## School Report.

---

For the year ending August, 1899, there were seven schools of twenty-five weeks. The whole number of pupils registered was eighty-eight, which included an equal number of boys and girls. The average membership in all schools was sixty-three, the average attendance fifty-six. Five pupils were neither absent nor tardy during the year; sixteen others were on the roll for perfect attendance for at least one term. There were two hundred and seventeen visits by parents and friends, besides thirty-two by members of School Board.

The teachers were those of established reputation and eminent success, or had had the advantages of special preparation for their work, coupled with the enthusiasm of younger teachers.

The schoolhouses on Pleasant street, White Plain and Putney Hill have been repaired and freshened by paper and new curtains so as to be attractive, and teachers and pupils have been inspired thereby to care for and beautify the rooms.

Geography study has received new impetus with new books. The raised and the colored maps have left indelible impressions on the minds of those who made them. History has been taught by topic, with several books as reference, in a way to give an insight into methods of study that is of immeasurable value. Supplementary reading of standard literature has been successfully handled.

Will not parents lend their influence with that of teachers in securing more reverent treatment of books? The scholar rarely rarely mistreat books, and the habit of care is worth while.

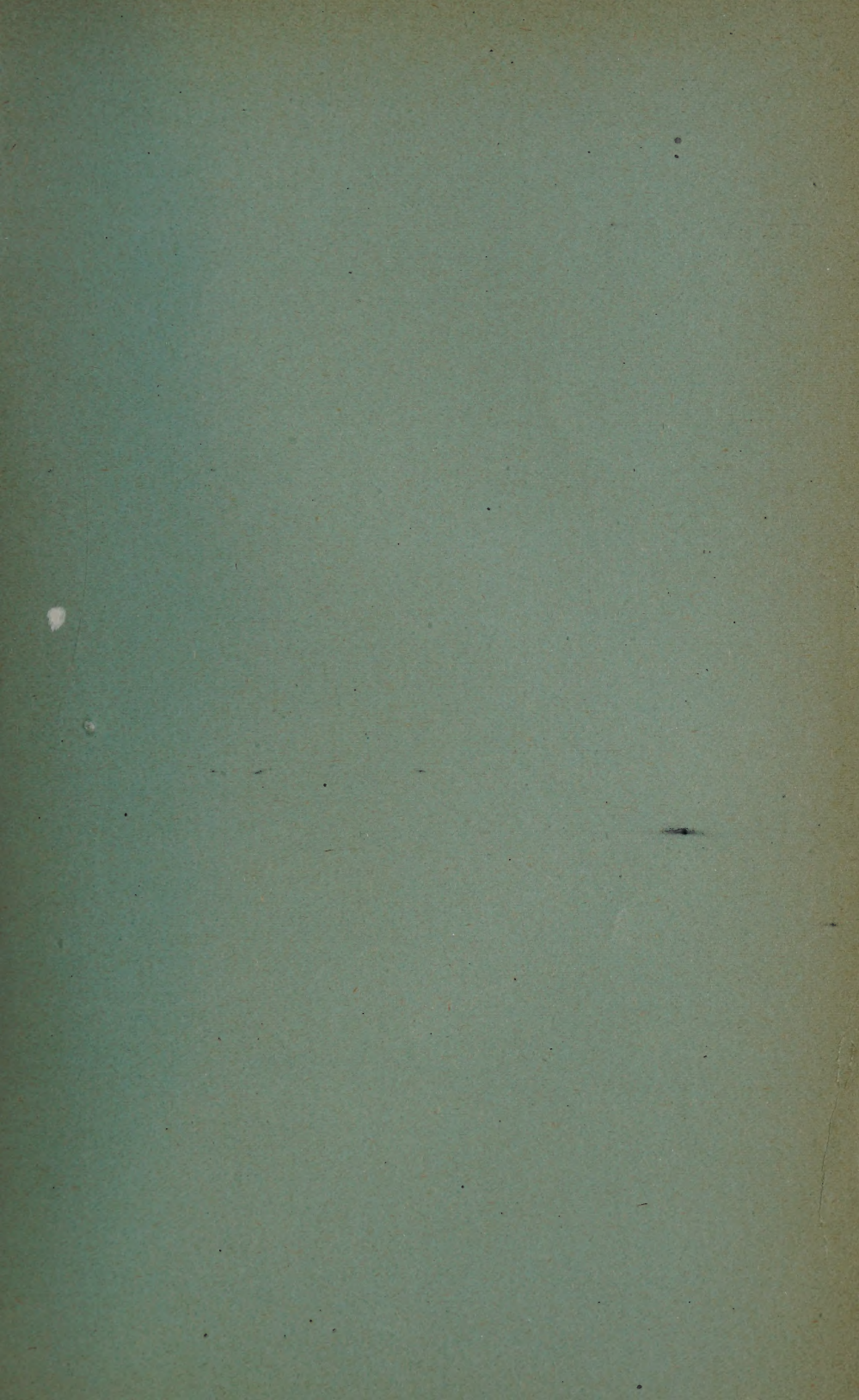
