

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

School Report.

TO THE CITZENS OF BARNSTEAD:

I have the honor herewith to present my second annual report, and I wish to call your attention to the selection of prudential committees. Districts should be careful whom they elect to this office. He should, in every case, be a man that will take an active interest in the school. In some districts rotation in office is the rule. No matter how worthy or unworthy the present incumbent, he must, at the next district meeting, give place to his neighbor: he, in turn, to his next neighbor, till, like a "school-marm boarding round," the office has been at every house in the district. In such districts it can be foretold with great certainty who will hold the office for several years to come.

DISTRICT NO. 1. ·

Amount of money, \$95.58. Prudential committee, W. H. Lock. Length of school, 16 weeks. Wages per month, \$18, \$29. Miss Emma J. Rogers and F. E. Shannon, teachers. As has been said in years past, there are not enough scholars attending to give that stimulus which in a large degree is essential to success, and lack of emulation is generally noticeable in classes composed of two or three scholars; yet they made good progress in their studies and have been well taught.

DISTRICT NO. 2.

Amount of money, \$86.25. Prudential committee, M. V. B. Nutter. Length of school, 20 weeks. Wages per month, \$17, \$18. Miss Josie M. Clough and Hattte M. Dow, teachers. Steady progress has been made in study, good order maintained, and the general appearance of the school is such as to commend it to all persons interested in the education of children.

DISTRICT No. 3.

Amount of money, \$134.80. Prudential committee, S. E. Emerson. Length of school, 22 weeks. Wages per month, \$20. Miss Aura L. Emerson and Clara A. Proctor, teachers. This school was successful in all branches taught. In numbers only it may be considered a small

school. Scholars were studious, orderly and respectful. Eximinations were interesting and satisfactory.

DISTRICT No. 4.

Amount of money, \$63.49. Prudential committee, S. T. Ayers. Length of school, 12 weeks, Wages per month, \$20. Mrs. Myra A. George, teacher. Two terms of school, and both taught by Mrs. George. This school is well advanced. The teacher labored hard to advance her scholars in every branch, and good improvement was made. It was her aim to be thorough in every study. Scholars from other districts attended, which added to the interest and welfare of the school. Parents are interested in their school, as was shown by their presence at the close.

DISTRICT NO. 5 AND 6.

Amount of money, \$103.78. Prudential committee, H. N. Colbath. Length of school, 24 weeks. Wages per month. \$19. Miss Helen M. Colbath, teacher. This was Miss Colbath's first attempt at a public school; success, however, has been hers; diligent and persevering in her efforts for the benefit of her scholars, they have appreciated her teachings and very gratifying improvement has been the result.

DISTRICT No. 7.

Amount of money, \$75.33. Prudential committee, E. F. Jones. Length of school, 12.6 weeks. Wages per month, \$14. Miss Sarah A. Gray, teacher. This is a pleasant and agreeable school to teach. The teacher's efforts were thorough and practical, and the results satisfactory.

DISTRICT No. 8.

Amount of money, \$31.93. Prudential committee, Lewis Clark. Length of school, 7.2 weeks. Wages per month, \$18. Miss Lizzie F. Grieves, teacher. This school has but one term. Whole number of scholars, 6. The length of term, 7.2 weeks. Miss Grieves' interest in the scholars was a deep one, and much effort and labor was expended upon her part for the benefit of her school. Good improvement was made.

DISTRICT No. 9.

Amount of money, \$138.80. Prudential committee, J. Y. Osgood. Length of school, 22.5 weeks. Wages per month, \$21, \$24. Miss Anna J. Clark and Jennie B. Hanson, teachers, The above-named teachers are good, and I know not but great improvement was made.

but I am not able to report it as such. I could not hear what was said in answer to the questions asked by the teacher of the winter term, and if I repeated the question all I got for an answer (in many cases) was Tee he, Tee he, he. In my opinion it is of no use to think of continuing the school as it is. The scholars ought to be made to speak clearly and distinctly.

DISTRICT NO. 10.

Amount of money, \$130.44. Prudential committee, H. Shackford. Length of school, 21 weeks. Wages per month, \$22. Miss Sophie George, teacher. Miss George has extensively taught in town. No efforts of mine are necessary to aid in establishing her reputation as a teacher.

DISTRICT NO. 11.

Amount of money, \$66.29. Prudential committee, Geo. W. Ayers. Length of school, 16 weeks. Wages per month, \$15, \$18. Miss Hattie M. Dow and B. Frank Dow, teachers. This school has moved quietly forward with its work, and teachers and scholars working together patiently and perseveringly always obtain the reward of their well doings.

DISTRICT NO. 12.

Amount of money, \$150.08. Prudential committee, D. N. Sackett. Length of school, 22.5 weeks. Wages per month, \$18, \$25. Fannie A. Hamm, teacher of the summer term. Miss Hamm is one of our experienced teachers, and the good reputation of the school was maintained. She labored earnestly for the advancement of her pupils, making her teaching a success. The winter term was taught by your committee. I leave others to judge of the value of the instructions imparted. For the earnest and cordial efforts of the parents I am truly grateful.

DISTRICT No. 13.

Amount of money, \$93.46. Pludential committee, H. Tebbetts, Length of school, 15.6 weeks. Wages per month, \$19, \$24. Miss Myra E. Berry and Lucy A. Berry, teachers. The names of the teachers of this school are in themselves sufficient guarantee for success. Faithful, earnest and persevering, they endeared themselves to their scholars, and they gained in knowledge.

DISTRICT No. 14.

Amount of money, \$173.27. Prudential committee, J. C. Pickering. Length of school, 24.2 weeks. Wages per month, \$24, \$30. Miss Eunice S. Grace and Arthur E. Davis, teachers. Miss Grace came to this school with previous experience and labored earnestly for the advancement of her pupils, making her teaching a success. Mr. Davis taught the winter term, and I think him deserving of praise for the thorough manner in which he performed his work. At the examination the scholars reflected credit upon themselves and their teacher, showing that they understood what they had studied during the term. On some accounts this is a difficult school to manage. Children that are not governed at home by their parents are not easily kept in order in the schoolroom: especially is this the case in this district, and such scholars are not only an injury to themselves but to the whole school.

DISTRICT No. 15.

Amount of money, \$86.63. Prudential committee, F. W. Brown. Length of school, 13 weeks. Wages per month, \$22, \$24. Miss Rose M. Hoyt and Carrie E. Giles, teachers. The scholars made commendable progress in their studies, and deserve credit for their perseverance and success.

DISTRICT No. 16.

Amount of money, \$72.13. Prudential committee, J. W. Evans. Length of school, 15 weeks. Wages per month, \$20. Miss Laura A. Willey, teacher. Teachers invariably speak of this school as a pleasant one. No scholars are more advanced in their studies than these of this school. The kindness and attention of this teacher to her pupils was pleasing and satisfactory. One will always be interested in making a visit to this school.
