in accordance with the laws of the State; and to authorize the Selectmen to execute said notes and any other papers necessary for the purpose of this article.
- ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000.00) for the purpose of purchasing from the "Lisbon Fire Department" one (1) 1954 Seagrave 75' Aerial Ladder Truck, complete with a full complement of aluminum ground ladders and hand tools; and also considering the Fire Department's investment to date, including capital investment, transportation and interest on borrowed funds of approximately \$11,700.00. Said money to be taken from surplus funds.
- **ARTICLE 11.** To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of seven thousand seven hundred fifty dollars (\$7,750.00) of which \$7,400.00 is principle and \$350.00 interest. Said money represents final payment on note relating to the Sewer Project. Said money to be taken from surplus funds.
- **ARTICLE 12.** To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to sell or lease that portion of the dam owned by the Town, along with a parcel of land along the riverbank for purposes of constructing a hydroelectric generating station. Prices and terms to be determined by the Selectmen in the best interest of the Town.
- ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town of Lisbon will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of three hundred and eighty dollars (\$380.00) for support of the Community Action Outreach Program. (This article by request)

ARTICLE 14. Shall the citizens of Lisbon, New Hampshire ask members of the New Hampshire Congressional delegation to support or co-sponsor a resolution in the U. S. Congress to: Request the President of the United States to propose to the Soviet Union that the United States and the Soviet Union adopt a mutual freeze on the testing, production, and deployment of nuclear weapons and of missiles and new aircraft designed primarily to deliver nuclear weapons, with verification safeguards satisfactory to both countries. (This article by petition)

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Board of Selectmen to apply for, accept and expend money from the State, Federal or other governmental unit or a private source which becomes available during the year in accordance with the procedures set forth in R.S.A. 31:95-b.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will vote to go on record in support of immediate actions by the Federal Government to control and reduce acid rain which is harmful to the environment and economy of Lisbon and to the health and welfare of the people of Lisbon. These actions shall include:

1. Reduce by at least half the major cause of acid rain, sulfur dioxide emmissions, by the year 1990.

2. Conclude negotiations and adopt a treaty with the government of Canada that will commit both nations to this same goal.

The record of the vote on this article shall be transmitted to the New Hampshire Congressional delegation and to the President of the United States. (This article by petition)

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to enter into such agreements with Lisbon Development Association and North Country Council, Inc. and any other organizations and entities as may be warranted and to do any and all other things necessary to fulfill the Town's obligation under Grant No. B-82-DH-33-0021 - Lisbon Revolving Loan Fund Project received under Title I of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1974 through the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development.

ARTICLE 18. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

LISBON LIFE SQUAD

1982 Annual Report

There were over 100 calls for emergency medical assistance during 1982. This is a substantial increase over last years 64 calls.

Training was a major item this year. Three new members and two old members qualified as Emergency Medical Technicians (EMT) and two members qualified as American Red Cross Advanced First Aiders. Half the cost of this 110 hour course was paid for by the individual members with the balance being paid for from Squad funds. Several members qualified for advanced skills during the year. The volunteer spirit is alive and well in our community.

During the year we purchased an oxygen powered demand valve (to assist patients in breathing) and suction unit. This was a needed piece of equipment and should serve us well.

It should be noted that the money for training and equipment comes only from donations, and from the proceeds of our Annual Supper and Raffle. Your interest and support is sincerely appreciated.

For the first eleven months of the year Ross Ambulance Service responded to Lisbon 70 times. We enjoy being of service to you.

LISBON FIRE DEPARTMENT

Although your Fire Department was busy all year, it is a welcome statistic that the total number of calls we had to answer in 1982 was down from 81 to 61. Detail of these is given at the end of the report.

Many volunteered hours of training, maintenance of equipment, and construction of our meeting room occupied members of our department. Four new members were trained and accepted into the department making us 25 strong at this time. Training for the whole department consisted of six drills that we held ourselves, and all members attending at least one out of four State approved schools in New Hampshire or Vermont. Several of our members are also faithful attendees at all Life Squad meetings and activities.

Thanks to good support of our raffle and dances, we have been able to buy some needed equipment and do the work on our meeting room. Our next projects are the bathroom and kitchen facilities.

The long search for a ladder ended when we found one in Cornwall, New York, that would fit our needs and within our price range. It is a 1954 75-foot Seagrave. The asking price was \$15,000 and with some extra work and discussions, we were able to purchase it for \$10,000. With it we also received aluminum ground ladders of slightly less than \$4,000 value, an intercom system valued at \$700, and a water gun worth \$500. This piece of equipment should cover our needs as required by the State Board of Underwriters. We had 20 hours of training with the ladder, and have used it four times already at both commercial and residential properties.

In order to take advantage of the opportunity to obtain this piece of equipment, it was necessary for the Fire Department to borrow the money from the Bank. With interest and \$650 expense for getting the ladder here from Cornwall, the Fire Department has spent a total of \$1,700. We have an article in the Warrant asking for the Town to take over the loan; we sincerely solicit the support of the townspeople in this endeavor.

Our members supported the first Lisbon Lilac Time by having a booth on the street and by joining in the Parade. This year we will have a Fire Muster and Parade on Sunday of Lilac Time.

The frequent use of wood-burning units for heat continues to cause much concern, and we urge that extreme caution be used to insure proper installation and use. The importance of smoke detectors and fire extinguishers for all buildings cannot be overemphasized.

Kerosene heaters also present dangers and problems. As Fire Chief, I want to make it clear that I do not approve of the use of any unvented heater inside, and I urge anyone who is considering one to examine the instructions and manuals very carefully. Only certain models and fuels are approved for use, a permit must be obtained before purchase, and they are NOT allowed in other than single-family dwellings.

Greatful appreciation for their assistance and cooperation goes to our dispatchers, and to the Police and Highway departments; and thanks to the Selectmen and Townspeople for your continued support and confidence.

REPORT OF FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST FIRE SERVICE

Forest fire prevention, our business, your business, good business. This slogan has been the motto of the New Hampshire Division of Forests and Lands, Forest Fire Service since 1909 when the first forest fire laws were passed by the Legislature.

These laws set in place a cooperative forest fire protection program of State and local forest fire personnel that has, in the past 75 years, established New Hampshire as a leader in forest fire prevention and control. Our annual acreage loss to forest fires of one-half acre per fire is the best in the nation. This fire record has come about through the cooperative efforts of our state/town forest fire protection program. The state provides detection of fires, training for local forest fire wardens, low cost forest fire suppression equipment to local fire departments, and technical advice at the fire ground. Local governments provide the volunteer fire fighters who are appointed as wardens and deputy wardens and who respond quickly to suppress reported forest fires.

This program has resulted in a steady decline in annual acres lost to forest fires since 1910 when the average fire burned 33 acres compared to the modern day loss of one-half acre per fire.

Only by the continued cooperation of the state/towns and our entire citizenry can this record be maintained.

LISBON PLANNING BOARD AND BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT

In 1982 The Lisbon Planning Board approved two property line adjustments and attended five Board of Adjustment hearings. The town contracted with the State Water Resources Department and U.S. Soils Conservation to study the flood problem in Lisbon. They reported that there are three alternatives: 1. Do nothing and live with the flooding; 2. Take out the dam leaving the natural rock and filling some gaps between to result in a falls that is 4 feet lower, thus taking the Main Street out of the flood plain (the town does not own the dam and it would no longer be suitable for hydro-electric production); or 3. to seek a federal grant to dike the River from Family Drug through to the Wire Mill property.

The Board of Adjustment approved all cases before it except Pike's request to operate an asphalt plant on Mt. Eutis Road. The use did not meet the "no nuisance" requirement.

Three Planning Board members took a soils course so the town can effectively use its soils survey information. The free maps that we obtained from the course helped offset the cost.

The Planning Board meets the third Tuesday of each month unless otherwise noticed. The Board of Adjustment meets at the call of the chairman for public noticed hearings. All meetings and records open to the public. Both boards would like to see more people attend the public hearings, as that is often the only time facts are presented about issues to be voted on by ballot. Future development of the Town and our tax rate are at stake.

NORTH COUNTRY COUNCIL REPORT

In 1982 in the Town of Lisbon, North Country Council prepared an application to the US Department of Housing and Urban Development which resulted in a \$304,000 grant to establish a revolving loan fund to assist downtown industries, and will be assisting the Selectmen with the administration of the program during the next year.

In addition to providing specific assistance to your town, the Council works on activities that benefit several towns and the entire North Country. In **economic development**, the Council has provided direct local assistance to several communities in their local development programs and has continued to seek approval from the Economic Development Administration for a revolving loan fund to assist small and medium-sized businesses in eight communities. As a member of the Small Business Development Program for Northern New Hampshire, NCC has provided information to prospective businesses on the available training and financial programs. The Economic Development Committee has met on issues such as trends in the wood products industry, the future of the North Country railroad system and small business development and financing.

One of the major efforts for towns is **community planning**. The Council staff met throughout the year with numerous planning boards, selectmen, and master plan committees to discuss community issues and provide solutions such as zoning, subdivision regulations, site plan review, sign, parking, septic system and mobile home regulations, recreation planning, business and traffic surveys, and more. The Council organized a subdivision workshop in the spring for planning board members, coordinated the Municipal Law Lectures in the fall, and provided information to towns on HUD's Small Cities Community Development Block Grant and Urban Development Action Grant programs. In an effort to maintain essential planning assistance to our towns given somewhat smaller budget, our Community Planning Committee established a clear policy on membership services. This is described in a brochure we recently mailed to you entitled "North Country Council, Inc: What's In It For Your Town?"

In transportation, the Council's Transportation Committee assisted the NH Department of Public Works and Highways with the Annual Highway Action Plan Meeting. This meeting is usually very productive as it is the major way that the public can participate in identifying and supporting needed highway improvements. NCC is assisting the state, the new rail operator, and rail users in marketing the Concord-to-Lincoln rail line to make the line more economically viable and eventually self-sufficient. In the Mt. Washington Valley, NCC surveyed businesses to determine the potential for utilizing a truck/rail terminal. We are also following the proposed New England rail reorganization and its impact on our region. The Council continues to work with the Whitefield Regional Airport in an on-going effort to secure commuter air service.

The Council is providing planning recommendations and some technical assistance to towns in anticipation of the solid waste district planning scheduled to occur in late 1983 and 1984. We had a voice in amending the state's solid waste law to make it more flexible in local situations. Sharing of ideas and coordination in this field is aided by staff member Fred Moody's position as a director of the NH Resource Recovery Association.

To assist town governments with administrative and financial tasks (e.g., tax billing, accounting, etc.), NCC has acquired a mini-computer with programs to accomplish these functions. At this time, we developed our tax billing services and look forward to offering additional services in the future.

The Council has also conducted historic buildings inventory in a few towns and will be serving as a clearinghouse on historic preservation planning and activities.

The Council closely followed the proceedings for the Quebec Hydro powerline in 1982 and presented our position before the Site Evaluation Committee in March. We recommended construction of the line in Vermont which provided the most economical, direct, and least environmentally-damaging route. As of early 1983, it appears the powerline will follow the

Vermont route and will come into NH in Littleton. NCC also testified before the NH House and Senate in support of the Pontook hydroelectric facility in Dummer.

For the last year and a half, the Council has published NEWS FOR SELECTMEN, an informative report on local, regional, state and federal activities and trends. The Council is active on the state and national level through the NH Association of Regional Planning Commissions and the National Association of Regional Councils. We were very fortunate to have our former President and Jackson representative Oliver Nelson serve as the Chairman of the National Advisory Committee on Rural Development. This past summer, the Committee prepared a rural development strategy. The Council set up one of two in-state meetings to solicit views from the public on rural needs and practical solutions.

As in the past, the Council's major emphasis will continue to be technical assistance and information on matters of concern to local governments. The Council staff is always available to meet with local officials to discuss projects and needs of the towns.

On behalf of the Council and its Board of Directors, we thank you for your support during the past year and hope that the Town will continue to use the services of NCC during 1983. Please feel free to contact either one of us or the Council staff in Franconia at 823-8108 or 823-5566.

GRAFTON COUNTY COMMISSIONERS

In our continued effort to communicate more directly with the taxpaying citizens of Grafton County, we take this opportunity to reach you through your annual town/city report.

Budgeting becomes more complex each year due to variables and unfunded state mandates. Until authority accompanies funding, our local governments will have little control over spiralling taxes. Counties encounter funding problems similar to towns/cities. We are continually absorbing more costs of state/federal programs. This year local governments picked up a 25% increase in their share of the OAA/APTD/ICF grants. Child placement costs are increasing dramatically with the private foster homes rapidly being replaced by more expensive group homes, some costing \$25,000 to \$40,000 per year compared to private home rates of \$2,400 to \$3,600 per year.

Our new sewage system, tied in with Woodsville Precinct's treatment plant, was complete and operational in February 1982.

Many dollars are being saved in energy accounts through conservation measures. Fuel costs were reduced by 20% and electric costs by 8% in fiscal year ending June 30, 1982, saving \$41,800.

Finishing the second superior courtroom will cost approximately \$169,500. Bonding is approved and the project should be completed this spring.

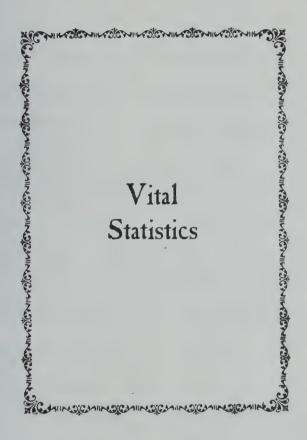
The Jail & House of Correction had another busy year. Average census was 38. We continue to get inmates with mental or emotional problems requiring additional staff and medical treatment and higher medication costs. No change is foreseen in the admission pattern due to the continuing discharge policy of NH State Hospital. Pending legislation requiring more severe sentencing for some crimes will increase duration of stay and census, proportionately increasing the burden on correctional staff.

The County Farm is a productive asset to the County through participation in Extension and Conservation Service programs and by creating meaningful work for House of Correction inmates. Volume of milk remains constant although the revenue dropped slightly due to decrease in federal parity. Quality of the Holstein herd is excellent. Revenue from livestock sales grossed \$25,092 last fiscal year, and produce grossed \$40,016 for the Farm.

The Commissioners meet Mondays at 9:30 a.m. at the Courthouse, 1:30 p.m. at the Nursing Home. Meetings are open to the public.
