TOWN WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of New London in the County of Merrimack in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

[L. S.]

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,090.00 to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

This sum includes

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$4,500.00 for the Town Library for the ensuing year.
6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,200.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$3,800.00 for support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for the care of the Town poor.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,000.00 for summer maintenance and \$4,000.00 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$575.97, the State to contribute \$2,303.87, for Town Road Aid.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 to continue sidewalk resurfacing started in 1950.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Fire Dept. Maintenance for the ensuing year.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the purchase of Willys Jeep Fire Engine. Not approved by budget committee.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Police Dept., \$2,000.00 being Chief of Police Salary and \$500.00 for General Expense of Dept.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 to increase Chief of Police Salary, \$500.00 of which to be used for expenses, \$100.00 to cover increased cost of living. Only \$300.00 approved by budget committee.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the continued support and maintenance of a Skating Rink. \$250.00 recommended by budget committee.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of maintaining an Information Booth. It being understood that any balance at the end of the season will be turned back to the Town. Not approved by the budget committee.

TOWN WARRANT (Continued)

18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association. Not approved by budget committee.

19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,024.60 for sewer maintenance for the ensuing year.

20. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate a sum not exceeding \$11,000.00 for the purpose of publishing two thousand copies of The History of the Town of New London from 1900-1950, and raise said sum by authorizing the Selectmen to borrow the same in the name of the Town by the issuance of serial notes and to also authorize the Selectmen to include in the annual budget any sum of money necessary to supplement the revenue from sales of the Town History books so as to make an annual payment of \$2,200.00 on the outstanding notes. All revenue from sales of books shall be remitted to the Town Treasurer.

21. To see if the Town will vote:

(a) To authorize and empower the Selectmen, for and in behalf of the Town, to take any and all such action as may be necessary to confirm and establish the title of the Town to the Tracy Memorial Building, so-called, and the lot or parcel of land on which it stands and to do any and all such things as may be incidental or necessary thereto.

(b) To authorize and empower the Selectmen, for and in behalf of the Town, to adjust and settle any and all claims of the Town against the Jane Tracy Estate upon such terms and conditions as they may approve and to do any and all such things as may be incidental or necessary thereto.

(c) To approve and authorize the acceptance by the Town of the sum of one hundred ten thousand dollars in compromise settlement of all claims against the estate of Jane Tracy, the said fund, after deduction of legal expenses, to be held in trust by the Town, the income to be used for the support, maintenance and operation of the Tracy Memorial Building and Library as and for a public library, as more particularly appears

in a proposal for compromise settlement to be submitted at said meeting by or on behalf of said Tracy Estate, and to authorize and empower the Selectmen, for and in behalf of the Town, to execute all necessary agreements and releases, and to do any and all other things necessary and proper to carry out said compromise settlement.

(d) To approve and authorize the compromise settlement of all claims of the Town against the Jane Tracy Estate upon the payment by the Jane Tracy Estate of the sum of one hundred ten thousand dollars to the Town, to be held in trust, after the deduction of legal expenses, the income therefrom to be used for the support, maintenance and operation of the Tracy Memorial Building and Library as and for a public library and subject to such other terms and conditions as the Selectmen may approve, and to authorize and empower the Selectmen, for and in behalf of the town, to execute and deliver to the Jane Tracy Estate all agreements and releases and to do any and all other things necessary and proper to carry out said compromise settlement.

22. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.

23. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.

24. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

The following statistics of the circulation of the books and magazines at the library show an increase over 1949, and, also good use of the building by the community.

There have been 12,718 visitors through the year.

During this year 354 new books have been added, of which 42 were gifts. As usual, our many friends have contributed very generously to our magazine table in the reading room.

In both the reading room and the children's room the magazines have circulated freely, thus helping make up for the smaller amount of books purchased this year. We have begun to feel the rise in the cost of new books, especially in the children's room.

We have tried to keep the grades and the High School supplied with supplementary reading and have also sent books regularly to the Elkins School.

All calls for inter-library loans have been met promptly and the Bookmobile still calls on us on alternate months. Although the upper stack is still very congested, we try to do our best, and have answered more than 150 requests for reference material.

The meetings in the Club room average six each week, while the auditorium is used by the Woman's and the Garden Clubs for their meetings through the year.

On May ninth the librarians attended an all-day Neighborhood Meeting at West Lebanon. A refreshing interchange of ideas was enjoyed and new spring books inspected by all.

The State Institute of Librarians, conducted by Miss Pratt of the New Hampshire State Library, honored us by holding their annual week of study at our library, the third week in May. At the end of the course fifteen certificates were awarded and the attendance reported as ranging from 20-26 through the sessions.

The piano pupils of Mrs. Helen R. Colburn gave a recital in June that greatly pleased the audience of parents and friends gathered in the auditorium that night.

The usual Vacation Reading Club was organized in July and August with an enrollment of twenty-two children. Nineteen of these participated in the party held on the first day of September in the auditorium. Games were played, the art exhibit of Mrs. Dorothy Dey Howard visited, and refreshments were served to all. The head librarian presented diplomas for reading twenty-five books to the following children: Sandra Jane Dean, Mary Jane and Betsey Tunis, Judith and Florence Champion, Judith Pond, Robert Wheeler, Judith and Jacqueline Kezar, and Ann Greenaway. Awards for reading ten books went to Marguerite Huntoon, Roselee and Claudia Pellerin, Jane Greenaway, Judith Rivers, Elizabeth Worthen, Marjorie Orr, Ellen Hein, and Karyl Allyn.

Good Book Week was observed in November from the thirteenth to the eighteenth, with an exhibition of new books for adults and children. Also on display were fine mineral collections loaned by Ervine Williams, Earl Lawler, Burton Gray, and Seth Lamson. A cup-and-saucer collection loaned by Mrs. Oscar Colburn and exhibits of pitchers by Mrs. Robert MacMichiel, Mrs. Frances and Sadie Shepard, and Miss Elizabeth Shepard, attracted the attention of all the visiting women. Over three hundred and fifty guests visited us that week, including the grades from the Central School. In connection also with Book Week the head librarian addressed the High School Assembly on the origin and meaning of Good Book Week.

On display in the Reading Room is a beautiful bronze casting of a pheasant done by Jules Moigniez and presented to the library by Dr. Alfred E. Sears.

Our Saturday afternoon Story Hour continues to be popular with the children of the town and we have had as

guests three hundred and seventy-five children during the year.

Mr. Edward Dexter has continued his faithful work in our building and in our gardens. Hospital Day under the direction of Mr. Robert Sawyer and ably assisted by Mr. Harry Harris was the most successful day we've ever had. The net receipts for this day totalled \$6,630.11. (This figure does not include the money collected by the Summer Residents' committee.) Members of the board and the hospital administration offer their heartfelt thanks to Mr. Sawyer, Mr. Harris and all the folks who worked so untiringly to make this day the best.

The gifts from the summer Residents' Committee include a new kitchen range, equipment for the X-Ray room and a suction and etherizer machine for the operating room. We are deeply indebted to this Committee and to our summer residents for their interest and generosity to the hospital.

Dr. Hayward gave an electric Corey Coffee Maker and it is appreciated by staff and patients alike. The Hospital Aid has continued their work in making improvements to the Nurses' Home. In addition to these activities they have paid off \$600 on the mortgage, and approximately \$500 has been spent for linen for the hospital. We are indeed grateful. The Woman's Club gave \$50 to the maternity ward. The American Legion Auxiliary gave a share of their profits from the play "The Man Who Came To Dinner." A donation of \$500 was received from Colby Junior College and is greatly appreciated. A gift of \$25 was received from the Sunapee

Horse Show Committee. The Colby Students continue to maintain the Barbara Jane Baker Laboratory.

The Hospital was painted this year, the Nurses' Home has had a portion of the roof shingled and the sidewalks repaired. Work has been started on improving and replacing some of the wiring at the Hospital.

The employees of the Hospital voted to accept Social Security and the program will go into effect January 1, 1951.

The treasurer's report will not appear in the Town report, the audit has not been completed, however, copies of this report will be available at the Annual Meeting of the New London Hospital Board in February.

Mrs. Sargent reports that the total number of patient days for 1950 was 5,692. 616 adults were admitted during the year and 81 births were recorded. These figures show an increase over last year. Miss Dorothy Hale, laboratory technician reports that 2,655 tests were performed during 1950.

The officers and directors of the New London Hospital again wish to express their appreciation to the many benefactors of the hospital. REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New London School Board:

I herewith submit my third annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Enrollment

The enrollment for the school year, 1950-51, is 221. It is broken down as follows:

Central School:

Grades 1-8 120

Grades 9-12 92

Elkins School:

Grades 1-6 9

The total figure is approximately the same as a year ago although the entering first grade is some larger. This is typical of the pattern of school enrollment throughout the nation.

There are 40 tuition pupils in the high school and 5 in the grades.

Handwriting

This year we have added the Rinehart Functional Handwriting System in Grades 1-8. Trained handwriting supervisors visit each class room once a month, outline the work for the next month and check the work of each pupil for the

previous month. A diagnostic report is given to the teacher indicating the items which are to be made the basis for remedial instruction.

Indications point to a general improvement of pupils' handwriting.

The tuition rates is as follows:

In-Service Training

Four members of the staff attended summer school and several others took extension courses during the year. This interest in professional improvement on the part of the faculty is commendable. It is but one indication of an earnest, conscientious staff.

It is planned to use the balance of the money available

for further improving the surface of the baseball field and the construction of bleachers.

School Insurance

A survey of insurance needs was made during the year and an Insurance Analysis was prepared through the cooperation of the local agents.

During the year the amount of fire insurance on the school property was increased from \$56,000 to \$76,000. It is recommended in next year's budget that this amount be increased to \$101,000. Extended coverage was placed on all existing policies.

Public and Teachers' Liability Insurance has been added this year. In general, this type of insurance protects the District against suit from any negligence of its employees.

Workmen's Compensation Insurance has been placed on all regular employees of the School District.

Athletic insurance on those students, both boys and girls, who participate in team sports has been carried for several years.

Next year's budget includes funds to provide for Boiler Insurance.

The "Insurance Analysis" recommended that student accident insurance should be handled by the parents. It is a type of insurance not generally carried by School Districts for the cost of reasonable protection would be approximately \$13.50 per male student and \$6.00 per female student. This type of insurance is generally considered the responsibility of the parent and not the school.

Recommendations

Good schools can always be made better and it is the duty of those charged with school policy to be ever working in that direction.

As we look toward the improvement of our educational offering, consideration should be given to: (a) physical education classes for both elementary and secondary students, (b) the introduction of a course in auto-driving, (c) specialized guidance personnel, (d) an art supervisor. It is likely that items "c" and "d" could best be provided by combining with the other districts of this School Union. It does not

seem feasible to plan to do this for next year, yet we should not forget the need in these fields.

Physical education and auto-driving classes could be included in the school program for next year if one additional faculty member was added. It is recommended that this additional faculty member be obtained for next year and by so doing, we could considerably improve and implement our present school offering.

In conclusion, I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation received during the past year from the school staff, together with the loyal support of the School Board and the continued interest of the other citizens in the welfare of the schools.

REPORT OF PRINCIPAL TO
SUPERINTENDENT GORDON B. FLINT

Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my report as Principal of New London Central School.

There are many activities during a school year that are not a part of the regular classroom work, but are an important part of the education of the students. It is my wish to present some of these activities.

Soon after school opened in September, each of the high school classes met with their faculty advisors and elected their class officers and outlined their class activities for the ensuing school year. At the same time class members to the Student Council were elected.

The Junior and Senior classes, with the aid of Miss Eleanor C. Parker, inaugurated a series of Community Interest Speakers this year during their morning exercises. These speakers represent various occupations in the community.

The Student Council has sponsored a series of programs of speakers for assemblies. To date the programs have included Mr. Gould, Director of Safety of the New Hampshire Motor Vehicle Department, Mr. Alois Myer, a German youth who has been studying 4-H work in the United States, Mr. Albert Martin of the Speech Department of Dartmouth College, Dr. J. Duane Squires and four students from one of his classes at Colby Junior College, and the Directors of Admission from Bryant

College of Business Administration, and Simmons College. In addition to these speakers there have been movies, one-act plays by the English classes, and a concert by the Colby Junior College Orchestra.

The Senior class presented "Life With Father" on November 3 under the direction of Miss Eleanor Parker. It was an excellent performance.

At the Open House on November 9 the lower elementary grades presented a musical program and the upper elementary grades presented a Minstrel Show. The Parent-Teachers Club helped to make the evening a success by serving refreshments.

The Music Department, under the direction of Mrs. Alberta Fisher, has done much to maintain the interest in music. The Glee Club was represented by three students and the Orchestra by three students at the State Music Festival. In addition to the joint concert with Sunapee, the Glee Club and Orchestra held a Pops Concert on May 19. The Pops Concert proved to be one of the most successful activities of the year and plans are being drawn up for another one this spring.

Sixteen students represented us in the State Speech tournament in February, 1950. Kenneth Rich, Jr., and Vernon Squires reached the semi-finals.

The 1950 Seniors, with Miss Parker as chaperone, went to New York City for a five-day trip during the April vacation. A similar trip is being planned by the 1951 Seniors with Mr. and Mrs. Herwood Curtiss acting as chaperones.

During the spring the Home Economics IX and X classes exchanged places with the Shop IX and X classes. The boys proved to be excellent cooks and the girls clever at repair jobs.

The high school had a Cleau-Up Day in the spring. Work was done on the new athletic field. While this was going on, the Trigonometry class, under the supervision of Mr. Curtiss, surveyed and marked out the baseball diamond.

The athletic program is under the supervision of Mr. Robert Rivers and Miss Mary Ryan. In order to increase the number of students participating, both the coaches are supervising a Junior Varsity program in addition to a Varsity program. Soccer was played by the boys in the fall and plans are being made for Field Hockey for the girls next fall. A Ski Team is planned to help round out our program.

The elementary grades renewed the custom of taking an active part in the Memorial Day Program.

In conjunction with the Commencement Program, the Junior Class sponsored an Alumni Banquet on June 9 in the gymnasium.

In addition to our regular testing program which is conducted by the University of New Hampshire Testing Service for members of the Junior Class and the Eighth grade, the World Book Company, Division of Test Research and Service, invited the high school to participate in a national standardization program. These tests consisted of the Essential High School Content Battery and the Terman-McNemar Test of Mental Ability and were administered in May, 1950. The final results have just been received and it is pleasing to be able to report that the Percentile Rank for each high school grade is equal to or above the National Norms. These tests were in the fields of Mathematics, Science, Social Studies and Eng-

lish. It is our hope that the results will be of use to the students and parents as well as the school.
