## STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

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To the inhabitants of the town of Haverhill in the county of Grafton qualified to vote in town affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the town hall in said town on Tuesday the 8th day of March, 1938 at ten o'clock in the forenoon to act on the following matters:

Article 1. To choose a town clerk.

Article 2. To hear the reports of the selectmen, treasurer, cemetery commissioners and any other town officers heretofore chosen, and to pass any vote relating thereto.

Article 3. To choose one selectman for the term of three years, a town treasurer, one or more highway agents, one or more auditors, one library trustee for the term of three years, one cemetery commissioner for the term of five years, one trustee of trust funds for the term of three years and all other necessary town officers.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate a sum of money not to exceed three hundred fifty-one dollars based on 1-100th of 1% of assessed valuation to be paid as its share of the expense of carrying on an advertising and other beneficial program for the section of the state known as the White Mountains Region, of which this town is a part, in co-operation with the state of New Hampshire and other towns in said region, to be paid by the board of selectmen to the treasurer of the White Mountains Region.

Article 5. To see if the town will vote to make any alterations in the amount of money required to be raised and appropriated for the ensuing year for the support of the town and payment of statutory obligations of the town, as recommended by the finance committee in its budget report, to raise and appropri-

ate all sums so determined for the purposes so determined, and to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 6. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to issue interest bearing orders or notes to provide for the current year's expenses in anticipation of taxes.

Article 7. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to distribute the inventory blanks by mail or at the time they examine the taxable property.

Article 8. To see what action the town will take in regard to real estate taken over by the town for non-payment of taxes.

Article 9. To see if the town will vote to apply all money received from the sales of deeded property to the reduction of the temporary indebtedness of the town.

Article 10. To see if the town will vote to appoint a budget committee to supervise the appropriations of the town and to recommend to the next annual meeting the amounts to be raised for various purposes, such recommendations to be printed in the next annual report.

Article 11. To see if the town will vote to grant permits to druggists for the sale of liquor in this town for medicinal, scientific and mechanical purposes, under the provisions of chapter 144 of the Public Laws.

Article 12. To see if the town will vote to rescind a vote passed by this town at the annual meeting in 1935 relating to the adoption of by-laws to regulate the observance of the Lord's Day, to reject such by-laws as a whole, to change or modify such by-laws in part, or to pass any other vote relating thereto.

Article 13. To choose three delegates to a convention to revise the constitution to be held in Concord on the second Wednesday of May, 1938.

Article 14. To see if the town will vote to discontinue that portion of the old highway leading from

Woodsville to Bath from the point of intersection of that highway with the new highway at the top of Wizer Hill, so-called, past the dwelling of William V. Darling over the track of the Boston and Maine Railroad to the point of intersection of that highway with the new highway northerly of the Boston and Maine railroad track.

Article 15. To transact any other business proper to come before said meeting.

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## REPORT OF SELECTMEN

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To the taxpayers and citizens of Haverhill:

We herewith submit our report for the year ending January 31, 1938. On the following pages will be found a detailed statement.

### FINANCIAL

In 1936 we closed our books with an overdraft of \$8,824.39. In 1937, the overdraft was \$2,551.77. This year, 1938, we closed with a balance of \$442.92.

Our net debt, as reported, is now \$38,395.04 showing a decrease from last year of \$6,699.52 which seems to indicate we are going in the right direction.

### POLICE

At the last March meeting it was voted to leave the appointment of Chief of Police to the Selectmen in view of the existing controversy at that time.

We decided it best to go in a new field for a chief, and appointed Wilfred Larty. This, as far as we know, has been very satisfactory.

The appropriation was slightly overrun due to re-

pairs which had to be done at Pike and at Woodsville, to the amount of \$313.25.

We believe the town to be well policed. The boys now have a room in the railroad station as headquarters, equipped with desk, phone, etc., the rent for which they pay themselves.

### DEEDED PROPERTY

Last year we had deeded property (assessed valuation) of \$37,950. This year the tax collector handed us deeds to \$41,250 more which he is required by law to do.

Now, in our judgment, this is getting to be a serious situation.

Next year, in the interest of the Town, we will have to ask the persons who hold deeds to this property to pay rent enough to equal the taxes, and, in some cases, to turn over to the town, the insurance on the property.

This is a very unpleasant thing for any Board of Selectmen to do, but, in justice to our town and its taxpayers we shall be obliged to do this.

### INTEREST

The Woodsville Savings Bank gave us a  $\frac{1}{2}$  of 1% reduction in our interest rates on temporary loans which shows a spirit of cooperation on the part of the bank officials.

Our experience in the past shows that it is not in the best interest of the town to offer a discount for the prepayment of taxes as those who take advantage of this would pay anyhow. It has proven out that the town loses by such discounts.

This year we paid \$1,948.40 interest on temporary loans and gave \$1,857.68 discounts on taxes.

### HIGHWAYS

The highway expenditures have been kept within the appropriation this year. For the past five or six years the town has received from \$3,200 to \$6,000 from

the State to use on Class Five Highways. This year we did not receive any as a town cannot receive State Aid and T. R. A. in the same year. However, we had an unexpended balance of about \$1,500 from 1936 which was expended this year.

We will not receive any T. R. A. money in 1938 as we are receiving State Aid money.

Reference to detailed information on various pages of the printed report discloses amounts expended during the past fiscal year as well as probable expenditures for the ensuing year. The amount to be raised to balance the Budget is \$24,217 08. While this is less than was raised last year at Town Meeting it has been more than offset by the needs of the Woodsville School Dist. North Haverhill Lighting Dist. and Haverhill School Dist. to the extent that based on last year's valuation the rate will be higher than that of last year which averaged throughout the town \$3.11 Town Maintenance funds are divided as follows: 47 per cent to Woodsville and 53 per cent to the town.

The Indebtedness of the Town is \$6,797 69 less than last year. Bonded indebtedness is \$39,000. Temporary notes amount to \$31,145 20. Taxes due the town amount to \$31,569 65 which if paid would retire temporary notes in full. Taxes were paid better during 1937 and we recommend that the Selectmen for the year 1938 abate interest charges on back taxes to 7% instead of 6% now charged and as soon as possible increase rate to the 10% required by law.

It is our opinion that the discount allowed on prepayment of taxes has not worked out to the advantage

of the town and we concur in the recommendation of the Selectmen that such discount be discontinued.

Since last year's report was presented there have been made a number of improvements to the buildings or equipment. The porch roofs at the Graded School were repaired and the woodwork painted. In the High

School two of the physics tables have been made over into a chemistry table having a trough and running water. A new set of tablet arm chairs has made it possible to use the rear of the assembly hall for the recitations of larger classes. We hope this coming summer it will be possible to continue the refinishing of the interior walls in the High School.

Under the heading of activities I am pleased to call your attention to the successful work being done by our graduates in the normal schools, colleges and in business. In the tests given by the State Board last spring to all high school seniors, the Woodsville class made an excellent showing.

The High School is again enjoying the advantage of a supervisor in vocal music. I strongly recommend a music teacher for all the grades, a service which brought gratifying results in former years.

The new Community Building is filling a long felt want in providing gymnasium facilities. About forty junior high school and fifty senior high school pupils are out for basket ball this winter. The urge and the need for physical activity by children and young people is so great there is bound to be a beneficial result from these sports. I hope in time we may have supervised gymnastic training for all the pupils in the schools.

In behalf of the school I wish to thank the Rotary Club and the American Legion for furnishing suits for the teams of the seventh and eighth grade boys. I also want to express our appreciation to the dentists who helped in the clinic last spring and to the Progressive Club, who with the help of the Grange, the Rebeccahs, the Odd Fellows, the Rotary Club, the Lions Club, the D. A. R., the Methodist Girls' Club, the League, the Catholic Women's Club, the Legion, and the

Legion Auxiliary, are again furnishing milk for about thirty children.

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### REPORT OF THE HEADMASTER

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To the Superintendent of Schools:

I offer herewith my twentieth annual report of the Woodsville High School, for the year ending January 31, 1938.

There have been registered this year one hundred thirty-four pupils, sixty boys and seventy-four girls. These are classified as one special pupil, thirty-seven seniors, twenty-nine juniors, twenty-nine second year, and thirty-eight first year. There are fifty-two tuition pupils, thirty-one from Vermont, and twenty-one from New Hampshire,

The forty-first graduation took place in the Opera House last June. There were twenty-two in the class: Louise G. Adams, Elizabeth V. Brown, Luvia E. Butson, Laura E. Carson, Alice L. Chamberlin, Bernice M. Cinnamond, G. Samuel Darling, Muriel W. Day, Virginia L. Dow, Helen K. Field, Catherine E. French, John C. Gallagher, Kathleen E. Gray, Ora G. Heywood, Winona M. Hill, Earl W. Hodgkins, Jr., Elsie T. Nicol, Rachel D. Rowden, Constance Smith, Marjorie E. Thayer, A. Lorraine Wallace, and Richard S. Whittier. There are now seven hundred and twenty graduates.

First place in this class was taken by Constance Smith; Lorraine Wallace stood second, and Elsie Nicol third. The Alumni Attainment award was given to Luvia Butson, presentation being made by Mrs. Bradley Smith, '01. The Perley N. Klark music award was given to Rachel Rowden. An award offered for the first time by the local chapter of Quill and Scroll for high

quality of literary composition was given to Rachel Rowden. At Class Day exercises an electric clock was presented for use in the kitchen. The baccalaureate address was given in the Opera House by Rt. Rev. John T. Dallas, Episcopal bishop of N. H.; and the annual reception took place in the Odd Fellows' Hall. Details of all these events, and of the weekly school occurrences, will be found in local newspapers of the day.

There are about sixty recent graduates in twenty-seven different higher schools, eleven at the University of N. H., ten at the University of Vermont, and five at Dartmouth. For the size of our school that is an exceptional number in college courses.

The teaching staff was reduced this year, and Mrs. L. R. Warren withdrew from the school. Her classes were divided among the other teachers. She had given thirteen years of service, had organized the Quill and Scroll chapter, had supervised the Cycle, and deserves recognition for a long period of successful teaching.

The revival of Chorus Singing after having been omitted for a period of years is much appreciated; the introduction of a new graded series, "Prose & Poetry," basic English texts for intensive study, has strengthened these courses; the new self-feeding mimeograph has supplied a much needed printing machine, and gives the means of producing single sheets or booklets equal to the best.

We have missed the N. Y. A. employment activities. A new ruling this year required that any pupil applying for work must certify that he would without this assistance of six dollars a month be unable to remain in school, and none of our pupils could qualify under that regulation. There are, however, many small jobs about the school house that could well be done.

The Community Hall is the greatest piece of equipment in a quarter century. It provides a place for games and for public exercises of the school; and

gives opportunity for music instruction during all hours of the day. There should be an increasing number of pupils taking lessons on violin, horn, or some other instrument.

With the intention of sustaining interest in athletic expenses a new organization has been effected. A season ticket admitting to all home games and sports has been sold to pupils for one dollar, and to others for one dollar and a half. Voting members of the association are all pupils who have earned a letter in any athletic activity, and officers are drawn from this group. Other pupils who have purchased a season ticket are admitted to athletic meetings and may take part in discussion. About half the pupils have joined the association.

Our school was one of three in the state to receive mention for excellence in editorial writing in the nation-wide Scholastic literary awards.

Public speaking was presented in four sections, there being thirty-seven speakers, all coached by Mrs. G. H. McGaw who heard more than two hundred rehearsals.

The Cycle continues to be the school journal; it is managed by an able and industrious staff, and attracts considerable creative writing. A biweekly sheet called Cycle Chatter, gathering the news and small talk of the day, has been started this year.

A feature has been made of programs to celebrate patriotic holidays; numerous speakers have given inspirational addresses at the assembly; we sent a group of pupils to participate in the Scholarship day program at Plymouth Normal, and another group to the annual prize-speaking contest at Durham; some pupils took part in winter carnivals in neighboring towns; a large number have participated on the athletic teams and in the musical organizations; we entered a candidate in the D. A. R. plan of one girl from each State to make

a patriotic pilgrimage to Washington as an incentive to good citizenship. A class in Safe Driving was conducted for half the year, and a certificate of attendance was given to those who finished the course.

Bulletin boards have been kept supplied with matters of current interest; some moving films have been shown, and a number of movie stills have been on display.

Scarlet fever appeared late in the fall term and caused a large amount of absence, although all cases of the disease were quite light.

The Alumni Association has been maintained since 1920, and meets during the Christmas recess when many alumni are at home. This is a valuable organization and ought to be well supported, as it gives to young pupils a sense of the worthwhileness of the school.

Many other features, continued from year to year and mentioned in former reports, are in active operation. To adapt the words of New Hampshire's most famous son, "It is a small school, and there are those who love it."

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**REPORT OF THE SCHOOL BOARD OF  
HAVERHILL**

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We, the undersigned members of the Haverhill School Board, beg to submit the following report:

During the past year quite a number of important improvements and repairs were made, the foremost of which were at Alumni hall. Thanks to the generous appropriation of \$4500. at last year's district meeting we were enabled to install a much needed steam heating system, create two very fine dressing rooms with showers for the boys and girls, change over the lighting system and enlarge the playing space for basket ball games by removing the ticket office. New metal walls were installed, and both the interior and exterior of the hall were painted. In its present new dress the hall compares most favorably with halls used by other high schools, and we consider it a very valuable asset to Haverhill Academy.

In order to facilitate the work in the laboratory room and kitchen in the Academy building we had a hot water heater installed.

At Pike we replaced the porch with a larger and more practical one, also had a cement walk put in. The outside of the building was painted. The Primary room was equipped with 15 new desks and the School Board plans to install ten more by next fall, thus completing the refurnishing of that room.

Minor repairs and changes were made at some of the other district schools.

Through the help of Rev. Dr. Gilbert Wieting we were enabled to purchase, at a very reasonable price, a good, used piano for No. Haverhill school.

We wish to call attention to the annual reports by our Superintendent, Mr. E. A. Janes and by the headmaster of Haverhill Academy, Mr. F. H. Jenkins.

Attention of the tax payers and voters of the district is called to the proposed expenditures for the year from July 1, 1938 to June 30, 1939 and the budget has been prepared with utmost care and with a desire of strict economy.

The retiring member of the board is Mr. Wm. H. Slight of Haverhill.

Due to the small number of children it seemed advisable to close Number Ten School and transport the pupils to Center Haverhill. Unless there is a decided drop in the school population there appears no necessity of closing any other schools next year.

I am pleased to call your attention to a number of improvements which have been made since our last reports. At Pike a much more adequate and better looking entrance porch has replaced the old one. The building has been repainted and the primary room partially furnished with new desks. Before another year the replacing of the old desks can easily be finished.

At North Haverhill modern pendent light fixtures have replaced the old unshaded drop lights. While these are an improvement they are not sufficient and I would, therefore, recommend the addition of two more lights in each class room. The same situation exists in the two large recitation rooms downstairs in Haverhill Academy.

A boiler connected with one of the furnaces now furnishes a good supply of hot water to the kitchen in the Academy. The large sized classes in cooking find this much more convenient than the teakettle system formerly used. The chemistry table installed last year in the Academy has proved to be very satisfactory. As the classes are large we should have another such table added to the laboratory equipment.

The generous appropriation of the district, the presents of stage curtain by the alumni association, and window draperies by the class of 1937 made possible the remodelling and redecorating of Alumni Hall. The added facilities of showers and dressing rooms, the more comfortable and attractive auditorium are a pleasure to all who use the building.

The addition of more pupils has created a somewhat crowded condition in the elementary rooms at Haverhill Corner. We shall probably have to enlarge the room in the rear of the building by removing the partition and using what is now a storeroom. This would not be a complicated piece of work and would not cost very much.

The loyal support of the people of the district has been appreciated by your school board and superintendent. I feel sure any suggestions for the good of the schools and the welfare of the children will be welcomed and given careful consideration.

I submit herewith my fourteenth annual report of Haverhill Academy and High School for the year ending January 31, 1938.

The total enrollment to date is 116. There have been 15 tuition pupils. The five withdrawals to date leave the present enrollment at 111.

The decrease of 7 under last year's enrollment is due to the large graduating class rather than to a small entering class this fall.

First and second honors as determined by school marks were won by James Barber and Norma Hough respectively. The "John Dexter Locke Latin Prize" was awarded to Hazel Church and the Scholarship, Loyalty and Achievement Medal to Josephine Stebbins.

Eight of the above graduates are attending post-secondary institutions. Reports from these institutions indicate that all are carrying their studies creditably.

No change has been made in the program of studies. Copies of the same may be had at any time upon request.

The usual extra-curricula activities have been continued. While a majority of the pupils avail themselves of the opportunities presented in and through these activities, it is to be regretted that quite a number do not. In addition to the immediate benefits to be derived from the challenges offered in these activities, it should be borne in mind that prospective employers, colleges, and training schools seeking information in regard to graduates, are asking for the school's opinion in respect to certain personality traits and attitudes that can not be found in academic standing alone. Nor can these desirable attitudes and traits be developed through academic pursuits alone. The participation of the pupils in these so-called extra-curricula activities offers a most favorable opportunity to observe and record the reactions of the pupils to the challenges presented. The school is thereby placed in a position to make a more honest and just recommendation.

The baseball team won the Connecticut League Valley trophy last spring, losing but one league game. The girls' basketball team completed the season with but two defeats against ten victories and the boys' team won half of their games. Three of their six defeats were by but one point. Armistice day, Hallowe'en and Christmas programs have been publicly presented. The newly organized French club has also presented a one act French play. The orchestra continues to furnish music for school functions. The combined glee clubs presented a delightful cantata at the annual Christmas party. Several girls participated in a sports day pro-

gram held at Lisbon last spring and also in a play day held at Bradford this fall. Three teams competed in the annual scholarship day at Plymouth. The arithmetic team won first place while the other two teams stood well above the average.

The alterations and new installations in Alumni hall have made the use of the building a pleasure to everyone concerned. The reversing of the basketball court has resulted in a much better proportioned playing floor and at the same time has made available considerable more seating space. The change in the court also serves to protect the walls from damage. We are pleased to report that very little apparent disfiguration is resulting from the use of the hall for basketball. The hot water heating unit installed in the academy building has added a great deal to the efficiency of the work in the domestic arts classes and at the same time assures an adequate supply of hot water for general cleaning purposes. The usefulness of this new unit could be further increased at very little expense by piping hot water to the science laboratory and to the boys' and girls' lavatories.

The willingness of the community to provide the funds for these new improvements in addition to those provided yearly for the recurring expenses of maintaining our schools is evidence of its belief in, and adherence to the American principle, "that we can't afford not to educate our young people." It is becoming more and more generally accepted that secondary education is concerned not only with the welfare and progress of the individual but with these individuals as they promise a profitable contribution to the supporting community, state, or school district.

The fine spirit of cooperation displayed by pupils, parents, school officials, and the community as a whole is gratefully acknowledged.
