REPORT OF SCHOOL BOARD

Freedom, N. H., January 31, 1923.

The school board herewith submit to the citizens of the school district of Freedom the financial standing of the district from July 1, 1921, to June 30, 1922.

We believe our schools are doing good work now, and that we have at this time efficient teachers in both rooms.

The school work is under the personal supervision of our superintendent, Mr. Wingate, in whom we place all confidence for the proper management and planning of the school work, and the towns of this supervisory union are fortunate in securing and being able to keep a superintendent that is so well liked in the four towns.

The expense of transportation is an item which is increasing from year to year and must be cut down in some way, perhaps by opening some of the rural schools.

Another expense which is more burdensome, since the district has now to bear the entire expense rather than the State, is high school tuition. We have 11 pupils in high schools this year, eight of which we are paying tuition for, which will amount to \$410.00.

The school district will be obliged to ask for a deficiency appropriation again this year and it is hoped the school laws of the State may be changed in the near future so the smaller towns may have a fair chance.

This report contains the report of our superintendent, also the report of the medical supervisor.

SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

To the School Board of Freedom :

The year, which ended June 30, 1922, proved to be one of considerable progress for our schools. The two rooms of the Village school were the only ones maintained during the year, all the pupils from the outlying districts,—with the exception of three at the head of Ossipee Lake, who were carried to the West Ossipee school,—being transported to the village. In the upper room, Mr. Bennett continued the high grade of work that was maintained the year previous, and in the lower, Miss Furlong carried forward the excellent work that Mrs. Jones began. Mr. Bennett remains in charge of the upper grades again this year, but Miss Furlong resigned and accepted a position in Massachusetts. Miss Jennie B. Harwood taught the lower room during the fall term of the present year, and Mrs. Anna Heikes has been engaged to complete the school year.

There seems to be some misconception concerning the status of scholars between the ages of five and eight years. The compulsory age for school attendance is eight years; a child may enter school, however, after he is five years old, provided he starts at the beginning of the fall term. When he is once registered as a member of any school, he is subject to the same rules and regulations that govern all scholars. To be sure, the parent has the right to take him out of school, but in that case he must stay out until the beginning of the next year. In no case can the attendance be intermittent.

While it is the province of the school board, and not the superintendent, to have control of the school's financial affairs, I should like to speak briefly of the reason for the large reduction in the amount of State aid which Freedom received last year, and will receive this year, compared with the amount paid to the school district the two years previous.

The school law of 1919 provided that any school dis-

tract which should raise the full amount of its \$5 tax, should be entitled to State aid for its additional approved expenditures. Unfortunately, but due largely to general conditions, the total of approved expenditure of all districts—above the \$5 tax—was much greater in the school year, 1920-1921, than the legislative appropriation for the purpose, and so the legislature which met in 1921 felt obligated to make up the amount due the districts by a deficiency appropriation. It then proceeded to modify the law with relation to State aid so that in the future this condition could not again arise. The modification of the law is as follows: "If in any year the approved claims of the several districts entitled to State aid shall be in excess of the appropriation, a sufficient number of districts shall be omitted from the distribution to bring the total amount of the grants within the limits of the appropriation. The eliminated districts shall be those in which payments for current local expenditures for public education, as measured in dollars and cents per one thousand dollars of equalized valuation, were, during the previous year, the lowest; except that the State board shall have authority in its discretion to withhold from such general distribution an amount not exceeding five per cent of the appropriation for State aid which it may use to furnish additional aid to districts where special need exists."

The State aid appropriation for last year, and also for this, was \$325,000. The approved claims of all districts totaled nearly \$350,000. Obviously, according to the change in the law, some districts had to be entirely eliminated from the State aid distribution, or else share in the five per cent distribution, according to the discretion of the State Board of Education. The latter course was followed, and so Freedom, being one of the districts "in which payments for current local school expenditures were lowest," received last year but \$505.72, instead of the approved claim of \$1,386.65. This year the school district has received but \$385.63 out of an allotment of

\$1,432.80, which means that the school board will be under the necessity of asking for a deficiency appropriation at the district meeting again this year. This situation is most unfortunate, and it is to be hoped that the present legislature will do something to remedy the condition.

In order to keep down expenses as much as possible,—since the State aid allowance was reduced,—the purchase of text books and general scholars' supplies has been limited. A good teacher can do much to make up for the lack of books and supplies, but not entirely. The school that is working with inadequate equipment is handicapped. I appreciate the kindness of individuals who have contributed gifts which have helped to meet our needs. In particular, let me thank Mrs. William Brooks for her contribution of pictures, views, magazines, and especially for the excellent five-volume American History by Woodrow Wilson.
