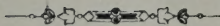

Acting under Article 10 of warrant, voted "that all books and periodicals now or hereafter belonging to the Library, be marked "Jaffrey Public Library," and that no other Library name be used thereon, and the Trustees of the Library are directed to see that this vote is carried out.

Parker Legacy:

Voted to accept the offer of Edmund M. Parker, and Gertrude Parker Sheffield, of Cambridge, Mass., under the terms and conditions set forth in Articles 11, 12 and 13 of warrant.

Voted to choose a committee of three to investigate the subject of a town system of Water Works, to make necessary surveys, obtain estimates &c., and prepare a printed Report to be distributed to the voters of the town, and that the expenses of said committee be paid from any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated. Chose Albert Annett, Charles R. Kittredge and Milton L. Hadley to serve as such committee.

Voted to purchase a Type Writer for the use of the Librarian and Town Officers, and pay for the same out of any money in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated.

## THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

### To the Inhabitants of the Town of Jaffrey, qualified to Vote in Town Affairs.

You are hereby notified to meet at the Town Hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine o'clock in the forenoon, to act on the following subjects:

1. To choose a Town Clerk and all other necessary town officers.

2. To hear all reports and act thereon.

3. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the support of schools, the maintenance of the poor, building and repairing highways and bridges, for the Town Library, Fire department, Memorial Day, Street Lighting and all other necessary town charges.

4. To see if the town will raise and appropriate a sum of money to assist in supporting the Conant High School, or take any action relating thereto.

5. To see if the town will vote to appoint a Liquor Agent, and to see what disposal the town will make of the goods now on hand, or act in any way relating thereto.

6. To see if the town will vote to accept the fund of \$200 00 as bequeathed to the town by will of the late Elvira S. Spaulding, to be kept invested, the income to be used for care of the Spaulding and Stratton lots in Cemetery at Jaffrey Center, or act in any way relating thereto.

7. To see if the town will vote to accept the Report of the Committee on Water Works chosen at the last annual meeting of the town, or act in any way relating thereto.

8. To see if the town will vote to accept the Charter granted by the State Legislature of 1901, authorizing the town to construct, manage and own a system of water works.

9. To see if the town will vote to construct and operate a system of water works in accordance with the authority granted to the town by the provisions of Chapter 265 of the Laws of New Hampshire, passed at the January session of the Legislature of 1901, and raise and appropriate or borrow money to pay for the same, or act in any way relative thereto.

10. To see if the town will vote to enlarge the Engine House, at East Jaffrey Village, to increase room for fire apparatus, or act in any way relating thereto.

11. To see if the town will vote to pay the firemen of Jaffrey Center for the first three months of their organization, from April 1 to July 1, of 1901, or take any action relating thereto, as petitioned for by S. H. Austin, E. P. Baldwin and others.



12. To see if the town will vote to repair the gate and wall inclosing the Cemetery in the west part of the town and make other needed repairs in said Cemetery and appropriate a sum of money therefor, as petitioned for by C. H. Plumer, D. P. Adams and others.

13. To see if the town will vote to build or cause to be built a gravel or coal-ashes side-walk from East Jaffrey Village to Cheshire Mill, and raise or appropriate a sum of money sufficient to pay for same, or act in any way relative thereto, as petitioned for by Joseph White, J. F. Whitehead, A. S. Burpee, J. B. Shedd and others.

14. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to settle with, and pay the Estate of Algernon S. Butler, just and reasonable damages, caused by fire running through his woodlot and over his premises in this town, in the month of April, 1900, or pass any vote relating thereto, as petitioned for by D. P. Adams, L. N. Willoughby, J. W. Poole and others.

15. To see if the town will vote to widen the highway from the foot of the hill below B. L. Robinson's cottage to the corner at Michael O'Brien's, or act in any way relating thereto, as petitioned for by Michael O'Brien and others.

16. To see if the town will vote to give a gas-light company permission to lay pipes in any highway of the town, provided said company should be formed by local parties, or act in any other way relating thereto.

17. To see if the town will vote to authorize the Selectmen to make a contract with said company to light the streets.

18. To see if the town will vote to discontinue the highway in Jaffrey Center Village leading from the Dublin highway near Mrs. Cozbie Tenney's residence and intersecting the highway east of the Common near the late residence of Dr. G. A. Phelps, or pass any vote relating thereto, as petitioned for by Jonas Cutter and others.

19. To see if the town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to purchase a suitable piece of land and erect thereon a building, in which to house the town snow-rollers and road machines, raise and appropriate a sum of money to pay for the same, or act in any way relating thereto.
