Report of the School Board.

To the citizens of the town of Hebron. The school board herewith submit their report for the year ending March 1, 1891:

The number of schools supported by the town district are the same as last year, viz.: the East Hebron school and the village. We have sent one scholar to Bridgewater and received one from Plymouth.

Both terms of the East Hebron school were taught by Miss Mary A. Lorden, of Lebanon, N. H. This was Miss Lorden's first attempt at teaching and proved a success. Her examination at the close of the summer term of nine weeks showed that both teacher and scholars had improved their time. The order was excellent, and we were so well pleased with the school that we secured Miss Lorden for the fall term of twelve weeks and she fully maintained her former good record, as the closing examination showed.

Number of visitors first term, 39; second term, 7. Roll of Honor: First term, Lilla M. Nutting, Nellie Maud Merrill. Second term, Roy M. Smith.

Both terms of the village school were taught by Miss Celia A. Jewell, of this town. Miss Jewell is so well and favorably known as a teacher, that all we need say is, she fully sustained her former record. Literary exercises at the close of both terms were very interesting and listened to by a large number of the parents and friends of the pupils.

GENERAL REMARKS.

In reviewing the work of the past year we feel it will compare favorably with any preceding year.

Our schools are, to a great extent, what teachers make them. Yet the teacher is not alone in this matter; they need, and should have, the full co-operation of parents, without which no school or schools can ever prove a success.

One of the most essential of all things should be prompt and regular attendance, and until parents and guardians will aid teachers in securing said attendance they cannot make their schools as effective as they otherwise would be. Absentees are among the worst of evils with which teachers have to contend. We hope in future this complaint will be remedied.

Thoroughness of work is another requisite teachers should demand and enforce. When combined with order, which is "Heaven's First Law," results will follow that will end in having a foundation laid for more successful schools.

Our educational facilities are such there should be no apology for any child, however humble, not to be able to master what is well known as "the three R's, Reading, 'Riting and 'Rithmetic."

The school buildings and furnishings are in good repair. Some needed improvements in the school-house surroundings we would recommend; one in particular, that of grading up in front of the village school-house, which will prevent an excess

of mud and water, that now arises in wet weather, much to the discomfort of teacher and scholars.

This closes our first year of being supplied with free textbooks. We think it has met with approval by the teachers, although it created extra care and work for them. This was more than balanced by the benefit to all pupils in having a uniform and sufficient supply of free books.

Our thanks are extended to the citizens of the town for their liberality in furuishing sufficient funds for all our needed wants and to parents and scholars for their general good-will and courtesy.
