The difference between the appraisal of property on the farm in 1850 and 1861 is \$\overline{310.86}\$

Which may be accounted for in part by the general decline in the value; as any person who has been obliged to sell stock which they had on hand one year ago know tull well, by looking at the appraisal of the cows last year, 4 in number, and 4 3 years old heifers, and 3 of them were farrow, and then look at the price of the same 7 cows, and the difference is very apparant.

Again, as regards the oxen which were bought last April, there is in addition to the general decline in price, another cause for the low run at which they were appraised, which is, one of them has got a hold fast upon one jaw which will spoil him for work and consequently the low price.

Again, in regard to the farming tools, they are all on the place which were there a year ago, and an addition has been made of about t-n dollars, of yokes, irons, hoes and forks. And last but not least, is the matter of household furniture which it will be seen is appraised at about one half of what it was last year, although the appraisers were shown a lot of *new* sheets, pillow cases and quilts, which they appraised at 10 dollars, which I think would make up for all the decline in value, in the natural wear.

I would here further say, that in consequence of the building of the new road through said farm, thereby causing an additional sum of about 12 dollars in labor and repairing tools, in building the walls on said road, adds another item to the general expense.
