STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE.

*To the inhabitants of the Town of Milan qualified to vote
in town affairs.*

You are hereby notified to meet at Knights of Pythias hall in said town, on the second Tuesday of March next, at nine of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Clerk.
2. To choose by ballot and major vote three Selectmen.
3. To choose by ballot and major vote a Town Treasurer
4. To choose Road Agents and all other necessary town officers, including Fish and Game Wardens.
5. To raise such sums of money as may be necessary for the maintenance of the poor and other necessary charges arising within the town.
6. To see what sums of money the town will raise for laying out, building and repairing highways and bridges.
7. To see what sums of money the town will raise for breaking roads during the winter of 1910 and 1911.
8. To see what sum of money the town will raise to rebuild the bridge and abutments that crosses the north branch near Bean & Hodgdon's mill.
9. To raise such sum of money as may be necessary for the support of schools.

10. To see if the town will vote not to distribute inventory blanks until such time as the selectmen shall examine and appraise property to be taxed.

11. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the library.

12. To choose a library trustee to serve three years.

13. To see what sum of money the town will vote to raise and appropriate for the observance of Memorial Day.

14. To see if the town will vote to lay a sewer in West Milan from Postoffice to the American Realty R. R., thence to the river, and appropriate money for the same.

15. To see if the town will vote to buy two snow rollers and appropriate money for same.

16. To hear the reports of the agents, auditors, committees or officers heretofore chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.

Chairman's Report.

To the citizens of the School District of Milan:

The fiscal year has closed, and in accordance with the established custom, you doubtless wish to learn how your money has been spent, and what has been accomplished in the schools in the opinion of the school board.

The attendance in the Village and Jewett schools has been unusually good all the year, and fair in the other schools during comfortable weather.

The average attendance for the school year ending July 15, 1909 was over 90 per cent. It seems this might be increased by opening the rural schools earlier in the spring and fall. The larger the per cent. of attendance the more school money is received from the state.

We have endeavored to obtain teachers, as far as possible, who were Normal graduates, or who held state certificates, as the district receives \$2.00 per week from the state for each such teacher employed. The demand for such teachers is great, the supply is small; they demand higher wages, but are well worth them. We hope to see these "qualified" teachers in every school in the near future.

As you are well aware the best advancement has been made in those schools where the same teachers have been retained for several terms. In these the course of study, now on the third year of its use, has been well carried out, and pupils can pass from any grade to the same grade in larger towns and cities, or enter High school and maintain a high standing. Some of the teachers who taught but one term did good work and under

more favorable circumstances were capable of doing better. A lack of co-operation on the part of parents, and guidance on the part of the school board at the first of the term, with teachers unaccustomed to our country life and ways, gave a few very poor scholars we are sorry to say. Many of our teachers come here strangers, as parents, is it not our duty to make their stay pleasant? Can you not do better work when you feel those about you appreciate your endeavors? In some instance teachers have doubtless been at fault, such have not been retained, even some good instructors have not been, because so much talk had been made about them they would not stay. Parents, do co-operate with the teachers, especially as to discipline.

It is with you to greatly improve our schools herein. Please do not think I am partial, but I would like for example to call your attention to the Jewett school. Here the same teachers have remained for a long time, the pupils make it so pleasant, they are glad to all work together for the interest of the school, and the consequence is a rural school as thoroughly instructed and well graded as any school in town, scholars alive in their work and opportunities and discipline of the best. There are several other schools of which the same is true and might be of all.

The question of boarding teachers, as you know it has been a troublesome one during the year. Doubtless few of you care to go to the trouble, but do you consider teachers must be had if we have schools and they must be comfortably housed in order to do their work. It would be a serious case to have to discontinue any school because no one would board the teacher, or at a reasonable rate. It came near being such in several instances the past year. You can see the extra expense it caused.

Some are asking the question "what about the \$200

raised to supply teachers in the village grammar schools who would teach first year High school subjects?" The teachers were hired with the understanding, the text-books provided, and the course of study laid out. No pupils appeared to pursue the course, yet the teachers were ready and paid for the work.

In the matter of repairs, the Jewett school house has been put in good condition, making an attractive school house. The Milan village building had some necessary repairing done. The furniture, apparatus and building here showed gross carelessness. I wish it were possible for pupils never to be in our school buildings without the presence of a teacher or caretaker, as is done in some places. Of course this is impossible now, yet let us endeavor to keep our children at home until as near time for teachers to be present as possible. Not only for the safety of school property, but for their own sakes morally.

Four slate blackboards have been placed near the stove at West Milan where lithoplate from heat cracks and lasts but a short time. These look expensive are only half more than lithoplate and practically everlasting. I hope they may replace other kinds, as the old boards wear out. Minor repairs have been made in most of the school buildings.

No changes have been made in text-books. Forman's Civil Government has been introduced, it seems a change in grammars and spelling books would be for the improvement of our school.

Books purchased with two years as a rule have been better cared for than formerly, still there is a chance for improvement. Parents do unite with teachers and school board in teaching children to be careful of our school property, for one reason if no other that they enjoy nice clean books so much better than filthy ones. I have found children and teachers, I am sorry to say,

doubling books together in the back—result soon a book devoid of course—that no child wants.

The course of study in a slightly changed form has been printed and placed in the schools. We think this course has made great improvement in our schools. Teachers speak of it as very helpful, very clear and concise. The pupils take greater interest, work harder to accomplish what is planned for them, with the goal of a promotion to strive for.

The five years which I have served as a member of the school board have been very pleasant. I have enjoyed watching the advancement of the children, and general improvement in the school system. I feel a personal interest in each scholar, and in closing my term of office urge you to do the best work and be the best you possibly can during all your schooldays here; then to continue if possible your education in some higher institution of learning, anyway to always be a student whether in or out of school.

You citizens have been exceedingly kind to me for which I thank you heartily. I feel you already have an interest in our schools, though I do not find as many of your names among the school visitors as I wish. Why not make it a point to visit the school once each term, to make the teachers acquaintance. You can be mutually helpful, making the school a center of good feeling and a success.
