

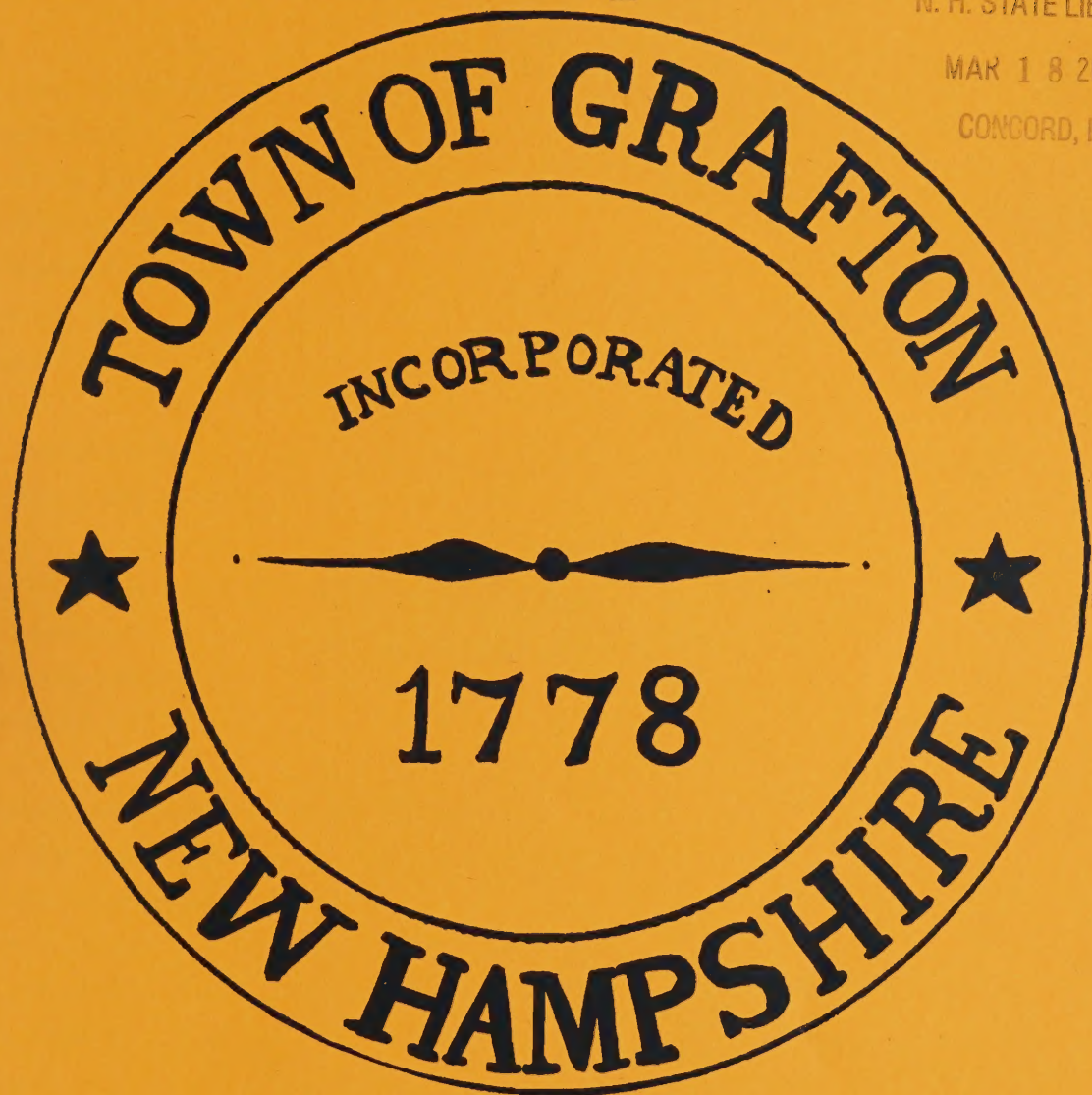

## Summary of 2007 Warrant Articles

1. All officers duly elected.
2. Passed operating budget of \$896,553.
3. Voted to raise \$30,000 to be added to the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund.
4. Voted to raise \$130,500 for the purpose of purchasing a new Fire Rescue Vehicle. \$100,500 to be withdrawn from the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund and the balance of \$30,000 to be raised by taxation.
5. Voted to raise \$40,000 to be added to the Highway Capital Reserve Fund.
6. Voted to raise \$30,000 to be added to the Bridge Capital Reserve Fund.
7. Voted to raise \$7,000 to be added to the Police Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund.
8. Voted to raise \$100,000 for the purpose of upgrading and repaving existing paved roads.
9. Voted to raise \$20,000 to be added to the New Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund.
10. Voted to withdraw \$96,000 from the New Ambulance Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of purchasing a new ambulance vehicle.
11. Voted to raise \$2,500 to be added to the Library Improvements Fund.
12. Voted to raise \$2,000 to be added to the Records Storage Vault Capital Reserve Fund.
13. Voted to raise \$3,000 to be added to the Town Hall Repairs Capital Fund.
14. Voted to raise \$1,000 to be added to the Veterans' Memorial Park Construction Capital Reserve Fund.
15. Voted to discontinue the Solid Waste Capital Reserve Fund created in 1985. And transfer said funds of \$120,013 plus interest to the municipality's general fund.
16. Voted to establish a Capital Reserve Fund for the purpose of recycling and to raise \$120,013 to be placed in said fund and to further authorize the Selectmen to act as agents to expend.
17. Voted to raise \$32,000 for the purchase and set up of a New Compactor at the Recycling Center.
18. Voted to establish a revolving fund under RSA 31:95-H (a) (II) for the purpose of purchasing equipment and/or items needed for the Recycling Center, said funds to begin this account shall come from the general fund in the amount of \$13,000 which represents the amount of money earned from recycling in 2006.
19. Voted to establish a disabled exemption which will be taken from the assessed value of a property either owned by a disabled individual or a disabled individual married to a property owner who has owned property for more than five years in the amount of \$10,000 in accordance with RSA 72:37-b.
20. Defeated to rescind the provisions of RSA 40:13, SB2, as adopted by the Town on March 19th, 1996.
21. Defeated to change the date of March Meeting to the second Tuesday in April.
22. Defeated to have the Board of Selectmen levy property taxes starting in the year 2008 on a biannual (twice a year) schedule.
23. Defeated to raise \$500 to be used as a portion of the operating budget for the Canaan Town Library.
24. Defeated to raise \$25,000 to establish a fund for the purpose of paving a portion of Kinsman Road.
25. Voted to discontinue absolutely the easterly portion of Johnson Lane.
26. Defeated to pass an ordinance known as "The Grafton United Nations Free Zone Act".
27. Voted to recognize U.S. Route 4 designated the Purple Heart Trail by the New Hampshire General Court.
28. Defeated for the Town to go on record as in support of effective actions by the President and the Congress to address the issue of climate change.
29. Voted to eliminate the two Town Auditor positions.
30. Defeated to raise \$33,150 to add a fulltime officer to the Grafton Police Department.
31. Voted to allow the collection of prepayments for property taxes under the provisions of RSA 80:52-a.

**WARRANT for the TOWN of GRAFTON  
STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE 2008**

To the inhabitants of the Town of Grafton in the County of Grafton in said State qualified to vote in Town affairs; You are hereby notified to meet at the Grafton Fire/ Ambulance Station in Grafton, New Hampshire, on Saturday, the 9<sup>th</sup> day of February next at 1:00 PM for the first session, to discuss, debate, and amend the Town budget and all Warrant Articles which are listed below (with the exception of Article #1, which elects officers) and to vote by ballot at the Grafton Fire/ Ambulance Station, Grafton, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, March 11<sup>th</sup>, 2008 on elected officials and all Warrant Articles that are listed below:

POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 8:00 AM TO 7:00 PM

1. To choose all necessary officers for the next year ensuing; including, Selectman 3 years, Tax Collector 3 years, Budget Committee 3 years, Police Chief 3 years, Trustee of the Trust Funds 3 years, Library Trustee 3 years, Supervisor of the Checklist 6 years, Cemetery Trustee 3 years, and Planning Board 3 years.

**"To choose all necessary officers for the next year ensuing; including, Selectman 3 years, Tax Collector 3 years, Budget Committee 3 years, Moderator 2 years, Police Chief 3 years, Treasurer 1 year, Trustee of the Trust Funds 3 years, Library Trustee 3 years, Supervisor of the Checklist 6 years, Cemetery Trustee 3 years, and Planning Board 3 years."**)

2. Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant, or as amended by vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein totaling \$947,731.00. Should this article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$896,553.00, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous action of the Town of Grafton, or by law, or the Governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13 X and XVI, to take the issue of a revised budget only. NOTE: This Warrant Article (operating budget) does not include special warrant articles or individual warrant articles.

(This device is to detect levels of carbon monoxide in patients suspected of having this poisoning) Recommended by the Selectmen. Recommended by Budget Committee.
- To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$ 4,144.00 for the purpose of giving the police chief a raise in salary. Recommended by the Selectmen. Recommended by the Budget Committee.

27. “To see if the Town will vote to amend Article #26 of the 1987 Annual Town Meeting, the intent being to reclassify a portion of Gifford Hill Road, now known as Wyman Road, from a Class VI highway, from the point at the intersection of Brock Hill Road and Gifford Hill Roads and running in a southeasterly direction to a point approximately 2,640 feet. Shown on Grafton Tax Map #7. The intent being to leave the long remaining portion of Wyman Road as a Class VI highway. The remaining Class VI highway portion of Wyman Road would end to where it meets Wild Meadow Road at the point approximately 700 feet southwest of Golden Valley Road as shown on Grafton Tax Maps #7 and #8. (RSA 231:22a) (RSA 39:3)” (by petition).

**(Amended at Deliberative Session on February 9<sup>th</sup>, 2008.**

**“To see if the Town will vote to amend Article #26 of the 1987 Annual Town Meeting, the intent being to reclassify a portion of Gifford Hill Road, now known as Wyman Road, from a Class VI highway, from the point at the intersection of Brock Hill Road and Gifford Hill Roads and running in a southeasterly direction to a point approximately 2,640 feet; and provided that the roadway is first improved to the satisfaction of the road agent, per town road standards, at the sole expense of the abutters, which costs shall be charged to them through betterment assessments made under NH RSA 231:28-33. Shown on Grafton Tax Map #7. The intent being to leave the long remaining portion of Wyman Road as a Class VI highway. The remaining Class VI highway portion of Wyman Road would end to where it meets Wild Meadow Road at the point approximately 700 feet southwest of Golden Valley Road as shown on Grafton Tax Maps #7 and #8. (RSA 231:22a) (RSA 39:3)” (by petition.)**

## *Selectmen's Report* 2007

Another year has passed in the town of Grafton. As the Greek philosopher Heraclites suggested, 'you can't step into the same stream twice'. The only constant in life is change. This is certainly true for Grafton. The change is multi-leveled. Some is generated by changes within the town, some generated by larger entities like the Mascoma School District, and by our federal, state and county governments.

Here in Grafton, 2007 brought twenty building notifications, fourteen approvals to construct septic systems and fourteen approvals to operate those systems. In 2007 there have been twenty one new current use applications approved. Some other changes include:

In 2007 the NH Bureau of Land and Tax Appeals approved the results of the *statistical update* that they ordered in 2006. The Town continues to work with Brett Purvis & Associates to complete yearly new construction, abatement applications and a 33% re-rate and re-measure of all properties. In 2007 all properties located on tax maps 1 – 11 were re-measured and re-rated. In 2008 another 33% starting with tax map 12 and moving in ascending order will be completed. The town's goal is to be fair and equitable. A representative from the Bret Purvis & Associates is available for meetings and reviews once a month. Please call the office for an appointment.

The Transfer Station always has changes. Our recycling efforts have seen tangible results. New concrete pads have been placed under the construction debris and the glass containers. In addition a new stairway leads users to safely dispose of their glass. These items were paid for out of recycling proceeds. In 2008 new roofs will be constructed over these containers to keep the water out, thus reducing the tonnage the town pays to remove them. A new set of steps for the paper will be built. The long awaited compactor will be purchased and installed with the passage of Article 14 on March 11<sup>th</sup>. The board encourages all to recycle.

Work on our roads and highway continues. In March the town purchased and added a 2001 Freightliner to the heavy truck fleet. This was done because the fleet of vehicles has become old. Our newest vehicle is a 1996 and the oldest is a 1984. In this purchase the board had to weigh the downside of a used vehicle against the upside of a newer vehicle that had significant safety improvements. The 2001 Freightliner was proudly displayed in the Independence Day parade. The board is currently weighing options on the purchase of a new 2008 vehicle.

With the April northeaster the tone was set for our highway department in 2007. The damage was extensive. The repairs to make the roads passable were made. The budget was stressed. Fortunately later in the year the town received a grant from FEMA for \$580,000 for approximately twenty-one projects in different locations around town. This amount far exceeded what the town had initially expended. With the large grant the town's budget was reimbursed and further road repairs were made. The work on these FEMA projects is ongoing in 2008. We received this grant due to the efforts of Fred Duefield and we thank Fred for his hard work.

The road re-paving project was continued in 2007. The portion of Slab City Road that had been reclaimed in 2006 is now paved. In 2008 The Select board has reduced the amount on the warrant from \$100,000 to \$50,000 for road paving projects. Our roads are a valuable asset. We feel it is imperative that we protect our investment by continuing this work. We ask you to support Article 6.

RSA 51:2 states that the lines between the towns be perambulated and the marks and bounds made new every seven years. In compliance with this RSA the line between Grafton and Enfield was walked in 2007 for the first time since 1957. The process took place over four days. It was noted by the perambulators that the weather was warm and the deerflies thick. It was observed that the lines that divide our towns are difficult to traverse and the markers are not always clearly visible.

In 2007 a new Tax Collector was appointed. After many years former tax collector, Donna Dugan, has stepped aside. The Select board wishes to thank Donna for her years of service. Janet Duefield was appointed in March 2007. New hours have been posted for her office, which is located in our municipal building. Currently all tax records are being brought into electronic format. This will make our record keeping more accurate and will bring us into compliance with Governmental Accounting Standards Board practices. The transfer has proven to be a tedious process. The town has engaged Vadar Systems, Inc. to work with Janet to complete this task.

In spite of what may have been reported by the elected town auditors, the town budget was NOT overspent in 2004, 2005, 2006, 2007, or anytime in recent memory. A meeting was held on June 26, 2007 with the Select board, the elected auditors and the State Department of Revenue Administration officer responsible for Grafton. During the meeting Bob Anderson of the DRA explained how our auditor's calculations of FICA payments were incorrect, that the expenditures made were within the budget and that the subsequent report to the state was premature. The Select board continues to work with the CPA firm of Mason & Rich for professional advice and auditing services.

The Select board takes seriously its role in the financial aspect of the town. Each year the board reviews the budget submitted by the department heads as well as the budgets for which we are responsible ( i.e. Executive, General Government Buildings). After that the budget is submitted to the budget committee for their scrutiny. This year the entire Select board attended all the Budget Committee meetings to be sure there was no mis- communications regarding our involvement in this important process.

The Board keeps a watchful eye on expenditures during the year. The object is to keep our costs low and stay within the voter approved budget. Sometimes things unforeseen and beyond our control occur. Some departments may go over budget When this happens the Board can compensate by not spending all the allocations from other departments. This is how the overall budget is maintained.

The Select board wishes to thank all involved in the volunteerism that makes our services work. When there is a fire department call or an ambulance call those who respond are volunteers. They are not paid. They are there because they want to help the community. They are committed. We thank them and stand behind them.

The Select board meets on the first and third Wednesdays of each month. Meetings start at 7:00 p.m. You are welcome to join us. Our office is open Monday- Thursday 8:30 a.m. through 3:00 p.m. We look forward to seeing you.

## Grafton Planning Board Report

To begin, I would like to express my appreciation to the members of the Board - Catherine Mulholland, Sam Vose, Dotty Campbell, and Brian Fellers, our secretary, as well as the alternates - Brad Grange, Maureen O'Reilly, and Bob Hull. I would also like to thank Jon Thompson for his years of service on the Board, during which he served as chair and helped to steer the Board through some rocky times.

It has been a busy year for the Board. We received 9 driveway applications, approved four voluntary mergers, one annexation and one significant lot line adjustment. Most importantly, the Board reviewed six completed subdivision plans, totaling 23 subdivided lots. See the table below for a comparison of the past few years.

The Board has also begun work on revising the subdivision regulations. The first task has been to update all statutory and regulatory references so that the regulations accurately reference current RSA designations. These references have not been updated since the regulations were last updated in 1977, so there are several areas where updates were needed. The Board hopes to continue with substantive changes where necessary to reflect current needs of the town, while remaining consistent with the requirements of the master plan.

The Planning Board meets the first and third Thursdays of every month, and encourages interested residents of the town to attend.

## *Grafton Volunteer Ambulance Report – 2007*

March 23, 2007 was an exciting day for the department as our long-anticipated, new ambulance rolled into the station. As our old one rolled out of town that very same day, we gave it a heartfelt goodbye, thankful for its fourteen years of steadfast service to the people of Grafton. Thanks to everyone's cooperation, the new ambulance was ready for service pronto with the required medical equipment, radio installation, registration, and licensing by the State. The long day was concluded with Reverend Tom Warner offering a prayer of safety for the EMT's and for the well-being of our imminent patients. We sincerely thank the town for your support in acquiring the new ambulance.

This past year seemed to have been brimming with training and testing. Most members on the department were due for EMT recertification for both the State and National Registry. This included a 48-hour blitz of comprehensive training as well as hands-on testing with the State. We have also been required to test on NH patient protocols, National Incident Management, and nine different "transition modules" (e.g. glucometer, advanced spinal assessment, cardiac monitoring, etc.). Along with in-house training and joint trainings with Canaan and Danbury, we attended programs hosted by Littleton Hospital, DHMC, Dartmouth Air Response Team, and New London Hospital. We participated in the health fair hosted by the Mascoma Health Initiative—a successful event that was both informative and fun. A grant from Alice Peck Day Hospital was applied for and approved, including \$1075 earmarked toward training and a \$1000 worth of equipment for 2008. A million hugs to the great folks at APD!

During 2007 we responded to 135 calls, up from 114 in 2006. As always, we offer our thanks to all that assist us on these 9-1-1 calls, including the highway, police, and fire departments. Our EMS team roster remains strong, though we are always on the lookout for new members who can make a volunteer commitment. We are pleased to report that two of our EMT's, Ali Kenyon and Kathy Lund, are currently enrolled in Intermediate level EMT classes. We thank them for the additional volunteer time and energy this takes. Our officers for 2008 are: Captain: Sandi Pierson, First Lieutenant/Training Officer: John Babiarz, Second Lieutenant/Supply Officer: Dotti Ernst, and Secretary: Lex Berezny.

Finally, a longstanding member of the ambulance department has decided to bring her EMS service to the town to a close. Jane Kenyon has served the town as an EMT for 25 years, the last eight as captain of the squad. The volunteer hours she has given to the town during this quarter of a century of service is truly incalculable. Jane, on behalf of all of the members on the squad, as well as the countless community members you cared for and comforted, we offer you our admiration and gratitude for a job well done. You have championed the volunteer spirit and Grafton is a better place because of it.

## Grafton Ladies Auxiliary 2007

The Grafton Ladies Auxiliary is a private, self sufficient organization whose purpose is to support the Volunteer Fire and Ambulance Services of Grafton. That support comes in different forms such as purchasing much needed supplies and equipment, providing food, hot and cold drinks at the fire scenes, sponsoring a yearly Fire Warden's supper for other New Hampshire Fire Wardens, the yearly Firemen's Supper (with the volunteer firemen helping serve the food) and supplying refreshments at various fire and ambulance training sessions.

Meetings are held the first Monday of each month April through November.

Members were busy with events which included the spring Fire Warden's supper in April, a rummage and bake sale, the annual Firemen's Supper, the annual Christmas Party for members of the Ladies Auxiliary, Fire Department and Ambulance Squad and also providing refreshments at fire scenes and training sessions.

The taxpayers and residents of Grafton were very generous again this year. The Ladies send out solicitation letters each year requesting monetary donations for the Annual Firemen's Supper and this year received approximately \$1250 in donations, not including the monies taken in at the door of the supper. We realize that in our present economic state and at this time of year it is difficult for many and we cannot thank you all enough for your generosity. We appreciate the support the townspeople have always shown towards the Fire Department. Thank you, too, for those who donated food and supplies for this event. These monies assist in the purchases made throughout the year.

Some of this year's purchases included a thermal imaging camera which cost approximately \$6,791 which will aid the firefighters in locating the source of the fire and possibly any occupants trapped inside a building.

The local telephone directory was published this year. This project is taken on by the Ladies Auxiliary, usually every 2 years, and this year's edition is dedicated to Don Gallup. Don was a dedicated firefighter and Deputy Chief for many years. Don was instrumental in the construction of the new fire station. He spent countless hours sheet rocking, building and maintaining the new building. The Fire Department and the Town felt a great loss when Don passed away in April. The directories are available for purchase from members of the Auxiliary, at the Town Office, the Library, the Town Clerk's Office, and the Grafton Country Store. The cost is \$2.00 per directory.

New members are always welcome--there needs be no direct fire or ambulance affiliation. If you would like to help in any way, come join us!

## TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT 2007

After a little more than one year as Grafton's tax collector, I have concluded that the job of managing the property tax accounts is highly underrated. It is clear that a small community such as ours cannot afford to pay someone to perform his or her duties as collector of taxes in accordance with the actual number of hours spent. The best one can do is to learn the process including New Hampshire property tax collection law, and take it one transaction at a time. I appreciate your assistance and patience this year while I have endured the learning curve. I also wish to thank Cathy Coutu, deputy tax collector, for her help and especially for her sense of humor.

This past year has been spent learning a variety of new things. Three workshops were offered in March and April by the Department of Revenue Administration and taught by the New Hampshire Tax Collectors Association. I attended all three and found them to be very helpful in understanding the process. I also attended the first week of training to become a Certified Tax Collector. It takes three years to become certified. I also have tax collectors from the entire state at my disposal to answer my questions. Both the NHTCA and the DRA have been instrumental to me in providing Grafton taxpayers with solid, sound and immediate answers to your questions. In addition, regular office hours were established to give property owners opportunity to come in to make payments or obtain information. Currently office hours are 6-8 pm Thursday evenings and 9 am to 12 noon on the last Saturday of each month. I can also be available by appointment. You may leave a message at 523-8395. I work full-time at Dartmouth, so I will not be able to return your call until after 4 pm during the work week. I always return calls – you can help me provide prompt, accurate service by providing your name, map and lot number of the property you are calling about, and a telephone number where you can be reached.

Another change is the Grafton County Register of Deeds is now online. We can research the site without having to travel the long distance to North Haverhill. This is substantial in cost savings of time and mileage.

We are in the process of updating our tax collection software – I learned - and many of you did also last spring, that many payments were not posted in the computer, and so it seemed as though your taxes were not paid. Your patience and helpfulness in this procedure were greatly appreciated. We hope to have the system completely updated before the time Notices of Arrearage are mailed out around April 4, 2008 per RSA 76:11-b. This notice is required to be mailed ninety days after the 2007 tax due date. It includes all outstanding balances and unpaid tax liens. If you are behind, if you can make regular payments it will avoid increasing interest which accrues daily.

2008 marks the first year that the Town will be billing for taxes twice – the first will be in late May to early June, and the second bill in late fall. The purpose is to give the Town of Grafton a consistent cash flow. When the town runs out of money, it must borrow from the bank, which costs heavily in interest. By billing semi-annually, we hope to prevent this added expense. We all will benefit from this change. The first billing is based on property assessment times half the 2007 tax rate (i.e. half of \$19.42 or \$9.71). The second billing is determined by the new tax rate times the assessment, then subtracting the first payment, leaving the new balance due. Unpaid taxes for 2008 will be liened in 2009.

Hopefully this has explained what has taken place this past year. If you have questions, please feel free to be in touch. We hope to have established tax collector's office space this year. The past year has been very challenging, however I have found it to be fulfilling and rewarding in many ways. I look forward to getting into our space and the continuous improvement of the tax records through computer technology. I also anticipate the opportunity to grow from both the State and the Tax Collector's Association.

## Grafton Recycling Center Report 2007

Since the Town of Grafton adopted mandatory recycling, we have come a long way. This year we were able to start a revolving account with the recycling money, under the direction of the Selectmen, with checks written by the Treasurer.

Only about 60% of the people in Grafton recycle. It would be nice if the other 40% joined in. From April 4<sup>th</sup>, 2007 through December 31<sup>st</sup>, 2007 the Town received approximately \$13,600 through recycling. This year the recycling money paid for a concrete pad for the new compactor and for the renovations on the office building.

A concrete pad was put in for the glass container and one for the demolition container. Plans are to construct roofs over both come spring, to keep the winter weather out of the containers, thus saving tax dollars. A small concrete ramp was also built to enable the forklift to put the bales into the truck body and steps were made to the present glass container.

Some minor repairs were made to the fork lift; a few repairs still need to be done in the spring. This year we would like to purchase a backhoe/loader from the recycling money. This will enable us to keep our containers packed down. Many thanks to the Highway Department for crushing our containers down this past year.

## ***TRUSTEES OF THE TRUST FUNDS***

In 2007 the Town received \$1707.00 in interest income from the three Cemetery Trust funds for care of cemeteries and \$73.78 in interest from the Ruth Leonard and Barney Flanders Trusts for the purchase of books for the Town Library.

Disbursements from the Kilton Trust :

\$1500 for Visiting Nurse Association of New Hampshire and Vermont  
\$ 390 for Medical Expense Reimbursement to Grafton residents  
\$20 Safety Deposit Box annual rental

In view of the reduced income from the Kilton Trust, the Trustees have decided to limit payout to individuals for medical reimbursement to no more than a total of \$1500 a year in order to preserve capital while continuing to fulfill the purpose of the Trust.

According to Warrant Article #16 in the 1007 Town Report, the Solid Waste Capital Reserve Fund was to have been transferred to a new Recycling Capital Reserve Fund. The Trustees made this transfer before discovering that the Department of Revenue Administration (DRA) had disallowed the article as it was omitted from the MS 7 form in the proposed budget for 2007. However, after withdrawals of \$1263.00 to meet obligations for the Transfer Station, \$118,750.00 was withdrawn and placed in the General Fund pending resubmission of a new Article on the 2008 Town Warrant (see article # ). In the meantime the new Fund has earned \$2465.86 in interest. The transfer of \$118,750 from the General Fund if approved by voters this year, will be added the already existing Recycling Capital Reserve Fund.

In our report last year we noted that interest from the Cemetery and Library Trust Funds would be paid directly to the Town as revenue for 2007. The information we received at that time from the Charitable Trust Division of the Department of Justice was incorrect. In 2008 the interest income from the combined years 2006 and 2007 will be paid to the Cemetery and Library Trustees respectively in the amounts of \$3094.90 and \$\$154.38.

Before starting this report I would like to thank all current members of the highway department, Razor Hill Excavation, Frank's Auto and Excavation Services, Sean Frost, Dave Tupper, Jr., and anyone I missed for their hard work and dedication to the department and Town of Grafton for the April storm disaster, and the rest of the year 2007.

Again, as in May 2006, we found ourselves involved in a weather-related disaster. It began on April 17<sup>th</sup> with the arrival of a storm that caused considerable damage to 18 different named roads in Grafton. In May 2006, only 4 of Grafton's roads were affected by the Mother's Day storm, and we did receive FEMA money for repair work.

Because Grafton and other surrounding communities have been affected over the years by major storm events and received assistance from FEMA (Federal Emergency Management Agency), in this year's report I will explain how funding is achieved and received from FEMA and the State of New Hampshire.

First, the state must withstand 1.5 million dollars in state-wide damage. If that amount in damage is not determined through a PDA. If the 1.5 million dollars in damage has not been determined through a PDA (preliminary damage assessment) report completed by each community affected, FEMA will not cover any public assistance to the state of local communities. It is up to the communities to repair the road damage their own funds. For instance, the April storm a few years ago had less than \$50,000 in road damage in Grafton. Total damage around the state did not add up to 1.5 million dollars, so no public assistance was received.

Once the declaration is determined and approved through a request from the governor to the President, there is a kick-off meeting in each county to apply for public assistance, and meet all FEMA members involved in helping the town to receive public assistance. From that meeting date the community has 90 days to complete forms for work completed, and work to be completed to put damaged roads and bridges back in pre-condition before the storm began. Records are kept including hours worked, equipment and hours worked, material used during and after the storm, and what contractors were used. Each community is assigned a public assistance coordinator to assist in damage assessment and funding estimates determined by cost codes set by federal government standards. The coordinator will review and measure each site to determine how much it will cost to repair and reimburse the town for each road damaged area. A project worksheet (PW) is completed and signed by both the FEMA representative, and the administrator (road agent). Grafton has twenty-one project worksheets for the April 2007 disaster.

Each community has eighteen months from the disaster declaration date to complete the projects once funding is approved, FEMA contributes 75%, and the town contributes 12.5%. The State of New Hampshire Legislature will vote on, and more than likely approve 12.5% of the non-federal match share which each community will receive once all projects are signed off as completed. FEMA approved the 12.5% funding for the Mother's Day flood of 2006 and the April storm of 2007.

FEMA requires that you repair with the funds received, the measured site location determined on each project worksheet. If you complete the damaged locations and have funds left over from that project, you are not required to return the remaining funds to the government. The remaining funds may be used for continued repair work, either on the road already repaired (i.e. the improved ditch line and culvert replacement for better draining on Bullock's Crossing), or other roads in town that need attention. Also the town may use the remaining funds from each completed PW for the "betterment of the community." Some of these funds were used for the newly paved parking lot and landscaping at the town clerk's office and Historical Society building.

The highway department will resume working on remaining projects as soon as weather permits. I believe all projects will be completed before the 18-month deadline arrives. Of course, there is always the possibility of more storms. The Mother's Day disaster of May 2006 projects have been completed and all funds received.

We need to recognize and thank Mike Murray who was the town's public assistance coordinator from FEMA. Mike determined how much public assistance would come to Grafton for the April 2007 storm. Mike and I spent many days including weekends traveling to, and assessing damaged sites, plus reviewing paperwork and photographs to determine how much funding would be appropriated for each of the 21 damaged sites.

In closing, again as last year, our fleet of trucks and heavy equipment are aging with each passing year. When you come to the warrant article that asks for funds for the highway fund, please vote yes so we can replace trucks and heavy equipment as money becomes available – and please slow down when entering our work zones.

We also like to thank the Grafton Ladies Auxiliary for their hard work in fund raising that resulted in the donation of an IR (Infrared Imaging) Camera. The IR can sense and display thermal image of a fire scene or assist in night time searches and rescue missions. This expensive piece of will allow us to effectively fight chimney fires with the least amount of structural and water damage to the home. We also like to thank the Mascoma Foundation for their Grant to purchase two Auto-Crib devices. The Auto-Crib device allows us to quickly and safely stabilize motor vehicle for patient extraction.

2007 the volunteers under took a project to build the antenna tower. This tower will be used for the EOC (Emergency Operation Center) and communications within the radio dead spots in Grafton. Land clearing, conduit trenching and initial tower erection has taken place all with volunteer labor. Due to weather, procurement and scheduling conflicts the tower won't be in operation until late spring 2008.

The Mascoma Valley Health Initiative (MVHI) is a nonprofit public health organization and NH Public Health Network site representing the five towns of Canaan, Dorchester, Enfield, Grafton and Orange. Our mission is to maintain and improve the health and well being of residents of these five communities through public health programs and education. In 2007, MVHI received program and operating support from state grants and contracts, foundation grants, town appropriations and donations from the community.

### **2007 Community Benefits Highlights:**

- Our **Public Health Fair** (held in September) was a big success – over 35 local and regional organizations & businesses were on hand to provide public health materials and information for an estimated 400 attendees. *Approximately 9% of those attending the 2007 Public Health Fair were from Grafton.*
- We published three issues of our **written newsletter**, which is delivered to all households in the Mascoma Valley and includes seasonal health and safety tips, along with information about our organization, current programs and upcoming events.
- MVHI worked to bring **Flu Shot Clinics** to the Mascoma Valley Regional High School, which allowed 175 people to receive a free flu vaccination. These November flu shot clinics also served as a drill to test the Mascoma Valley Point of Dispensing (POD) plan.
- We continued our leadership role in **coordinating Regional Pandemic Planning for NH State Region 4**, which includes the five Mascoma Valley towns and eight others in both Grafton and Sullivan Counties. In addition to writing and revising the Regional Plan, MVHI has collaborated with each of the five towns in writing their Local Emergency Operation Plans, as well as the Mascoma Valley POD Plan. Presentations about the regional emergency planning and preparedness work were offered to all towns. MVHI also planned and facilitated several other exercises to test the response plan, including a Regional Tabletop in May and a Regional Functional Exercise in December.
- MVHI works in the community to assist municipalities, businesses and organizations **build local public health emergency response capacity**. That technical assistance for emergency preparedness efforts included facilitating a Continuity of Operations Planning forum for businesses, leading two “Volunteering in a POD” trainings with local EMS providers and Lions Club members, and providing one-on-one support as requested.
- The **Mascoma Valley Tobacco Coalition** coordinates efforts for tobacco prevention & cessation in the region. Activities for the year included completing compliance checks in local stores and restaurants, hosting a Great American Smoke Out poster contest (receiving 147 entries from our Mascoma Valley Elementary and Middle Schools), leading classroom discussions for 4th-7th graders regarding deceptive tobacco advertising practices, and planning a new monthly smoking cessation support group with the Good Neighbor Mascoma Clinic.
- With funding from an Endowment for Health planning grant, MVHI is exploring the problem of Geographic Barriers to Health Care Access. We’ve held focus groups, a community forum, and have prepared reports on regional transportation needs and primary care needs (which you can find at our web site). We continue to consider best practices to **help make it easier for people here to access the health care they need**. MVHI works with the Good Neighbor Mascoma Clinic to promote that evening clinic option in Canaan. We can also help family’s complete applications for the NH Healthy Kids program.
- We **collaborate with many additional local, regional and state agencies and organizations to assess and address community health needs**. This includes projects related to: Oral Health, Alcohol and other Substances, Nutrition and Physical Activity and more. MVHI participates in the Bi-State Coalition for Community Health Improvement.
