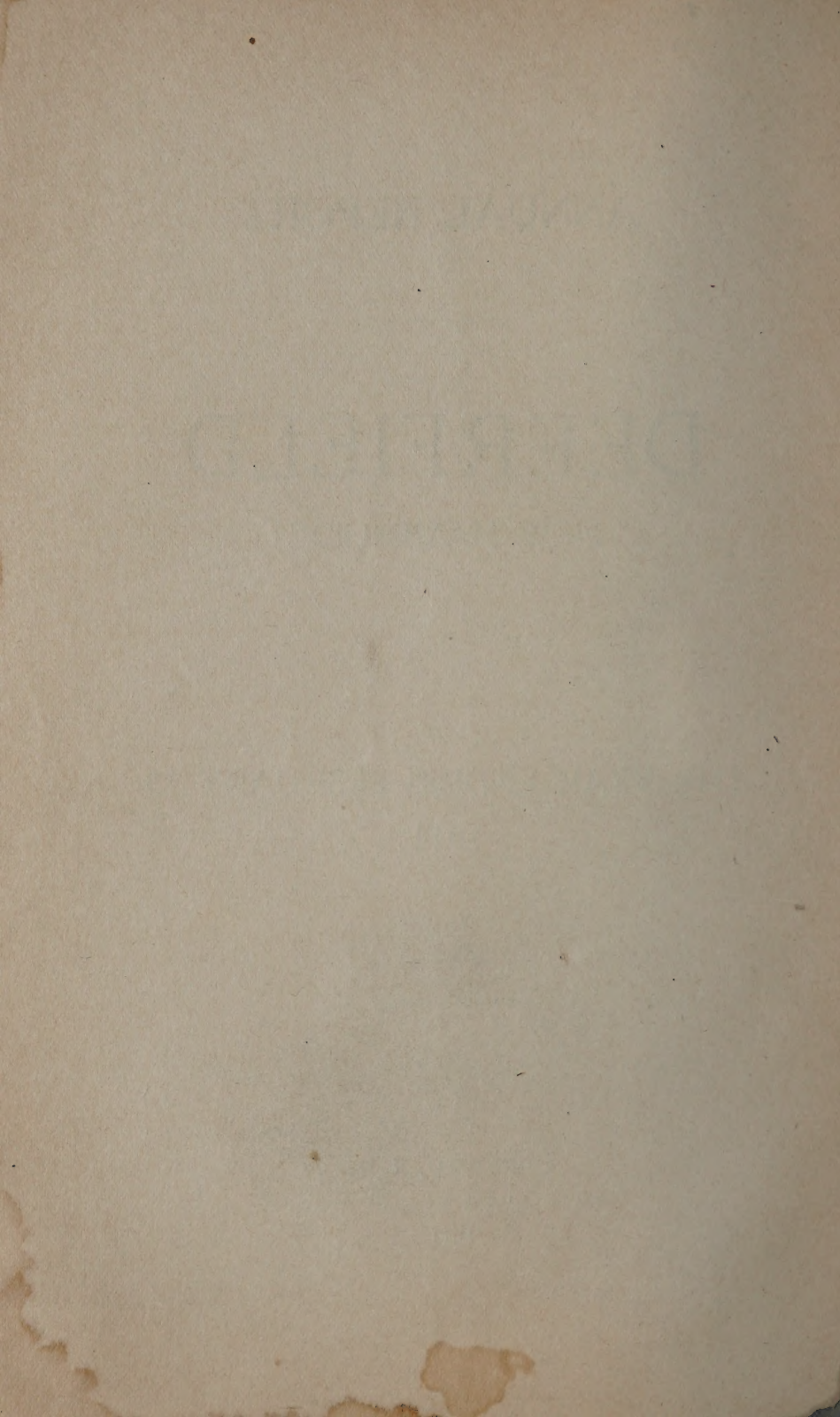

## REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD.

---

For the year ending February 15, 1911, we respectfully submit the following:

We have maintained eight schools of three terms each, having thirty weeks in seven districts and thirty-three weeks in District No. 1. The whole number of different scholars attending the fall term was one hundred and forty. The state compels us to maintain school thirty weeks, at least, in a year in order to be entitled to receive from the state treasurer our proportion of money paid for average attendance. The scholars at Nos. 6, 8 and 12 were transported to No. 7, making it the largest school in town, the total number of scholars being thirty-eight. The scholars at No. 3 were transported to No. 13. By uniting the two districts we were able to get a membership of fourteen scholars. The attendance at some of the schools has been very irregular, as the different registers show. If the parents would try and have their children present at every session of the schools, it would be better for all concerned. We were pleased to note the many visits reported by the teachers of citizens and others during the three terms.

We have paid for out-of-town tuitions for the year the sum of \$259.28, showing a decrease of \$83.60 from last year. We heartily believe in educating the young. We also believe that the citizens should have something to say at what age they should be permitted to leave the district schools and go to a seminary or academy, at an extra expense to the town, when they could be taught just as successfully two or three terms more at the district school. We have not expended any money for text-books, feeling the supply was sufficient for the year.
