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## TOWN OF BEDFORD BUDGETARY TOWN MEETING MINUTES MARCH 3, 1999

The annual Budgetary Town Meeting was held on Wednesday, March 3, 1999 at the Bedford Town Hall. Town Moderator Eugene Van Loan, III opened the meeting at 7 PM and introduced those seated on the platform including Councilors Richard Como, David Danielson, Paul Goldberg, Edward Moran, Jeanene Procopis, Thomas Riley, and Richard Also, Catherine Debo, Town Stonner. Manager; Edith Schmidtchen, Town Clerk/Tax Collector; Keith Hickey, Finance Director; and Martha Gaudes, Secretary to Town Council. Moderator Van Loan gave the prayer and led the Pledge of Allegiance. There were approximately 40 people in the audience.

Council Chairman Goldberg said this is the last year for Edith Schmidtchen, who is retiring after serving the Town for 35 years. He presented her with a bouquet of flowers from the Town Council and Town Manager. Mrs. Schmidtchen thanked everyone and said she is looking forward to her retirement.

Chairman Goldberg also announced that Parsons Richmond is retiring after serving as Library Trustee for many years. His wife died a week ago. He has been an invaluable member of the town and to the library.

Moderator Van Loan reviewed the rules for the meeting. Moderator Van Loan read Article 3: To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year.

Mr. Goldberg moved to adopt Article 3; motion seconded. Mr. Goldberg read the Budget Summary .

#### 1999 Town Council – Proposed Budget Summary

There is no increase for the Town portion of property taxes in the 1999 budget. The tax rate for the Town portion will remain \$2.71 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. Changes in Department budgets, noted below, reflect the Town's objective to continue providing quality services at appropriate levels in the community. Additional costs in the Budget are funded through cost savings elsewhere in the Budget and through new revenues.

- The <u>Police Department</u> budget provides funding for an additional patrolman, through a COPS grant; data communications equipment for patrol officers, through a federal grant; and a part-time clerk to assist the Prosecutor.
- The <u>Fire Department</u> budget provides Professional Incentive Pay for firefighters who obtain more advanced EMT training; pay range adjustments (the first since 1995) for personnel, funding for an additional firefighter, and a capital reserve to buy a new fire truck apparatus which will replace Ladder #1 and Engine #1. Training programs and a capital reserve for ambulances are funded by new ambulance fees that went into effect Jan. 1<sup>st</sup>.
- The <u>Public Works Department</u> budget provides additional funding for our road re-construction and resurfacing program, and for hauling more trash from the transfer station - keeping up with the needs of a growing population.
- The <u>Parks and Recreation Department</u> budget funds further development of Legacy Park – with 50% of cost paid with recreation fees from developers; creates a capital reserve for rehabilitation of our community pool in 2002 – with 90% of cost offset by increased concession and swimming lesson fees; and allocates 12 hours of secretarial time to the Department for scheduling, billing, and program assistance.
- The <u>Town Hall</u> budget provides funding for painting the exterior of Town Hall and installing sprinklers.
- The <u>Planning Board</u> budget funds professional services through fees charged to developers.
- The <u>Planning Department</u> budget includes funds for contract service for data entry in records retention software; and the first full year for a Planner I position for a staffperson transferred to the Department last year.

- The <u>Library</u> budget provides funding for\_a parttime reference Librarian and four hours of staff time on Saturdays. Funds are also provided for grounds maintenance and snow removal on sidewalks.
- The <u>Finance Department</u> budget provides additional funding for health insurance reflecting major surgery costs in 1998. An improved experience factor in 1999 would help contain health care costs in 2000.
- The <u>Assessor's</u> budget provides funding for contract services to help measure and list properties.
- The <u>Conservation Commission</u> budget includes \$475,000 to purchase the Benedictine property on Wallace Road, funded through land use change tax revenues in the Conservation Fund. The Council and Conservation Commission have both approved use of these funds to acquire the property - meeting statutory requirements. The Bedford Land Trust will make a substantial contribution (approximately \$325,000) toward the purchase of this property and will receive a conservation easement in exchange for this contribution.

Moderator Van Loan read each line item of the budget under the 1999 Council recommended column.

Ed Comiskey, 12 Three Corners Road, said last year the Town Meeting approved funding for sidewalks on Route 3. Nothing has started. What is the progress and where are the funds. Mr. Stonner said the contract is out and it is scheduled to start this summer. Mr. Goldberg said it is tied in with the State intersection work on Kilton Road and Back River/South River Roads. Mr. Comiskey asked if the funds are in escrow. Mr. Stonner said yes. Mr. Comiskey asked if there is any change in the plans. Are they just doing one side. Mr. Goldberg said only one side.

Vote on the budget of \$11,397,790 passed.

#### SUPERVISORS OF THE CHECKLIST

As of December, 1999, the voting list recorded 2315 Democrats, 5,629 Republicans, and 2,901 Undeclared, for a total of 10,845 registered voters.

The Supervisors hold evening and Saturday sessions for registration of voters before each election. These sessions are posted in the Town Office, the Library, and published in local newspapers. Residents may also register or change their party at the Town Offices during regular office hours. Eligible residents are also allowed to register or change their party at the Town Office during regular office hours. Eligible residents are also allowed to register to vote at the polls on voting days. The Supervisors wish to thank Wanda Jenkins, Town Clerk, and her staff for handling the majority of registrations.

<u>No. 1</u> To Amend Article 45-4, Use and Dimensional Regulations by deleting (1) Home Occupations in its entirety and substituting language differentiating between requirements for Level I and Level II home occupations. <u>Passed.</u>

No. 2 To Amend Article 45-6, Cluster Residential Development by deleting Section 45-6-3 (d) Home Occupation Prohibition. Passed.

**No. 3** To amend Article 45-11-1 Signs by adding a height restriction in paragraph (a). **Passed.** 

<u>No. 4</u> To amend Article 45-11-1 Signs, by replacing paragraphs (d),(e), (f), and (n) with new requirements. <u>Passed.</u>

**No. 5** To Amend Article 45-11 Signs, Section 2 and Figure 45.19 by making allowance for increasing the allowed sign area by a formula related to distance in feet from the edge of street right-of-way in certain districts. **Passed.** 

<u>No.6</u> To Amend Article 45-11 Signs, Section 3 related to Political Signs. <u>Passed.</u>

<u>No. 7</u> To Amend Article 45-4-1 (k) (1) (a) related to Recreation Capital Facilities Fees. <u>Passed.</u>

**No. 8** To Amend Appendix 45-D (b) assumptions and (c) formula related to recreation fees. **Passed.** 

<u>No. 9</u> (Citizen petition) To Amend Article 45-3-2 the official zoning map by expanding a commercial district on Route 101 owned by Thos. J. Flatley to include abutting land zoned Office. <u>Passed</u>.

<u>No. 10</u> (Citizen petition) To Amend in 45-3-2 the official zoning map by reducing the size of the Highway Commercial district on Route 101 where Mobil Gas Station property is located and to rezone adjacent property owned by the Town of Bedford as residential-agricultural. <u>Passed.</u>

<u>No. 11</u> (Citizen petition) To Amend Appendix 45-A (Table of Uses) to prohibit a drive-up or drive-through service facility or curb service in Highway Commercial Zones. <u>Did not pass.</u>

To the inhabitants of the Town of Bedford in the County of Hillsborough in the State of New Hampshire qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at McKelvie School on Tuesday, March 14, 2000 at 7 o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following Articles numbers 1 and 2. Polls are to close no later than 7:00pm. Action on the Town Budget (Article 3) and on Articles 4, 5, and 6 will be held at the Budgetary Town Meeting on Wednesday, March 8, 2000 at 7:00pm at the Town Hall (70 Bedford Center Road).

Article 1. To elect necessary Town Officers for the ensuing three years.

Article 2. To see how the Town will vote on the following zoning amendments.

#### ZONING AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD:

#### AMENDMENT NO. 1

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 1 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 45-2 DEFINITIONS, by adding the following:

ELDERLY HOUSING – Any housing for the exclusive use of elderly and physically disabled persons which complies with the <u>Fair Housing Act of 1988</u> and as amended.

ZERO LOT LINE HOUSING – The location of a building on a lot in such a manner that one or more of the building's sides rest directly on a lot line. No building or structure projections, including roof eaves, bay windows, rain leaders, or chimneys shall project across the lot line.

SETBACK, MINIMUM STRUCTURE - A line parallel to the front, side, and/or rear lot line and set back from said lot line a sufficient distance as specified in this

Ordinance. The yard setback measurements establish the area in which all structures must be erected or placed. No part of a building or structure shall extend across the minimum vards specified in the Tables of Dimensional Regulations except "permissible projections" specified in the Building Code adopted by the Town Council and referenced in Article 45-13, Building Permit Procedure, of the zoning ordinance. Such projections, including roof eaves, steps, window sills, and similar architectural features, rain leaders, chimneys, fire escapes and other required elements of a means of egress shall be allowed to project into the required yards to the distance specified in the Building Code. [This amendment is intended to allow roof eaves and architectural features to extend into the required vards around buildings.]

#### **AMENDMENT NO. 2**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 2 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 45-4, Section 1, GENERAL PROVISIONS, by deleting item (g) BOCA Building Codes in its entirety.

[This is a redundant section of the ordinance which will be removed, and a full discussion of the building permit procedure and BOCA Codes is found in section 45-13-2 of the zoning ordinance.]

#### AMENDMENT NO. 3

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 3 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 45-4-2, Section (c) "USES PERMITTED BY SPECIAL EXCEPTION", section (4) Wireless Telecommunications Facilities, by deleting this section in its entirety, and replacing it with the following:

(4) New commercial ground mount wireless telecommunications facilities may be permitted by Special Exception of the Zoning Board of Adjustment in accordance with the provisions of Article 45-7 of the Zoning Ordinance entitled "Wireless Telecommunications Facilities".

[This section of the ordinance has been rewritten and the body of the text has been moved to a new location in Article 7.]

#### **AMENDMENT NO. 4**

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 4 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 45-5, Section 5, SPECIFIC PROVISIONS, by deleting item (c) which prohibits placing fill in wetlands to obtain required setbacks.

[The Planning Board and Zoning Board have found that it is redundant to require a variance for filling in a wetland after the NH Wetlands Bureau has already granted a State permit for fill.]

#### AMENDMENT NO. 5

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 5 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 45-5, Section 6, (g) MITIGATION PLANS, by deleting the mitigation provisions (1) through (4) in their entirety.

[This section was originally intended to give a "Mitigation Committee" the ability to negotiate for other improvements to offset filling of wetlands. However only the State of NH Wetlands Bureau has legal authority to require mitigation or grant permits for filling of wetlands.]

#### AMENDMENT NO. 6

Are you in favor of the adoption of Amendment No. 6 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance, summarized as follows: To amend Article 45-6, CLUSTER RESIDENTIAL DEVELOPMENT, summarized as follows:

Amend Section 45-6-3 General Provisions as follows:

(b) Permitted Uses - to allow attached dwelling units exclusively for elderly housing with a maximum of 4 units per building

#### ZONING AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD: AMENDMENT NO. 6 - continued

(presently only detached dwelling units are permitted);

(j) Common Open Space Area - to require that no more than 25% of the required open space may be wetlands (presently 40% may be wetlands); and that 40% of the open space must be contiguous (presently the open space may be scattered throughout);

Amend Section 45-6-5 Design Requirements as follows:

(e) Open Space – to restrict recreational facilities that have impervious surfaces, such as tennis courts and swimming pools, to a maximum of 10% of the open space;

(f) (2) Buffer Zone - to eliminate the requirement for a 100 foot buffer around the perimeter of the tract where detached dwellings will be constructed, and instead require a 50 foot buffer as part of the required lot area of each detached dwelling abutting the perimeter;

(f) (2) Buffer Zone - to require a 100 foot vegetated buffer zone around the perimeter of the entire tract where attached elderly dwellings will be constructed;

(g) (4) Internal Design Requirements – each new cluster house lot that is served by an individual on-site septic system and is less than 20,000 square feet in area may be required to submit a final grading plan to the Planning Board as part of the submission for Planning Board approval.

Create a new Section 45-6-7 Options for Non-Contiguous Tracts, summarized as follows:

The Planning Board may grant a Conditional Use Permit to allow development of a cluster residential development involving two separate tracts of land: one tract on which all dwelling units will be located, and a second tract which will provide for the common open space.

[These amendments to the Cluster Development Ordinance are intended to encourage more elderly housing by allowing duplex, triplex, or fourplex units for the elderly, and to secure more meaningful open space in cluster developments by requiring open space in large blocks and restricting the amount of paved recreational facilities. Further, the amendment intends to improve the acquisition of open space within the Town by allowing clusters on two separate lots, i.e., one lot for houses and a different lot for open space. The complete text of the 6-page amendment is on file for public viewing at the Town Clerk's Office.]

#### **AMENDMENT NO. 7**

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 7 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance, summarized as follows: **To create a new Article 45-7 entitled Wireless Telecommunications Facilities.** 

[This amendment is intended to reduce the potential height of new telecommunications towers from 200 feet to 130 feet maximum height, to require camouflage or "stealth" shielding, and to encourage the placement of telecommunications antennas on existing structures rather than construction of new ground-mounted towers. The complete text of this 10-page amendment is on file for public viewing at the Bedford Town Clerk's Office.]

#### AMENDMENT NO. 8

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 8 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows:

To amend Article 45-10, OFF-STREET PARKING REQUIREMENTS, Section 1, General Provisions, by amending (g) as follows:

(g) Parking and circulation driveways will be set back a minimum of thirty feet (30) feet from all lot lines in the Commercial, Highway Commercial, Service Industrial, Route 3 Corridor Performance Zoning, Office, and Apartment Residential zoning districts.

[This amendment is intended to prohibit internal circulation driveways that would reduce landscaped green space around the perimeter of the lot.]

#### ZONING AMENDMENTS PROPOSED BY THE PLANNING BOARD: AMENDMENT NO. 9 - continued

#### **AMENDMENT NO. 9**

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 9 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To Amend Article 45-13, Section 2, BUILDING PERMIT PROCEDURE as follows:

Delete the first paragraph of Section 45-13-2 and insert the following text: All structures shall be constructed in accordance with the most current applicable residential and nonresidential building codes that have been adopted by the Bedford Town Council. The Bedford Building Code Official shall prepare an amendment for submission to the Town Council no less than every three years, requesting adoption for revised building codes. The Town Council shall hold a public hearing on the proposed updates or revisions to the building codes with public notice as required by RSA 675:7. Such notice shall include information stating where the proposed building code updates or revisions available for public inspection. are Following such hearing, the update or revision shall become final upon approval by the Town Council and recording with the Town Clerk.

[This amendment is intended to clarify that the Bedford Town Council will periodically adopt and update the building codes used by the Town of Bedford. ]

#### AMENDMENT NO. 10

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 10 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Article 45-14, Section 4, POWERS AND DUTIES OF THE ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT, as follows:

Add a new Section (f) Variances for Persons with Disabilities. The Zoning Board of Adjustment may grant a variance from the terms of the zoning ordinance pursuant to RSA 674:33 V. without finding a hardship arising from the condition of a premises subject to the ordinance, when reasonable accommodations are necessary to allow a person with a recognized physical disability to reside in or regularly use the premises. In granting a variance pursuant to RSA 674:33 V., the Zoning Board may provide that the variance shall survive only so long as the particular person has a continuing need to use the premises.

[This amendment is intended to allow the Zoning Board to grant variances for disabled persons to use their property, such as installing handicap ramps, without the person having to prove the strict set of standards normally required.]

#### AMENDMENT NO.11

Are you in favor of adoption of Amendment No. 11 as proposed by the Planning Board for the Bedford Zoning Ordinance as follows: To amend Appendix 45-A TABLE OF USES, as follows:

Home Occupations shall be a use permitted by right "P" in the US Route 3 Performance Zoning District subject to a new footnote stating that only Level I Home Occupations will be permitted.

[This amendment is intended to allow lowimpact home occupations in homes and apartments in the Performance Zone on Route 3. However, there shall be no employees who do not reside in the dwelling, the use shall generate no vehicular traffic, and the home occupation shall not advertise with a sign on the premises.]

#### ZONING AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED BY CITIZEN PETITION:

#### **AMENDMENT NO. 12**

We, the following registered voters of the Town of Bedford, NH, petition for the following zoning changes to be presented to the residents of the Town of Bedford, NH at the next general election in March, 2000, for their approval or disapproval.

TO AMEND ARTICLE 45-2, DEFINITIONS, BY ADDING THE FOLLOWING DEFINITION:

#### ZONING AMENDMENTS SUBMITTED BY CITIZEN PETITION: AMENDMENT NO. 12 - continued

Boarding, Lodging, or Rooming House: Any dwelling unit which is occupied by more than 2 adult persons not related by blood or marriage and which provides sleeping accommodations on either a transient or permanent basis, with or without meals, but without separate cooking facilities. This definition shall not apply to group quarters for special needs groups.

#### TO AMEND ARTICLE 45-4-2, TO

INCLUDE: **Boarding, lodging, or rooming houses** <u>shall not</u> be permitted in any zoning district. PURPOSE: To control the number of vehicles at any one location, due to the limited parking spaces, by controlling the number of residents who are <u>each</u> likely to be the owner of a vehicle in the residence.

#### THE PLANNING BOARD APPROVES ADOPTION OF THIS AMENDMENT.

#### **AMENDMENT NO. 13**

The undersigned registered voters of the Town of Bedford hereby request that the Zoning Ordinance of the Town be amended by adding the following provision and deleting any provisions inconsistent therewith: This petition is to amend the Zoning Ordinance such that "Fast food restaurants", as defined in this Ordinance, which are located in the Highway Commercial Zone in the Town of Bedford, will not include drive-up or drivethru service facility or offer curb service.

ARE YOU IN FAVOR OF THIS AMENDMENT PROPOSED BY PETITION FOR THE TOWN ZONING ORDINANCE AS FOLLOWS: Amend Article 45-4, "Use and Dimensional Regulations" so that, as amended, Appendix 45-A (Table of Uses) will include footnote numbered 32 after the letter "P" in the Use subheading "Commercial-Restaurant, Fast Food" in a Highway Commercial Zoning District, which footnote shall read as follows:

#### "32. Shall not include a drive-up or drivethrough service facility or offer curb service."

(A "yes" vote will ban fast food drive-through service. A "no" vote will allow fast food drivethrough service.)

The \$1,100 limit on the excludable amount of remuneration paid in the calendar year for the services specified in this modification will be subject to adjustment for calendar years after 1999 to reflect changes in wages in the economy without any further modification of the agreement, with respect to such services performed during such calendar years, in accordance with Section 218(c)(8)(B) of the Social Security Act.

#### TOWN ARTICLES – FOR REVIEW AT BUDGETARY TOWN MEETING ON MARCH 8, 2000 AT TOWN HALL (70 Bedford Center Road)

Article 5. To see if the Town will vote to send the following resolution to the New Hampshire General Court: Resolved, New Hampshire's natural, cultural and historic resources in this town and throughout the state are worthy of protection and, therefore, the State of New Hampshire should establish and fund a permanent public/private partnership for the voluntary conservation of these important resources. *This article was submitted by citizen petition.* 

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize a sum equal to but not limited to seventy (70) percent of the current use penalty assessments to the Conservation Fund for the fiscal year beginning in January 2001 as authorized by RSA 36-A:5 to be used only for the acquisition in the name of the town of the fee or lesser interest in conservation land and other costs associated therewith for permanent conservation use. Said authorized funds and state matching funds may be expended by a majority vote of the Town Council following a majority vote and recommendation by the Conservation Commission. This article was submitted by citizen petition.

This warrant was approved by the Bedford Town Council on February 9, 2000.

#### TOWN COUNCIL Dick Como, Chairman

Once again the Council has proposed no additional tax increase in the Town portion of the 2000 Budget. Our cash reserve will increase to approximately \$2,129,000 - giving us additional protection to maintain a stable tax rate in future years when an economic downturn occurs.

With the establishment of capital reserve accounts in the CIP, future vehicle replacement will no longer be on a lease/purchase plan, but rather on a cash basis, saving the Town thousands of dollars in interest charges, while earning interest in reserve accounts for the purchases.

Our assessed valuation again increased substantially this year - by over 90 million dollars, bringing the Town's total valuation to over \$1.6 billion, ranking Bedford in the top 7 communities in the State. Bedford continues to strengthen its tax base by attracting new business and industry because of its creative planning and zoning regulations.

With the completion of the Town's Ten Year Master Plan, a new guide for the Town to follow will be in place to help us determine the course Bedford pursues on such issues as sewer extensions, additional sewer capacity, water connections, alteration of planning and zoning ordinances, economic development, increased demand on Town services – including Fire, Police, Public Works, Parks and Recreation, and so on.

On behalf of the Town Council, I thank our devoted staff and town employees, the many volunteers who serve on Boards and Commissions, as well as numerous others who give their time and talents to other Town projects throughout the year. By all working together, we can continue to keep Bedford a wonderful and affordable place in which to live and work.

#### TOWN MANAGER Catherine Debo

I've had a busy, productive, and enjoyable year,

- Working with Town Council to develop an ambitious budget for 2000 which keeps a stable and low tax rate (no increase), accommodates important capital projects, and provides capital reserves to safeguard tax rate stability for the long term;
- Sharing oversight of Master Plan process to develop a Plan which will provide vital guidance to the Town for a decade;
- Guiding development of a Sewer Plan Update which protects long-term interests in commercial development and reserves the balance of limited sewer capacity for residential areas where the prospect of failure is greatest;
- Promoting changes in the Town's telecommunications ordinance to improve our ability to control cell tower development;
- Negotiating a new union contract with the Teamsters for the DPW bargaining unit;
- Acquiring Town title to the Benedictine land, developing a Conservation Easement of mutual benefit to the Town and Bedford Land Trust, and pursuing management options and appropriate use of the property;
- Developing a network of 30+organizations, our business community, and many individuals to plan and implement an extensive array of Bedford 250<sup>th</sup> Birthday year activities; and
- Pursuing improvements in Traffic, Road, Sewer, Transfer Station, Building Dept, Investment, Personnel, Welfare and Zoning ordinances, standards, policies and regulations; and related rate changes where appropriate.

Many thanks to Councilors and Staff who have worked with me during the year on these and other projects.

This year will be a tremendous opportunity for townspeople to come together "in community" to celebrate our Town's heritage, support our community organizations, and have great fun. #### PLANNING BOARD Paul Drahnak, Chairman

The Planning Board received 118 applications for action in 1999, the highest number of requests filed since Planning Board review was established in 1964. Demand for new residential lots and new commercial buildings has continued at an unprecedented rate since 1994, causing Bedford's population to increase by 32% during this decade.

#### Final approval was granted for:

- 18 Subdivision Plans 147 residential lots and 4 commercial lots;
- 8 Lot Line Adjustment Plans;
- 7 Home Occupation Permits;
- 20 Site Plans 305,268 sq. ft. of new commercial/industrial buildings;
- 1 Site Plan for 100 rental apartments;
- 2 Site Plans for telecommunications towers;
- 62 miscellaneous plans concepts, compliance hearings, waivers, etc.

#### Major developments reviewed included:

- Cabot Preserve 80 clustered residential lots on Beals Road;
- Laurel Woods Estates 47 residential lots on Campbell Road;
- Continental P.E.T. 100,000 sq. ft. industrial addition on Technology Drive;
- The Taylor Group 93,347 square ft. office building on Commerce Dirve;
- Kensington Close 100 apartments on Technology Drive.

#### Year 2000 Master Plan

During 1999, the Planning Board began work on the 2000 Master Plan. To involve citizen participation in the planning process, a series of "Vision Forums" was held where residents and business owners shared their visions of how our community should look in the future. From photographs, sketches, and dialogue presented at these forums, plus workshops with the Planning Board, RKG Associates has prepared a Strategic Master Plan Update/Vision Statement for presentation at public hearings scheduled in February and March of 2000.

#### Gary Howard – Citizen Planner of 1999

At the Annual Conference for Planning Board members, sponsored by the NH Office of State Planning, Bedford Vice-Chairman Gary Howard was presented the "Citizen Planner of the Year" award for 1999. Gary has devoted 30+ years of volunteer service to the cause of good community planning, and we extend our grateful thanks to him for a job well done.

#### <u>PLANNING DEPARTMENT</u> Karen White, AICP, Director

The Bedford Planning Department completes its first decade of service at the close of 1999. This has been a decade of unparalleled economic growth and community planning - which has provided for acquisition of land for new parks, increased protection of natural resources, and improved response to citizen initiatives and concerns.

#### **Economic Development**

The Planning Department performed plan reviews on 118 applications to the Planning Board in 1999. Staff conducted 90 inspections of commercial and industrial buildings to insure that drainage, paving, landscaping, and lighting conformed with plans approved by the Planning Board. Staff was also active in intersection planning at North Hawthorne Dr. and South Technology Drive along Route 3.

#### Zoning Administrative

Staff prepared 48 applications and reviews for ZBA and responded to citizen complaints. During 1999, zoning violations were investigated and resolved, and 10 wetlands violations were documented and forwarded to the NH Department of Environmental Services for resolution.

#### **Master Plan Activities**

Staff scheduled citizen input forums and Planning Board workshops for Master Plan development and performed extensive research for RKG Associates to document growth and change in the community since the last Master Plan in 1990.

#### 2000 U.S. Census

The upcoming 2000 Census will be the most detailed study of population and demographics ever performed by the Department of Commerce. Bedford's Planning Staff worked throughout 1999 preparing and reviewing census track maps, adding new developments and roadways, for use by census takers.

#### SOUTHERN NEW HAMPSHIRE PLANNING COMMISSION Moni Sharma, Director

The SNHPC has a wide range of services and resources available to help dues-paying members deal with a variety of municipal issues. Technical assistance is provided by a professional staff whose expertise is, when necessary, supplemented by consultants who are selected for their specialized skills or services. Each year, with the approval of your appointed representatives, the Commission staff designs and carries out programs of areawide significance that are mandated under New Hampshire and federal laws or regulations, as well as local projects which would pertain more exclusively to your community.

Technical assistance is provided in a professional and timely manner by staff at the request of your Planning Director and/or the Town Manager. The Commission conducts planning studies and carries out projects that are of common interest and benefit to all member communities, keeps your officials apprised of changes in planning and land use regulation, and offers annual training work shops for Planning and Zoning Board members.

Services performed for Bedford during the past year are as follows:

- Co-sponsored Municipal Law Lectures;
- Conducted traffic counts at 39 Town locations, forwarding info to the Town;
- Provided copies of our "Land Use Plan 2015 for SNHPC Sub-region".
- Provided video "Tools and Techniques" for the Planning Board.
- Provided handbook "Stormwater Management in NH communities" (SNHPC) and "The Law (RSA 155-E) Governing Earth Excavations" (SRPC) to Planning Dept.
- Provided disks containing data on historic sites and open space for use by the Town's Master Plan consultant.
- Provided copy of "Impact Fee Development for NH Communities" (SNHPC).

Bedford's Representatives to the Commission are Eugene Van Loan, Jr., David J. Danielson (Executive Committee Member), and Edward P. Moran, Jr.

#### ZONING BOARD OF ADJUSTMENT Sandra LaMontagne, Chairman

In 1999, the ZBA heard 48 applications for variances, special exceptions, equitable waivers, and administrative appeals. Eleven commercial and 27 residential requests were approved. One commercial and 9 residential requests were denied.

The Zoning Administrator handles public inquiries regarding zoning questions and advises citizens on application procedure. The Board hears evidence for and against variances, appeals from administrative decisions, and approvals of special exceptions. After hearing the evidence, the Board discusses the requests and votes in public session. Planner I, Nancy Larson, attends our meetings and provides information to Board members on the applications.

When an applicant makes a presentation before the Board for a variance, the following five criteria must be addressed:

- 1. No diminution in value of surrounding properties would be suffered.
- 2. Granting the variance would not be contrary to the public interest.
- 3. Denial of the variance would result in unnecessary hardship to the owner seeking it.
- 4. By granting the variance, substantial justice would be done.
- 5. The use must not be contrary to the spirit of the ordinance.

Applicants not present at a meeting who wish to have someone speak for them must give written authorization for the representative. Scheduled applicants wishing a postponement must do so within <u>seven</u> working days before the meeting and must pay for notification of abutters of the change, or the applicant will not be heard for <u>six</u> months. Anyone may appeal a Board ruling in writing within twenty days. The Board then has thirty days to determine if it will grant a rehearing based on new information in the request.

Members of ZBA have worked with the Town Manager and members of the Planning Board, Town Council, and Planning Staff to improve our Telecommunications ordinances.

#### HISTORIC DISTRICT COMMISSION Maurice E. Goulet, Chairman

The HDC met nine times, and held fifteen public hearings during 1999, including Commercial Construction (4), Commercial Signs (5), Residential Additions (5), and New home construction (1).

The Commission thanks the Public Works Department for the final installation of Historic District signs. Other issues discussed by the Commission included landmarking of specific historic properties outside of the District, and camouflage (or stealth) design and location of telecommunications towers.

The Commission made history this summer when it held its August meeting outdoors on the picnic table under the trees. Even though the reason was that no one had the keys to the building that night, history was made! Who knows, on a future nice summer evening we might like to try it again!

The Commission's success is due to diligent work of the members. I would like to thank former members Marilyn Otterson (Past Chairman) and member Kevin Keyes. Many thanks go to this year's membership: Paul Drahnak, Councilor Edward Moran, Beverly Thomas and Robert Scott and Alternates Norma Collins, Ray Minichiello, and Lisa Sheldon. Town Liaison Frances Wiggin and Secretaries Martha Gaudes and Susan Holstein added expertise to our deliberation as well.

We look forward to celebrating Bedford's 250<sup>th</sup> Anniversary, and hope that we have made the right decisions in keeping the Historic District "alive and well".

#### **CONSERVATION COMMISSION**

In 1999, the Commission concentrated on the acquisition of open space; review of Conservation Easements; review of Dredge and Fill Applications; revision of the Commission's Rules of Procedure; and oversight of the Pulpit Rock Subcommittee.

In the spring, a joint effort by the Town and the Bedford Land Trust made possible the acquisition of 27 acres of open space known as the Benedictine Land on Wallace Road and preparation of a Conservation Easement to permanently protect a very beautiful piece of property in the heart of Town. The Town purchased the property with its Conservation Funds and a substantial contribution from the Bedford Land Trust, holder of the Conservation Easement.

Town Council approved and the Commission accepted the role of monitor for a small nondisturbance conservation easement on Newfane Road. Commission members Jeff Nelson and Merv Taub conducted a baseline evaluation of the land to provide a framework for future monitoring duties.

At public meetings, the Commission reviewed 14 Dredge and Fill Applications and made recommendations on wetlands impacts to the State Wetlands Bureau. Site walks were conducted, where appropriate, to better evaluate applications.

Commission members Jeff Nelson, Jeanene Procopis, and Woody Haskell drafted updated Rules and Practices for the Commission, which were adopted in December.

The Commission thanks retiring member Tod Campbell for his assistance and participation, and extends its appreciation to members of the Pulpit Rock Subcommittee: Joe Szymanowski (Chair), Jay Barry, Bill Burns, Peter Delano, Bill Ewing, Clark Gott, Chris Kelley, Ray Landry, Richard Moore, Karen Neumann, and Barbara Tufts.

#### PULPIT ROCK SUBCOMMITTEE

The Subcommittee completed its Pulpit Rock Conservation Area Master Plan and several major maintenance projects including replacement of 3 major bridges and walkways in wetlands areas to accommodate accessibility in a greater portion of the conservation area, hazardous tree removal, and refurbishing of signage on New Boston Road. The Master Plan addresses preservation, expansion, and maintenance issues of this unique geological and historical open space.

#### PARKS AND RECREATION COMMISSION AND DEPARTMENT Scot Pollock, Chair Brian Ross, Director

Much has been accomplished in 1999 at Legacy Park. The Senior Baseball Field was seeded and will be ready for use in 2000. The first phase of the Skateboard Park was completed in November and is receiving a tremendous amount of use already. Additional funds are needed to complete the final phase of the Skateboard Area. In 2000 three Tennis Courts and a Basketball Court will be constructed and be ready to use by the summer season. Earl Legacy Park will be an active community park offering a variety of opportunities for the entire community. A Grand Opening of the park will be held on Saturday, September 30, 2000 - as part of the Town's 250<sup>th</sup> Birthday celebration. A special Birthday Tennis Tournament will be held immediately afterwards for Town residents of all ages.

In 1999, the Town Hall was spruced up to get ready for Bedford's 250<sup>th</sup> Birthday Celebration. The outside of the building was painted and the first floor room was repainted and refurbished from floor to ceiling. During the year, the Town Hall was used extensively by local groups and organizations. Presidential candidates George W. Bush and John McCain used the facility for campaign stops.

The Town Pool had another busy summer season – in open swimming, swim lessons, swim team practices, meets, and summer camp. Average daily attendance: June – 273, July – 236, August – 146. Dave Feren, who has worked at the Bedford Pool for the past 10 summers, will not be returning in 2000. Dave started as a Pool Checker in 1989 and has been the Pool Director for the past four years. We thank Dave for his many years of dedication and service to the Bedford community. He will be missed!

Our ninth annual Cultural Series was a big success with our largest crowds to date. 2,600 people attended six shows. Prudential Habs Real Estate of Bedford was again our sponsor of this popular family activity. The Outback Steakhouse in Bedford kicked off our Cultural Series on July 13<sup>th</sup> with a family cookout which raised over \$1,000 for a Permanent Performance Stage. Many thanks to Outback Steakhouse.

We want to thank all of our Program Instructors, Volunteers and Businesses that made 1999 a tremendous year for the Bedford Parks and Recreation Department. A special *thanks* to Nancy Tompkins who was our **Simply Messy** Instructor for over 5 years.

Join us for our many 250<sup>th</sup> Birthday "doings" in 2000. Check your 250<sup>th</sup> Commemorative Calendar for dates, times, places.

In 2000 we need your help to make us even better. We are doing a Community Survey of what future recreation facilities and programs residents would like to see in Bedford. #### **BEDFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT David C. Bailey, Police Chief**

I certainly don't have to tell anyone that the town of Bedford is still growing. The number of calls for service, including burglar alarms, investigated and accidents arrests have increased significantly. The number one complaint that I hear regularly is the amount of traffic and the related motor vehicle complaints such as speeding, red light violations, and road rage. We will continue to make traffic enforcement a priority. Fortunately, even though the number of accidents has risen, we investigated no fatalities in 1999 on roads that we patrol (one fatality on the interstate handled by state police). Another category that has significantly increased is burglaries. We encourage alarm systems and are actively trying to solve and prevent burglaries, but we can't do it alone. Please, please report suspicious activity. You will not be bothering us. It is our job and we would rather be called and find out that everything is OK, than not be called and miss a burglar. All of our recent residence burglaries have occurred between 8AM & 9PM. We all must also work on the problem of false burglar alarms. They are time consuming, costly and sometimes dangerous. Less than .1% of the alarms is real. Fines are heavy for false alarms. The sole purpose is to prevent alarms, not to raise revenue. Please help us by not causing false alarms.

In the 2000 budget, we are asking for one more police officer to help us keep pace. Remember this is the fourth and last officer through the COPS grant awarded two years ago. We are also keeping pace with new technology and hopefully by the time you read this, the mobile data terminals approved in previous budgets will be in use. The holdup has been the licensing procedure through the FCC.

As always I wish to remind you that we are a team, the police, other town departments and the residents. Praise us when we do well, but also let us know when we do not do so well. We are responsive to your requests and desires. Thank you all for your help in 1999!

#### **BEDFORD FIRE DEPARTMENT** Joseph M. Clow, Fire Chief

In 1999 we made some great strides in personnel training, equipment replacements, and public education. This year, the Fire Department focused on training and upgrading firefighter expertise in Emergency Medical Service. At the beginning of the year, the Department had 2 EMT- Paramedics, 4 EMT-Intermediates, and 29 trained to the EMT-Basic level. By the year's end, we had 5 paramedics, 11 EMT-Intermediates, and all other firefighters at the EMT- Basic Level. This will make a significant difference in the quality of emergency medical care the Department will be able to offer Bedford residents.

We also added a new Aerial Ladder/Pumper (QUINT) and a new Forestry/Utility vehicle to our fleet. The "Quint" replaces Engine I and Ladder I and is significantly better equipped to deal with multi-story commercial buildings and hard-to-reach residences than any previous equipment owned by the Department.

During the year we expanded Community Inspection and Public Education/Preparedness Services. Internally we refined programs relating to Facilities and Equipment Maintenance and Professional Development.

We're in the process of revising our Standard Operating Procedures, Strategic Action Plans, Vision and Mission Statements. Our Mission is to provide a professional work force dedicated to the safety and security of Bedford residents; reaching the highest levels of skill achievement; service above self and team before individual; commitment, dedication, loyalty, gratitude and humility.

It has been our pleasure to serve Bedford residents. Rest assured, we're working to keep on the "cutting edge" of providing the best possible safety and emergency services to our community.

#### REPORT OF FIRE WARDEN AND STATE FOREST RANGER

To aid your Forest Fire Warden, Fire Department, and State Forest Ranger, call to find out if a permit is required before doing any outside burning unless the ground is completely covered with snow where the burning will be done. Violations of RSA 227-L:17, the fire permit law and other burning laws of NH are misdemeanors punishable by fines of up to \$2000 and/or a year in jail. Violators are also liable for all fire suppression costs. If you have questions regarding forest fire or timber harvest laws, call the NH Division of Forests and Lands at 271-2217. Wildland fires in the urban interface is a serious concern for landowners and firefighters. Homeowners can help protect their structures by maintaining adequate green space around them and making sure that houses are properly identified with street numbers. Early fire detection and reports from citizens aid in quick response from local fire departments.

#### DEPARTMENT OF PUBLIC WORKS Edward S. Kelly, P.E., Director

The Department of Public Works has four divisions. Administrative, Highway, Solid Waste and Wastewater. There are 21 full-time, 3 part-time and 3 seasonal employees.

## Highway Division

#### Paul Belanger, Superintendent/Asst. Dir.

In the early months of 1999, there were 20 snow and ice storms. Overall, the entire winter (98-99) was mild by New England standards. The major road project in 1999 was completion of Liberty Hill Road construction. The wearing course for the remaining phases will be placed in 2000. This will bring the four-year project to a successful conclusion. Road crews spent the summer on general maintenance and drainage improvements in preparation for future rehabilitation and construction. Annual road budgets have steadily increased to meet increasing reconstruction, rehabilitation, and re-paving needs. Road paving projects in 1999 include: Beaver Lane, Blanford Place, Bourbon Street, Briar Road, Cambridge Rd., Cherry Lane, Dunlap Drive, Essex Road, Gault Road, Green Meadow Lane, Joppa Hill Road, Liberty Hill Road, Magazine St., North Amherst Rd., and Wallace Road. A sidewalk was constructed on South River Road between Second Street and the Bedford Mall. DPW has also been involved in design of traffic signal and intersection improvements at New Boston/Wallace Roads. This will be a two year project with signal installation in 2000 and lane improvements in 2001. The Town and School Board agreed on contributions to the project to meet local share requirements.

#### Solid Waste Division

The final contract for Bedford Landfill Closure was completed. Costs for hauling and disposal have increased dramatically as has the volume of the waste stream due to growth in Bedford's population. A new contract for solid waste disposal was negotiated that should help stabilize rates. New regulations, restricting access to the Transfer Station for debris related to residential and commercial construction, is expected to reduce the waste stream. A Hazardous Waste Day was conducted, with funding and volunteer assistance from the Bedford Rotary Club.

#### <u>Wastewater Division</u> Stephen R. Crean, Environmental Coordinator

Projects completed in 1999 include the Constance Street/St. Anselm sewer extension, Greenfield Farms pump station, Village Green extensions and several small extensions along South River Road in the Performance Zone. A Sewer Plan Update, developed by Anderson-Nichols, was adopted by Town Council and incorporated in the Town's Master Plan. The Sewer Rate formula was also updated and adopted by Town Council.

#### BEDFORD PUBLIC LIBRARY Frances M. Wiggin, Director Trustees: Robert Brooks, Richard Tucker, and William Wickham; Trustee Emeritus: Parsons Richmond

Our Library served more people in 1999 than ever before and in new ways. Now, with a library card and a pin number, a patron can check our holdings, as well as the database of all GMILCS libraries – Amherst, Derry, Goffstown, Hooksett, Manchester City Library, West Manchester Community Library, Merrimack, Milford and Salem. The Internet adds even greater service availability.

The number of people coming to the Library is no longer the sole measure of its use. Our homepage at <u>www.bedford.lib.nh.us</u> was accessed 120,523 times this year by people all over the world. By computer, patrons can verify items checked out, renew books or place one on hold, research magazine articles and print them from a remote site. However, on-site service remains key to many services - the Children's Department is a prime example.

Our growth continues, with 274 programs provided and a 1999 attendance of 11,669 - a 27% increase over 1998. The numbers remind us how much time and preparation our dedicated staff gave to the effort.

Joanna Baqqi was appointed as Technical Service Librarian, joining us from the NH State Law Library. Mary Ann Senatro, previously with UNH Manchester's Oudens Memorial Library, now supports our reference library under the direction of Susan Rotch. New faces in the Children's Library are Jane White, Marguerite Frizzell and Karen Kilgore. Together they add a new dimension to our dedicated staff. A host of great volunteers provide support to our staff and make a great difference in how we serve the public.

I'd like to thank individuals, clubs, and the Bedford Library Foundation for their many contributions which have allowed the Library to remain on the cutting edge of technology and equipment. The Bedford Rotary Club provided a new portable stage for our musical performances. The Foundation purchased a special computer and genealogy software that is available for researchers. They underwrite our Sunday musicals, a Pass to the New England Aquarium, and have contributed a DVD (digital videodisk) collection, audio books on CD, and a new copy machine for staff use. We thank the Friends of the Library who continue to support our efforts in so many ways.

#### <u>CEMETERY TRUSTEES</u> Ralph Wiggin, Chairman Doris Peck Spurway and Donald Folsom

Donald Folsom was welcomed as a new Trustee for a three-year period. Ralph Wiggin became Chairman and Doris Peck Spurway continued as Secretary.

During the year, the Trustees continued work on the expansion area at the top of the hill at the Bedford Center Cemetery. In the coming year, plans call for completion of driveways, water line installations and plot plans for gravesites.

The Trustees wish to remind present gravesite owners that any in-ground plants are prohibited. All live vegetation must be placed in an urn or pot. Artificial decorations of all types are not allowed. These regulations follow accepted guidelines in the interest of attractive and easily maintained grounds.

A superintendent, under the direction of the Trustees, is responsible for the care and appearance of the cemeteries maintained by the Town.

There have been eleven lots sold this year, of which six have been 4-place and five have been 2-place lots. Two deeds from previously sold lots have been returned for reimbursement and resale and one lost deed has been replaced.

There are four cemeteries in Bedford under the jurisdiction of the Trustees, as well as the historic Walker Monument located off South River Road.

#### ASSESSING DEPARTMENT Donald A. Ingalls, Assessor

For 1999, the Town's gross assessed valuation increased \$95,092,244 over the previous year. This is an astounding figure exceeding the past two consecutive years record growth.

The overall growth represents a 6.31% gain over the previous year with the annual percentage increases in each of the above classes as follows: Residential: 6.24%; Commercial/Industrial: 5.69%; Exempt: 11.75%. The majority of the increase in the exempt category is due to construction of the new Riddle Brook School and a major addition to the Bedford Presbyterian Church. The total number of parcels increased from 6,889 to 7,309 for a 6.1% gain.

Evidence of the demand for real estate within the Town of Bedford may be illustrated by the number of real estate conveyances within a given period of time. A Department of Revenue Administration report indicates 764 transfers took place in Bedford between October 1, 1998 and September 30, 1999 compared to 725 for the previous year for a 6.1% increase. It should be noted that this number represents transfers of all properties including market and non-market transactions. Of note is the fact that for 1998 and 1999 better than 10% of properties changed ownership each year.

As of September, 1999, the following is a breakdown of the classification and numbers of types of properties located in Bedford.

The Assessing Office is a valuable resource for individual property owners, real estate appraisers, brokers, etc. Each property has its own Map/ Block/Lot number and has a folder with info such as history of ownership, purchase date and price, and individual property characteristics. A public access computer terminal with this info is available in the assessing lobby as are Tax Maps. Copies of records are available for a nominal fee. Assessing Office hours are 8:00am through 4:30pm Monday through Friday.

#### BUILDING/HEALTH DEPARTMENT Wayne A. Richardson, CBO, Code/Health Official Wayne H. Moore, Code/Health Inspector

1999 was a year of unprecedented growth for the Town of Bedford. The Department continues to deal with a growing workload. A third qualified Inspector was hired on a part-time basis to help deal with increased inspections and permits in a timely The Building/Health fashion. Department performed approximately individual 5,500 inspections, reviewed 700 building permits, 40 pool permits and 100 septic permits. Additionally, 250 new single residential dwelling units received Certificates of Occupancy.

We've had a full year's experience with the computerized permit system and it is performing well. Our next task is to broaden the Department's exposure to residents and contractors. This is being accomplished by sponsoring seminars for contractors and residents at the Safety Complex. These meetings are held when conditions indicate there are misconceptions about code issues and when new codes are being implemented. The sessions are based on questions and concerns presented to the Department. We encourage both contractors and residents to visit the Department page on the Town website to view information there. ## **2000 Town Council – Proposed Budget Summary**

There is no increase for the Town portion of property taxes in the 2000 budget. The tax rate for the Town portion will remain \$2.71 per \$1000 of assessed valuation. Changes in Department budgets, noted below, reflect the Town's objective to continue providing quality services at appropriate levels in the community. Additional costs in the Budget are funded through cost savings elsewhere in the Budget and through new revenues.

- The <u>Police Department</u> budget provides funding for an additional officer, through a COPS grant. This is the last person approved in a grant authorized several years ago.
- The <u>Fire Department</u> budget includes \$50,000 in a capital reserve toward purchase of a replacement for Engine #2 in 2002. Training programs and a capital reserve for ambulances are funded by ambulance fees which went into effect 1/1/99.
- \$102,000 is incorporated in the budget, per prior approval of Council, to be allocated toward the cost of <u>New Boston Road water</u> <u>line projects</u>, of which \$25,000 is for New Boston Road and \$77,000 for an extension to Chubbuck Rd/Magazine St. This expense will be reimbursed to the Town over the years through water hookups by developers and property owners in the New Boston Road Water Corridor.
- A new Land Purchase Reserve is established in an initial set-aside of \$17,500 (representing 5% of anticipated Current Use revenues in the year 2000) to meet land purchase needs in the future.
- An appropriation for the local share match for the State's **Back River Rd. Project** in the amount of \$200,000 is provided as a requirement of the project. An additional appropriation for the local share of **a signalized intersection at New Boston and Wallace Road** is set aside to meet project requirements.
- The <u>Public Works Department</u> budget provides \$920,000 (\$120,000 additional funding) for road reconstruction, rehabilitation, and resurfacing, continuing the trend for greater investment in road upkeep. The DPW budget also provides funding for direct purchase (\$33,250), lease agreements (\$173, 033), reserves for equipment purchases (\$107,000), and facility reserves (\$25,000).

- The year 2000 budget includes the first payment for the Landfill Closure Bond to be acquired later this year (October/November timeframe). Tipping/Hauling fees for trash hauling are increased to reflect growth in tonnage and fee increases.
- The <u>Parks and Recreation Department</u> budget funds further development of Legacy Park – with 50% of cost paid with recreation fees from developers. The project is expected to be fully completed in 2000. The budget includes \$5,000 for a Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment Study, a segment of the Master Plan. It continues a capital reserve for rehabilitation of our community pool in 2002 – with 90% of cost offset by increased concession and swimming lesson fees.
- The <u>Town Hall</u> budget includes a second installment in a facility reserve.
- The <u>Planning Board</u> budget funds professional services through fees charged to developers. \$10,000 is included for the Transportation Segment of the Master Plan.
- Last year's Assessing Budget included funds for contract service for measuring and listing, and the Planning Department budget included funds for contract service for data entry in records retention soft-ware. This year's budget converts those contract funds to a full-time employee who would spend approximately 1/3 of staff time in each of three related programs: Building Assessing, Planning, and Departments. \$10,400 is added to the Building Department Budget for use of this employee during summer months when additional staff is needed to review permits and perform field inspections.
- The <u>Town Clerk/Tax Collector</u> budget includes funding for approximately 1,000 hours of part-time staffing at the windows as the need arises during the year. This time is needed to cover for vacation time and heavy seasons of the year when motor vehicle and property tax work is greatest. Our in-house computer specialist will go from <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> to full time.
- The <u>Conservation Commission</u> budget includes \$10,000 in funds available in the Conservation Fund for use toward acquiring property, should an opportunity arise during the year which the Conservation Commission and Town Council determine appropriate.

#### FINANCE AND PERSONNEL/TAX COLLECTION DEPARTMENT Keith Hickey, Director

1999 was another year of growth for the Town. This growth has generated additional revenues, which together with conservative budgeting, has assisted in keeping the Town's portion of the tax rate stable.

Much time this year was devoted to issues relating to the "Claremont" school funding issue. Finally, in mid-November, resolution was reached on a Statewide Education Tax. Under that plan, Bedford became a recipient community, i.e. eligible to receive additional funding from the State. The additional State funding reduced the school portion of our property taxes by \$1.09 per thousand dollars of valuation. At present, some communities are disputing how the Statewide Tax is assessed. It is unclear whether there will be a change in the way the Education is funded and, if so, what impact it will have on Bedford.

The Finance Department is in the process of upgrading its financial software. Residents and property owners will notice that invoices from the Town will be on one standard form rather than on a variety of forms used in the past.

## INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S COMMUNICATION OF REPORTABLE CONDITIONS AND OTHER MATTERS

To the Members of the Town Council and Town Manager Town of Bedford Bedford, New Hampshire

In planning and performing our audit of the Town of Bedford for the year ended December 31, 1998, we considered the Town's internal control structure in order to determine the scope of our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements. Our review of these systems was not intended to provide assurance on the internal control structure and should not be relied on for that purpose.

Under the standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants, reportable conditions involve matters coming to our attention relating to significant deficiencies in the design or operation of the internal control structure that, in our judgment, could adversely affect the Town's ability to record, process, summarize, and report financial data consistent with the assertions of management in the financial statements. A material weakness is a reportable condition in which the design or operation of one or more of the internal control structure elements does not reduce to a relatively low level the risk that errors or irregularities, in amounts that would be material in relation to the financial statements being audited, may occur and not be detected within a timely period by employees in the normal course of performing their assigned functions. Our consideration of the internal control structure would not necessarily disclose all matters in the internal control structure that might constitute reportable conditions and, accordingly, would not necessarily disclose all reportable conditions that are also considered to be material weaknesses as defined above.

During the course of our review, the following condition was noted that was considered to be a material weakness as defined above:

## TAX COLLECTOR

As was cited in the previous year's audit report, the following problem still exists and has not been corrected. We did not receive cut-off lists for all the uncollected and unredeemed taxes as of December 31, 1998. The tax collector's software does not have the ability to provide a receivable list for a prior date. As each transaction is recorded, the system is updated to reflect that transaction. One receivable list was run on January 28, another on February 25, and other lists used to reconcile the receivables were run on April 1, 1999. Considerable additional audit time was expended in attempting to reconcile these lists back to December 31, 1998.

### Town of Bedford Independent Auditor's Communication of Reportable Conditions and Other Matters

At the end of the year, there was a variance of approximately \$14,000 between the tax collector's receivable balances and the general ledger. We recommend that the tax collector and the general ledger bookkeeper reconcile cash receipts and receivable balances on a monthly basis. Any discrepancies can be corrected at that time. The tax collector's system should have the ability to run a report at the end of each month that summarizes cash payments and receivable balances.

Other weaknesses or other considerations coming to our attention were generally procedural in nature and dealt with administrative or recordkeeping practices. In these instances, we made specific recommendations or provided instruction to those individuals involved during the course of our audit fieldwork.

This report is intended solely for the information and use of management and others within the administration. This restriction is not intended to limit distribution of this report, which is a matter of public record.
