II. The meeting will reconvene at 7 P. M. in said School House to see what sums of money the Town will raise and appropriate for the following purposes and to transact any other business which may legally come before this meeting.

Bunker Hill Rd. from the Alt House to the top of Bunker Hill. Not approved by Finance Committee.

Article 21. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of (Total cost \$24,000.) \$8,000 as Tamworth's share of State Bridge Aid to reconstruct Bridge No. 032/051 near the Wonalancet Farm. Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 22. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$100. for the purchase of a copying machine. Approved by the Finance Committee.

Article 23. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 as initial payment to complete White Lake Road. The remainder to be raised as follows:

Article 24. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to start a capital reserve fund to be used for the purchase of a fire engine. Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 25. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for dry hydrants and for water holes. The Tamworth Fireman's Club will donate matching funds up to \$300.

Approved by the Finance Committee.

Article 26. To see if the Town will raise and ap-

propriate the sum of \$3,000 to be paid to the Tamworth Bicentennial Committee, Inc. for celebrating Tamworth's bicentennial. All profits from this celebration will be returned to the town.

Approved by the Finance Committee.

Article 27. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$3275 for the purchase of a brush chipper.

Approved by the Finance Committee.

Article 28. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$750 for the purchase of a York Rock Rake.

Approved by the Finance Committee.

Article 29. To see if the town will vote to establish a Planning Board of five (or seven) members with duties as set forth in Sections 1 to 10 and 13 to 15, Chapter 36, RSA 1955. The sole duties and the purpose of the Planning Board shall be to study the resources and development of the Town and the welfare and prosperity of its people and to make recommendations to future Town Meetings.

Nothing in this article shall give the Planning Board authority under Sections 11 and 12, Chapter 36, RSA 1955 nor shall the Planning Board have any power to impose any zoning restrictions or any other regulations whatever.

The Planning Board shall consist of one selectman and four (or six) other citizens appointed by the selectmen.

Article 30. To see if the town will vote to continue the official mapping of the town under the direction of the present Planning Committee. No Town appropriations are necessary.

Article 31. To see if the town will establish a

town Conservation Commission as set forth in R.S.A. 36-A.

Article 32. County Tax Approved by Finance Committee

Article 33. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes .

Article 34. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax collector's deeds.

Article 35. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute inventory blanks on April 1st.

Article 36. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

### REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

The Finance Committee, in joint meeting with the Selectmen, has reviewed and voted separately upon all items of proposed expenditures in the Town Budget. Your Committee has also held joint meetings with the School Committee and has reviewed and voted separately upon all items in the School Budget.

The ordinary items of Town expense show but slight change over the previous year, and the proposed expenditures were approved by the Committee.

It is the opinion of your Committee that the Town's growth in the White Lake area demands the completion of The White Lake road now. Instead of the piecemeal construction financed by direct appropriation in past years, which has left approximately one mile and a half incomplete, we recommend that the sum of \$2000 be appropriated this year and that the balance of the construction costs, \$8000, be financed by serial notes payable at \$2000 annually. This sum is no greater than what previously has been the annual appropriation.

The bridge near the Wonalancet Farm on Route 113A is in dangerous condition and demands immediate, expensive repair. The bridge can be taken over by the State and thereafter the Town is forever relieved of responsibility and maintenance charges, provided the Town now contributes its share, \$8000, of reconstruction expense - approximately \$30,000. Your Committee recommends the appropriation of \$8000 to be financed by serial notes payable at the rate of \$2000 annually.

Your Committee recommends that the sum of

\$3000 be appropriated to be used by the Tamworth Bi-Centennial Committee, Inc. for expense in connection with the Bi-Centennial celebration. The by-laws of the Bi-Centennial Committee provide that all unexpended monies and profits revert to the Town treasury at the wind-up of the Committee's business. Profit on some activities can reasonably be expected. A substantial portion of this sum may, therefore, revert to the Town.

# School Budget

The proposed gross expenditures for School expense are increased but 3% over the past year, an amount which the Committee approved and considers entirely reasonable in view of the substantial increase in Social Security cost - in High School enrollment to 82 pupils - and readjustment of teachers' salaries.

It is a gratification to your Committee that the School Board has now adopted a schedule of teachers' salaries which will come into full effect within the next three years. This schedule has been most carefully considered by this Committee in at least two meetings. Your Committee believes that the schedule is fair both to the teachers and to the Town, and that it will allow the School Board to compete successfully for adequately trained teachers - a condition which, unfortunately, has not prevailed in the past.

The ordinary expenses are well in line with previous experience, and budgeted amounts for these items were approved by your Committee.

We must express our appreciation for the careful and thorough work which the Town officers and School Board members have done in preparation of their annual estimates. Every item was fully supported by specific data and the full and frank discussion of each item which the officials gladly afforded, greatly aided your Committee in its decisions and recommendations to the Town Meeting.

### THE SELECTMEN'S REPORT

A study of the Comparative Statement of Appropriations and Expenditures for 1965 will show that many appropriations were exceeded. The selectmen feel that an explanation of the following items is desirable:

### 1. Town Officer's Expenses

The law requires that when a tax collector dies in office an audit be made and new warrants be made for his appointed successor. The cost of this was slightly more than the overdraft.

### 2. Police

1965 was a year of numerous cases of breaking and entering. It is obviously impossible to anticipate when the budget is made, the amount of police work that will be necessary during the year. The trend is that more money will be spent on law enforcement in future years.

# 3. Fire Department

The overdraft is installing furnace in new fire house. This should have been included in last year's budget but was omitted. The dry summber necessitated a fire patrol which added to the overdraft.

# 4. Summer Highway

In the latter part of the summer it was found that the structural members of the Sanborn Bridge had failed. A state engineer was consulted and the selectmen were ordered to close the bridge to all traffic. It was found that a prestressed concrete deck would be the least expensive replacement and would also relieve the town of future costs in replanking. The cost of this project was slightly over \$5000.

# 5. Winter Highway

While 1965 was a year of little snow, added driveways and roads put this item over the appropriation.

The financial outlook for 1966 would appear fairly bright. A large increase in taxable property is anticipated which should offset increases in town and school budgets.

### TAMWORTH BICENTENNIAL

1966 is Tamworth's bicentennial year. Two hundred years ago Gov. Wentworth in the name of the King of England granted to the inhabitants of this area the land we know as Tamworth. From 1766 to the present time many events have occurred. Tamworth started its growth before the Union and has grown with it, fighting for its independence and fighting to defend its liberties, sharing its prosperities and depressions. Without towns like Tamworth and people like our forefathers who reared their families, governed themselves, opened the roads, sawed the lumber, tilled the soil, raised the stock, rejoiced at the happinesses, mourned at the sorrows and prayed to God, this great country of ours could not have come into being or survived. But towns are like people, they have their own heritage, their own personality and individuality. It is now time at the turn of the second century that we set aside the time, the effort and the funds to perform a fitting, and memorial celebration of the people and the events that have gone before.

To accomplish this end, more than a year ago individuals and committees under the parentage of the Tamworth Chamber of Commerce, started making plans for exhibits and events. It was through their foresightedness that an article was placed in last year's Town Warrant to raise \$500 to defray planning expenses and allow some working capital to get projects started. Late last summer it was felt by the Chamber and others who had joined in the effort that a formal organization should be formed to represent the people of the town, correlate the many projects and transact the business of the celebration. At this time 17 persons joined together to form a Non Profit

Corporation, known as the Tamworth Bicentennial Committee, Inc., all 17 were named as the original Board of Directors, and elected the following officers: Earle H. Remick, president: Helen Nickerson, treasurer; and Mabel B. Hidden, secretary. The Board then decided that an Executive Committee of seven members, with an Executive Chairman, the three officers and 3 members at large should be established and empowered to transact all business for the Corporation. Whipple W. Farnum, was elected Executive Chairman, Elizabeth Wasson, Marion Spaulding and Charles E. Behr were selected as members at large.

The function of the Executive Committee is to hear any individual, group or organization that has a project they would like to include in the celebration. If the project is fitting and in keeping with the aims of the celebration, and its tentative budget and anticipated revenue seem feasible in relation to the effect on the celebration the committee will approve the project its chairman and committee and make it officially part of the Bicentennial Committee, Inc. Several committees and their chairmen have been so approved. Publicity Committee, Eleanor Grace: Ways and Means Committee, Robert Eastwick: Painting in the White Mountains, Helen Cole; Commemorative Plate, Mabel Hidden; Children's Art Exhibit, Four Tamworths of the World, Joyce Kumm: Regatta and Fireworks, Charles E. Behr; Horse Show, Marion Spaulding; Pet Show, Eva B. Seeley; Time Capsule, Stephen Damon; Commemorative Coin, Raymond Flanagan; Beard Growing Contest, George Wendell. There are more that are in the formative stage and several important areas that have no nucleus at this time.

We the Executive Committee need your help in ideas, time, effort and money. If you have any

thoughts that will make the celebration more meaningful, exciting and enjoyable, please contact one of the committee members. If you think the cause is worthwhile and are willing to contribute time and effort please contact one of the committee members. And as for money, we have a tentative budget of \$5500 that we hope to meet as follows; \$500 that was raised at last Town Meeting. \$1000 by sale of Commemorative Stock Certificate shares in the Corporation at \$1.00 each. \$1000 income from advance sale of articles, \$3000 that we are asking the Town to raise at this year's Town Meeting, as working capital to be paid back as revenue permits. Estimated income is \$4000 to \$6500. If there is any excess of income over expenses according to our Non Profit Charter, the money must be returned to the Town of Tamworth.

It is our Town, it is a Great Town, let us all get together and help in every way we can to show the world that we are proud and grateful for our heritage.

## REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Most of us who live in New Hampshire and the thousands of vacationists that visit us every year love the State for the varigated woodlands that encircle our clean lakes and clothe the hills and mountains. Most of us appreciate these values, but still there were enough careless people among us to cause over 880 grass and woodland fires to start in 1965. True this was a much dryer than normal year but this should have meant the use of extra care. Fortunately the fire fighting forces have held the line against such careless acts. It is up to each one of us to be ever mindful that a spark or flame is a potential fire.

### WE MUST ALL BE CAREFUL:

- 1. To teach our children the danger in lighting matches.
- 2. To never discard lighted smoking material from a car or while walking through fields or woods.
- 3. To safely dispose of rubbish preferably at the town dump. If you must burn rubbish or brush; a. Always get a permit to burn from the warden.
  - b. Start your fire late in the day after 5:00 PM.
  - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment
  - c. If burning a field or brush have equipment and adequate help on hand. The heat from your fire creates its own draft to spread fire.

Our carelessness with fire is costing our State and Towns thousands of wasted dollars in suppression and hundreds of acres of destroyed woodlands. Yours never to enjoy.

### THE PLANNING COMMITTEE

During 1965 your Planning Committee continued to work on the preparation of the Town Property Map and conducted a number of studies which have to do with the progress and prosperity of the Town.

MAP PROJECT The Tamworth property map is about 70% complete and should be completed during the 1966 field season. Sufficient funds are available so that no Town appropriation is necessary. The completed map will contain property lines of all areas except small house lots in congested sections and in new subdivisions. Separate maps of the subdivisions are on file for the use of Town officials.

The value of the Town map is already being demonstrated. Some land owners have been advised of errors in their deeds and others of incorrect estimates of acreages for tax purposes.

HEMENWAY RESERVATION The development and clean-up of the Hemenway Reservation was strongly sponsored by your committee. Field work to be undertaken by the State in 1966 will conform to plans to be submitted by the Tamworth Outing Club. Bridal paths, sled dog courses and better facilities for hiking and picnicking are envisioned.

NATURAL RESOURCES On a number of occasions the Soils Map has been used to determine drainage characteristics on various properties and their suitability for sanitary disposal. The survey of standing timber has been delayed, however, due to the unavailability of professional assistance.

Several conferences were held with the Soil Conservation Service relative to the Bearcamp River Flood Control Project. A field survey in September 1965 determined that the project is economically feasible.

The construction of flood-control dams could result in recreational lakes.

INDUSTRIAL DEVELOPMENT Parts of Tamworth favorably sheltered from radio interference by mountains are uniquely adapted for space communication. In expectation that the expanding activities of the Defense Communication Agency would require a tracking station, the Committee made field surveys of possible locations for a Defense Department satellite tracking station similar to the installation at Andover, Maine. Committee members visited the installation in Andover and consulted with a recognized expert in space communication in Baltimore, Maryland. An acceptable location in Tamworth was found. Aid in promoting the Tamworth location was secured from members of the Congressional Delegation and findings of the Committee were reported to responsible government officials. However, the Defense Department decided that, for the present, an installation already existing at Ft. Monmouth wiuld be utilized.

Preliminary negotiations were undertaken with a Manufacturer of Plastics who was considering a new plant in the North Country. Heavy transportation costs made the southern section of the state preferable.

HUMAN RESOURCES Members of the Committee have assisted in the application for financial aid for the Tamworth Pre-School. This makes it possible to give more children the experience of the preschool program.

COOPERATION WITH STATE AND COUNTY AGENCIES.

EMPLOYMENT The Committee has participated in a survey of employment opportunities in central Carroll County. Wage rates have been examined and progress made in Vocational Training to equip young

people for better jobs. Although the unemployment rate in New Hampshire is at an all time low, the rate for Carroll County appears higher than the State average. However no accurate figures are available as to the size of the unemployed labor force in Tamworth.. The Tamworth Planning Program might profitably be expanded into the field of labor force analysis.

TRANSPORTATION The Committee has cooperated with the RAD Committee in urging the State to make improvements on route 16. Road-side Rest Areas and other facilities for the motoring public were recommended under the Highway Beautification Program.

Members of the Committee attended the Regional Conference and initiated the reconstruction of the dangerous intersection of Washington Hill Road and Route 16.

Your Committee cooperated with the Carroll County RAD Committee in making a Town survey of the domestic water situation. Shortages were noted in Chcoorua Village where a new central system may be desirable. Land owners along route 25 experience serious road salt pollution in shallow wells. Tamworth has about fifty deep wells (artesian). Average yield is 9.4 gallons per minute, average depth is 213 feet with average depth to bed rock 52 feet.

As programs for Federal, State and County action come into prospect, the responsibility of your Committee to evaluate the effect of each program or proposal upon the Town of Tamworth is a continuing obligation.

### REPORT OF THE SPECIAL HEALTH OFFICER

During the year 1965, the Special Health Officer examined 43 septic tank installations and granted 41 permits for construction and use. Two installations were in the process of construction at the year end and permits were held in abevance pending completion of construction. One day was spent with Mr. Grossman, Senior Sanitary Engineer, Water Pollution Commission. Mr. Grossman did not approve of lot size and lot location on Mr. Maxfield's proposed development on Swift River. On the Bolduc Development on Route 16, septic tank layout in accordance with our Town ordinance was approved, but Mr. Grossman advised great caution in relocation of any septic tank outlets which might become plugged up. General density of habitation and small lot sizes leave little opportunity for safe relocation. Contractors and householders showed good cooperation in observing the Town Ordinance.
