

The foregoing bills have all been paid by orders given on Treasurer of school district.

We have estimated that the average cost of schools in town, wood included, has been \$39 00 a week.

We think that we absolutely need more money for school purposes; and that if the town would see fit to raise more money for said purpose than what they are obliged to raise by law, and said money be judiciously managed, the results would be most beneficial.

Paid for school books for use in public schools of Jackson, 1895, expressage and cost of money orders included, \$96 33.

Have received for school books sold \$1 05 and the same has

been paid to town Treasurer.

#### REPORT OF SCHOOLS.

The summer term in No. 1 was begun by F. Oakman, but he was expelled after six days by the Board for failing in his duties as a teacher. The remaining seven weeks were taught by John E. Mason of Bates College, the scholars doing fairly good work under his tuition.

The fall and winter terms were taught by Chas. M. Stanley of Hiram, Me., and was a complete success. He has excellent methods and is a conscientious worker. This school should have been three weeks longer but Mr Stanley was obliged to return to college, and the Board thought it would be wiser and more satisfactory to lengthen the coming spring term by that much than to get a new teacher for so short a time.

We hope we may secure Mr Stanley's services for another year.

Miss Blanche Wiggin taught both terms in No. 2, and did good work, but by having to go back over work which should have been accomplished the previous year the pupils could not make as good advancement as they could otherwise have done.

The summer term in No. 3 was taught by Edith Fraine of Skowhegan. Me., a graduate of Skowhegan High School. The scholars who tried to learn made good progress.

The winter term was taught by John E. Mason. Most of the scholars did excellent work.

Both terms in No. 4 were taught by Josie A. Mansfield. The first term gave good satisfaction to the member who had charge of the school, but the second term did not prove so good as he expected.

The summer term in No. 5 was taught by Mrs. N. Maud Fernald and was very successful, both teacher and scholars doing good work.

The second term was taught by Miss Henrietta S. Brickett of No. Chatham, N. H. This was her first attempt at teaching and she tried very hard to please both Board and scholars and she succeeded admirably. We think she possesses the qualities necessary to make a good teacher. The scholars also seemed interested and did their work in a thorough manner.

There was but one term in No. 6 which was trught by Miss A. Mabel Hosmer of No. Conway, N. H. The scholars made good advancement, and seemed to understand their work. Miss Hosmer seems to take a keen interest in her school, and is a very successful and conscientious worker.

It is hard to do best work with so small an enrollment as some of our schools have, that spirit of competition is lacking which seems so necessary to bring out a pupil's best efforts.

We intended to give a complete inventory of school books owned by the town. But are not able to do so, having failed to secure an inventory of books in No. 1, & 4,

We think if the town would have a repository made in each school house in which to keep school books when not in use they would receive better care, and the scholars will be more thoughtful when they find the town cares for its property.

We would like to say before closing that whatever disinterestedness manifested by the scolars is due mainly to irregular attendance. Pupils soon lose interest in studies which are continually being broken in upon, and it also makes it harder for the teacher, Parents should, for the welfare of their children, insist upon a more regular and punctual attendance.

We told the scholars we would report the names of all those occuring upon the Roll of Perfect Attendance throughout the year. They are as follows: In No. 2, Nina Leonard, No. 3, Blanche L. C. Meserve, Claude P. Meserve, No. 5, Leona Dalloff, Edith Dalloff, No. 6, Blanche Hayes.
