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

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

Superintendent's Report.

To the School Board, Madison, N. H.

Your Superintendent has served about six months, and so this report covers only the fall and winter terms of school.

During this time there have been no radical changes in the schools, but your Superintendent believes that he now has a strong grasp of the school situation in Madison, and he proposes to gradually build them up to higher standards.

The chief work of a Superintendent must always be to visit the schools, and already your Superintendent has made 45 visits in Madison, which have been from one to three hours in length.

The state puts a bonus on good schools, and by taking advantage of every aid that she offers, it will be possible for Madison to have better schools without much additional cost. The better the attendance at school the more money we receive from the state, so that every time a child stays out of school the district loses just so much money. The longer the schools keep, the more money we receive from the state, and hereafter if the average length of our schools is less than thirty weeks, we receive no help whatever from the state.

For every teacher who is a normal school graduate, or who holds a state certificate, the district draws two dollars (\$2.00) per week. Now this last additional sum would enable us to pay more and thereby secure better teachers. Your Superintendent has arranged to conduct a state examination in Conway on March 25 and 26. This will enable the more ambitious teachers in this section of the state to take the examinations for which they would otherwise be required to go to Concord. As a result of this examination Madison should have at least three teachers with state certificates.

The average attendance in some of the schools has been rather poorer than it should be. We can never have the best of schools until our average attendance is high.

The Madison schools divide themselves into two classes, Madison Corner and Silver Lake, are of good size, and are doing much the better work; the other four are very small, and a good school with less than ten scholars is a rare exception. This is not the fault of the teachers or parents.

In view of these facts, it is recommended to the School Board as well as to the parents concerned, that the Nickerson school be discontinued and the scholars transported to Madiison Corner. As long as a part of the pupils in this school are already transported, this change would be a financial saving, and the parents would have the satisfaction of knowing that their children were attending one of the best schools in town.

Pamphlets on practical hygiene of the schoolrooms, and Snellen's test cards have been placed in the schools and the teachers instructed to use them. If parents receive a written statement from the teacher, saying that their children's eyes need attention, they can feel reasonably sure that the teacher's instructions are correct for she has probably based them on the tests she has made with Snellen's test letters for measuring the acuteness of vision, which is in universal use.

Two Conway-Madison teachers meetings have been held, one at Conway Center and the other at Conway. The Madison teachers attended and took part in both. Two other meetings will be held during the spring term, the first at Madison and the second at North Conway. The importance of these gatherings can not be over estimated, for they are inspirational to the best teachers, and little short of a revelation to the others.

Most of the school grounds are ample, but very barren, and it is recommended that the teachers, pupils and parents unite to improve them.

During the spring term your Superintendent desires to secure among other things, better attendance, better reading, and more attractive school grounds, because he believes that these things are fundamental.

Report of School Roard and Superintendent

TO THE CITIZENS OF THE DISTRICT OF MADISON:

The School Board respectfully submit the report of the Superintendent as submitted to them, and indorse the recommendations therein made. The Board believes that the schools have shown improvement and will continue to improve under supervision. The spring and fall terms at Silver Lake were very successful and although the winter term was not quite as satisfactory, yet it was taught by one recommended by a neighboring school board.

Attention is called to amendments enacted at the last session of the General Court relating to school money, while the amount required by law remains the same, the amount exceeding that required by law remains at the option of the district as in previous years, except that all money paid out for books and supplies and high school tuition, shall be determined by the School Board and assessed by the Selectmen, in addition to all other money. If the amount assessed is, at the end of the fiscal year, in excess of the requirements, the balance can be carried over to the next year on this account.

The Board recommends that \$100.00 be raised for books and supplies, and that \$54.00 be raised to pay for approved high school tuitions. It is also recommended that \$50.00 be raised for repairs.
