Superintendent's Report.

To School Board and Citizens of Madison:

It is my privilege to submit for your approval my third annual report.

The past year has been one of steady advancement in the schools. Four of the five schools have been taught by Normal graduates and State certificate teachers. This means, in general, better teachers. The town will draw from the State, next December, \$2 per week for each of these teachers so that there will be a rebate of \$8 per week of school. This has enabled us to pay our teachers more without any extra burden upon the town.

REPAIRS

The Quarry schoolhouse has been painted outside.

The Nickerson schoolhouse which was in miserable repair, has been sheathed overhead, papered, and painted inside. Through the efforts of Miss Hoagland and others, several beautiful pictures have been added to the walls. Madison now has another school room changed from an ugly, dingy one, to one both attractive and better adapted for the education of children. Clean and attractive school rooms are great silent teachers of thrift and morality.

RECOMMENDATIONS,

The Nickerson school now needs a partition to separate the entry from the woodshed, and doorsteps. These things would cost very little and would add greatly to the looks of the school.

The Lake and Corner school houses need new blackboard space. It is recommended that slate boards be added, as they cost little more, are so much more serviceable, and never wear out. In most schoolhouses today, nothing but slate is used for boards.

The text-book outfit is now in good shape, and the up-keep ought to be easy to maintain. It is recommended that the district now furnish the scholars with paper, pencils, etc. This is almost the universal practice throughout New Hampshire. It would be a saving to the parents, as the supplies can be purchased very much cheaper in quantities by the School Board than by individuals.

Two new features have been added to the report this year: the Honor Roll, to encourage better attendance; and a table of facts for a series of years so arranged as to bring to view the movements and developments of the schools. Both of these features should be kept up from year to year.

DISPOSAL OF SUPERINTENDENTS TIME AND PLAN OF WORK.

My time is divided among the school districts in the union as follows: Conway 19-33, Madison 5-33, and Bartlett Special 4-33, Bartlett Town 5-33.

During the summer, every effort was made to secure the best possible teaching staff.

With many new teachers the first part of the fall term was consumed in observation of their work and making the necessary suggestions. As soon as the schools were well started it has been my policy to systematically test out the schools in the various subjects. The idea has been as far as possible to go the rounds with one subject at a time. In this way the visits have all been with some definite object in view. Some of the means of testing have been as follows:

Writing—By means of Prof. Thorndike's scale for measuring writing.

Arithmetic—Multiplication tables, written work, large number of oral problems.

Language—A written test of the application of good English.

Reading—Hearing everybody read.

Geography—I have usually outlined a map on the black-board, and then had the pupils fill in the mountains, rivers, cities, and tell the business and products of the various sections.

Spelling—Examined spelling blanks, and oral spelling.

History and Civics—To start a discussion of some topic to see how much interest the pupils take in these subjects.

Physiology—Board diagrams and questions, more especially pointed questions in regard to the habits of personal hygiene of the pupils themselves. Example: How many do not regularly use a tooth brush?

One large teachers' meeting, the Saco Valley Association's annual meeting, has been held in the district. I have attended several educational meetings away from here during the year, and have participated in two. Although my time has been largely occupied with actual school work, I have done considerable solid study and reading on the subjects of education. This is absolutely necessary for both teachers and superintendent, and it is an important fact for the public to realize, for a teacher is either growing better or worse every year. There is no standing still.

Again I wish to thank the citizens for their hearty support and good will which has made my work in the Madison schools a pleasure.
