SCHOOL REPORT.

The School Board having attended to the duties of their office, respectfully submit the following report, agreeably to the statutes.

Seven schools have been maintained the past year, with a general length of twenty-seven weeks each. Through the generosity of the town there were sufficient funds to prolong each school somewhat, but your School Board deemed it best to limit the schools to three terms of nine weeks each, an arrangement which has given general satisfaction for several years past. We have endeavored to secure teachers of the very best abilities and qualifications for all of our schools, and from the painstaking interest they have manifested for their schools we can but think that they possess all the graces mentioned by the poet when he said, —

“O'er wayward childhood would'st thou hold firm rule,
And sun thee in the light of happy faces;
Love, Hope, and Patience — these must be thy graces,
And in thine own heart let them first keep school.”

Our teachers have seemed to realize that the responsibilities resting upon them are many and great, and as a rule we think have made preparation for each day's work. Men are few that can accomplish much upon the spur of the moment. The attorney that faithfully serves his client; the orator that would interest and instruct his audience, must make ample preparation. Should teachers do less? Can they expect to interest and profit those under their care without preparation for every recitation? The text-book is repulsive to the minds

of some children, and not without reason, unless clearly illustrated and explained by the teacher. To do this the teacher, as well as the scholar, must study each recitation.

Order has generally been excellent in all of our schools, and with the exception of a temporary unpleasantness in the spring term of the North Road school, "all has been calm as summer evenings be." Under these circumstances it is hardly necessary for us to say that our schools have been in a prosperous condition and that scholars generally have made good progress in all their studies the past year.

Statistics show that neglected childhood is criminal manhood. Said Caserio, at his trial for the murder of M. Carnot, the late President of France, "If I had been a better scholar, I should have been a better man." If you would have your children grow up to be men and women truly worthy of the name, we urge you to take a deep interest in school matters. We believe that more is done toward forming and fixing the mental and moral characters and habits of children during the few years they attend the public school than during all the rest of their existence. A boy that forms habits of industry, perseverance, punctuality, and promptness is likely to carry such habits with him through life.

But some one may ask, "What more can I do"? In answer we would say if you would have good schools and your children make good progress in their studies, see that your children are constant and punctual in attendance at school, and visit your schools once or twice each term. It gives us pleasure to report that during the past year more visits have been made our schools by parents and others than in any other year within the past decade. Such visits have a tendency to increase the interest and energy of both teacher and pupils. If you cannot visit your schools, manifest your interest at home by making daily inquiries of your children as to their progress, thereby keeping their minds upon their studies.

We would again remind the people of the town that the public schools are deserving of liberal expenditure of care

and money. A good education is an invaluable legacy to leave your children — better by far than golden treasures.

Ellis's United States History, a new work written in a style to make it very interesting and attractive to the pupil, has recently been introduced into our schools in place of Swinton's Condensed History, published nearly a quarter of a century ago. And such important changes have been made not only in our own country but in many parts of the world since the publication of the Geography now in use in our schools, that the question of getting a revised edition of the same work or some new one should be considered in the near future.

The flag raisings, with appropriate exercises, at the Centre and North Road schools during the spring term were witnessed by a large number of citizens, and will long be remembered by the pupils of these schools as very pleasant occasions.

During the year a new schoolhouse has been built at Gossville. The building is a commodious and attractive one, and for the first time within our remembrance, it may be said that our schoolhouses are all in good condition for schools.

Only one of our school registers — and that the Centre — contains remarks by the teacher, and we take the liberty to quote them in full: "We have tried to instruct and interest the boys and girls of this school, and think we have been successful in a degree, from their apparent interest and good attendance. During the second term there was one perfect attendant, Miss Hilliard, who tried 'to do well' all school work. Masters Knowles and Bunker, Misses Lawrence and Sherburne deserve special mention for the attention given to all suggestions made to them, and also in securing a high per cent in deportment, all of which suggests to us a desire for improvement as the years go by."

Were we to mention the names of scholars in other schools who have excelled in scholarship at closing examinations, we should mention E. Christie Yeaton, Helen E. P. Yeaton, Minot R. Yeaton, Ola I. Tripp, Charles A. Brown, Gertrude H. Greene, and Nora A. Foss as being among the number.

The number of children in town between the ages of five and fifteen years, by the selectmen's enumeration in April, 1894, is: boys, 50; girls, 42.

For length of schools, names and wages of teachers, number of scholars in each school, branches studied, etc., you are referred to a tabular statement on another page, all of which we trust may receive your careful attention and, we hope, approval.

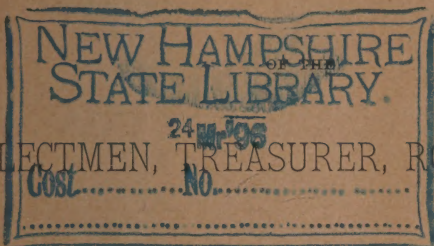
