

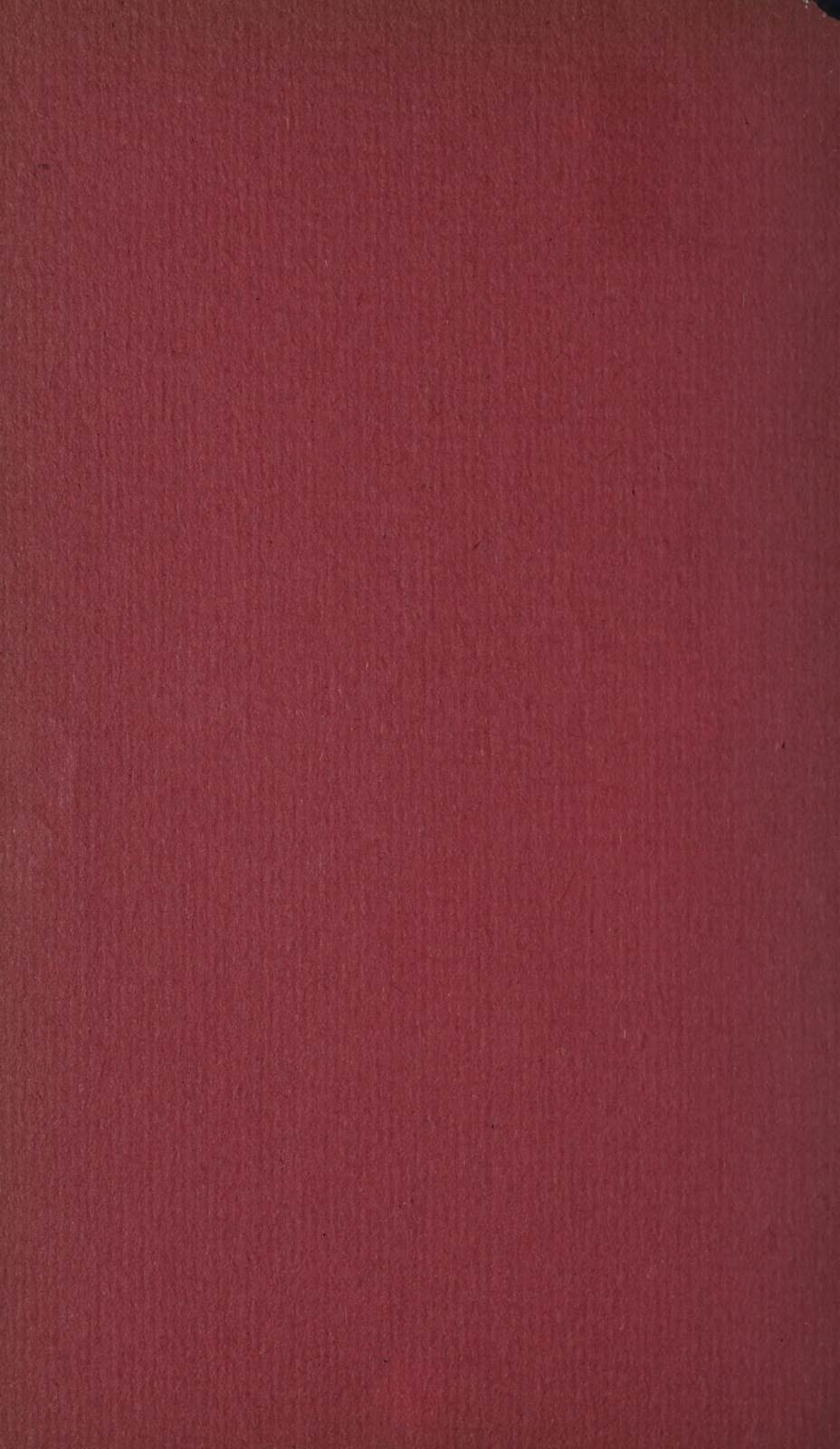

# ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

## TOWN SCHOOL BOARD.

---

We herewith present to you this our eleventh annual report, since the adoption of the present town system. We think that the past year, like the years that have gone before, has been fairly successful.

More or less changes have been made among our teachers, circumstances compelling such changes, and not failure to do reasonably good work in the school room.

Scholars throughout the town have shown a good degree of interest in their studies, consequently they have made fair progress.

Our schools are small in numbers but are so situated that they cannot well be united, with the exception of those at East Tilton. We think the two schools there might well be brought together under one teacher, thereby making them more interesting, and saving not a little expense.

We also suggest that it might be well for the town to consider the question of procuring a site somewhere near the centre of the school population, where a school house might be built, or to which one of the present houses might be moved, thus accommodating the schools when united.

ANNUAL REPORT  
OF THE  
BOARD OF EDUCATION,  
UNION DISTRICT.

The past year has witnessed steady improvement in our schools, though there is still plenty of opportunity for advancement. The effort to bring all the schools more completely into the same line of action has been pursued with gratifying success. Our teachers deserve credit for the work they have accomplished during the last twelve months. They have wrought together for a common result, not with individual purposes.

The new room which the district provided last spring relieved the congestion which obtained a year ago. It allowed a redistribution of grades, so that now there is but one grade in the first primary room, and beginners have the entire attention of their teacher.

What is likely to prove the most important action of the year is the contract, authorized by the district, which was made with the trustees of the Seminary to give our pupils a two years high school course at that institution. This step cannot fail to become a lasting satisfaction to all lovers of learning in Union District. A village of this size without a high school or its equivalent is to be looked askance at. The arrangement with the Seminary will not cost over one fifth of the amount that would

be required to maintain a high school. The district cannot fail to appreciate the pecuniary advantage of this plan; while the incentive for thorough work, which this advanced course offers, ought not to be overlooked. It will be remembered that free tuition is offered only to those students that attain a passing rank at graduation from the grammar school, and that it is not furnished when they fail to compass seminary standards after they have entered there.

According to instructions given at the last school meeting, the Board of Education had the roof of the school house patched more carefully than ever, but the whole protection, shingles and gutters, were in such a state that patching was of little avail. The heavy fall rains came through in streams and damaged the plastering considerably in several places. We hope the building may be resingled before another summer passes.

The attendance of non-resident pupils in our schools has been discussed somewhat of late and the Board decided its policy regarding this matter at a recent meeting by a unanimous vote. In substance, it is: that pupils will be admitted, provided they may be accommodated without interfering with our own interests, by paying a tuition of thirty-five cents per week in the four lower rooms, or forty cents per week in the first grammar grade, and fifty cents per week in the second grammar grade. Fractions of a term to be reckoned as whole terms except in case of sickness.

The enumerating agent discovered two hundred and nineteen children of school age in the district last April. There have been two hundred and thirty scholars enrolled on our registers during the year. At the present moment there are an even two

hundred in all the schools. They are found as follows :
