Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to raise \$25 to be expended in cooperation with the New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission for the opening and maintaining of trails and old roads for forest fire protection. The New Hampshire Forestry and Recreation Commission to provide a matching sum not in excess of \$25 for this purpose. Approved by Finance Committee.

Article 19. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 to continue a capital reserve fund to be used for the purchase of a fire engine. Approved by the Finance Committee.

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Article 20. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$300 for dry hydrants and for water holes. The Tamworth Firemen's Club will donate matching funds up to \$300.

Article 21. To see if the town will vote to place the Melanson lot at Jackman Pond, acquired by tax collectors deed in 1961, under the management and control of the Conservation Commission for conservation purposes.

Article 22. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$200 to enable the Chamber of Commerce to publish a brochure.

Article 23. To see if the town will vote to adopt the following ordinances recommended to the Selectmen by the Tamworth Planning Board:

1. For all new residence construction or removal of an old house to a new lot, building lots shall have a frontage of at least 200 lineal feet and each side shall have at least 200 lineal feet. Only one dwelling unit may be erected on each such lot. The dwelling unit and accessory buildings may occupy no more than 30% of the lot on which they are located.

2. On all new construction or relocated buildings front yards shall have a minimum depth of 25 feet from the nearest existing edge of the public right of way to the nearest building and shall be set back 15 feet from the side and rear lot lines, buildings on corner lots shall have a minimum depth of 25 feet from the nearest edge of all public right of ways. The only exception shall be that roadside stands erected for the purpose of selling or exposing for sale home produce may be located a minimum of 15 feet from the nearest existing edge of a public right of way. 3. Cottages and camps designed and built for occupancy during a portion of the year are permitted subject to the same restrictions as those applying to a new permanent residence.

4. For all new construction, a building permit must be issued by the Selectmen. The purpose of the building permit is to acquaint the prospective builder and/or owner with the ordinances that exist in the town of Tamworth with regard to location of building, sewage disposal and water.

5. Upon any violation of this ordinance, the Selectmen shall, on their own initiative, take immediate steps to enforce the provisions of this ordinance by seeking an injunction in the Superior Court or by any other proper legal action.

Article 24. To see if the town will raise and appropriate the sum of \$2500 to construct an access road and provide police for a town beach on White Lake providing a long term lease for a beach can be arranged with the State of N. H.

Article 28. To see if the town will vote to authorize the selectmen to dispose of any property acquired through tax collectors deeds.

Article 29. To see if the Town will vote to authorize the selectmen to borrow money in anticipation of taxes.

REPORT OF THE FINANCE COMMITTEE

Town Budget

The Finance Committee met with the Selectmen and discussed and voted separately upon all items of expenditures in the Town Budget.

The regular expenditures except for the town dump were discussed and approved by the Committee. It should be noted that the county tax is up about \$4000.

There was much discussion on the care of the town dump. The amount contained in the warrant is the same as last year and was disapproved by the Committee as not being enough to do the job the way it should be done. It was brought up that we should some how control the dumping of stumps which is fast filling up the area, and at the present rate it won't be many years before we will not have any dump. Also there is much dumping by people outside of our Town. This brings up a need for more money to pay a responsible attendant a reasonable wage for more hours on duty at the dump. A way to cut down on this cost would be to open it only for certain hours on certain days. We could also issue passes to taxpavers and others who are willing to pay for the use of the dump. The Committee would like the opinion of the rest of the Town on this matter.

The Cemetery Trustees would like to finish paving the road through the Chocorua Cemetery, the cost of which would run to approximately \$1000. The Committee recommends approval of this item.

The subject of fixing Bunker Hill Road was brought up and the Committee decided that the Town should wait until there is enough Duncan Fund money available to properly reconstruct the road over the hill. The Committee approved the raising of \$2500 to clear approximately 5 acres and build 1200 feet of road and a parking area for access to 1000 feet or less of beach area on the west side of White Lake in the event the Planning Committee obtains for the Town from the State a long-term lease for the use of this area. The final approval will be made as soon as the snow is off the ground so that the Governor and Council may meet with the Planning Board at the site. The Planning Committee has a tentative verbal approval from the Governor at this time. With the raising of this money now and a concentrated community effort the area should be ready for picnicing and swimming this summer.

An initial payment of \$5000 for a grader (Austin-Western Pacer) was approved by the Committee. Our present 1941 bulldozer is costing a lot of money to maintain and at present needs extensive repairs and being so old isn't worth it. There was much discussion on whether to buy a bulldozer or grader and it was decided that a grader is much more versatile and would be used year-round for grading, ditching and snow plowing. This will allow the Road Agent to do more work without hiring equipment.

School Budget

The Finance Committee met with the School Board and discussed and voted upon all items of expenditures in the school budget.

The proposed expenditures are up 12% over last year. The biggest part of this increase is the \$9050 increase in tuition for high school students due to a raise of cost per pupil and more pupils. Transportation is also up \$4683 due to a new contract. Teachers salaries are up \$3750 due to the necessity of raising the base salary and therefore raising the rest of the salary schedule to stay in a competitive position with the surrounding towns in order to hire new teachers. These items were approved by the Committee.

The rest of the expenses are for the most part the same or close to last year having been shaved as close as possible by the School Board. These items were also approved by the Committee.

The Finance Committee would like to thank the Selectmen and School Board for their complete cooperation in explaining and presenting facts and figures on all items.

SELECTMEN'S REPORT

Our Bicentennial year has a 10% increase in town valuation, probably the largest change in the town's history. While this increase produced added tax revenue, over all appropriations outweighed it resulting in a higher tax rate.

The proposed town budget for 1967 is lower than last year, however the county and school taxes are estimated to be higher, the outlook — a higher rate this year. This is a problem common to all towns (and to higher forms of government).

Congratulations to all those who participated in our Bicentennial Celebration. From the opening church service at Ordination Rock to the closing fireworks on Chocorua Lake it was a week of fun for all.

Our thanks to the Tamworth Foundation for their many favors, especially the new furnace at Union Hall, to Mr. Theodore Browne, the town's horologist, who has fixed the Library clock, and to all the other individuals and organizations whose efforts have made 1966 a memorable year.

REPORT OF THE FOREST FIRE WARDEN AND DISTRICT CHIEF

Fire records are made by people—those who cause fires and those who control them. Your forest fire warden, deputy wardens, fire chief and firemen have, in spite of a prolonged drought, made one of the best fire control records in recent years. Despite a very dry spring, we in New Hampshire working together, have substantially reduced our fire incidence (885 in 1965 to 595 in 1966).

This enviable record is largely due to two factors:

- 1. A closely coordinated and integrated statetown organization jointly carrying out programs of forest fire prevention, training and suppression with dedicated personnel.
- 2. Your appreciation of our forest fire control program and your individual effort in practicing fire prevention.

Statistics show, however, there is room for improvement. Major problems are still with us; (1) the careless disposal of cigarettes; (2) the householder's carelessness in burning rubbish; (3) the failure of woodlot owners and contractors to completely extinguish their brush burning fires; (4) failure to extinguish camp fires; (5) unsupervised children playing with matches.

New Hampshire has 4,339,000 acres of woodland to be protected. In 1966 we experienced 595 forest fires in this area and restricted acreage burned to 395 acres — a fine testimonial to the efficiency and dedication of the men who make up our forest fire control organization.

1. If you must burn you will need a permit. Permits are not issued between 9:00 A. M. and 5:00 P. M.

THE PLANNING COMMITTEE

In the interest of promoting health, safety, morals and general welfare of the community, the selectmen of Tamworth appointed a new planning board to study and report ways and means of accomplishing these interests.

The new planning board held five meetings and one field trip to White Lake.

The board studied and discussed the promotion, within the town, of an orderly process for its growth and development and at the same time preserving its natural charm.

Providing adequate areas between buildings, various rights of way, preventing over crowding of land, avoiding undue concentration of population, securing safety from fires and other hazards, facilitating adequate provisions for water, sewage and other public requirements came under study by the planning board.

In the interest of the inhabitants of Tamworth now and in the future, the board has set forth relative ordinances which are printed in the town warrant, are to be publicized by the selectmen and voted on by ballots.

A field trip was made to White Lake to study an area on the West side of the Lake proposed for beach use by Tamworth residents only. At the present time steps are being taken to secure a release from the Department of Resources and Economic Development for the area. Plans are being formulated for a meeting with a representative from the Department of Resources and Economic Development, Councilman Phillip A. Robertson and Representative Earle Remick.

It is urgently hoped that all residents are interested in the general welfare of the community and will give careful consideration to and voice opinions that

will enable the board to seek and plan ways and means of community betterment.

REPORT OF THE CONSERVATION COMMISSION

On March 8, 1966, The Tamworth Conservation Commission was duly voted in at Town Meeting.

Chosen by the Selectmen to become the first members of the Conservation Commission were: Miss Elizabeth Steele, Chairman, Mrs. Myrick Crane, Miss Margaret King, Mr. Joseph Dawson, Mr. Elton Perkins, Mr. John Damon and Mrs. Charles T. Gallagher.

Monthly meetings have been held in the Town House and the Commission members have been on several field trips.

Approximately one hundred acres in the Hemenway State Forest will be leased to the Conservation Commission by the State of New Hampshire. This area will remain uncut. It is the plan of the Commission to lay out a nature trail within this tract where there are unusually large pines and interesting ecological features. A footbridge across Swift River will be constructed to make the area more accessible to the public. The Commission believes it has reasonable assurance that funds will be forthcoming from a private source to cover the cost of the bridge building.

The Conservation Commission has been asked to take care of the planting of trees for which one hundred dollars was appropriated at the last Town Meeting. It has been decided that this planting should be done in South Tamworth Village.

The Commission will manage for conservation purposes the swampy, town owned tract of land on Route No. 113, which has no timber value, if the Town votes to turn it over for this purpose at the March 1967 Town Meeting.

MAPPING COMMITTEE

The property map of the town has been completed as of October 1, 1966. There still remain a small number of properties whose boundaries it has been impossible to determine due to the absence of owners. These boundaries will be entered as soon as they become available.

With the exception of small house lots, the acreage of all properties has been measured on the map, and numbers have been assigned. These numbers, the owners and the acreage have been entered on a card catalogue in the Selectmen's office.

Your committee will recommend to the Selectmen that copies of the completed town map be put on sale. While the scale of the map (1000 feet to the inch) does not permit great accuracy in plotting property lines, the map is useful in demonstrating the relative position of various properties and their size and ownership.

Due to the changes in ownership that are constantly being made, it will be necessary each year to devote some time and expense to the task of keeping the map up to date. This problem will be resolved by the selectmen.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

There were several changes in the teaching staff as the 1966-1967 school year began. Mr. Roger Person formerly principal of the Moultonboro Elementary School, replaced Mr. Thomas Conway. Mr. Person has had 16 years of experience and will receive his M. Ed. from Plymouth State College this year.

Mr. Roy Boon, a graduate of Bowdoin College, class of 1966, replaces Mr. John Turner. His principal teaching assignment is in the field of Social Studies in grades 6, 7, and 8.

Mrs. Joyce Perkins, a graduate of Gorham State College, replaces Miss "Peg" King. Mrs. Perkins has had two years of prior teaching experience in Fryeburg, Maine.

Tamworth has been fortunate over the past few years in having a stable staff. Generally this is a great advantage to any educational institution. However, there are indications that Tamworth will be faced with substantial teacher losses in the near future.

Since the 1966-1967 average salary of the Tamworth teachers is only \$5011.00 as compared with the \$6050.00 average salary of the classroom teachers in New Hampshire, it will become increasingly more difficult to staff Tamworth's elementary school with good experienced teachers. In fact, if the \$5200.00 minimum salary for New Hampshire teachers is enacted by the New Hampshire General Court, it will be difficult to secure beginning teachers.

READING PROJECT

Under Public Law 89-10 (Title I) of the Elementary and Secondary Act of 1965, Tamworth received \$3,327.04 in Federal funds. These funds were allocated to Tamworth for a two year period. This is an attempt by the Federal Government, the only government we all have in common, to raise the quality of education in all of the nation's schools.

All school districts in Supervisory Union 9 elected to develop a cooperative project with the emphasis on Reading. During the first year, the funds were devoted almost exclusively to the purchase of essential equipment and materials to be used in the classrooms - and consist of the following:

The first phase of this program was to secure the equipment and materials that are listed above. The second phase was to secure a professional staff for this cooperative Reading Project.

We now have a special reading teacher whose services are shared by all of the elementary schools, a special reading teacher at Kennett High School, an elementary Guidance Counselor, and a part-time Speech Therapist.

Reports of the Elementary Guidance Counselor and Special Reading Teacher are included in this report. In the Union as a whole, all grades were well above the National Norm in the Step Reading Test administered this fall. It is our hope that through individualization of instruction for those children who have reading problems, we will see definite progress on a similar test to be given this May.

I wish to express my appreciation to the Tamworth School Board for its dedicated service in an effort to improve education in Tamworth. The Board members have devoted many hours and a team effort to this all-important endeavor.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

The Kenneth A. Brett School opened on September 7, 1966 with an enrollment of 143 pupils. There were 20 eager first graders with Miss Ford, 13 second graders with Mrs. Remick, 20 third graders with Mrs. Perkins, 22 fourth graders with Mrs. Wendell, 15 fifth graders with Mrs. Davison, 14 sixth graders with Mr. Boon, 22 seventh graders with Mr. Blanchette, and 17 eighth graders with Mr. Person. Since then, 12 new pupils entered, making the total number of children attending school here on February 1, 1967, 155. Other members of the regular staff are Mrs. Eleanor Taylor, teacher of French, and Mrs. Eleanor Tripp, our Music teacher.

This year, the emphasis has been on improving the curriculum wherever possible. With this in mind, new supplementary reading books of current and past literary greatness were purchased for small groups in the sixth, seventh and eighth grades; a complete set of phonics transparencies used with the Overhead Projector was purchased for the primary grades; and a new system of grouping in reading was initiated in the primary and middle grades, to provide an opportunity for greater individualization of instruction.

We have had the services of a Reading Specialist who has worked closely with the teachers and the children in this all-important skill basic to all learning.

Mrs. Eleanor Taylor is teaching French in grades 4, 5, and 6 as well as her regular classes in the 7th and 8th grades. This is offering an opportunity for a more uniform French sequence. It also makes possible more time for regular classroom teaching which is necessary with the intensified reading program.

We have adopted a mathematics programb which is the same as that used in the Kennett Jr. High School, thus enabling our graduating pupils to have similar preparation for their High School mathematics studies. New Science textbooks have been purchased for grades 5, 6, 7, and 8, providing a completely modern science program based on reasoning and laboratory techniques — a concept which is essential in all good science courses.

My report would not be complete without mentioning that Mrs. Ames and Mrs. Streeter have been serving excellent and well-planned lunches to our children and teachers; and that Mr. Davis is making our school a clean and neat place in which to work.

It has been a pleasure to work with the professional personnel, the School Board, the Supervisory Union staff, and many outside agencies who aid in the educational progress made in Tamworth.

REPORT OF SPECIAL READING TEACHER

"Today's children can learn to read" is the heading of many articles and editorials. The school agrees and has been striving daily to teach all the children of all the people. Indeed the schools have done rather well according to statistics!

The lack of materials and time to teach have been two handicaps.

Many new texts have been provided, such as the S. R. A. Kits for individualized reading, supplementing the basic reading program. Paper--covered Library Kits for each grade level are now being used. New teaching machines are in each building to implement the teaching process. The Overhead projector is very adaptable and can be used for a few or an entire room. The new Tachist-O-Films with the projector that times the flashes is designed to increase accuracy and speed at all levels from simple letters to phrases. The Language Master, which is a simplified tape recorder, allows a child to work in a small group or alone. Many games to provide drill on the word skills have been placed for use.

The role of the Special Reading Teacher is to provide more of that essential ingredient, Time. Time is needed to find the individual's specific needs and to reinforce those needs, either individually, or in small groups.

There are eight schools in our district. My time is allotted according to the pupil enrollment and the money available in each district. I work with individuals and small groups throughout the day. Most of my time has been with the lower grades.

More than seventy children have been tested individually to ascertain their grade level and comprehension capacity. These suggestions give a basis on which to start instruction. In many instances, the entire reading group meets with me for specific instruction. Much of the work is phonics, syllables and accent, and increasing word power. Better listening habits and comprehension are two goals constantly in mind.

My methods have included a careful diagnosis of reading problems and the selection of proper materials for each child. These factors plus the active cooperation on the part of both children and teachers, have increased my own effectiveness. A continued pattern of the above variables should provide each child with more confidence through his increased improvement in reading skills.

In my work in School Union No. 9, I have found an able administration, cooperative fellow workers, and challenging work with boys and girls at every grade level.

ROLE OF THE ELEMENTARY SCHOOL COUNSELOR

I am pleased to be able to submit a progress report concerning my role as school counselor as funded under Title I. Public Law 89-10. Since the role of elementary school counselor was new to the school union, I felt obliged to define and communicate this role to parents and teachers. As a school counselor I meet with individuals and groups to deal with the normal developmental problems of children which interfere with their academic achievement and personal growth. I am also concerned with the various school unionwide tests being given to determine which pupils are working up to their potential and which are not.

Thanks to the help and cooperation of the Principals and Teachers in the school union, the program is well under way. Private interviews are conducted in every school that is visited. The two highest grades in each school are participating in constructive group discussions. Interviews with parents and teachers are provided to discuss the progress of specific children. The first half of the STEP Reading Test Program has been completed. The Stanford Achievement tests are now being given and will soon be completed. Within a short time the Lorge-Thorndike Intelligence Tests will be administered. Lastly, rapport has been established with the Carroll County Community Service and periodic meetings are conducted to discover ways in which we can better aid each other.

The work that has begun will continue with the hope that as the role of the school counselor becomes clearer in the minds of children, parents, and teachers, more effective service can be rendered to more children.

I would like to thank all the people who have worked with me in the formation and implementation of the school counselor program.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON SCHOOL BUSES

The School bus study committee met three times at the school. At our first meeting after some discussion it was decided to make our study by comparing costs with other school districts in Carroll County and nearby. Since conditions vary even from town to town, depending on density of population and length of bus routes, we chose, for comparison purposes, a cost per mile figure which should include all costs including labor and depreciation. This figure could then be compared with contracts based on cost per mile. Consideration was given of course to the fact that the greater the mileage the lower the cost per mile can be ex-Various members of the committee pected to be. studied costs in the Conway school district and the Governor Wentworth school district, both of which own their own buses, and in the Interlakes and Bartlett school districts which contract their busing. Figures were also obtained from Madison. An investigation was also made by one member of the committee into the current price of buses of the sizes we would need and insurance coverage.

The results of our study led us to the following conclusions. There is a considerable savings on the cost of gasoline in District owned buses due to the fact that there is no tax on the gasoline. To effect the largest savings on this item the district should own its own gasoline pump. There is also, in theory, the saving of the profit which the contractor can reasonably be allowed to charge. This however is not great and seems to depend largely on good management, several contractors outside of Tamworth stating that they could not stay in business on school bus contracts alone and must rely on summer and non-school operations to make a go of it. We found that generally, contract cost per mile was higher than district owned cost per mile but that in the Town of Tamworth, contract cost per mile was similar to and in the case of Governor Wentworth below the cost per mile of district owned buses and this is not including in the Governor Wentworth figure any cost for administration since we did not forsee one in Tamworth. Conway does not have an administrative cost.

We therefore unanimously recommend that for the present we remain on the contract system, but that each year prior to the year in which the contract must be renewed the School Board make an inquiry into the cost per mile of town owned buses so that they will know if our contract prices are rising too far above costs.
