WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Tamworth in the County of Carroll in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Tamworth on Tuesday, the Twelfth day of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

- 1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
- 2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges fort he ensuing year and make appropriation of the same.
- 3. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing highways and ploughing snow for the ensuing year.
- 4. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairing and building bridges.
- 5. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for Memorial Day observance.
- 6. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise in addition to the amount required by law for the support of the Town Library.
- 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.
- 8. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$800.00 for the support of the Tamworth Community Nurse.
- 9. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for repairs of snow removal equipment.
 - 10. To see if the town will vote to authorize the

Selectmen to distribute the Inventory blanks at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

- 11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300.00 for Tarvia.
- 12. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to administer or dispose of any real estate acquired by the town through Tax Collectors' deeds.
- 13. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$300.00 for the Tamworth Fire Precinct.
- 14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate \$75.00 for the Wonalancet Fire Precinct.
- 15. To see if the town will vote to adopt the provisions of the Municipal Budget Act.
- 16. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 to be applied to the town's indebtedness.
- 17. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$700.00 for the construction of a town garage.
- 18. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$500.00 for the repairing of the town hall
- 19. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the construction of the Cleveland hill road provided the state shall appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the same purpose.
- 20. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1000.00 for the construction of the Deer Hill road provided the state shall appropriate the sum of \$2000.00 for the same purpose.
- 21. To see if the town will accept state aid for construction of Class V roads and raise and appropriate or set aside for said purpose the sum of \$1000.00.
- 22. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to appoint one or more highway agents.

- 23. To see if the town will vote to quit-claim or otherwise release to Francis G. Cleveland the Town's right of way over such land on the south side of the building known as Kimball's Hall, now subject to the Town's right of way or easement, as will allow a clear space of eighteen feet from the wall of the present building; and on the west side such land now subject to the Town's right of way or easement as will allow a clear space of eighteen feet from wall of the present building or, more or less as the Selectmen may determine, to allow space for new construction.
- 24. To see if the town will vote to discontinue pieces of highway made obsolete by the construction of the state road from Bennett's Corner to the Sandwich line.
- 25. To transact any other business that may legally come before said meeting.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Adoption of suggestions here'n contained, in conjunction with the budget with allowance for an overlay of about \$1000.00 will produce a tax rate of \$2.90, as nearly as it can be estimated in advance.

The fiscal year ended January 31 and has been an unfortunate one for the Town financially. Current expenditures appear to have exceeded income by \$4585.66, converting a surplus standing on the Balance Sheet at January 31, 1934, of \$668.47, into a deficit on the current Balance Sheet, of \$3917.19. Of the assets listed on the current Balance Sheet, \$678.52 are considered by your Selectmen and this Committee to be of doubtful or no value, but these assets have not as yet been written off the books.

The question of whether it is advisable to supply this deficit by an appropriation or to borrow at times such amount as may be necessary to finance current expenditures has been carefully considered by your Committee and it is recommended that the sum of \$2000.00 be raised for the purpose of reducing the deficit (long term notes) under Article 16 of the Warrant, and that the Selectmen be authorized to borrow as usual in anticipation of taxes up to \$10,000.00.

It should be understood that it is not necessary to establish a standing debt to take care of the balance of this deficit; the usual procedure of borrowing money in anticipation of taxes (short term loans) would suffice, although some increase in amounts borrowed would be necessary.

In analyzing the causes of the deficit incurred this year, your Committee finds that support of Town Poor and Old Age Assistance, an item difficult to determine accurately in advance, exceeded appropriation by about \$450.00, cost of receiving tomb was in excess by about \$390.00, cost of bridges, owing to State pressure in the matter of the Glover Brook bridge, was in

excess by \$1156.32, and maintenance of Town roads exceeded appropriations by \$4020.10, \$389.49 of which represents the cost of new culverts on roads improved by the C. C., balance largely chargeable to the cost of snow removal. Making every allowance for the increased severity of the winter weather experienced during the past year, your Committee believes that this last item is excessive, and indicates that a change in the manner of maintaining Town roads, as outlined in succeeding paragraphs, would be for the best interests of the Town. The cost of ploughing all dooryards is estimated to constitute from one third to one half of the total cost of snow removal, and some revision of the present system might well be considered by the Meeting under the last Article of the Warrant; no recommendation is made in this connection, however.

The present system provides for the election of three road agents, who are charged with the maintenance or Town roads. The men chosen are each allotted their due proportion of amounts appropriated, to expend as they see fit. They are responsible only to the electorate which, in the opinion of this Committee, is not usually in any position to judge whether or not funds have been expended to the best advantage. This Committee believes that the men selected under this system have, in the main, been conscientious and able but, owing to the method of their choice, have been subjected to political pressure and precluded by the division of authority inherent in the system from any effective coordination of effort.

The law provides that the Town may vote to have the Selectmen appoint one Road Agent and it would appear that the Town would derive material benefit from this change in the system. The man appointed would be freer of political pressure than at present and would be judged by results only. Having charge of

all roads he could arrange work to the best advantage and secure results from the funds at his disposal impossible to a divided authority. He would be charged with the proper housing, conservation, and maintenance of all Town equipment which, under the present system, appears to be nobody's business. In the matter of snow removal, he would be the judge of what equipment to order out and in this item alone this Committee believes that a capable man could much more than save his salary. Fighting severe storms with inadequate equipment is a sorry and expensive business as the past winter has shown, and the advantages of having a responsible head with authority at all times to choose between light equipment working on contract, or heavier equipment, Town property, under his charge and ready for action, are apparent.

Your Committee believes that adoption of this suggested change (Article 22) will secure for the Town much more efficient management, and better roads at all seasons in return for the amounts expended, and will prevent a recurrence of the present deficit except under circumstances of stringent emergency. Under no circumstances should the appointee have equipment of his own to rent to the Town. Adoption of this system would not take effect until 1936, road agents being elected as usual at this Meeting for one year.

Under Article 17 of the Warrant it is proposed to raise the amount of \$700.00 for the purpose of constructing a building for the housing of tools and machinery belonging to the Town. This sum is to cover all expenses of the project except the labor item, for which it is proposed to secure Federal funds. Your Committee recommends this project. In view of comments made upon the highway system, there are undoubted advantages in Town ownership of such a building. Under ordinary circumstances, the project would not be advisable during a year in which there is

a deficit to be met, but the project will furnish work needed by many, and probably obviate the necessity of much direct relief. The project should be contingent upon its approval by the government, and availability of Federal funds.

The budget for the ensuing year, presented in another part of this report has been made up by your Committee and the Selectmen with regard for necessarv expenditures, and the concurrent need for keeping the tax rate as low as possible. Estimates of School expenses to be included in the tax levy this vear total \$14.200.00. Included in the School funds is an item of \$2350.00 raised at school meeting last year to purchase land and build an addition on the South Tamworth school house. At a special meeting of the School District, held last summer, it was voted to withhold this sum for future disposal. It is recommended that the School District vote to apply this sum to the purposes of the School Board's budget, reducing the tax levy by that amount. If this is done, and the budget, as set forth, is adopted it is estimated that the tax rate will be \$2.90.

Attention is called to the fact that non-resident property owners of the Town pay 60% of the property taxes levied, and receive but little benefit therefrom. The welfare of the Town, is, to a very large extent, dependent upon its summer residents; a high tax rate is discouraging to present non-residents and to any who may contemplate settling here. Increased taxes, in the opinion of this Committee, would be justified only if for a purpose directly beneficial to non-residents and visitors, or to encourage an increase in their numbers, in line with the policy of the State, and of New England in general.

In connection with Article 23 of the Warrant, this Committee believes that the project of building a theatre in Tamworth is commendable in every way,

and that the Meeting should authorize the transfer of the small amount of land necessary. It should be understood the land is not Town property, but is subject to the Town's right of way.

In the opinion of this Committee, the establishment of Camp Tamworth, 117th Company C. C. C., in the town of Tamworth has been of great value to the Town in that various projects of permanent benefit have been undertaken and completed, that would have been impractical with Town funds. It recommends that Town officials and citizens co-operate with this State and Federal Agency to the fullest extent.

It should be stated in connection with Article 8 of the Warrant providing an appropriation for the District Nurse, that this Committee was evenly divided, one member being absent, on the question of recommending \$800.00 for this purpose. Another vote disclosed a majority in favor of raising \$500.00, the figure set forth in the budget. Due regard should be had for the divided opinion.

All recommendations or opinions set forth in this report, and the amounts set forth in the budget are expressive of the carefully considered thought of a majority of your Committee but do not, in all cases, express a unanimous agreement.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

To Tamworth School Board and Citizens:

I herewith submit my twelfth annual report as superintendent of schools.

It is said that the public schools are the bulwark of American civilization. This being so, schools and school work assume major proportions. The school work in Tamworth is going well.

High School

Former N. H. Commissioner Butterfield has said, "Some five million American boys and girls are attending high schools. They are doing this, not for the honor of it, not that they may wear an academic badge, but that they may use education in their daily lives.The ordinary citizen for ordinary life needs three characteristics: social adaptation; many and broad interests; and the ideals and habits of good citizenship."

It is a source of great pride to have a full fouryear high school. Under the careful management of Headmaster Hatch, the school is developing well. There is at present an enrollment of thirty-five, and we shall graduate our first class next June. Citizens may be assured that money spent on this school is well invested.

School Property

The property has been kept up as usual. The greater part of the work last summer was done at the village in preparation for the high school. A new room was finished on the second floor where the primary school is accommodated, leaving both rooms on the first floor for the high school. A supply and wood-working room was also finished in the basement. A better water system was installed, and equipment provided for standard high school work.

The important problem for the coming year is the

proper building at South Tamworth. At the last regular school meeting it was voted to raise \$2200 to do this work. This seemed an insufficient amount to do a satisfactory job and at a later meeting it was voted not to do the work this year. It remains to be decided at the coming meeting just what shall be done. I advise that a sufficient additional sum be raised to build a two-room building such as was proposed on the blue-print now in the hands of the school board. This would accommodate the Bennett's Corner School together with the South Tamworth School and also the Whittier School when it might seem desirable.

Health Work

The health work is under the care of Dr. Edwin C. Remick and the community nurse. At present Mrs. Malone is serving to check up the defects, following examinations by the doctor. Some good results have been secured. Mrs. Malone's report is included.

Visual Education

The work in visual instruction is still being carried on. During the year we have had pictures on bananas, oranges, corn, and paper-making. An important historical picture "Columbus" was given to a public audience. The picture "The Heart of a Hero" was given on Memorial Day. This gave in striking form the sacrifice of Nathan Hale, the patriot spy, who said, when facing death, "I only regret that I have but one life to give for my country."

Adult Education

An effort has been made to introduce adult education this winter. A class has met with Mr. Lorne B. Hulsman as teacher, and has enjoyed courses in Current Events, Literature, and Business Law. It is never too late to learn. It is agreed now that older people can learn as well as younger people. Appreciation is hereby expressed for the use of the school

building for this purpose. Mr. Hulsman has been well received in other towns where he is conducting adult classes. The class is open to all adults at any time.

Attendance

For the year ending June 30, 1934, we had an average attendance of 159, an average membership of 167, and a percent of attendance of 95.4. Schools having an attendance last year of 95% or over are as follows:

At the opening of the school year in Sept. 1934, all pupils were given a physical examination by the school physician, Dr. Edwin Remick, Jr., assisted by Miss Eleanor Harmon, R. N.

At that time all abnormal defects were noted and cards were sent to parents stating the condition of each individual child. All pupils were weighed and measured.

nurse for the town to carry out the work in the community and in the schools. After a careful study of the situation of children's defects following the September examinations, I found the most urgent correction needed was eye tests for those of poor vision.

Twelve pupils have had their eyes examined and are now wearing glasses. This correction will no doubt enable them to do their school work more efficiently.

The aim and purpose of a well organized program of public health nursing in the schools is to correct all defects in so far as we are able. This can usually be accomplished when the parents work in cooperation with the school nurse. Let us strive to have the citizens of our future generation one hundred percent perfect in health.
