School Report.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT KNOWLTON. To the School Board and Citizens of Madison:

Mr. Chairman and members of the Board-

I have the honor and privilege to submit to you my first annual report of the public schools of Madison for the year ending March 1, 1913, it being the fourth in the series of such reports.

I entered your field of service last August, and have endeavored to pick up the threads of administration of my predecessor, Mr. E. C. Witham, thus to carry on the work with as little break as possible. We feel that this has been fairly successfully accomplished through the valuable assistance rendered by members of the School Board.

For a school report to be of value to the citizens, it is necessary for it to contain some local school history that progress may be noted as well as the plans and aspirations of the future.

Rank cards have been made out for all the schools. These are so arranged as to take the place of promotion cards at the close of the school year. Duplicate reports are kept so that the loss of a card does not mean the loss of a child's record.

Along with these cards, we have introduced a partial set of the National School Record System used by all up-to-date school systems and approved by the U. S. Commissioner of Education. We did not use a full set of records as our system is not sufficiently large. This system gives on one card the record of the child from the time that he enters school till he has graduated from high school and what he does when he has left school. These records are made out in duplicate.

The State Course of Study has been followed as closely as possible in our schools. We are in hopes to follow it more closely and extensively as time goes on. The following teachers have been employed during the past year: Mrs. Ethel M. Lane, fall and winter term at Silver Lake; Margaret M. Stevens, spring, fall and winter terms at the Corner school; L. Bessie Parker, fall and winter terms at Nickerson school; Anne Kenneally, Quarry school for one week and Georgianna Hurlin for four weeks. Of these teachers, Misses Kenneally, Stevens and Parker are normal graduates.

At the end of the fifth week, the Quarry school was closed on account of very few pupils and those not attending. The pupils have been attending the Albany schools since the closing of this school. We would recommend that arrangements be made with the Town of Albany to furnish schooling for the pupils in Madison belonging to the Quarry school.

Some slate boards ought to be supplied for the Silver Lake school also some at the Corner school. The teacher at the Corner school ought to be supplied with a desk in place of the old table now in use. The Nickerson should have a book closet.

My time has ceen divided as follows: $\frac{3}{5}$ to Conway, $\frac{1}{5}$ to Madison, $\frac{1}{5}$ to Bartlett Town and $\frac{1}{5}$, o Bartlett Special.

During the fall and winter terms, I made 37 visits to the Madison schools. It has not been possible to hold teachers' meetings as the schools are so scattered. I have discussed the needs, offered suggestions, etc. to the teachers at the time of my visits, usually after the session closed, treating each school as its needs seemed to require.

Some simple tests have been given, not to see what the children could do with difficult problems but to test their ability to apply what they have been studying to every day conditions. The results were not all that might be desired. We feel confident that more satisfactory results will follow in due season.

BOOKS AND SUPPLIES.

The regular supplies have been purchased consisting of paper, pencils, crayon, ink, pens, etc. We have endeavored to have these used economically. A few new spellers have been purchased to supply the place of those worn out, in the Silver Lake school. A few histories, arithmetics, physiologies, geographies and supplementary readers have been purchased. These have been to supply the classes using the books. More supplementary readers are needed and individual dictionaries for the upper grades.

We would recommend that a pupil entering the sixth grade be given a new geography, arithmetic and grammar and that he shall use the same books for as long a time as he shall remain in the elementary school. When he shall have completed the course satisfactorily, these same books are to become his property. If the child destroys these books before he has completed the elementary course he shall replace them. The average life of a school book is three years, much less in the hands of some children. We believe that this will not materially increase the cost of books and will keep the books in much better condition, and further, the child will have some books for reference when he has left school.

GIFTS

The Nickerson school has received the present of a nice organ, and I understand that the children have some funds that they are to use for a gift to the school. This money was earned by an entertainment given by the school. The pupils and teacher gave an entertainment at Silver Lake school, and the funds from it were used to purchase a beautiful clock, dictionary and dictionary stand for the school. The pupils and teacher at Madison Corner school gave an entertainment. The funds from this, I understand, are to be used in the purchase of a dictionary and a holder for the same. In behalf of the district, J wish to thank you for these useful gifts.

CONCLUSION

In conclusion, I wish to take this opportunity to thank the teachers for their faithful work in their endeavor to carry out our suggestions and for their co-operation and support.

I also wish to thank those parents who have taken an active interest in our schools and who have labored with us for their betterment and success. We trust that all will unite with us in this one important question, the education of our boys and girls, so that our schools shall grow in thoroughness and efficiency.

We hope to see the coming year, less tardiness, better attendance, full co-operation of parents, teachers and pupils, all trained teachers, fewer changes in teachers, better results in reading, writing and arithmetic.

To you members of the School Board, I wish to extend my sincere thanks for your assistance, suggestions, support and hearty co-operation in my varied duties to the Madison School District.
