



### Report of Schools

It has been hard work, so far, this school year. First there was the scarlet fever in the Jones family, and just as that was over, word came from the State Board of Health to close all schools on account of the influenza epidemic. That lost us most of October, but there were three families who had influenza or pneumonia in this part of the town, and one family in Wildwood. Miss Mildred Noyes finished her term of 14 weeks, the first week in January, and the next week the other school, taught by Miss Gertrude Eastman, closed, after a term of 11 weeks, as, on account of sickness and removals, there were only three scholars left.

When the January scare was over, we started a school in No. 1, to which all could conveniently go, except some of the little ones, below school age, who are not able to go in winter. Mrs. Francella Cooley resigned from the school board and is teaching the school. She is an experienced teacher, with an excellent reputation from past years, and we are hoping there will be no more interruptions, and that by July we may get in our proper number of weeks.
