Warrant for the Annual Town Meeting, March 13, 1923

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Brookfield in the (L.S.) County of Carroll in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Brookfield, on Tuesday, the thirteenth day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the ensuing year.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
3. To see what the Town will vote to pay for labor on the Highway.
4. To see what the Town will vote to raise for the extermination of the Pine Blister Rust and Gipsy Moth.
5. To see if the Town will vote to accept State aid for Highways and appropriate money for same.
6. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one hundred dollars (\$100) for Tumble Down Dick and one hundred dollars (\$100) for Tibbetts Hill, the State to raise the same.

7. To see if the town will vote to raise the sum of one thousand dollars (\$1000) a year, for two years, to build State aid road, if the State will raise the same.

8. To bring in your ballot upon the question as to whether the amendment proposed by the Convention to revise the Constitution shall be approved.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Superintendent's Report

TO THE SCHOOL BOARD OF BROOKFIELD:

GENTLEMEN:—I have the pleasure to submit my fourth annual report as superintendent of the schools of Brookfield. With this I am also sending the report of the school nurse.

This table shows that the total enrollment and average membership are in each instance one less than the preceding year. The per cent of attendance is six-tenths of one per cent lower than for that year, but is still above the average for the state. The number of instances of tardiness has fallen off about one-third. This is excellent. I appreciate the co-operation of the parents in securing regular attendance and punctuality.

All schools were in session for thirty-six weeks.

I would recommend that during the next summer some improvements be made at the Hackett school which will make the building warmer. The underpinning should be "pointed up" and shutters provided to exclude the wind from under the floor during the winter. If possible, a new floor of hard wood or southern pine should be laid. The present floor is in very poor condition.

This year for the first time since I have been in your service, there were no changes in our corps of teachers. All three of the present teachers were in charge of the same schools last year. This is most fortunate. If we are to raise the standard of our school work very much, it is absolutely necessary to retain the services of a teacher for more than one year. An experienced teacher is worth more to the District than one without experience. The work now being done in the schools is of a higher grade than at any time during the past three years.

Health work in the schools has been continued under the efficient direction of Mrs. Anna E. Clow, R. N., whose report follows.

Hot lunches have been served in the Churchill School to the great benefit, I believe, of the pupils.
