WARRANT

The State of New Hampshire

To the inhabitants of the Town of Warren in the County of Grafton, in said State, qualified to vote in Town Affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at Town Hall in said Warren on Tuesday, the tenth day of March next, at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk.

2. To hear the reports of the Selectmen, Treasurer, Cemetery Trustees and other Town Officers theretofore chosen and to pass any vote relating thereto.

3. To choose one Selectman for the term of three years; a Town Treasurer; one or more Highway Agents; one or more Auditors; one Library Trustee for a term of three years; one Trustee of Trust Funds for a term of three years; and all other necessary Town Officers.

4. To raise and appropriate money for the support of the poor.

5. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of state trunk line roads.

6. To raise and appropriate money for the maintenance of state aid roads.

7. To raise and appropriate money for the construction of state aid roads.

8. To raise and appropriate money for the removal of snow on trunk line and state aid roads.

9. To raise and appropriate money for laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges.

To raise and appropriate money for Town Library
 To raise and appropriate money for Memorial Day.
 To raise and appropriate money for Cemeteries in

said Town and pass any vote relating thereto.

13. To raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for White Pine Blister Rust Control.

14. To raise and appropriate the amount of money necessary to complete Upton Bridge and pass any vote relating thereto.

15. To raise and appropriate money for other Town charges.

16. To authorize the Selectmen to distribute the blanks for inventories at the time they examine and appraise taxable property.

17. To see if the Town will vote to allow 3 % discount on taxes paid on July 1st; 2 % on taxes paid before September 1st.

18. To authorize the Selectmen to hire money in anticipation of taxes.

19. To see if the Town will vote to build a road from highway to Frank Clark's building and maintain same.

20. To see if the Town will vote to dispose of the Joe Fountain Mill.

21. To see what the Town will do with the Goss Farm and pass any vote relating thereto.

22. To see if the Town will vote to let the Grange have the Town Hall for the year 1931, two nights a month, for one dollar per night and pass any vote relating thereto.

23. To transact any other business proper to come before this said meeting.

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24. To see what action the Town will take in regard t Town Water System; vote to bond the town for the necessary money for same. Appoint a committee to make necessary investigations for Water System and pass any vote relating thereto. Vote to adjourn this meeting for further investigation.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of Warren School District:

I hereby submit my first annual report as Superintendent of Schooles of the Warren School District. The statistical information follows this report. The superintendent assumed the supervicion of your schools .cn May 1st, 1930. It being near the end of the year there was time only to familiarize himself with the problems of the district and finish up the year's work.

INSTRUCTION: Miss Hazel Maynard resigned her position at the Grammar School and Bernice Boswell was appointed to the position. Mrs. Evans and Miss Natalie Smith are in charge of the Intermediate and Primary rooms. Miss Wildie Stillings, a Plymouth Normal graduate was appointed teacher at Glencliff.

Owing to crowded conditions in the Primary room it has become necessary to split up the third grade so that one section is in the Intermediate room all the time and the other section is in the Primary room. This was done by the Stanford Achievement Test and by conference with the teachers. As a result each group is pleasantly occupied with tasks suited to their abilities and the seating problem is settled happily from the point of view of educational efficiency and seating capacity.

The school at East Warren has been closed and at the time of writing this report three children are being transported. It is generally understood by educational authorities that at least ten children should be in school to operate efficiently. Generally speaking, children receive a broader education in village schools by contacts with more children, more opportunity for group work, more equipment and more experienced instrution And finally there is a financial saving.

ATTENDANCE: The attendance of the district was 93.75 per cent and was below that of the state which was 95.50. Only the Intermediate room exceeded the state average. While a great deal of this was undoubtedly due to sickness, nevertheless, one cannot escape the conviction that a few families are unmindful of the loss of school even one session and others are keeping children home for small and trivial reasons. Not only does a child lose by absence but he slows down the class on his return. The law states that children should attend school every day that schools are in session.

It is my recommendation that a truant officer be appointed at once. It is a worthy position and one that should be well paid for the work and responsibility. One or two prosecutions would clear up the attendance situation for a good long time.

HEALTH: The district is fortunate in having a school nurse. Miss Underhill reports twenty-two (22) house visits in addition to school visits as well as two clinics. It is lamentable that so many parents are not apparently, in the least interested in the notices of the nunsie. She found 146 instances of underweight, defective vision, hearing, teeth, diseased tonsils and defective breathing, and only 32 have been apparently treated. This is a correction of less than 25 per cent. Children with these handicaps invaribly lose a good number of days in school and a consequent education. Any day's absence is a distinct loss to the average child for he loses the momentum of the class and the teacher has to reteach, to a certain extent, what the class has been over the day before. No child can do satisfactory suffering physical discomfiture, and furthermore neglect of these all important defects often develop into physical handicaps throughout life.

CONCLUSION: The School District is to be commended for the good equipment of its' schools. In particular its' policy in paying substantial salaries to the teachers is sound. In this way successful teachers can be secured and depended upon to stay more than one or two years. The Village School does not have to undergo the usual disadvantage in villages of constantly changing teachers.

In closing I wish to state that I shall be glad to meet parents at almost any time to discuss the individual school problems of their children. It is through such conferences that children often are understood better and do better work in school.


