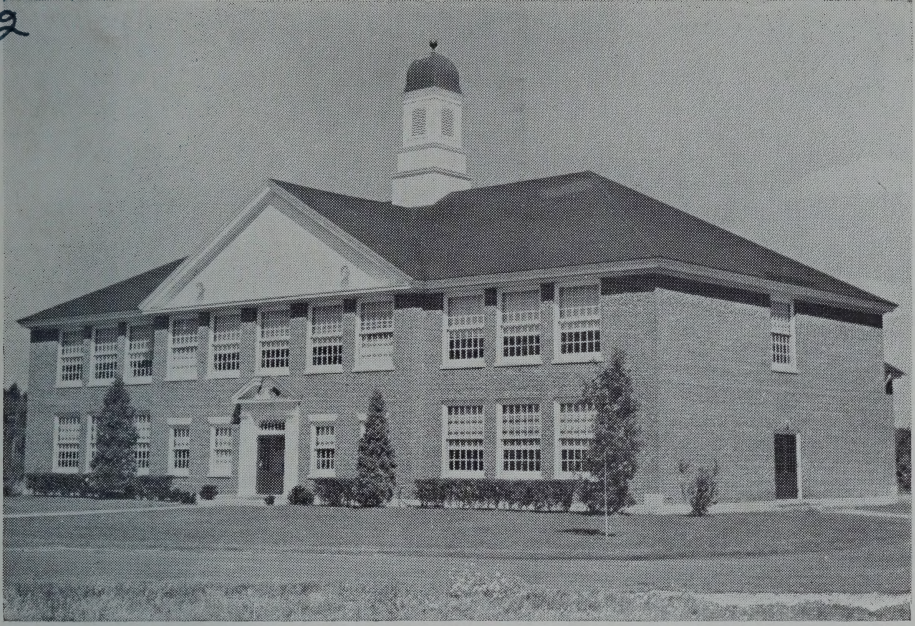

You are hereby notified to meet at Whipple Memorial Hall in said New London on Tuesday, the ninth day of March, next at ten of the clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing.
2. To hear reports of Agents and Committees heretofore chosen and pass vote relating thereto.
3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$10,685.00 to defray Town Charges for the ensuing year. This sum includes:

4. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the observance of Memorial Day.

5. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000.00 for Tracy Memorial Library for the ensuing year.

6. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$600.00 for Cemetery Purposes for the ensuing year.

7. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,800.00 for street lighting for the ensuing year.

8. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the installation of a street light and raise and appropriate \$30.00 for the purpose of maintaining the same for the group of houses on Lakeside Road beginning at the Brooks residence and ending at Joseph Tilton's.

9. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000.00 for the support of the New London Hospital for the ensuing year. This amount to include \$300.00 for the care of Town Poor.

10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$400.00 for the purpose of control and eradication of Pine Blister rust.

11. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$11,500.00 for summer maintenance and \$4,500.00 for winter maintenance of highways, bridges and sidewalks for the ensuing year.

12. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$566.91, the State to contribute \$3,779.40 for Town Road Aid.

13. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,500.00 for Fire Department maintenance for the ensuing year.

14. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropri-

ate the sum of \$3,100.00 for the Police Department for the ensuing year.

15. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$150.00 for the care of shade trees.

16. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,000.00 for the improvement of sidewalks.

17. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of grading the lower end of the Nelson Lot for a skating rink. The New London Outing will finance the maintenance of said rink.

*18. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$250.00 for the purpose of maintaining the Information Booth.

*19. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for publicizing and advertising the Lake Sunapee area, the same to be turned over to the Lake Sunapee Board of Trade for the purpose.

*20. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$200.00 for the purpose of publicizing and promoting the natural resources and advantages of the Town, together with other towns in the Dartmouth-Lake Sunapee Region.

21. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,296.28 for Sewer Maintenance for the ensuing year.

22. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,400.00 for Hydrant Service for the ensuing year.

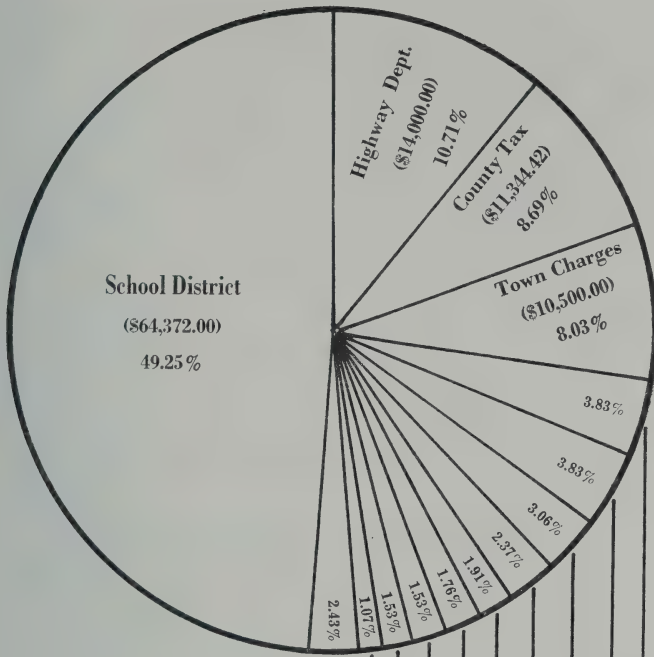

ANNUAL REPORT

TRACY MEMORIAL LIBRARY

On its twenty - third year, ending Dec. 31, 1953, Tracy Memorial Library shows a year of active service, both as a library and a community center.

The circulation records show an increase over last year and are as follows:

Adult fiction	7330
Adult non-fiction	1923
Adult magazines	1115
Juvenile fiction	4394
Juvenile non-fiction	949
Juvenile magazines	292

The library has purchased 396 new books and 49 more have been received as gifts from our friends. Through subscriptions and gifts, we have 54 magazines on our magazine table for reading and circulation.

Through our library, during this year, have passed 11,811 visitors.

We have met all inter-library loans with promptness and have kept a friendly relationship with the Fernald Library at Colby Junior College. On alternate months, the State Library Bookmobile has called with many juvenile and several adult selections for our circulation.

We have supplied 373 books for supplementary reading to the following: New London Central School, Wilmot Flat School, Colbytown Camp, Camp Hanonis, and Camp Penacook. We have answered 236 requests for special reference material. Our reference work grows steadily each year as students and patrons realize the usefulness of this department to them and the community. We also supply each class at the High School monthly with their book reports, which are kept on separate shelves for their convenience.

Our committee room is in constant use for small meetings, and the auditorium for larger gatherings.

In June, both librarians were fortunate in being able to attend the annual institute, held at Laconia for one week. Many interesting and highly serviceable ideas were gained from this opportunity to meet with other librarians and teachers.

During July, the Vacation Reading Club members numbered forty-three, the largest number ever to enroll. At their

August party, diplomas were awarded to 14 children, and awards to fifteen others, according to the number of books read during the summer months. Following an entertainment by "Skippy", a Boston terrier, and a puppet play, "Three Wishes" by Judith and Jacqueline Kezar, refreshments for all were provided by Mrs. Arthur Whitcomb, and served by the librarians.

In July, Mrs. Nell Lamson held her first exhibition of oil paintings. These were all New Hampshire landscapes as seen through the eyes of an amateur artist.

The ninth exhibition of paintings by Dorothy Dey Howard was shown in August. Both exhibits were frequently visited by friends and summer visitors in large numbers.

In September, the Freshman class at the High School, were brought by their teacher, for instruction by the librarian, on how to familiarize themselves with the library, and how to use its facilities.

The library has received a gift of Indian relics, found by Moses Trussell, New London's first settler, and left to the library by the late Luther Trussell Morse, a direct descendant of the pioneer. They include an Indian gouge and tomahawk, discovered by Mr. Trussell near his cabin on King Hill. They were placed on display in the reading room.

During United Nations Week an appropriate display of books, listed and recommended for reading by Dr. J. Duane Squires, was set up opposite the main desk. Everyone was privileged to borrow these books, copies of which were available in the library.

In observance of American Art Week, reproductions of famous paintings were borrowed from Fernald Library, which were exhibited on the main floor and in the Children's room.

The Board of Trustees held monthly meetings with good attendance. In March, we were happy to welcome to our Board a new member, Mrs. Arthur Whitcomb, who has always been deeply interested in the library and its work. By vote of the Board, the title of "Treasurer" was conferred upon Mr. Herbert D. Swift, who faithfully keeps our financial records. The minutes of the meetings are kept by the librarian.

In November, an itemized list of the improvements of the library grounds, under the supervision of the Garden Club, was submitted to the Trustees by Miss Gladys Moore. The

report was accepted and placed on file.

The New Hampshire State Library, in October, held its first annual Institute for Library Trustees. All three of the Tracy Memorial Library Trustees and Treasurer were in attendance. Dr. Emerson Greenaway, one of the speakers at the Institute, listed the twenty leading libraries of New Hampshire. We are proud to report that the Tracy Memorial Library was one of these top twenty in the Granite State.

National Book Week featured an exhibit of adult and juvenile books in the auditorium. A display of old valentines, loaned by Mrs. Swift, and an exhibit of Indian relics, borrowed from Mr. Leon Bickford, Mr. Norman Champion, and Mrs. George Thurston, also received many favorable comments. Through the kindness of Mr. Donald Sieburg, who loaned us his wooden model of a covered bridge, the theme, "Books are Bridges", was well depicted and enjoyed by all. We were delighted by the attendance of 483 visitors during this week. The pictures, taken by Mr. Sieburg during the visit of the fifth and sixth grades of the New London Central School, are on display at the library.

During her vacation in October, the librarian visited the Timrod Library in Summerville, South Carolina. In view of her report of the need of books for colored children there, the trustees authorized her to send surplus copies of books as a gift to this library.

Our Story Hour on Saturday afternoons has been well attended by 407 children, for entertainment and learning, under the direction of the librarians.

The Staff and Trustees of the library, at this Christmas season, look forward to another year of service to this community and its people.

has been purchased. Corridors have been painted and through the generosity of Mrs. Herbert D. Swift, Ward 8 has been painted. A new gas range has been purchased. Fans have been installed in the kitchen and delivery room.

From the Estate of Gertrude B. Hutchins the Hospital has been willed \$5,000 to be applied to the endowment fund in memory of Dr. Bickford.

Mrs. Jennie Folsum who for many years was the baby nurse passed away and is greatly missed.

Hospital Day under the direction of General Chairman M. Roy London ably assisted by the following committee, Donald K. Sieburg, Harry B. Harris, Herbert O. Williams, Mildred D. Lamson, Aaro Reivo, Venita Gay, Kenneth Rich, William F. Kidder and Herbert D. Swift, again topped all previous records. A net of \$10,247.37 was realized. In addition to this, Mrs. Dewey chairman of the Summer Residents' Committee reported a net of approximately \$4,200. Members of the Board and the Hospital administration offer their heartfelt thanks to these committees and all who contributed so generously to the success of the day.

The gifts from the summer Residents' Committee include a blood pressure machine, oxygen gauge, and humidifier, syringe sterilizer, vein stripper, Infantaire Oxygen Hood, anesthesia machine. They also contributed generously to the new obstetrical table.

Hospital Aid, continued their work in redecorating both the hospital and the Nurses' Home. Five hundred dollars was given to purchase linen. New furniture was purchased for the reception room and the mending has been done. We are indeed grateful.

The mortgage on the Picker X-ray has been discharged.

The Women's Club annual contribution of \$50.00 was used for improvements in the Maternity Ward.

The Community Players under the direction of Vaughan Biggert and Bruce Kimes presented the play "Blythe Spirit", the net receipts of \$335 were given to the Hospital.

A donation of \$500 was received from Colby Jr. College.

The Colby Students with the help of Mrs. Baker have purchased a Binocular microscope, they continue to supply and maintain the Barbara Jane Baker Laboratory.

The Steering Committee for building has been active, preliminary drawings for a proposed addition have been sub-

mitted and are being studied. A committee to plan and put into operation a campaign for funds has been appointed with Harry B. Harris, chairman.

A gift of \$1,570 from the Estate of Cora Bunker has been applied to the Building Fund which now totals \$4,100.

The cost to maintain the Hospital in 1953 was approximately \$18,000 more than the income received from patients. If it were not for the amounts received from Hospital Day, town appropriations, Summer Residents' Committee and all other gifts, it would be impossible for the hospital to serve.

Mrs. Sargent reports that the number of adult patient days in 1953 was 5,340 and 651 baby days, making a total of 5,991. 715 adults were admitted during the year and 74 births were reported. 2,367 outpatients were treated. 1,608 X Rays were taken, 4,310 Laboratory tests were performed.

Individual gifts of money, equipment, food etc. too numerous to list in this report have been received. Our sincere thanks and appreciation to these and to the many benefactors of the hospital.

We are appreciative of the continued support and interest of the people of New London and the surrounding towns and our summer friends and neighbors. Through your co-operation it has been possible to keep the hospital ready to serve. We are appreciative also of the loyal and efficient work given the Hospital by our Superintendent, Miss McLeod who is completing her tenth year of continual service. We are thankful for our Medical and nursing staff, our business manager Mrs. Sargent and all other employees. The Hospital is vitally needed by us all and our help is necessary to keep it always ready to serve.

SCHOOL WARRANT

THE STATE OF NEW HAMPSHIRE

To the Inhabitants of the School District in the Town of New London qualified to vote in District affairs:

You are hereby notified to meet at the Central School in said District on the sixth day of March, 1954, at 2:00 o'clock in the afternoon, to act upon the following subjects:

1. To choose a Moderator for the coming year.
2. To choose a Clerk for the ensuing year.
3. To choose a Member of the School Board for the ensuing three years.
4. To choose a Treasurer for the ensuing year.
5. To choose one or more Auditors and such other Officers and Agents as the voters may judge necessary.
6. To hear the reports of Agents, Auditors, Committees or Officers chosen and pass any vote relating thereto.
7. To see what sum of money the district will raise and appropriate for the support of schools, for the salaries of school district officials and agents, and for the payment of statutory obligations of the district, and to authorize the application against said appropriation of such sums as are estimated to be received from the state equalization fund together with other income; the school board to certify to the selectmen the balance between the estimated revenue and the appropriation, which balance is to be raised by taxes by the town.
8. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate a sum not to exceed \$84,000 for the construction, equipment, and acquisition of land for a new elementary school building; and to authorize the School Board to issue serial notes or bonds upon the credit of the District for this sum or any part of the sum so raised and

appropriated; and to further authorize the School Board to determine the time and place of payment, the denominations, and the rate of interest on such notes or bonds and to provide for the sale thereof, in accordance with the Municipal Finance Act and any amendments or other statutes related thereto.

9. To see if the District will vote to authorize the School Board to appoint a Building Committee of not more than three persons to advise the School Board in the location and construction of a new elementary school building; and to authorize the School Board to act as Agents of the District to execute and deliver all contracts and instruments necessary to carry out any action taken under Article 8, including the acquisition of land and the construction and equipment of such new school building.

10. To see if the District will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of four thousand three hundred and thirty-six dollars (\$4,336) to cover additional expenses incurred as a result of the action under Article 8.

11. To transact any other business that may legally come before the meeting.

REPORT OF THE CITIZENS COMMITTEE ON THE STUDY OF SCHOOL NEEDS

At the annual School District meeting on March 7, 1953, it was voted to authorize the School Board to appoint a committee of not more than three citizens to work with the School Board to investigate present and future school needs.

The Citizens Committee is composed of Clarence Granger, Mrs. William F. Kidder, and Don Sieburg.

The committees have met jointly ten times, and the School Board, Superintendent, and Principal have given additional time to the consideration of special details. Two public meetings were held, one in January and one in February of 1954, to present a proposed solution of the school needs. The discussion and suggestions at these meetings were helpful to the committees and given careful consideration.

At our first meeting the Citizens Committee was given some background information. It learned that in 1951 and 1952 members from the Parent-Teacher Association requested meetings with school authorities to discuss over-crowding in the elementary school. These meetings spurred the recommendation to make a study during the next year of school needs.

The Citizens Committee made a complete tour of the school building, noting in particular over-crowded rooms, and the inconvenience of serving hot lunch in the auditorium from a basement kitchen to 150, or more, students daily.

In order to have a basis upon which to begin our study, the Principal submitted, at our request, a list of school needs and desirable improvements. The School Board and Citizens Committee added its suggestions and worked from the following list:

1. Two additional classrooms to meet the immediate need. Four classrooms should be considered.

REPORT OF CITIZENS' COMM. (Continued)

2. Cafeteria
3. Music room
4. Teachers' room
5. Counseling or committee meeting room
6. Locker room for visiting athletic teams
7. Storage room for lunch program
8. General storage space
9. Adequate Home Economics room
10. Adequate Science Laboratory
11. Kindergarten
12. Audio-visual facilities

Various emergency measures to house the excess students were considered, such as the use of the Elkins School, other facilities in town, and double sessions.

It was decided that the advice of a specialist in the area of school buildings would be very helpful, so in July Mr. Paul Farnum of the State Department of Education met with us. He showed pictures of additions as well as separate buildings which were being used by other schools. He pointed out that an architect could be of great assistance in studying our special space needs, and we subsequently sought the advice of Mr. Irving Hersey, of Durham, N. H., who was the architect for the present school building.

Mr. Hersey was invited to meet with the combined committees. Following a discussion of our needs with him, he met at a separate time with school authorities to go over the present building and school program to ascertain if the building is being used to its fullest capacity of efficiency and found that it is.

We were now ready to consider ways to provide additional space. We studied 3 possibilities:

1. To add to the present building.

2. To erect a separate building with 2 classrooms and other facilities.
3. To erect a separate building with 3 classrooms and other facilities.

In our judgment a separate building offers the best solution, but believe that two classrooms in such a building would meet the school needs for only a year or two. Therefore, as a result of our study of the present and future school needs, the School Board and Citizens Committee present a proposed plan of a separate building for the consideration of the people of the School District; this to consist of three elementary school classrooms, a cafetorium which will serve other purposes, kitchen, storage space, teacher-nurse's room, and boiler room.

Since we are proposing a separate building, members from the School Board and Citizens Committee have discussed with the owner the possible acquisition of land adjoining the present school property. This land parallels Main Street and extends from the rear of the Edgewood approximately to the Odd Fellows Hall.

In order to erect the proposed school building the School Board and Citizens Committee recommend that funds not to exceed \$84,000.00 be raised for that purpose by the School District. The Committees believe that the need for expansion is urgent and welcome your thoughtful consideration of our school needs.

Although the duties of the Citizens Committee are not quite complete, we wish to express our sincere appreciation to the School Board, Superintendent, and Principal for the many hours they have worked with our committee, in addition to their regular service to the community. Mr. Irving Hersey, consulting architect, has met with us many times, and we are most grateful for his valuable advice and assistance.

REPORT OF SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS

To the School Board and Citizens of New London:

I submit herewith my sixth annual report as Superintendent of Schools.

Enrollment

The enrollment for the school year 1953-54, as of January 1, 1954, was 222. This is broken down as follows:

Grades 1-8	134
Grades 9-12	88

The number of primary pupils was great enough to force the School Board to take temporary measures to reduce the class size in Grades 1 and 2. The basement playroom at the residence of Mr. Robert Sawyer was offered as a temporary classroom for a limited time. This room had previously been used for a private kindergarten, but its size restricted it to a pupil enrollment of 16.

The enrollment in the elementary rooms is broken down as follows:

Grades 1 and 2	24
Grade 2 (Sawyer's)	16
Grades 3 and 4	31
Grades 5 and 6	23
Grades 7 and 8	40

The overcrowding in the 7th and 8th grade room (40) will be reduced next year as several smaller-than-usual classes move into these grades.

Our major concern with enrollment must be at the elementary level. We need at least five (5) elementary rooms of normal size. The necessary grade splits can then be made on the basis of number and grade performance.

School Study Committee

The Report of the School Study Committee, author-

ized by the 1953 District Meeting, is printed elsewhere in this report.

I should like to commend the members of this Committee for their interest and perseverance on our school housing problem.

The recommendations of the Study Committee should be given careful consideration if New London is to have the adequate plant facilities necessary to provide a modern educational program for the entire school population.

School Plant

Minor repairs and the regular summer maintenance work, including refinishing of the gymnasium floor, and the upkeep of the Memorial Athletic Field, were carried out by the custodian, Weston Ray.

Covers for the side entrances to the building, designed by the building architect, Mr. Irving Hersey, were erected under the supervision of Mr. Clarence Granger. These additions correct the bad condition that existed in inclement weather and also add to the general appearance of the building.

Other improvements to the plant include the screening of the windows in the kitchen and toilet rooms, resurfacing the main walk with "hot top," tarring the driveway areas, installation of a service sink in the kitchen, and the kitchen, and the installation of emergency lights in the auditorium to comply with the recently enacted law covering places of public assembly.

Supervisory Union No. 43

Since 1937, the School Districts of Newport, New London, Springfield, and Sunapee have comprised Supervisory School Union No. 43. However, by action of the State Board of Education, the Croydon School District will be added to this Union as of July 1, 1954.

The State Board of Education has established the position of Helping Teacher for this Union, together with five other large multiple-District Unions throughout the state. This position was approved for next year by the combined Boards of Supervisory Union No. 43 at their Annual Budget Meeting held last December. (Next year Supervisory Union No. 43 will have seventy full-time and two part-time teachers, as well as school nurses, custodians, bus drivers, cafeteria workers, etc.)

The work of the Helping Teacher is aimed to assist the regular teachers in carrying on most effectively in the classroom. This could include help with testing, interpretation of test results, teaching techniques, supplying teaching materials, correlating the curriculum, working particularly with beginning teachers and helping with problem pupils. Briefly, the person holding this position will be working with the other school personnel to improve the general learning situation.

Student Insurance

A group plan of pupil accident protection was approved by the School Board and offered to parents at a cost of

\$1.25 per school child. This provides broad protection to pupils against bodily injuries at school, or on the way to, or from, school, and during supervised school activities. It covers all supervised sports programs with the exception of football.

The response to this insurance program was greater than anticipated. Approximately 70 per cent of the students in the entire Union have this coverage for this school year.

School Plant Expansion

The warrant includes the necessary articles for an expansion of the school plant. This carries out the recommendations of the combined School Study Committee and School Board. In my opinion, this building program would provide New London with one of the most adequate school plants for a community of its size in New Hampshire. The plan provides additional rooms to set up good working conditions in the elementary grades. The rooms in the present building, that would be vacated by the elementary grades, would provide much needed space for the high school program. This added space at the high school level is needed—not so much in terms of the total enrollment as in terms of the number of classroom stations needed—to carry out the present variety of course offerings which include Academic, Commercial, Home Economics, and Shop. With these additional classroom stations, it should be possible to handle as great an increase in high school enrollment as can be anticipated in the foreseeable future.

Conclusion

I wish to express my appreciation for the cooperation received during the past year from the school staff, together with loyal support of the School Board, and the continued interest of the other citizens in the welfare of your school.

REPORT OF THE PRINCIPAL TO SUPERINTENDENT GORDON B. FLINT

Dear Mr. Flint :

I submit herewith my report as Principal of New London Central School.

When school opens in September it is a matter of only a few days before the various classes have organized and elected their class officers and plans have been started for the various activities carried on by each group. The Student Council members are chosen and the officers are elected by a plan similar to one used to elect our town officers. It is one more step in learning to do things the democratic way. At the same time the faculty is busy getting plans for the year started. In a very short time the students realize their vacation is over and school really has begun.

This year the Seniors presented *State Fair* on November 6 for their annual play. The Seniors and Miss Eleanor Parker should be proud of the results.

The annual Open House was held in November and as an added attraction grades three and four, under the supervision of Mrs. Doris Langley and Mrs. Alberta C. Fisher, presented the operetta, *Hans and Gretel*. The band, under the direction of Mr. Herwood Curtiss, gave a short concert and it was easily seen that the band has become one of the more important extra-curricular activities.

Ten Seniors, who anticipate going to college, attended the High School-University Day at the University of New Hampshire in October. Each of them was assigned to a group related to their chosen field of study. In addition they were guests of the University at a football game in the afternoon.

The school Lunch Program has continued to grow in popularity and has become a must in our regular program. At the annual Thanksgiving and Christmas Dinners, Mrs. Wes-

ley Woodward, the Lunch Supervisor, served about 215. The average number of meals served daily is about 150 now. When we first started the average was about 90.

The Music Department under the direction of Mrs. Alberta C. Fisher had its usual busy year. The Spring Concert in March, the Pops Concert in May, and the Christmas Cantata in December were the high-lights of the year, but in addition either the orchestra or one of the glee clubs participated at other school functions.
