



#### REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD.

To the Town of Walpole:

Herewith is submitted the annual report of the school board for the year now closing.

The work for the year has been marked by few special occurrences, but the schools throughout the town have made good progress. Removals from town of members of the school board, together with sickness, has somewhat interfered with the work the latter part of the year, but to no serious extent.

The full system, as outlined last year, has been successfully maintained, with a slight increase in the schools of Walpole village over last year, and a marked increase over the preceding year. There seems to be a general disposition on the part of parents and scholars to coöperate with the teachers and authorities and get the best results.

The high school is in excellent condition and doing most thorough work. There is a marked improvement in the bearing of the pupils, more earnest purpose and more studious habits, with a growing interest in the natural sciences, which lends enthusiasm and vigor to the whole work of the school. We believe the town has been fortunate in its principal, Mr. George O. Smith, A. B., who has spared himself nowhere, and done most faithful and conscientious work.

The grading of last year has required little change, and the classes are doing the work well.

The financial outlays of the year may seem to call for . some brief explanation. Larger expenditures than was anticipated were found to be absolutely necessary after repairs had once been begun on the high school building, and the board were obliged to considerably overrun the sum especially appropriated for that purpose. The building was found in much worse condition than was realized. and close previous estimates of the cost were impossible. The board therefore used their best judgment and put the entire building, including basement, in thorough shape, and now complete for many years. It seemed by far the best economy in the end to do so, and they saw no other reasonable course open to them, though they regret having had to do so without funds, and therefore to carry over the large deficiency of this year. But they feel sure that all who will investigate the matter, see what has been done and in so thorough a manner, will approve of their action as the only feasible course under the circumstances.

The building has been replastered throughout with pressed steel ceilings in the two school rooms; the walls and ceilings tastefully tinted; new hard pine finish, including floors, throughout; new seats and windows, and blinds where needed; the building thoroughly painted outside, two coats, lead and oil; concrete gutters around the building; the tower thoroughly braced and new timbered; a finely working heating system, consisting of two large Fuller & Warren furnaces, with a circulating arrangement distributing the heat evenly over the building, and serving well for ventilation, and which has worked to entire satisfaction in the coldest weather. The basement has also been thoroughly renovated, finished in hard pine, with finely cemented floor, enlarged windows, walls whitened, and bulkhead and comfortable stairway to the hall.

These improvements put the building, in all important respects, on a footing with any modern schoolhouse, and in every way as good as could have been built for many times this outlay, and now the building is a pride to the town. The basement serves as a fine playroom in stormy weather, and has been constantly in use and paid for itself already, as has the whole building, in the comfort of teachers and pupils. The basement also serves as a much needed place for the gymnasium equipment, generously given to the town a few years ago by Mr. Howland of New York.

The primary building in Walpole village now needs a thorough renovation, as especially the intermediate room is hardly fit for safe occupancy. The seats are dangerously uncomfortable, and the heating arrangements entirely unsatisfactory. Not a large sum of money would be required to put the building in good shape, and in as good condition as the other. The present finish could most of it remain. There should be basement facilities in this building like those of the high school house, and they could very easily be arranged as the building is situated. The small children especially need such. There should also be new floors, the building painted outside and in, new plastering in part, and a good heating system; but less than a thousand dollars would, in our judgment, do the whole job satisfactorily, and it is hoped the district will soon provide for this.

The schoolhouse at No. 6, which has long been in a condition unfit for use, has also been put in good repair, and is now an attractive and comfortable schoolroom. This also required more than was expected, but is a wise outlay. The schoolhouse at No. 10 has also been reshingled, and a fence about the lot put up at Drewsville.

Unexpectedly, also, North Walpole came in for quite a bill for repairs. The schools became so crowded as to require another schoolroom at the opening of the fall term. A plan was devised by which waste space, ante-rooms, etc., in the old building could be utilized by changing partitions so to make two additional rooms. This cost about two hundred dollars, and had to be done without funds, but was the wisest and the only thing to do under the circum-

stances, and this, we believe, will meet the requirements for some years to come. The North Walpole schools are in a most prosperous condition, and furnished with excellent and highly trained teachers, and under thorough management.

The school year has not been as long as we hoped to have, but the entire amount of special school money was used for that purpose, and not applied, as may have been supposed, to repairs. The extra repairs constitute the deficit. But we believe the high efficiency of the schools has more than made up for the loss of a week or two. What we have lacked in quantity has been more than made up in quality.

We believe that the good people of Walpole will be loyal to their schools, and stand behind us in doing the best we could under our conditions. We have spared neither time nor strength nor labor, to get the best results possible and the best value for your money. Repairs were done at exceedingly moderate figures and done well.

The sacred interests of education are the highest interests of our town, and we feel confident they will receive, as they have in the past, and we hope, merit your continued interest and support. We have done the best we could, to you we leave the rest.

#### REPORT OF

#### COMMITTEE ON THE TOWN LIBRARY

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1900.

#### To the Selectmen:

The whole number of volumes now on the catalogue is 7,098, of which 281 have been added during the past year. Of these 121 have been purchased with the annual appropriation, and 160 have been presented by various donors, to whom the town is much indebted for their liberal gifts.

The whole number of volumes taken out in 1899, was 8,966, divided as follows:

Main library,	7,877
Drewsville branch,	245
North Walpole branch,	. 844

The increase in circulation from 1898 was 500, mainly in the central library. The number of persons visiting and using the library and reading room in 1899 was 9,043, an increase of 866 over the previous year. As indicated by these figures, the use of the library and reading room, and the circulation of books are steadily increasing from year to year. The usefulness of the library to the town, and its appreciation by our citizens, and by visitors and temporary residents are thus made evident in the most practical manner. At the same time, the cost of maintaining the library is but little more than when its use was much more limited.

The year has been marked by the gift, by Mr. Chandler Robbins, of the Waverley Novels in 25 volumes, and the complete works of Charles Dickens in 20 volumes. The edition of the Waverley Novels belonging to the library had become much defaced, while the scattered volumes of Dickens's works were many of them soiled and worn by long use, and almost unfit for circulation. The gift of these choice new editions, well printed and illustrated, is not the least of Mr. Robbins's many benefactions to the library.

The supply of periodicals in the reading room has been maintained by gifts and by the annual subscriptions to the magazine fund without encroaching upon the annual appropriation. The following periodicals are now regularly taken: Harper's, Atlantic, Scribner's, Cosmopolitan, Outing, New England, Review of Reviews, McClure's, St. Nicholas, The Critic, Granite Monthly, Illustrated London News, Life, Judge, Puck and Walpole Gazette. Henry G. Wheelock of New York, also contributes the Century, Longman's and the Strand; Mrs. G. F. Tower, the Outlook; Mrs. Mary Schultz, Harper's Weekly and the Bookbuyer; and John W. Keyes, M. D., of Boston, the Christian Science Sentinel. Elliott's Magazine, devoted to cycling and good roads, is sent regularly by the publishers.

The collection of native birds has been increased by the gift of a henhawk, handsomely mounted, from Miss Alice Smith. Mrs. D. W. C. Ordway has also presented a henhawk in memory of her son Clinton, to whom it belonged. Mrs. James L. Mitchell has given a case of humming birds and has also loaned a valuable case of stereoscopic views. Charles P. Howland has presented an engraved portrait of Paul Revere, a companion to the portrait of Isaiah Thomas, presented by him a year ago. Two more of the rare volumes, published in Walpole about one hundred years ago, have been discovered, and have been presented by the owners and placed in the cabinet.

The somewhat larger appropriation made by the town a year ago has justified a more liberal policy in the pur-

chase of new books, and the committee recommend the appropriation of the same amount (\$400) for the coming year.

#### REPORT OF

## WALPOLE CEMETERY COMMITTEE,

FOR THE YEAR ENDING MARCH 1, 1900.

#### To the Selectmen:

The usual care has been bestowed upon the village cemetery during the past year. The special lots have been cared for with the income from the funds left for that purpose. During the past year the income from the fund of one hundred dollars, presented by the children of Leonard B. Holland, for the care of the Dr. Abraham Holland lot in the old cemetery, has become available. By the will of the late Mrs. Lucius P. Booth, we understand that a fund was bequeathed to the town for the care of the Booth lot in the new cemetery. As soon as this fund is received, the lot will be properly graded and put in good condition. A fund of one hundred dollars has been paid in during the past year, to be known as the "Matthew Dickey fund," the income to be used in the care of the Dickey lot in the old cemetery. By the decrease in the rate of interest the income of the funds has been somewhat diminished, but the same attention as usual will be paid to the lots.

The work of gravelling the long driveways in the level part of the new cemetery was completed last summer. This work was begun in 1893 and has been carried on so gradually that the expense has not been large in any single year. As a result, all of these driveways have been graded, the edges straightened, and the general appearance of the cemetery has become far neater and more orderly. The annual expense of keeping the drives in order hereafter will be very small. All of the gravel has been

screened and brought from "Cobb's brook" in Westminster, and, being of good quality, has packed well and made good walks as well as roads. The entire expense of gravelling since 1893 has been about \$300.00. The road leading from the highway past the Lucke lot to the Bellows monument is in a bad condition, and will require considerable outlay this year to make it safe. After this work is done, it is hoped that the path running north and south along the hillside can be widened and improved so as to be made available for carriages, and thus open a large number of good lots which are not now easily reached.

Seven lots in the new cemetery were assigned by the committee during the year 1899 to residents of the town applying for them. There were 26 burials in the village cemetery in 1899. Of these 18 were residents of Walpole and eight were of former residents who died out of town and were brought here for burial. Three persons, who died in town, were taken to other towns for burial.

For the first time in many years the town bell has been tolled for deceased persons, excepting when relatives have requested that it be omitted. The expense has been paid from the appropriation for the cemetery. As far as the committee have been able to learn, this revival of an old custom of our fathers is generally approved by our people as a proper recognition of those who are taken from us, and as tending to create and preserve a bond of sympathy in the community which may be regarded as in one sense a common family.

The cemetery has been well cared for during the past year by John E. Proctor, who has taken pains to keep it in a condition creditable to the town and to make it attractive to the many persons who visit it during the summer season.

The hearse house of the Drewsville cemetery requires slating and some repairs in the coming year.

The usual appropriation of two hundred dollars is recommended.


