# WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town House in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.

### REPORT OF SCHOOL HEALTH WORK FOR TAMWORTH

To the Townspeople, School Board and Superintendent of Schools:

What is health? Do people necessarily have health if they are not sick in bed? Is health no more than freedom from illness? It is much more than that. Health is the condition that exists in the body when all parts and organs are working at their best and when the person is happy, interested in life, and enjoying work and play—that includes not only proper digestion of food and free-

dom from pain and illness but also alertness, willingness to help others and interest in things that make life better, happier and more wholesome.

Herbert Hoover in his May day proclamation on "The Child's Bill of Rights" says, "The ideal to which we should strive is that there shall be no child in America (1) that has not been born under proper conditions; (2) that does not live in hygienic surroundings; (3) that ever suffers from undernourishment; (4) that does not have prompt attention and efficient medical attention and inspection; (5) that does not receive primary instruction in the elements of hygiene and good health; (6) that has not the complete birth right of a sound mind and a sound body; (7) that has not the encouragement to express in fullest measure the spirit within which is the final endowment of every human being." Do all our children have this right?

A man with a hole in the roof of his house repairs it quickly lest the water rot the rafters, soak loose the plaster and destroy the paper. It is economy to repair the little hole quickly. The automobile owner hearing a knock in his engine goes immediately to the most skilled machinist whom he knows. It is economy for him to heed that symptom. Children get knocks in their human mechanism which they scarcely are able to detect for themselves. We should be sure for them that repairs are made early if needed. The doctors and dentists are our "human mechanics." Economy lies in consultation with them.

Now this year we are going to give all parents the opportunity to have their children's defects corrected. We are going to have a temporary tonsil hospital in town as soon as school is finished. We are going to have a dentist come also. These specialists will be recommended by the State Board of Health, so we are sure of getting the best.

Our aim for next year is to have 100% of the children free from defects. This year there are only 21% free. Now



that means we all have to do our bit to help. It is not impossible to make Tamworth the only 100% town in the state.

We began our work in the schools this year on Dec. 5, 1933, but we expect to start the work in the next school year just as soon as the community nurse arrives in town.

## SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To Tamworth School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my eleventh annual report as superintendent of schools.

I congratulate the citizens of Tamworth on having maintained good schools as usual during these times of stress and strain. It is the evident belief of Tamworth people that the welfare of the boys and girls is of first importance. In comfortable, well-equipped buildings the teachers are giving instruction in facts of knowledge, and also lessons in self-control and regard for the rights of others. The ability to think and properly decide the questions of the day is vital in these changing times. The high school is doing good work along this line with the older pupils who are approaching an age of responsibility. It is well said that education today is not only gathering facts of knowledge but it is also training for lives of service in public welfare.

Jessie Gray, President of the National Education Association, says, "The American common school is the expression of a mighty faith. It has grown up out of need and aspiration. It is the bulwark of those democratic ideals and rights for which mankind has sacrificed and suffered throughout the ages. It is the home of light and of reason. It is the hope of a better tomorrow. The common school is the house of the people."

### School Property

The property is being well kept up. The schoolhouse at the Village and the ones at Chocorua and So. Tamworth were painted outside. Running water was put in the Chocorua School with aid of the Atkinson Fund. Cleaning and varnishing were done in all the buildings. New adjustable curtains were installed at Whittier.

A major problem now concerns the providing of a larger building at South Tamworth where the South Tam-

worth and Bennett's Corner children can be accommodated. Suitable plans have been approved which will be presented at the school meeting. Since the labor can be provided by CWA money, it is a comparatively small expense to provide material and have the larger building at once. I urge the citizens to support this proposition regarding which the school board has inserted articles in the warrant.

### **High School**

Another very vital and important matter for consideration is that concerned with the adding of the third and fourth years to our high school. A large amount is now being spent on tuition in other towns for the pupils of these years and with a small additional expense we could have the complete high school right here in Tamworth. It will require a slightly larger amount this year to complete arrangements in the new room and provide books and equipment. Another year the additional expense would be less. In view of the vital need that every boy and girl should get the best training for citizenship at this time, I hope every voter will support the measure and give Principal Hatch the opportunity to crown his good work with a full course and final graduation. The school now numbers 29, the largest in its history. The percentage of pupils who complete the eighth grade and go to high school is large. With the full course it ought to be larger and give us a high school of at least 50 pupils.

### **Health Work**

The medical inspection in the schools this year is being conducted by Dr. Edwin C. Remick, assisted by the community nurse, Miss Beatrice Coutts who does the follow-up work. The work is getting under way with prospects of good results. The report submitted by the nurse gives a detailed account.

### Visual Instruction

The motion picture has brought help and enjoyment to the boys and girls. Already there have been pictures of health, safety, kindness to animals, flowers, geography and history. The picture, "Daniel Boone" was given in the Town Hall and the public invited. It was also given in other sections of the town. This was a strong picture of early pioneer life in the Kentucky region. The entertaining picture, "Captain January," was favorably received everywhere. Since we learn more through the eye than any other sense, the picture comes to have special value.

The interest shown by the people in attending the school gatherings shows that Tamworth citizens are interested in schools and child welfare. The conditions of our country show that we need well-trained citizens, and the way to train is to begin in youth. Honest, loyal, efficient, helpful and law-abiding citizens are not made in haste. A squash can be grown in one season, but it takes years of slow, hard growth to make a sturdy, spreading oak. The twig can be bent. The tree cannot.

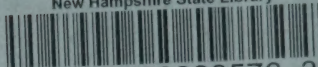








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
