# Report of School Board.

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Once more it becomes our duty to report the condition and progress of our schools.

A few circumstances have proved detrimental to the prosperity of the schools. An unusual amount of sickness has prevailed among the scholars, which caused considerable irregularity of attendance. Bad weather, also, operated unfavorably in some instances. These circumstances, which could not be avoided, have in a measure reduced the average attendance, and consequently prevented the fullest attainment in the branches pursued.

Good order has generally prevailed, though in some instances a certain amount of uneasiness and confusion which it is desirable should be overcome.

We cannot too earnestly recommend regularity of attendance, punctuality, and practical interest in all school exercises on the part of pupils, and the co-operation of parents to render these principles of practical value.

There has generally been very good progress in the several branches taught. The progress in arithmetic and geography has been commendable in most of the schools; grammar was not studied as much as would seem to be desirable. Good success appears to have attended the efforts in reading, spelling, and penmanship; algebra and history were successfully taught in some of the schools. Exercises in composition were successfully conducted in several schools. The requirements of the law in regard to physiology were complied with.

## TEACHERS.

There have been several changes in the corps of teachers from last year. All but one had had previous experience in teaching; that one, Mr. Bryant, met with fair success. We believe all have been earnest and faithful in their duties as teachers. They have evidently tried to inculcate habits of thoroughness in the lessons taught, and have endeavored to so apply the ideas involved that they may be of practical value in business in time to come.

## BOOKS.

Harper's system of penmanship has been introduced and adopted in our schools. A change in grammars would be desirable, but perhaps no change had best be made until after the coming session of the legislature is over, as a material change of the law in regard to school books may be made.

## SCHOOL HOUSES.

Quite extensive repairs were made on school house No. 7. No. 4 has been shingled. One side of roof of No. 13, and wood house attached, has been shingled. Repairs of less extent were made on other houses.

The blackboards in most of the houses were repainted during the past season; one new board was furnished No. 9.

Immediate action should be taken in regard to school house No. 6. at Centre Harbor village; if purchased, repairs will be needed.

It is recommended that the same amount be raised for the use of schools as in the past two years, viz: \$1000.
