[L. S.] THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Newton, qualified to vote in Town Affairs :

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall, in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects :

1. To choose a Town Clerk, three Selectmen, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditors, Road Commissioners, Trustees of Public Library, Constables, Sealer of Weights and Measures, Measurers of Wood and Bark and Surveyors of Lumber, Health Officers, Fence Viewers, and all other necessary town officers and agents for the ensuing year.

2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for paying the town debts and defraying the interest thereon, for the support and maintenance of the Public Library, and for other necessary charges arising in said town.

3. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$25 for Memorial Day purposes.

4. To hear the reports of the Town Treasurer and Board of Selectmen to the town Auditors, the reports of the Auditors, Agents, Committees, or other officers heretofore chosen or appointed, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

6. To see if the town will vote to raise extra highway money to receive State aid.

7. To see if the town will vote to finish the Public Library building and appropriate money for the same.

8. To see if the town will vote to raise to twelve hundred dollars (\$1200) each license issued for the sale of intoxicating liquors within said town.

To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

We hereby submit the annual report of our schools for the year ending February 15, 1908.

The repairs on school buildings which were suggested last year have been made as far as the sum of money for this purpose would permit. There has been a new fence built around the new building at the Village and a new flag pole. The furnace has had some repairs and we are in hopes now to obtain better results.

The changes in teachers this year have been more than common. It has been our earnest endeavor to fill all vacancies in our corps of teachers with the best talent, and we have reason to believe that they cannot be better at the present rate of salary.

At the close of the spring term Miss Mabelle Warner resigned as teacher of the Grammar school. We tried to persuade her to stay with us, for her work was always of a high order, but she decided to make the change. Her place was taken by Miss Nettie A. Smith, who has endeavored to keep the school up to the standard, and we believe with success. We think both teacher and pupils have overcome the change and are doing good work. The teacher deserves more encouragement and help on the part of the parents, such as visiting, consulting, etc.

The Village Primary school has had the same teacher, Mrs. A. F. George, and we are pleased to report the same good work. The pupils have gained by not having a change of teachers. Both these schools and Rowe's Corner have had a number of pupils absent on account of contagious diseases.

The Rowe's Corner school during the spring term continued its good work with Miss E. Belle Ingalls. The fall term was in charge of Miss Laura Welch. The winter term has Miss H. L. Durgin, who is doing good, satisfactory work. The school is the smallest

in town and the pupils have the benefit of more individual attention.

At the Junction school during the spring term Miss Nettie A. Smith continued as a faithful teacher, and we felt very sorry when she did not return to this school. Mrs. Grace Philbrook taught the fall term. The winter term has been in charge of Miss Sarah H. Morse, who has labored faithfully. We think the result of this term will be better in every way. A great deal of attention has been given to writing, and through the influence of Miss Morse the school has had the benefit of a drawing teacher, Miss Pauline Patch, who instructs them in this branch every Monday afternoon, and the children are delighted with this work.

Our pupils and teachers have from time to time presented the schools with pictures. This is a very good idea, and adds to the appearance of the rooms.

We take great pleasure in reporting, through the efforts of Mrs. A. F. George, Mabel Warner and Miss N. A. Smith, that the Grammar school has been presented with a piano. It is surely a benefit to the school.

We are pleased to bear testimony to the faithfulness, loyalty and skill on the part of our teachers. We hope the parents will assist our schools in securing good attendance, and in visiting our rooms at least once a year.

Honest criticism, based upon intelligent, careful observation of work done and results accomplished, is always helpful and acceptable.

If you will review the patience and vigor it has cost you to train one child in the path he should go, and call to mind the numerous mistakes you probably have made, you will appreciate the great task of the teacher, who has from 20 to 40 to lead.
