

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the Eleventh day of March, next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
- 3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,550.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year. This sum includes:

- 4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150,00 for the observance of Memorial Day.
- 5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for the Tracy Memorial Library for the ensuing year.
- 6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Cemetery purposes for the ensuing year.
- 7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2200.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

- 8. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000, for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for the care of the Town Poor.
- 9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$9,500.00 for summer maintenance and \$4,500.00 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.
- 10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$571.95, the State to contribute \$3,813.02 for Town Road Aid.
- 11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of tarring Pressey Court, so called, from the property line of Merle Gay on the North West end, to the property line of the New London Central School on the South East end.
- 12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for the exchange of trucks for the Highway Department.
- 13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Fire Department Maintenance for the ensuing year.
- 14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the the sum of \$3,100.00 for Police Department maintenance for the ensuing year.
- 15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the continued support and maintenance of a Skating Rink.
- \*16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of maintaining the Information Booth.
- \*17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200,00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural advantages and resources of the Town, together with other Towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region Association.
- 18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,150.49 for sewer maintenance for the ensuing year.
- 19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$850.00 for hydrant service for the

ensuing year. (\$700.00 recommended by the Budget Committee).

- 20. To see if the Town will vote to adopt a plan for extending to employees of the Town the benefits of Title II, of the Federal Social Security Act (Old Age and Survivors' Insurance) as authorized by Chapter 234 of the Laws of 1951 and to raise and appropriate the necessary sums of money to defray the Town's share of the cost thereof.
- 21. To see what action the Town will vote to take in regard to discount on taxes.
- 22. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes for the ensuing year.
- 23. To transact any other business which may legally come before said meeting.

#### REPORT OF THE BUDGET COMMITTEE

In accordance with the Municipal Budget law of the State of New Hampshire the New London Budget Committee has prepared a budget for the ensuing year which is submitted and set forth in the following pages of this report.

The committee held two public and two closed meetings.

The committee did not function as efficiently as was to be desired due to the lack of sufficient morale; which was due chiefly to the following reasons: An absence of general interest by the public in the Budget meetings and their purpose. Nearly a one hundred per cent disregard at town and school meetings of the Budget committees recommendations in past years, and the uncooperative attitude of the school committee as expressed by them toward the Budget committee's report in the 1951 school district meetings.

The Budget committee has submitted without recommendations the articles for the operation of an information booth and for regional advertising. Our reasons for opposition to the information booth is the fact that in 1951 less than three per cent of the information sought by the public at the booth pertained to locations to vacation in New London. Likewise our opposition to regional advertising is formulated on the belief that little if any returns come to New London from this expenditure.

This opinion was expressed by three of our local hotel operators as well as by several other business leaders.

The road agent's request for additional money to operate his department confronted us with the question of what is an adequate road appropriation.

In considering the road program several factors come to mind which have an important relation to the overall picture. New London has been fortunate in having the services of a very efficient road agent and our roads have been and are kept in as good a condition as the roads in towns of comparable size. The limited amount of travel on our roads places a restriction on the size of the expenditure of money for this purpose. Lastly it seems that our roads have not as yet had time to show the full benefits which they are expected to receive from the use of the power shovel which was purchased.

The town had been appropriating for summer maintenance \$8,000.00 annually until 1947 when this appropriation was increased to \$9,000.00 annually for summer work and \$4,000.00 for winter work. In addition the highway department receives an annual T. R. A. grant of \$4,284.97, an expense account of \$800.00 and the resulting profit which accrues from the work and rent of the department's equipment. (This equipment has all been purchased by special appropriation). Last year the gross work and rents totaled \$5,500.00

This year you are requested to approve \$2,500.00 for the purchase of a new truck for the highway department as well as to settle a \$2,000.00 note which was issued at the time the power shovel was purchased. Since 1945 special appropriations for the highway department total about \$30,000.00

This year the total funds which are to be spent by and for the highway department is \$23,300.00. The department is responsible for the maintenance of about 42 miles of road, equal to about \$500.00 per mile. The problem is yours. How much do you feel justified to spend on our town roads?

The committee came to the conclusion that we might be justified in increasing the summer and winter road maintenance money by \$500.00 for each season, a total of \$1,000.00 for the year.

When considering the road agent's request we studied the request of \$400.00 to tar Pressey Court. This street being a dead end street it was felt that the need and benefits were not great but the committee reluctantly approved the request.

In considering the request for the school budget the budget committee requested the school board to drop the request for a \$500.00 contingent fund as well as the plan to spend \$200.00 for a school sign. No doubt a

budget the size of the school budget could have been cut back by several hundred dollars but the committee felt reluctant to make any attempt to do so in view of the fact that the voters at the school meetings in the past few years have indicated a desire to expand the school budget by about \$4,000.00 annually.

Your total school budget has now reached a figure of \$71,859.51. How much higher do you wish it to go?

It was also suggested that in the interest of large public attendance that school meetings should be held in the evening of town meeting day.

The committee received a request of \$850.00 for hydrant service but approved an appropriation of \$700.00 which is equal to \$10.00 per hydrant.

It may seem to the readers of the report that the budget committee has been a little tight-fisted, but when you consider that the federal expenditures to be made in the fiscal year ending in June 30, 1952, are equivalent to the total income of all the individuals in the United States living west of the Mississippi River it seems as if the time had arrived when people should attend school and town meetings and think it over before money is spent in haste.

One problem which has confronted the past Budget committees has been somewhat clarified. Last year Attorney James Cleveland advised the committee that in his opinion their authority was almost unlimited in the making and control of both the town and school budgets. The Attorney General's office has now confirmed Attorney Cleveland's opinions.

In conclusion I wish to express my thanks to the public, and to the committee members for their cooperation and help.

#### 1951 ACTIVITIES

The New London Service Organization, Inc. started its eight year with a banquet at the Edgewood Inn where all members were guests of Mr. Herbert D. Swift.

#### NOTES TO TREASURER'S REPORT

We started the year with the same seven Trust Funds that we closed with last year i. e. Veterans, Expense, Parshley, Gay, Charity, Messer, and Town History. During the year we closed out the Town History Trust by transferring \$68.67 from our Expense Trust to it to wipe out its debt.

During the past year our total assets rose \$475.15. This was principally due to the increase in value of all our Series F. U. S. Bonds. On the other hand we did not spend much on the Memorial Athletic Field this year. Furthermore there were three fund raising projects during the past year, each of which helped our Veterans Fund.

The Veterans Fund raising projects were the Buffet Supper at Lake Sunapee Country Club for \$180.72, the Summer Movies for \$36.44 and finally the series of "Home Parties" which raised \$100.50. These made our 1951 fund raising projects total \$317.66.

During the past year we made three new loans which totaled \$750.00. One loan was paid up and payments were made on other loans so that we ended up the year with four loans still on the books for a total of \$885.00 still due us.

On two occasions during the past year we sent gifts to our servicemen away from home. In the Spring we sent Maple Sugar which with postage, etc., cost \$29.47. At Christmas time we sent them all gifts which, with cards and special wrappings and postage came to a total cost of \$58.66. These made the year's total for servicemen's gifts of \$88.13.

There were two other undertakings from other trust funds. One was for Mrs. Della Spiller's school clinic for \$15.00. The other was the afore mentioned Town History debt of \$68.67. These two non-veteran expenditures totaled \$83.67.

# ANNUAL REPORT NEW LONDON PUBLIC LIBRARY TRACY MEMORIAL BUILDING

The interest and use of this building, both as a library and a community center, are shown by the following records from 1951:

There have been 11,823 visitors during the year.

This year we have added 405 new books, of which 30 were gifts. Our magazine table in the reading-room offers a variety of 52 magazines, many of which our friends generously contribute each month.

We have added a new magazine, Children's Digest, to the Children's Room in an effort to make up for a cut in the number of books bought for the children. This magazine has proven popular and circulates freely, as do all our adult magazines.

We have supplied the grades in the Central School with 236 books for their supplementary reading. We also send books regularly to the High School, to the Kindergarten, and to the Elkins School (while open).

We have answered all calls for inter-library loans and met all requests from the Fernald Library with promptness. The Bookmobile calls on us in alternate months, bringing a new supply of juvenile books and adult nonfiction.

Our reference materials are always in demand and we have responded to 125 requests for special material.

During the year the Woman's and Garden Clubs have used the auditorium for meetings and the Club Room is in use several times a week.

#### LIBRARY REPORT (Continued)

Throughout the year we have tried to pay tribute to national, State, and special events with exhibits, posters, and pertinent book displays.

On May tenth, Miss Jean London brought her Sociology class from Colby Junior College to the library to listen to an informal talk and to examine a display of children's books. There were about eighteen girls and all were very kind in expressing their appreciation and admiration of our attractive Children's Room.

Mrs. Helen R. Colburn held her annual piano recital for her pupils in the auditorium on June eighth. A large group of interested friends and parents greatly enjoyed the children's efforts to entertain them.

During the second week in June both the librarians were privileged to attend the State Library Institute held in Hancock. Mrs. Franklin Farnum took charge of the library in their absence. The Institute was most helpful and both librarians returned with new ideas and new vigor to their work.

As has been the custom for several years, the librarians organized the Vacation Reading Club in July and August to stimulate and encourage summer reading among the local children. The western theme was emphasized with saddles, cowboys, cowgirls, minature corrals and attractive booklets. On the last day of August a party for all the readers was held in the auditorium with 17 children present. Fifteen diplomas and two awards were given to the club members. This annual event is anticipated with much pleasure by our young readers, and builds up the circulation in the Children's Room during the summer months, when it has a tendency to slacken.

An exhibition of needlework was on display in the auditorium throughout Hospital Week which attracted many visitors and gained a substanial sum for the Hospital.

In September a new innovation was made in our regular library hours. Through the authorization of the trustees, the library was opened to bus pupils from the Central School on Mondays and Fridays from noon to one p. m. This experimental project has proved to be of much

benefit to these pupils, who up to this time have had little opportunity to use the library.

From November 11-17 the library observed Book Week with a display of books dating from the late 1700's to modern editions. The feature exhibit depicted a cozy fireplace scene with dolls reading their favorite story books. Articles made in the Children's Room during Story Hour were displayed in a special section. Due to the kindness of Mrs. Herbert D. Swift, our glass showcases were well filled with unusual and old children's books. Nearly four hundred visitors attested to the popularity of the exhibit. Besides all the grades from the Central School we entertained both rooms of the West Springfield School, the Wilmot Center School and Mrs. Cricenti's kindergarten class.

The Story Hour on Saturday afternoons continues to be well attended as we have entertained and instructed 384 children during the past year.

Our library has been well cared for by the faithfulness of Mr. Edward Dexter in cleaning and repairing. It was found necessary by the trustees to forbid children playing in the library gardens without an adult, as our shrubbery and lawns were beginning to suffer. Mr. Holteen was hired by the Garden Club to replant the flower beds around the pool and to do some re-seeding. The spring of 1952 should show our garden beautiful again.

The Christmas season again finds the library building aglow with gay lights and colors, as we celebrate anew the holiday.

The New London Hospital and the community is saddened and bereft by the passing of Marie Parker Ray in October, who since 1928 had served as a registered nurse in the New London Hospital. She endeared herself to all who knew her, by her skill in her profession, her kindly personality and her deep interest in her patients.

Dr. Thomas of Sunapee has been appointed a member of the Medical Staff at the Hospital.

Dr. Anne Wasson of Bradford has been made an associate member of the Medical Staff at the hospital.

Hospital Day under the direction of Mr. Harry B. Harris and ably assisted by Mr. Donald K. Sieburg was the most successful day we've ever had. The net receipts for this day totalled \$7,327.43. In addition to this approximately \$3,000 was collected by the Summer Residents' Committee. Members of the Board and the Hospital administration offer their heartfelt thanks to Mr. Harris, Mr. Sieburg, the Summer Residents' Committee and all who contributed so generously to the success of the day.

The gifts from the summer Residents' Committee include \$2,000 toward the purchase of a new X-Ray machine, a new light for the operating room, an 18 cubic foot Deep freeze, which solves the problem of an immediate supply of ice when the oxygen tent is needed. A new mangle has been purchased for the laundry, and a refrigerator for the Diet kitchen. Linoleum has been installed in two patient rooms. We are deeply grateful to this Committee and to our summer residents for their interest and generosity to the Hospital.

#### HOSPITAL REPORT (Continued)

A donation of \$500 was received from Colby Jr. College. Colby has also contributed \$510 toward the re-wiring of the Hospital. The Colby Students continue to maintain the Barbara Jane Baker Laboratory at the hospital. This support is greatly appreciated.

The Hospital Aid has continued their work in making improvements at the Nurses' Home, in addition to these activities they have purchased linen in the amount of \$500. We are indeed grateful.

The Woman's Club gave \$50 to the maternity ward. A gift of \$50 was received from the Sunapee Horse Show Committee. A group of interested friends produced a play, directed by Vaughan Biggert and assisted by Bruce Kimes and Charlie Jobes "George Washington Slept Here." From this benefit \$435 was realized for the hospital. Our sincere thanks and appreciation to these and to the many benefactors of the Hospital. Individual gifts of money, equipment, food etc. have been many and too numerous to list in this report.

In December the Hospital purchased a 200 MA Picker X-Ray machine, the total cost of the machine was \$9600. The Summer Residents' Committee contributed \$2000 toward this, and the balance of the purchase price is being financed by the First National Bank of Concord, N. H. Due to the increased work by X-Ray at the Hospital in the past few years, the need for this machine has been great and it is proving very satisfactory.

The cost to maintain the Hospital in 1951 was \$11,000 more than the income received from patients, if it were not for the amount received from Hospital Day, Town appropriations, Summer Residents' Committee and all other gifts, it would be impossible for the Hospital to serve.

Mrs. Sargent reports that the total number of patient days for 1951 was 5553. 709 adults were admitted during the year and 85 births were reported. These figures show an increase over last year. Miss Dorothy Hale, Laboratory technichian reports that 4475 tests were performed during 1951. 270 Out Patients were treated.

Some major improvements and additions have been made at the hospital this year, the business office has been enlarged, the ceiling in the operating room has been raised to make room for the installation of the new operating light. The re-wiring of the Hospital is progressing to comply with State and National Hospital laws.

Memorial Gifts Fund and the Endowment Fund have received contributions through the year.

We are appreciative of the continued support and interest of the people of New London and the surrounding towns and our summer friends and neighbors. Through your co-operation it has been possible to keep the hospital ever ready to serve. We are appreciative also of the loyal and efficient work given the Hospital by our Superintendent, Miss McLeod who is completing her eighth year of continual service. We are thankful for our nursing staff, our business manager Mrs. Sargent and all other employees. The Hospital is vitally needed by us all and we are all vitally needed by the Hospital.

Meetings of the New London Hospital Aid Association were held once a month from October, 1950 through June, 1951, with an average attendance of thirty. Hospital mending and work on articles for the Hospital Day sale was done at each meeting. A business meeting was held at each meeting.

Money-raising activities of the Hospital Aid were the Membership Drive, Donation Day, Rummage Sale, Sale of candy, coca cola, pillows at the hospital benefit play in April, Sale of pillows at the Barn Theater, Soo-Nipi Lodge, Movies at Whipple Memorial Hall, and Hospital Day.

During the year the association approved the expenditure of \$785.57 at the Nurses' Home. This sum included \$400.00 to reduce the mortgage, \$100.00 for linen, and the balance for repairs and improvements.

The hospital was voted \$400.00 to purchase linen for the year.

The organization purchased a 50-cup coffee dripolator for its use. From February through May casserole luncheons were served and proceeds used to purchase a chair and footstool for the hospital.

Grateful acknowledgement is extended to the people of the surrounding towns and New London, and the members of the association whose help and cooperation has made the year a successful one for the benefit of the hospital.

# REPORT OF THE SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the New London School Board:

I submit herewith my fourth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

#### Enrollment

With the closing of the Elkins School last June, all public school students within the District (Grades 1-12) are now housed at the Central School.

The enrollment for the school year, 1951-52, as of January 1, 1952 was 215. This is broken down as follows:

Grades	1-8		122
Grades	9-12		93

We have a large Freshman class numbering 37—many of whom are tuition students. There are 39 tuition students in the high school and 5 in the grades.

Census figures of our pre-school population fails to predict any appreciable increase in entering classes for the next few years. However, the School Board has adopted a policy of not accepting any additional tuition students in Grades 1-8, except by vote of the Board on each individual case.

There is no restriction on high school tuition students. In fact, we are fortunate to have so many of them since it increases the size of our high school, making it possible to offer a wider variety of courses and activities as well as providing a substantial amount of revenue for the District. We can still accommodate additional students in the high school without overcrowding.

#### **Tuition Costs**

The tuition rates are as follows:

# Transportation

Transportation is now provided for high school students as well as the elementary students who reside the necessary distance from school.

It was necessary to revise the bus routes so as to provide for the Elkins people and those residing on the northeast side of Pleasant Lake. All transportation is now provided by the Edmunds Bus Company. Regular and spare drivers have been approved by the School Board as required by law.

# Repairs

Minor repairs and the regular summer maintenance work, including re-finishing of the gymnasium floor, were carried out by the janitor. The major repairs and improvements were:

Cutting a doorway under the stage. This provides more storage space.

Installing a septic tank to handle the drainage problem in

the kitchen.

Installing a mechanical ventilator in the kitchen.

An additional shower stall in the girls' locker room to meet the needs of the physical education program.

# New Equipment

The major items of new equipment include:

One sewing machine was exchanged and an additional one was purchased.

An electric adding machine (replacing an old hand-op-

erated machine.)

#### School Insurance

Our insurance program has been broadened considerably and now appears reasonably adequate. Various types of insurance policies now carried by the District include:

Fire—\$88,000 on buildings and \$13,000 on equipment—

totaling \$101,000.

Public and Teachers' Liability—In general, this protects the District against suit from the negligence of its employees.

Workmen's Compensation—Now carried on the regu-

lar employees of the District.

Boiler—Provides protection from damages arising from the steam boiler and hot water storage tank up to a limit of \$50,000 per accident.

Athletic Insurance—Now carried on both boys and

girls who participate in team sports.

#### School Board Policies

The School Board voted to discontinue over-night trips sponsored by the school beginning with the Class of 1955.

The salary rate for substitute teachers was raised from seven to ten dollars per diem.

#### Memorial Athletic Field

The Dedication of Memorial Athletic Field was held on Memorial Day, 1950. Remarks on the Development of Memorial Athletic Field were given by Mrs. Kenneth A. Rich, President of the New London Service Organization and Mr. Dura P. Crockett, Chairman of the School Board. A marker giving the history of the project was unveiled at the ceremony.

Some bleachers have been erected to provide seating

facilities at baseball games.

#### Conclusion

The work of the school touches many phases of community activity. It is my hope that our accomplishments will be such as to merit the continued interest and generous support of the citizens of New London.

# REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL TO SUPERINTENDENT GORDON B. FLINT

Dear Mr. Flint:

I submit herewith my report as Principal of New London Central School.

The many activities that constitute a part of the educational program add much to the education of the students and they are important in helping them to prepare for that which lies ahead of them. No one activity, however, is more important than the others although at the time it may seem that way to those, who are participating in it.

When school opened in September our way of life was changed considerably by the addition of a regular physical education program. The boys began to learn new games such as soccer and the girls revived field hockey, which had been dropped several years ago for lack of a place to play it. Under the able supervision of Mr. Richard Dart a well-rounded program is being developed. The classes have been outfitted in regular maroon uniforms and they add much to the interest in the program. Already a noticeable improvement in posture is evident throughout the school and the need for cleanliness by the requirement of a shower after every physical education class is proving to be of much value.

Driver Education was added also in September and a 1951 Dual-Control Chevrolet presented to the School District by A. S. Little and Son. Inc., makes it possible to have real practical experience of "behind-the-wheel" driving. Mr. Vincent Gates attended a special course in Maine during the summer on Driver Education and is obtaining excellent results with the students in the course. Several adults are busy learning to drive also. The course should do much to make better drivers of our young people.

At the annual Open House in November many parents and interested friends were give an opportunity to see the work of the students and talk with the teachers, Two

short Minstrel Shows under the direction of Mrs. Alberta Fisher, with the assistance of Mrs. Jennie Lull, Mrs. Ann Adams, Mrs. Helen Colburn, and Mr. Alphonse Soucy, were presented by the elementary grades as a program during the evening.

In addition to the Ministrel Shows Mrs. Alberta Fisher presented her usual excellent programs including the Spring Concerts with Sunapee High School, the Pops Concert, and a Christmas Cantata. Last April she took nine students to participate in the All-State Music Festival in Portsmouth.

An Operetta, Robin Hood, was presented in March by the members of Grades 7 and 8 under the direction of Mrs. Fisher and Mr. Soucy.

"Seventeenth Summer" was presented November 2 by the Senior Class under the direction of Miss Eleanor Parker.

Ten students represented the school at the State Speech Tournament in January at Durham. This annual affair is proving to be of much value in developing poise and the ability to express oneself in public.

The Student Council has been active and among the activities they have helped to arrange are speakers for

assemblies, a Christmas party for the high school, and a dance in the spring.

The 1951 Senior Class, with Mr. and Mrs. Herwood C. Curtiss, took a five day trip to New York City during the April vacation. They traveled in one of Mr. Edwin Edmunds' buses with Mr. Edmunds as driver.

The school was invited to send two students to the Youth Government which is sponsored by the State Y. M. C. A. and when the balloting had been tallied Henry Meinecke found himself a Senator and Vernon Squires a Representative from the Eighth District. They both attended the preliminary session at Dartmouth College and the final session in Concord.

The Freshman, Sophomore and Junior classes each presented a one-act play in the evening in the middle of April. I the past these had been presented as assembly programs, but due to the interest in them it was decided they should be given when the public could attend. It is planned to make this an annual affair.

Mrs. Beth Woodward, the School Lunch Supervisor, put on a Thanksgiving dinner and a Christmas Picnic Party that did much to make us all realize what an important part of the school life the Lunch Program has become.

The Junior Class presented each member of the high school a handbook called, "Under the Dome," in the fall.
