## SCHOOL REPORT.

---

*Citizens of Littleton*:—For years past it has been customary for Committees to report the town schools, that parents and friends of the scholars might learn whether any improvement had been made during the year. We think it highly necessary that each parent who has a child or children in school, should look to it themselves that the teacher was doing his or her duty.

It is important that the best instructors should be secured to teach the children of our country. Much good would be accomplished and the very best results would be experienced by all concerned if this rule were strictly adhered to.

The universal respect in which our teachers are held, is a sure index that their labors are appreciated; this respect and appreciation, as a rule, is well placed.

It would be no easy matter to secure a more able and conscientious corps of instructors, than the teachers employed in Littleton Town School District.

As shown by the School Registers our schools have been honored by more visitors this year than last. We ask a continuance of these visits and more of them; they stimulate both teacher and pupil, and afford visitors an opportunity to judge for themselves as to the work that is being accomplished.

The second year under the new school law has nearly closed, and we find but little dissatisfaction in the several departments. Our aim has been to give all the scholars of the town as nearly equal advantages as possible.

A word concerning our School Houses may not be out of order. In the report last year your board earnestly called your attention to the unfitness of the school houses in District Nos. 11 and 12. They are both there. One in No. 11 has been used 24 weeks for school purposes the past year. It seems next to an impossibility to use it longer for that purpose. The condition of the school house in No. 5 from outward appearances may be quite good, in our opinion it is cold, damp and badly located. We hope that measures may speedily be taken to bring about a better class of school houses in these districts.

## THE SEVERAL SCHOOLS.

### No. 1.

Summer term—ten weeks, taught by Miss Mary J. Wiles. Although a young and unexperienced teacher when she commenced here, yet her labors were not unsuccessful.

Fall term—eight weeks, taught by Mr. F. H. Dame. This was Mr. Dame's first experience in teaching. He was wholly unacquainted with districts schools, yet with a little more experience will make a fine teacher.

Winter term—ten weeks, taught by Mr. Matt Powers. Mr. Powers has had considerable experience in teaching, and we are happy to state that he gave excellent satisfaction.

### No. 2.

Summer term—ten weeks, in care of Miss Emma C. Flanders, a teacher of much experience. She was earnest in her work, and the school was profitable in every particular.

Fall term—six weeks, was commenced by Miss Flanders. Sickness in her family necessitated a close of school after six weeks of excellent work.

Winter term—fourteen weeks, taught by Mr. Leslie F. Bean. This district was fortunate in securing the services of Mr. Bean as teacher. The attendance was good, so the term was very profitable.

### No. 3.

Miss Alice Powers taught the three terms here of ten weeks each, meeting with success in all. Competent, apt, ready to teach and perfectly at home in the school room.

### No. 4.

Summer and fall terms of ten weeks each, taught by Miss Anna B. Cobleigh. A thorough scholar and good disciplinarian; scholars interested, progress good.

Winter term—ten weeks, taught by Mr. Loren E. Patridge. His skill and tact as a teacher are well known. The result was satisfactory.



## No. 5.

Miss Evelyn A. Wells taught the summer and fall terms of ten weeks each, giving satisfaction to all. Her method of instruction was of the best.

Winter term—ten weeks in care of Miss Mary J. Wiles. The scholars did themselves justice at the commencement of the term. The five at the close appeared well and orderly. Hard colds made the attendance small toward the last of the school.

## No. 6.

Miss Ardelle McIntire taught the summer term in her usual efficient manner; diligent and persevering in her labors.

Fall term—ten weeks, taught by Miss Gertrude Lang, meeting with good success in her efforts to maintain order. Her scholars improved under her instructions. Miss Helen Goss finished the year with a term of eight weeks, when sickness obliged her to discontinue the school. She is one of our best teachers.

## No. 7.

## No. 10.

Summer term—ten weeks, taught by Miss Myra L. Farr. As shown by the school register this is the smallest school in town. What progress was made I am unable to say, as I did not visit the school.

## Nos. 11, 18 and 19.

Summer term—eight weeks, and fall term of ten weeks, both taught by Miss Helen A. Goss. Good order, good instruction, good progress the result of both terms.

Winter term—six weeks, taught by Miss Abbie H. Ross. Her scholars had to learn as she governed them strictly, and kept them busily at work. The school was a success.

## No. 13.

Miss Hattie C. Vance taught the only term of 12 weeks. This school was small, six scholars. Teacher completed the term with gratifying success.

## No. 14.

Summer term—ten weeks, taught by Miss Elizabeth A. Tuttle. This is the largest school in town. The average for the year is not what it should have been. Miss Tuttle is one of our best teachers and did her duty faithfully.

Fall term—ten weeks, in care of Miss Katherine I. Dow, a teacher of experience; a hard worker. Not much interest manifested by many of the scholars. Her efforts were successful as possible.

Winter term of ten weeks was commenced by Miss Dow, after three weeks of school she left to accept another position, and the remainder of the term was taught by Miss Abbie H. Ross, to the satisfaction of scholars and parents. The school was as profitable as could be expected.
