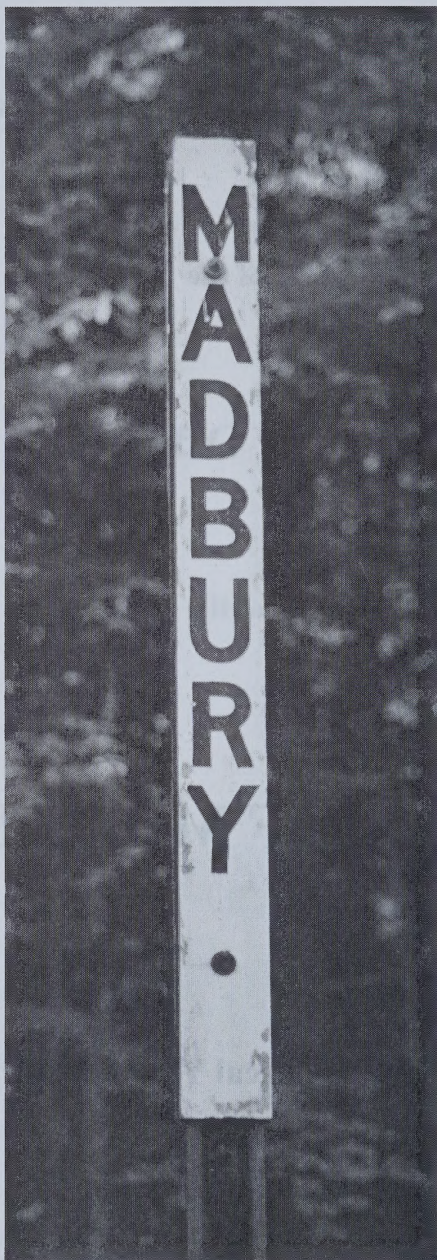

# RECORD OF TOWN MEETING

MARCH 9, 2010

Moderator Richard R. Houghton called the Annual Town Meeting of the Town of Madbury, County of Strafford, and the State of New Hampshire, to order Tuesday, March 9, 2010 at 11:00 AM. The polls were declared open and the following Ballot Clerks were sworn in by the Moderator:

Diane Hodgson • Mary Ellen Duffy • Melissa Walker • Jill Leavenworth

At 7:00 PM Moderator Houghton asked the assembled citizens (approximately 75) to stand for a moment of silence for those Madbury citizens who have died since last year's Town Meeting and to remain standing for the Pledge of Allegiance led by Town Clerk Pamela A. Seaver.

Those deceased include: Katherin Zenda Santarelli, Edith Comtois, Evelyn Louise Hodgson.

## ARTICLE 1. The following Town Officers were elected by Official Ballot:

Selectman for the ensuing three years.....Joan H. Sundberg  
Moderator for the ensuing two years.....Richard R. Houghton  
Town Clerk-Tax Collector for the ensuing three years...Katherine K. Cornwell  
Treasurer for the ensuing year.....Deborah M. F. Ahlstrom  
Supervisor of the Checklist for the ensuing six years.....Kathleen O'Shea  
Trustee of Trust Funds for the ensuing three years.....Molly Hodgson Smith  
Two Auditors for the ensuing one year.....Susan J. Cilia  
.....Denise DiHarce  
Cemetery Trustee for the ensuing three years.....Noreen Gaetjens  
Library Trustee for the ensuing three years.....Donald Melvin

## ARTICLE 2. Robert Hodgson moved and Robert Houston seconded a motion to authorize the Board of Selectmen to choose all other Town Officers. No discussion.

PASSED

## ARTICLE 3. Bruce Hodsdon moved and Roberta Stearns seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,156,135.00 for general municipal operations. This operating budget does NOT include appropriations contained in any other warrant articles.

Andrew Wood asked why, in today's economy, there is ANY increase in the new budget. Selectman Hodsdon explained that the Board took a hardline approach to all items in the budget and felt the 1.7% increase was a realistic one.



Moderator Houghton asked for a hand vote after a voice vote was not conclusive. The hand vote showed a definite majority vote in the affirmative.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 4.** Jay Moriarty moved and Mark Townsend seconded a motion to create a capital reserve fund for the purpose of reclamation of land purchased by the Town from the Estate of Michael Iafolla, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to add to this fund; and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Iafolla Reclamation Capital Reserve Fund.

[Madbury citizens voted on Article 4 of the 2005 Annual Town Meeting to purchase the G&R Associates property (Tax Map 3 Lot 16) for \$400,000.00 to be paid in yearly installments. Michael Iafolla, principal of G&R Assoc., died before the final payment was due in 2009. Madbury paid the Iafolla Estate \$51,500.00 (the final payment plus interest) and has settled with Mr. Iafolla's Estate]. Selectman Moriarty explained that the town received \$15,000.00 from the Estate to complete the reclamation of the gravel pit. This reclamation was part of Iafolla's obligation in the sale. Passing this article would create the new capital reserve fund specifically for the reclamation of the gravel pit, and allow the Selectmen to put the aforementioned \$15,000.00, which is currently being held in the general fund, into that new capital reserve fund.

After a short discussion the article was voted on.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 5.** Donald Melvin moved and Barbara Houston seconded a motion to create a recreational facilities fund for the purpose of planning and development of recreational facilities within the town, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to add to this fund; and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Recreational Capital Reserve Fund.

Recreation Commissioner Melvin explained that so far the Commission has been mostly working on the playing fields for kids. They would now like to address the needs of adults by developing walking trails on the Tibbetts property. After little discussion a vote was taken.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 6.** Joan Sundberg moved and Roberta Stearns seconded a motion to create a capital reserve fund for the purpose of purchasing police equipment, and to raise and appropriate the sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000.00) to add to this fund; and further to name the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Police Equipment Capital Reserve Fund.

Selectman Sundberg said that this action would put money toward the buying of the next police cruiser so that it would not have to be purchased out of one year's budget. Cruisers are getting more expensive each year and therefore harder to pay for all at once. With hardly any discussion a vote was taken.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 7.** Bruce Hodsdon moved and Jeannie Sowers seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$50,000.00) to add to the existing Purchase of Property and/or Easements Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2000 Town Meeting for the purpose of purchase of property and/or easements..

Selectman Hodsdon explained that we did not contribute to this fund last year, but now that the town is debt free once again the board felt it was again time to add money to this capital reserve fund. A short discussion was followed by a unanimous affirmative vote.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 8.** Jay Moriarty moved and Peggy Wolcott seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Sixteen Thousand Two Hundred Fifty Dollars (\$16,250.00) to add to the Property Revaluation Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 6 at the 2009 Town Meeting for the purpose of the revaluation of town properties.

Selectman Moriarty explained that this money will be added to the \$15,000.00 we put aside last year, which should be enough to pay for the revaluation that is scheduled for 2010. Madbury's representative to the Oyster River Coop School Board, Mark Townsend, and Selectman Moriarty fielded most of the questions that ensued concerning home values, tax rates, tax bills, etc. Citizens were reminded that 78% of each tax bill goes to local and state school taxes. Madbury's portion of the school budget is based half on daily student enrollment and half on the town's equalized valuation. A vote was taken.

PASSED

Moderator Richard Houghton announced that it was getting close to 8:00 PM, and that anyone who had not voted on the school and town ballots should do so. He declared the polls closed at 8:00 PM.

**ARTICLE 9.** Jill Leavenworth moved and Betsy Renshaw seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Twenty Five Thousand Dollars (\$25,000.00) to add to the existing Library Building Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 9 at the 2002 Town Meeting.

Betsy Renshaw, President of the Friends of the Madbury Library, spoke to how far the library has come in such a few years. She gave a brief overview of the Library's history and pointed out that it needs continued Town support in order to convince potential donors to give to the Building Fund in response to the Friends' fund-raising efforts. A vote was taken.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 10.** Tom Perley moved and Andrew Davis seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$15,000.00) to add to the existing Fire Equipment Capital Reserve Fund established in Article 8 at the 1994 Town Meeting for the purpose of purchasing fire equipment.

Chief Perley explained that this has been an ongoing fund that allows the Fire Department to purchase needed equipment without paying for it all in one year's budget. No discussion.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 11.** Joan Sundberg moved and Tom Perley seconded a motion to raise and appropriate the sum of Two Thousand Dollars (\$2,000.00) to add to the existing Trust Fund known as the Madbury Memorial Park Fund established in Article 6 at the March 1994 Town Meeting for the purpose of maintenance and operation.

Cemetery Trustee Rod Hutton explained that the Trustees plan to establish an irrigation system now that there is water at the cemetery. He explained that sprinklers would take care of the trees, shrubs, and turf in the center and outside of the circles as well as in the memorial garden. These areas get very dry in the summer. Selectman Hodsdon commented that the Town Hall grounds and ballfields are looking great due to irrigation, which is used only when needed. It would be nice to keep the cemetery looking good as well. After a spirited debate a vote was taken.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 12.** Eric Fiegenbaum moved and Kathy Frid seconded a motion to vote the retention of the unexpended portion of the 2010 Conservation Commission appropriation; said monies to be placed in the Madbury Conservation Fund. No discussion.

PASSED

**ARTICLE 13.** Gray Cornwell, Chair of the Madbury Zoning Board of Adjustment, made a plea for new members. The Board only meets once per month when necessary but plays a very important role in the town's governing.

**ARTICLE 14.** Library Trustee Jill Leavenworth thanked Peggy Wolcott for her dedication to the Madbury Library. Peggy is retiring as Library Trustee after serving one year as an Alternate and two terms (six years) as full Library Trustee. She is also one of the “founding mothers” of the Library. She will continue to volunteer her time and energy there. A round of applause from the assembly thanked Peggy.

Nancy Pape announced a meeting to be held on Monday March 15 at 10:00 AM at the Library to plan Madbury Day. Any and all interested people are urged to come with ideas.

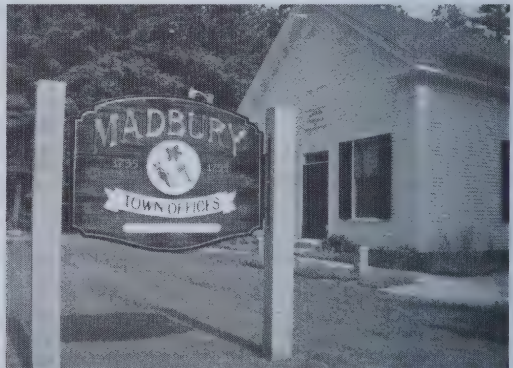
Selectman Chair Joan Sundberg gave a very warm and emotional tribute to retiring Town Clerk-Tax Collector Pamela Seaver who has decided to retire after 32 years of service. During Joan’s remarks honoring Pam, she observed that in many ways “Pam has been the face of the town,” and an “ambassador for it.” She presented Pam with a plaque stating, “In recognition and appreciation of her thirty-two years of dedicated service to the Town of Madbury.” Pam thanked everyone for their applause, stating that she has loved her career and that she hoped every Madbury resident knows and appreciates what a special place they live in. “Nobody has a town like ours. Nobody.”

The meeting was adjourned at 8:35 PM to count the ballots. The meeting was officially adjourned at 9:17 PM.

## BOARD OF SELECTMEN

Joan Sundberg was re-elected to the Board of Selectmen at the 2010 Town Meeting. Board appointments for 2010 were made following Town Meeting. Bruce Hodsdon was elected Chair and was also appointed to continue serving as the Welfare Officer. He also continued as the Board's representative to the Recreation Commission and will continue serving as the Town's representative to McGregor Memorial EMS. Joan Sundberg retained her position as the Board's representative on the Planning Board and as assistant to the Welfare Officer. In addition, she remained the Town's representative on the Board of the Health and Safety Council of Strafford County. Joseph Moriarty was appointed to continue serving on the Board of the Lamprey Regional Solid Waste Co-operative and to serve as the Board's representative to the Water Resources Board. He also will continue assuming primary responsibility for the Board's Road Agent function for the town.

The Board renewed several contracts this year, including our contract with Dragon Mosquito for maintenance of the town's mosquito control program. The program includes monitoring breeding areas and larviciding when necessary, and spraying for adult mosquitoes as required. The Board also renewed its contract with the City of Dover for use of the Recycling Center located on Mast Rd, and continued the town's membership in the Strafford Regional Planning Commission. A five year contract was signed with Avitar to continue assessment of the properties in town. State law requires a complete revaluation of town properties every five years. Our most recent revaluation was completed this year by Avitar, and this contract will continue the work they have been doing through the next revaluation cycle.

When the Perkins Rd bridge was removed, it resulted in the isolation of the Madbury Rd end of Perkins Rd. Due in part to concerns that emergency services may not recognize the new configuration, it was decided to rename this section and notify all emergency services of the change. After much discussion, it was decided to change the name to Miles Lane, due to the existence of the Miles' family graveyard in the area and the family history in this community. This change took effect on December 31, 2010.

In our ongoing effort to maintain the Town's right to withdraw water from the Bellamy River, the pumphouse and wells that have served this purpose for many years were repaired. Attention can now be placed on repairing the reservoir on Hicks Hill and the pipe system that leads to it.

A few years ago, parents bringing children to and from Moharimet School were given permission to park in a section of Town Hall parking lot in an effort to provide a safer transfer point and alleviate some of the congestion in the bus area at the school. In 2010, due to the efforts of Chief McGann, school zone signs were posted, and a school zone speed limit was established on Town Hall Rd. This is part of our ongoing effort to protect the school children of Moharimet School as they begin and end their school day.

The Board of Selectmen meets on the first and third Monday of the month at 7:00 pm at the Town Hall. Residents are always welcome to attend the meetings and to put forth ideas to benefit our community.

## POLICE DEPARTMENT

The year 2010 has come to a close. The department has been very busy with several major case investigations, some of which are still on-going.

Our department continues with yearly training. Officers have attended training in the areas of Command Leadership, Complaints and Warrants School, and Criminal Investigations. Officer Dronsfield completed a National Child Passenger Safety Training Program. This program allows Officer Dronsfield to inspect child safety seats and to instruct new parents in the proper use of these seats. Anyone who would like to have their child seats inspected should contact the Madbury Police Department for an appointment.

We have said good-bye to several officers and wish them well in their law enforcement careers.

The Police Department has also welcomed new faces. Sgt. Jacob Banaian, a 25-year member of the Barrington Police Department, will be assisting in Criminal Investigations and Juvenile Investigations. Officer George Main, an eight-year veteran of the U.S. Marine Corps, has graduated from the Part-Time Police Officers' Academy, and is assigned to Patrol. Officer Denise Inacio, a part-time certified officer with the Hampton Police Department is assigned to Patrol.

Madbury Police still remain affiliated with Internet Crimes Against Children Task Force. This program is being monitored by Officer Kevin O'Shea. We also continue working with school officials to ensure a secure environment for our school children. The "Special Events" parking, which was established last year, has been working very well. We appreciate the cooperation of parents, as well as school staff, while we worked on this program.

Our mission is to continue to work with members of our community who become victims of crimes. We continue to assist parents whose children have made contact with members of our department. Our efforts continue to allow many juvenile first-time offenders to complete a court-diversion program, where the offender performs community service in lieu of being prosecuted. I believe this helps the young man or woman to realize the importance of making responsible choices in life.

Through the efforts of members of both the Madbury Police and Madbury Fire Departments, the Explorer Program continues. This program introduces young men and women, ages 14-21, to Emergency Services. This enables them to learn more about careers in their chosen field. The Explorer Program said good-bye to three members, who all left for military service. We wish them well and God's protection while serving our country.

Our department has been working continually to make the Town of Madbury a safe place to live. We continue to enforce posted speed limits in our town. We ask that if anyone has concerns and/or issues in their neighborhood to please call, and we will address the matter. Please do not hesitate to call the department at 742-5566 if you witness anything suspicious.

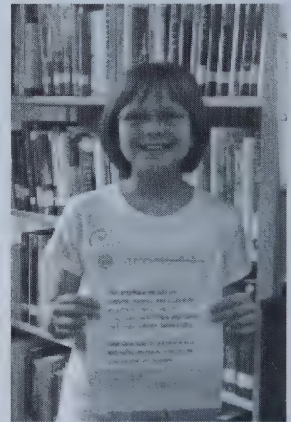

## PLANNING BOARD

The year 2010 is remarkable in the Planning Board's recent history as the year with no subdivisions. No new house lots were created in 2010.

The Planning Board has taken advantage of the lull, meeting quite regularly to work on ordinance improvements and to wrestle with the State's requirement to create workforce housing opportunities. This work led to two warrant articles that appear on this year's ballot: 1. Changing the Special Exception rules and 2. Allowing accessory apartments on single family lots. The former represents some long needed "ordinance housekeeping." The latter is a step toward serving the need for workforce housing in a manner appropriate for Madbury.

We anticipate another year with little subdivision work in 2011. We will use Planning Board time for ordinance work. We continue to struggle to find ways to meet State workforce housing requirements that make sense for Madbury. We have considered modifying our cluster subdivision rules for that purpose. In the course of those discussions we determined that the basic cluster subdivision ordinance probably needs to be rewritten to reflect recent experience in that area. Incidentally, the currently fashionable name for this subdivision concept is "Conservation/Open Space" subdivision. We hope to present related ordinance revisions for your vote next year.

The Planning Board has worked continuously to improve Madbury's Zoning Ordinances and Subdivision Regulations. We strive to make these rules serve the interest of the Town and its landowners by protecting important features and resources while maintaining the greatest practical flexibility for landowners.

On a different note, the Planning Board has identified the construction of motocross tracks and regular use of them as a land use problem. We find clear prohibition of this activity in the ordinance governing the General Residential and Agricultural District (most of the Town) and have recommended that the Selectmen act to enforce this prohibition.

## CONSERVATION COMMISSION

The Commission completed its annual monitoring of the four conservation easements held in part by the town. Biomass harvesting and wildlife enhancement activities on the Fernald easement on Nute Rd were being directed by a forest management plan and expertise from local extension specialists, as called for in the easement. The city of Portsmouth has had, for several years, a washout of a culvert on their right-of-way on the Hayes Farm easement. Together with the landowner, we prodded the city to repair the crossing with an appropriately sized fixture, and we sense progress. We continue to respond to inquiries about conservation easements from residents, and also provide assistance to other entities that have like-minded land conservation objectives for land in Madbury. The property market and economy add a higher level of uncertainty to the process.

There were three wetland applications this year: One for replacement power pole activities on a PSNH right-of-way, a second for a wildlife pond, and one from Portsmouth to replace a culvert on their water pipeline. We offered assistance to the Selectmen regarding a landslide on town land off Garrison Lane, which may require a wetlands application in the future.

Along with the Selectmen and Water Resources Board, the Commission supported the nomination of the Oyster River to the state's Rivers Management and

Protection Program. The program helps to focus state protections on the river, and establishes a local river advisory committee allowing for formal communications between the four towns that are in the watershed.

We arranged for the mowing of the Hayes Rd field access to the town's Bolstridge Forest between Hayes and Cherry Lane. In concert with the abutting land-owners' mowing, the practice enhances field habitat necessary for certain bird and animal species. The Commission provided an educational outreach display for Madbury Day. We also did some studying ourselves on the topics of "amending or termination of conservation easements," and "conflict of interest" as it relates to the operation of town board and commission members.

As always, we encourage town residents to bring us their concerns, comments and ideas by letter, email, or attendance at our meetings. While we picked up one new commission member this year, we still have an opening for a committed individual. We meet on the fourth Monday of the month at 7:00 pm in the Town Hall.

## WATER RESOURCES BOARD

The Madbury Water Resources Board concerns itself with issues of water quality and quantity in Madbury and the watersheds of the region. The many areas of interest are guided by the Town's Master Plan.

The Board regularly receives copies of water quality monitoring at the New England Metal Recycling facility (Schnitzer Steel) on Rt. 155 and continues to review the reports. Water Board members and Selectmen were given a tour of the NEMR facility that included a viewing of the newly completed redesigned storm-water treatment system. The board also joined Selectmen to tour construction of the new Portsmouth Water Treatment Plant. The new facility is due to go on line in 2011 and boasts increased capacity, improved treatment processes that reduce sludge needing disposal, and reduced chemical and energy requirements.

The Board continues to work with the Selectmen and the Fire Department to make repairs to portions of the Hicks Hill water system. The Selectmen arranged to make repairs to the pump house structure, electrical service, and access road. Two electric pump motors were rebuilt in preparation for system testing planned for the coming year.

The Board submitted a letter to the NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) strongly supporting The Oyster River Watershed Association's nomination of the Oyster River to the State's Rivers Management and Protection Program. The program takes a regional approach to local water protection by establishing a multi-town advisory committee. The Board also compared Madbury's Shoreland Ordinance to the State Comprehensive Shoreland Protection Act to identify differences and consider recommendations to improve alignment.

Of significant regional interest is the establishment of the Southeast Watershed Alliance (SWA) that was recently authorized by the State. The SWA is a regional organization of municipalities in New Hampshire's coastal watershed. The watershed covers 42 towns in New Hampshire, including Madbury. It was established by RSA 485-E in the 2009 legislative session in response to the Federal EPA request that New Hampshire set guidelines for improving water quality in the Great Bay, Piscataqua River and coastal watersheds. SWA's vision is a healthy coastal water resource that provides a balance between social, environmental, and economic benefits in keeping with State and Federal regulations. The mission of the SWA is to establish a regional framework for coastal watershed communities, regional planning commissions, the state and other stakeholders, to collaborate on planning, and implementation measures to improve and protect water quality and more effectively address the challenges of meeting clean water standards.

Jim Irish, of the Madbury Water Resources Board, was appointed by the Selectman to represent the town in the SWA. He attended the first organizational meeting in Dec 2006, joined the Planning Committee, and helped draft the SWA Bylaws which were adopted by the SWA during the general meeting in June 2010 after approval by the state attorney general and the NHDES. Irish was then appointed to a two-year term on the Board of Directors, which is now planning an

outreach effort to inform communities of suggested improvements in storm water ordinances, and provide a series of symposia on the state of the watershed, gaps in our understanding, regulators requirements and possible improved ordinances. This is a first step toward meeting the mission of the SWA.

The Water Board meets on the last Tuesday of the month at 7:00 pm, and interested residents are invited to attend and participate in the discussions.

## CEMETERY TRUSTEES

The Madbury Cemetery had no major landscaping or infrastructure projects in 2010, although the trustees anticipate having sufficient funds through the capital reserve fund to begin an expanded watering and irrigation system project by 2012.

One trustee sustained an injury in June when a headstone fell onto his leg. There was no permanent damage to any cemetery property, and the town's workers compensation insurance covered the expense for treatment of the injury. Also, a granite post at the corner of Town Hall Road and Cherry Lane was broken when, in late December, a vehicle slid off the road and struck the post. The motorist's insurance was expected to cover the cost of repairs.

Through an agreement with Moharimet School, the cemetery provided the water supply for the school's pumpkin-growing project on town-owned land just east of the cemetery.

The trustees also undertook an update and revision of the Rules and Regulations for the Madbury Memorial Park in order to bring policies into line with what the trustees have determined in the nearly two decades since the cemetery was established to be the most fair and efficient practices. The Rules and Regulations are available at Town Hall or on the Madbury website under Government: Cemetery Trustees.

## STRAFFORD REGIONAL PLANNING COMMISSION 2010 REPORT

Strafford Regional Planning Commission (SRPC), a political subdivision of the State of New Hampshire, serves in an advisory role to the Town of Madbury and seventeen other communities. We provide planning services to assist officials, boards and citizens in managing growth and development and to foster regional collaborative efforts.

SRPC's professional staff offers a range of planning services in transportation, land use, economic development, natural resources and geographic information systems (GIS) mapping and analysis. These services are available in customized modes to meet the diverse needs of communities. Access is also provided to SRPC educational resources including our website, library, workshops and forums, and customized training.

### 2010 Accomplishments:

- Collected Broadband Internet data from community anchor institutions as part of the NH Broadband Mapping program
- Completed Air Quality Conformity travel demand model runs for Transportation Plan and NH Ten Year Plan transportation projects
- Prepared a crash rate map based on reported vehicle accidents in 2009
- Updated the Town's standardized map set including transportation, conservation land, water resources and aerial maps
- Collected building permit data for all new construction; geocoded information to create an updated building permit map
- Worked with Town officials for submittal of the Oyster River into the NH Rivers Management and Protection Program
- Worked with Oyster River Watershed Association preparing nomination document for Oyster River
- Distributed New Hampshire Planning and Land Use Regulation books to Town land use boards

SRPC provided the following services to all municipalities in 2010:

- Hosted presentation with Washington DC Census Bureau staff regarding the Census 2010 draft criteria for developing Urban Area boundaries
- Approved amendments to 2009-2012 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
- Developed and approved the 2011 –2014 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP)
- Published the maps and database for 2010 Annual Listing of Obligated Projects receiving federal transportation funds
- Collaborated with Alliance for Community Transportation (ACT) to provide coordinated transportation for human service agencies in southeastern NH
- Published an email newsletter and alerts to keep communities informed of

- meeting schedules, events, local news and other beneficial information
- Downloaded and displayed the latest demographic and economic data to SRPC web page as tools for municipalities to utilize in planning efforts

Goals for 2011:

- Create a Strafford County Comprehensive Economic Development document by June 2011, including Brookfield and Wakefield in Carroll County
- Assist communities in their efforts to increase energy efficiency through the Energy Technical Assistance & Planning for NH Communities (ETAP) Program
- Solicit transportation projects for inclusion in the NH Ten Year Plan and Strafford Metropolitan Transportation Plan.
- Begin broadband planning for the region as next phase of the NH Broadband Mapping and Planning Project

## DRAGON MOSQUITO CONTROL

The 2010 mosquito season was quiet and rather uneventful but I'm not complaining. It was nice to have a season where Eastern Equine Encephalitis (EEE) wasn't ruining the summer. Dry conditions helped to keep the mosquito population down. New Hampshire didn't escape the year without some arboviral activity. There was one EEE horse in Freedom, one West Nile Virus (WNV) mosquito sample in Manchester and a human case of WNV in Mason, NH. Over the border, Massachusetts was experiencing record levels of disease activity prompting the State to conduct aerial spraying in some counties.

Dragon has identified 74 larval mosquito habitats in the Town of Madbury. Crews checked freshwater sites 304 times throughout the season. There were 64 sites treated to eliminate mosquito larvae. In addition, 47 catch basin treatments were made to combat disease carrying mosquitoes. Adult mosquitoes were monitored at four locations throughout town. The mosquitoes were collected in light traps, identified to species, and sent to the State Lab to be tested for diseases. None of the mosquitoes collected in town tested positive for disease. Spraying to control adult mosquitoes was not conducted last season since no EEE or WNV was found in Madbury.

The proposed 2011 Mosquito Control plan for Madbury includes trapping mosquitoes for disease testing, sampling wetlands for larval mosquito activity, larviciding where mosquito larvae are found, efficacy monitoring and emergency spraying when a public health threat exists. The control program begins in April when mosquito larvae are located in stagnant water such as swamps, marshes, ditches, and woodland pools. Trapping adult mosquitoes begins in July. The mosquito control program ends in late September or early October when temperatures drop and daylight diminishes.

Dragon will be introducing an organic larvicide to our arsenal of products for the municipal control program. Natular™ will be the first organic larvicide used to control mosquitoes for municipalities in NH. Natular™ is listed by the Organic Material Review Institute (OMRI) for use in and around organic agriculture.

Homeowners can reduce the number of mosquitoes in their yard by emptying any outdoor containers that hold standing water such as buckets, trash barrels, and boats. Tires collect enough water for mosquitoes to survive. It is also a good idea to change the water in bird baths every two or three days.

If you're new in town and do not want your property treated for mosquitoes, then a written request is needed. Please send a letter to Dragon Mosquito Control, P.O. Box 46, Stratham, NH 03885. Be sure to include your name, physical address, phone number, and a description of your property with boundaries. Otherwise, your property may be treated. Anyone who sent a written request in 2010 may call the office to reaffirm your request. Our phone number is 964-8400. You may call our office for assistance regarding mosquitoes, the insecticides we use, spray dates, or questions about EEE or WNV.
