TOWN WARRANT

To the Inhabitants of the Town of Sullivan in the County of Cheshire in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said Sullivan on Tuesday, the eighth day of March, next at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary to defray town charges for the ensuing year and make appropriations of the same.
3. To see what sums of money, including that required by law the town will raise for building and repairing highways and bridges for the ensuing year.
4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$297.00 for Town Road Aid. The State's share to be \$1,250.45.
5. To see what sum of money the town will raise and appropriate for winter maintenance of the highways.
6. To see if the town will raise or borrow and appropriate any money for the purchase or hire of equipment for the use of the road agent or take any action relating thereto.
7. To see if the town will vote to pay for digging graves of residents.
8. To see what sum of money, including that required by law, the town will raise and appropriate for the support of the public library.

9. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for a memorial or honor roll for veterans, or take any action relating thereto.

10. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for Memorial Day or take any action relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for Old Home Day or take any action relating thereto.

12. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$19.00 for the Monadnock Region Association.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the fire company or take any action relating thereto.

14. To see if the town will vote to raise and appropriate a sum of money for the aid of the Elliot Community Hospital of Keene, N. H., or take any action relating thereto.

15. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to borrow money on the credit of the town in anticipation of taxes.

16. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell property acquired by tax deed, or take any action relating thereto.

17. To see if the town will authorize the Selectmen to sell the hearses or take any action relating thereto.

18. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to help stamp out the White Pine Blister rust or take any action relating thereto.

19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$148.00 for street lights or take any action relating thereto.

20. To see if the town will vote to have a traffic blinker light near the East Sullivan Post Office and raise and appropriate money for the same or take any action thereon.

21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate any money for repairs on the town hall or take any action relating thereto.

22. To hear the reports of agents, auditors or committees heretofore chosen or take any action thereon.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Sullivan:

I herein submit my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

The expanding role of education emphasizes the need for revisions in our rural school programs. The present rural school district organization in New Hampshire has too few pupils and too little taxable wealth in back of each pupil to provide good schools on an economical basis. The Cooperative School District Law passed by the last legislature provides the means for well organized schools in rural areas. Neighboring school districts with small enrollments should consider in detail the feasibility of this plan as it applies to the local situation.

The school tax rate for the State of New Hampshire, 1948-1949, amounts to \$18.04. The school tax rate for the Sullivan school district is \$30.15. This high rate maintains only minimum facilities and should be lessened by financial aid from sources other than local taxation.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN

Your local organization to prevent and extinguish brush and woods fires is glad to report a good year of forest protection in 1948. In spite of danger conditions nearly equalling at times those of 1947 when great losses were suffered in New Hampshire and New England, fire damage and loss this year have been gratifyingly low.

With the continuing cooperation of all the people, we can hope to have another successful year in 1949. Let us remember that in any year, over 90% of all fires are caused by carelessness and that all of these man-caused fires are preventable.

Today, we have more slash and uncut grassland than for many years in the past. Smokers, campers and tourists who use our outdoors are also more numerous than ever before. We must therefore be ready for fires which might occur but, above all, prevention by everyone is the greatest need.

A few simple precautions taken by every citizen will help, as follows:

- (1) Always get a written permit from the warden before kindling a fire outdoors when the ground is not covered with snow.
- (2) If you smoke, always extinguish matches and tobacco before dropping or throwing them down. In automobiles, always use the ash trays.
- (3) Report fires and smokes to the warden without delay.

The observance of these and other simple rules will go far to insure safety from fire damage and your cooperation in this way is earnestly solicited.
