TOWN WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Lyndeborough in the County of Hillsborough in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Lyndeborough on Tuesday, the 8th day of March, next at seven-thirty of the clock in the evening, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.

3. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen and the Town Treasurer to borrow sums of money not exceeding \$30,000.00 in anticipation of the collection of taxes for the current municipal year, and to issue in the name and on the credit of the Town, negotiable notes therefor, said notes to be paid in the current municipal year from taxes collected during the current municipal year.

4. To hear reports of all committees or take any votes relative thereto.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of not exceeding \$7,500.00 for the purpose of making improvements of the following Class V road within the Town under T.R.A. accelerated program – beginning at the Corner at the home of Charles O'Hara over Cram Hill to the Wilton road – such sum to be raised through the issuance of bonds or notes under and in compliance with the provisions of Chapter 241 New Hampshire Revised Statutes Annotated and to authorize the Selectmen to determine the date

and place of payment of such bonds or notes and to determine the rate of interest thereon and to take such other steps as may be necessary to negotiate such bonds or notes as shall be to the best interests of the Town of Lyndeborough, or take any action relative thereto.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the purchase of a York Road Rake for the Highway Department or take any vote relative thereto.

7. To see if the Town wishes to take any action pertaining to the Chief of the Lyndeborough Fire Department.

A. That the Fire Chief be elected with all other necessary Town Officers at the next Town meeting or take any action relative thereto.

B. That the Fire Chief be appointed by the Selectmen for the year ensuing or take any action relative thereto.

8. To see if the Town will vote to accept the budget as prepared by the Budget Committee or make any alterations thereto.

9. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

Fire Prevention is Everybody's Business

The year 1959 was fortunate from a forest fire standpoint. New Hampshire had the best record in the nation. Fewer acres were burned, suppression costs were substantially reduced and damage to woodlands held to a minimum. The record resulted from a combination of favorable weather conditions, an alert warden service and a cooperating public.

Yet, despite all this, there still persists a disturbing note.

58%, or 6 out of every 10 fires in 1959 were caused by careless smokers and debris burners.

10%, or 1 out of every 9 fires was caused by children.

Careless, indifferent, thoughtless and independent minded individuals and failure of parents to properly supervise children and keep matches out of their reach, annually cause these unnecessary fires which cost large sums to extinguish and cause extensive damage. The elimination of these three causes of fires would radically change this picture. The rules are simple —

1. Before burning, secure a permit from your local forest fire warden — the law requires it.

2. Be sure to properly supervise your burning.

3. Make certain your fire is DEAD OUT before leaving it.

4. Don't throw lighted matches, cigars and cigarettes from moving vehicles — use your ash tray.

5. Don't burn at home. Use your town dump and save yourself much possible difficulty, both personal and financial.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Lyndeborough School in said district on the second day of March 1960, at 7:30 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To the School Board and Citizens of Lyndeborough:

I respectfully submit my third annual report as your Superintendent of Schools.

Staff and Instruction

School opened this fall with the same basic staff as last year. Mrs. Howard Peters accepted the position as Principal and teacher of grades five and six upon a request from Mrs. Herrick to be relieved from such duties. Mrs. Herrick continues as teacher of grades three and four and Mrs. Alice Smith continues in grades one and two. Due to the action taken at the last School District meeting, an assisting teacher was hired at the beginning of the year to aid and assist in instruction in fundamental areas, and to assist early in the year with instruction at the second grade level. Mrs. Marion P. Wilcox of Amherst, New Hampshire, a teacher of primary grades for many years in New Jersey, was hired for this position and continued to fill this need satisfactorily until the first of December when she left to assume a full time teaching position in a nearby school. Miss Joan Buckley, a graduate of Bridgewater State Teachers College in Bridgewater, Massachusetts, was then hired to fill this position which she has done very capably. These assisting teachers have helped measurably with youngsters who for one reason or another have experienced difficulties in fundamental areas and a marked improvement in pupil attitude and quality of work has been definitely evident.

Mrs. Catherine Edwards of Wilton was hired to fill a vacancy which existed when Miss Sybil Beatham, the School Nurse for many years, retired from school nursing work. Dr. Sheris continues to perform duties as School Physician and Mr. Harry Holt continues as School Custodian. Mrs. Barbara Shinn again this year effectively is conducting the School Lunch Program. The instrumental music program continues for an addi-

ional year under the guiding hand of Mr. Edward Hamilton, and excellent progress has been made through the year. It is expected that culminating activities of this program will be evidenced by the youngsters from the Lyndeborough School participating in concerts and in Memorial Day services with the Wilton School Band.

During this past school year all school districts throughout the country have become affected by National Legislation which was passed September 5, 1958 by the Congress of the United States. This act, the National Defense Education Act, made available to educational institutions throughout the country some billion dollars to strengthen educational effort. By the mere title of this Act, Congress shows awareness that the very defense of this country hinges upon the educational and intellectual level of its citizenry and is willing to spend such an amount of money for strengthening education in the United States. The most important title of this Act so far as the town of Lyndeborough is concerned, is Title Three, which provides money to strengthen education beyond the usual effort of a community in the areas of Math, Science and Foreign Languages. Funds made available by the National Defense Act are on a matching basis, each dollar that is expended to strengthen education is matched by a dollar of Federal funds. Lyndeborough's share in this huge allotment of money amounts to some \$150. each year for a period of three years. The School Board has already voted to expend money made available for the purchase of a portable Science Laboratory Bench and related equipment necessary for adequately implementing instruction in Science in grades one through six. Additional money is being utilized to pay some of the costs of the new television set which is, at this time, within the school plant, primarily through the efforts of the P.T.A. Money for the further strengthening of instruction will be provided in the next two years under the present Act and it is

expected that upon termination of the time limit of the current Act, additional legislation will be passed.

As has been noted above, just recently a television set was purchased for use within the school and money was provided to join the New Hampshire educational television outlet in Durham. The teachers are quickly utilizing the offerings of this television station to supplement instruction in the areas of Literature, Science and Social Studies and it is hoped that even the Conversational French Program will, at sometime in the future, be utilized for the benefit of the children of the community.

Building and Grounds

With the exception of the roof of the original structure, the building and grounds are in generally good condition. During the Fall, in spite of the work which was done on the roof, additional leakage took place in areas that had previously not shown any evidences of leaking. In the early winter a situation developed which caused considerable confusion and consternation within the school but which finally was rectified to the satisfaction of all concerned. The roof drain in the original part of the structure developed a stoppage which resulted in leakage from the drainpipes going down within the building and for several days water was in the hallway of the building. Efforts to open the stoppage by means of a snake and even a power driven electric eel were useless. It was finally decided to dig in the floor area where the drain entered the sub-floor and thereby find the source of the difficulty. It proved that several blocks of wood had collected at an elbow in the pipe and this was the source of the stoppage. It was felt that probably this wood had been within the drain-pipe since the new construction and was perhaps a source of some of the difficulty with leakage through the original roof. From the time of the clearance of the stoppage to date, the roof situation has been markedly improved, very slight leakage having developed. The

reason for this perhaps might be due to a condition other than that of collection of water on the roof.

Towards the end of last year, additional book and paper storage space was provided above the coat racks in the hallway of the new building. This proved such a satisfactory arrangement that plans within the present budget call for the construction of an additional space over the other set of coat hooks in this hall area.

It seems important to note that the ground drain that was installed in the area adjacent to the new exit has worked with considerable satisfaction during the previous winter and up to this point in the present winter season. Some care must be taken in making sure that freezing does not take place in vertical sections of the pipe, but except for this difficulty this situation seems to be working out very satisfactorily.

Special Articles

Article 9 again gives the School District the opportunity to provide funds for the hiring of an assisting teacher in the school to help children who are in special need of this kind of service. This Article was placed in the Warrant at the request of several parents of school children. The School Board had not contemplated such an article since the numbers of children in grades one and two next year are expected to be in the vicinity of 31. Originally this assisting teacher had been requested by the Board to provide help especially in grade two because of the large enrollment in the primary room. However, last year by vote of the School District the use of this teacher singularly within the primary room was **not** included in the motion, but was made so that the instructor would be used throughout the school wherever services seemed to be most needed. This is a matter for careful consideration by the citizenry of Lyndeborough, weighing carefully the expenses involved and the educational benefits available through the services of such a person.

Article 10 simply provides approval by the District for the School Board to receive any funds that might be made available to the School District from Federal sources, namely the National Defense Education Act.

Finance

The Deficiency Appropriation which was voted at the last School District meeting amounting to \$1351.93 was not necessary when all income was totaled and therefore such an amount of money was not received by the School District. In addition, the School District ended up the past school year with a slight balance of \$63.57. The total appropriation required to meet the School Board's 1960-61 Budget amounts to \$50,648.83 which is an increase of \$369.46 over the amount which was budgeted for the present school year. On the income side of the ledger, however, it is estimated that during the year 1960-61 the income will amount to \$12,623.79, an increase of \$1153. more than anticipated in 1959-60 and thus resulting in a school assessment some \$784. less than is anticipated to be spent during the present school year. It should be noted that the Tax Commission allowed the School District to receive \$39,184.31 rather than \$38,809.31 for the operation of schools during the present year, this difference being due to several incorrect figures which the Tax Commission received from various sources. If comparison is made of this amount (\$39,184.31) with the amount expected that the Tax Commission will allow for a School Tax for 1960-61, an amount of \$38,025.04, the net decrease in the cost of schools amounts to \$1154.27 which reduces the local assessment by \$1.50 per \$1000. of valuation.

There are several areas of increase within the Budget which should be brought to the attention of the citizens of the community. In items 7 and 8 there is a net increase of \$207., most of this increase being provided to take advantage of National Defense Act funds

which have been referred to earlier in this report. It should be noted in speaking of these funds, that in the income section of the budget, an amount of \$150. in Federal Aid is estimated which helps to reduce the net cost to the District for such expenditures. In the area of Transportation, an additional expenditure of \$210. is reflected due primarily to the additional cost of transportation of children to the Frankestown School and additional mileage required by the Wilton Auto Station Transportation Company in picking up children in the Johnson Corner area. The biggest increase in the budget is in the area of Tuitions, where an increase of \$1412. is noted. This increase is brought about by increased tuition costs at Wilton from \$320. to \$350. per pupil and also due to increased enrollment at the elementary and secondary levels. It can be expected that each year the costs of this tuition will increase as the numbers of children enrolled at Junior High and High School levels increase is evident in Items 22 and 23 of \$150. and upward. The increase in Item 19 of \$171.01 is brought about by a relocation of the teachers' share of Social Security from Item 20, where it formerly was listed, to Item 19. It should be noted that Item 20 decreased by \$172.24. making up all of this increase in Item 19. An increase is evident in Items 22 and 23 of \$150.00 and \$25. The \$150. is to be used for additional shelf space constructed in the hall of the new part of the building, as was noted previously, and also for cupboard doors to be constructed in the kitchen. The increase in Item 23 is for equipment needed for the school, an additional record player, a second tether ball to shorten the length of the pupil line waiting to use the present tether ball erected by the P.T.A., and two teachers' desks.

In Item 25, a reduction in principal payments of \$1000. is brought about by a drop in principal payments as shown by the Table of Indebtedness which will be found elsewhere within the School District report. There is another area of decrease within the budget, in

Item 6, a decrease of \$850. This shows up because the present school budget includes the salary for the assisting teacher whereas the 1960-61 budget has no such budgetary item.

On the income side of the budget it is estimated that a balance of some \$2,000. will exist at the end of the present school year. Most of this money has been made available because of a tuition balance. State Foundation Aid has decreased slightly due to the revision of the formula and a reduction of enrollment. Building Aid is reduced since principal payments are being reduced as previously noted. An item of Federal Aid, already referred to, of \$150. increases income as does elementary tuitions, since a tuition rate of \$262., the State Average, will be permissible.

Conclusion

Special commendation is due the School Board for their tireless service to the school and children of Lyndeborough, and yet with a sincere feeling of economic responsibility to the town. Townspeople should be proud to have servants so devotedly dedicated to their responsibilities.

In conclusion, I wish to thank the Lyndeborough School Board, the staff, parents and friends of the school for their help, cooperation and encouragement in efforts being made to provide a sound program of education for the children of Lyndeborough.
