Summary of 2010 Warrant Articles

- 1. All officers duly elected.
- 2. Approved operating budget of \$965,976 but, subsequently, due to a ballot misprint a Special Town Meeting was held; the operating budget failed and the Town reverted to the default budget.
- 3. Defeated \$3,500 for the Fourth of July fireworks display.
- 4. Defeated \$4,000 for an increase in the Police Chief's salary.
- 5. Voted to raise and appropriate \$25,000 for the purpose of paving town roads.
- 6. Defeated \$18,000 for the purpose of purchasing a roadside mower.
- 7. Voted to raise and appropriate \$5,000 to be placed in the already established Police Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund.
- 8. Defeated \$25,000 for the Fire Station Clean Air Project.
- 9. Defeated \$20,000 for the purpose of funding the Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund.
- 10. Defeated permission to appoint the Selectmen as agents to expend from the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund.
- 11. Defeated \$2,000 for the purpose of mowing the Recreation Field. (By Petition)
- 12. Approved the citizen's request that the burn pile at the Grafton Transfer Station be reopened. (By Petition)
- 13. Defeated a resolution declaring Grafton a "Communism Free Zone". (By Petition)
- 14. Defeated the request to stop spending money for the "maintenance and relief" of poor people. (By Petition)
- 15. Defeated passing the ordinance known as "the Grafton United Nations Free Zone Act". (By Petition)

Warrant for the Town of Grafton State of New Hampshire 2011

To the inhabitants of the Town of Grafton, in the County of Grafton, in said State of New Hampshire, qualified to vote in the Town affairs: You are hereby notified to meet at the Grafton Fire/Ambulance Station, Grafton, New Hampshire, on Saturday, the 12th of February next at 9:00 AM for the first session of the 2011 Town Meeting to discuss, debate and amend the Town Budget and all Warrant Articles listed below (with the exception of Article #1, which elects officers). You are also notified to meet for the second session of the 2011 Town Meeting to vote by official ballot at the Grafton Fire/Ambulance Station, Grafton, New Hampshire, on Tuesday, March 8, 2011, on elected officials and all Warrant Articles that are listed below.

POLLS WILL BE OPEN FROM 8:00 AM TO 7:00 PM

- 1) To choose all necessary officers for the next year ensuing: including, Selectman 3 years, Tax Collector 3 years, Treasurer 1 year, Budget Committee 3 years, Budget Committee 1 year, Police Chief 3 years, Trustee of the Trust Funds 3 years, Library Trustee 3 years, Library Trustee 2 years, Cemetery Trustee 3 years; and Planning Board 3 years, Planning Board 1 year.
- 2) Shall the Town raise and appropriate as an operating budget, not including appropriations by special warrant articles and other appropriations voted separately, the amounts set forth on the budget posted with the Warrant, or as amended by the vote of the first session, for the purposes set forth therein totaling \$897,818. Should the article be defeated, the default budget shall be \$955,833, which is the same as last year, with certain adjustments required by previous actions of the Town of Grafton, or by law, or the Governing body may hold one special meeting, in accordance with RSA 40:13X and XVI, to take up the issue of a revised budget only. NOTE: This Warrant Article (operating budget) does not include special warrant articles or individual warrant articles.

- 3) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$40,000 to be placed in the previously established Bridge Capital Reserve Fund. This appropriation will allow for completion of the Millbrook and Davis Road Bridge replacement projects and any unused funds will remain in the Capital Reserve to be used for future bridge projects. (approximately \$.32 per \$1,000)

 The Selectmen recommend this Article/Budget Committee recommends this article.
- 4) To see if the town will vote to appoint the Board of Selectmen as agents to expend from the Property Capital Reserve Fund previously established in 1982. Should this Article pass, \$15,000 from the Property Reappraisal Capital Reserve Fund will be used to offset the operating budget account number 4152 Revaluation of Property. (approximately minus -\$.12 per \$1,000)
- 5) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 for the purpose of paving Town roads. (approximately \$.20 per \$1,000)
- 6) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in the previously established Fire Apparatus Capital Reserve Fund. (approximately \$.16 per \$1,000)

 The Selectmen recommend this Article/ the Budget Committee recommends this article.
- 7) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$5,000 to be placed in the previously established Police Vehicle Capital Reserve Fund. (approximately \$.04 per \$1,000)

 The Selectmen recommend this Article/Budget Committee recommends this article.
- 8) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$25,000 to be placed in the previously established Highway Department Capital Reserve Fund. (approximately \$.20 per \$1,000)

 The Selectmen recommend this Article/ the Budget Committee recommends this article.
- 9) To see if the Town will vote to adopt RSA 72:37 tax exemption for the blind. If approved those meeting the appropriate criteria will receive a \$10,000 exemption on their property assessment. This Article appears at the direction of the Department of Revenue Administration.
- 10) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,872 to be placed in the previously established Recreation Field Shelter Capital Reserve Fund, and further to authorize the selectmen to accept a donation of \$8,872 from Friends of Grafton Community to fund this appropriation. Should the donation not be received in 2011, this Article will be void. The Selectmen recommend this Article/ the Budget Committee recommends this article.

11) To see if the Town will vote to turn off and remove street lights identified by the Board of Selectmen as not needed to light public facilities or to light dangerous road intersections. The street lights that will remain are:

At the Town Hall

At the intersection Turnpike Rd. and Rt4

At the Library

At the Town Offices/Fire & Ambulance Station

At Huff Beach

At the intersection Davis Road and Rt4

At the Recycling Center (2)

At the intersection Riddle Hill Rd. and Rt4

- 12) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$1,260 for the purpose of paying the salary of the Librarian to open the Grafton Free Public Library for three hours on Monday evenings from April through December 2011. (By Petition) (approximately \$.01 per \$1,000)
 - The Selectmen recommend this Article/ the Budget Committee does not recommend this article.
- 13) To see if the Town will vote to create three Town Auditor positions, whose election shall take place at the next annual town meeting. (By Petition)
- 14) Are you in favor of requiring that the Town of Grafton set the date for payment of property tax bills be five days prior to Town Meeting? (By Petition)
- 15) Are you in favor of a 3-man board of assessors to be the legal assessing authority for the town? (By Petition)
- 16) To see if the Town will vote to repeal warrant Article #24 of the Town Meeting of 1994, and the resulting ordinance, which prohibits the possession of open containers of alcoholic beverages and/or the consumption of same on town/property. Recommended by the Recreation Committee. (By Petition)
- 17) To see if the Town will vote to create one Overseer of Public Welfare position, whose election shall take place at the next annual town meeting. (By Petition)
- 18) To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$2,000 for the purpose of supporting the Grafton County Senior Citizens Council, Inc. (By Petition)
 (approximately \$.02 per \$1,000. The Selectmen do not recommend this Article/ the Budget Committee does not recommend this article.
- 19) To see if the Town of Grafton, New Hampshire would support a Freedom of Conscience Act which would accommodate our Rights of Conscience in the way our tax dollars are spent. The New Hampshire Bill of Rights states in Article 4 "Of the natural rights some are in their very nature unalienable because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the 'Rights of Conscious.'" Also, Article 13 "No person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto."
 - The New Hampshire Bill of Rights Article 10 empowers us to make a change "the people may, and of right ought to reform the old, or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power, and oppression, is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind." It is our duty to defend our rights as conferred by Article 10 and in good conscious we cannot allow the government to use our tax dollars for the taking of life or degradation of the Commons. Therefore with our vote we demand the Freedom of Conscious Act to redirect our taxes to local education, sustainable housing, better healthcare, support of returning soldiers, alternative energy, waste to power programs, small business loans, preservation of natural areas, and other humanitarian purposes. Selectmen's Report 2010

The business of the Town was very active this year starting with Town Meeting.

At the conclusion of the 2010 election we were faced with errors on the ballot. Of those errors Warrant Article #2, Operating Budget, was time consuming to correct. The Board was advised by both town counsel and the DRA to begin functioning with the lowest number presented on the warrant as our budget, \$921,239. The Department of Justice concluded its review of the situation in early June resulting in a special deliberative session and vote to present an error free warrant for the Town Budget. That election was held in July and the recommended budget failed leaving the default budget of \$955,833. Since the vote was so late in the year it had become clear to the Selectboard that there was no need for the additional funding and the Selectboard decided to continue to manage town expenses to the allocated budget of \$921,239. Anticipation of budget under run allowed for use of unreserved funds to help off-set the year's tax rate. In spite of the efforts of the Board and the good stewardship of public funds by the budget managers our over-all tax rate increased. The town rate was reduced by 85¢ from 2009 but support for schools and county government increased, more than enough to absorb the savings.

Also during the year efforts considered and begun last year were continued as we move forward. We:

- engaged Avitar, a new firm for appraising property values and did the full town statistical update required periodically by the State.
- installed and began operating Avitar software for both the Tax Collector and for Property Appraisal management. The new software is about half as expensive to maintain per year as the old systems and at the same time provides better reporting and support for these functions.
- welcomed a new Administrative Assistant to the Board of Selectmen
- established a new official website for the Town fully owned and controlled by the Selectmen *TownofGraftonNH.com* (check it out; it is under development but is going to be great)
- changed our telephone billing structure allowing for cost savings
- dealt with about 50 action items assigned by the Board to itself
- called a Building Assessment Committee which has begun to assess use of and need for Town facilities for the near term and into the future
- welcomed two new members on our road crew
- considered changes to our employee handbook and adopted some
- renewed/refreshed the policies and procedures for the Recycling Center
- received clean audit reports for the Treasurer, Town Clerk and Town Tax Collector and the recommittal of both Clerk and Tax Collector following the election of new officials
- closed the financial year, considered budget requests for 2011 and prepared for elections which filled out 2010.

As many readers already understand, our Town functions largely as the result of a lot of volunteer effort. More volunteers are always needed and more people would help make our efforts even more successful. Our emergency response teams in both our Fire and Ambulance Departments are all volunteers. Many others serve on committees and still others are elected to positions with small stipends. This structure continues to enable Grafton to function economically. Is there something that you would like to do for our community?

In November of 2009 the Town of Grafton chose a new assessing company and the Town purchased a new tax collecting software program, Avitar. The change over to Avitar has been an excellent choice for the Town, the taxpayers and the Tax Collector.

I pride myself in representing the Town in a professional and efficient manner and foremost, keeping the taxpayers informed. It is sometimes challenging to prioritize the tasks at hand. The responsibilities include generating tax bills twice a year, posting all tax payments, monthly balancing, liening properties, redeeming properties, deeding properties, corresponding to the taxpayers, lawyers and real estate offices, who are depending on information for real estate closings, interactions with mortgage companies as well as researching deeds and liens on behalf of the Town, lawyers, mortgage companies and taxpayers. There are also now additional forms and information that are required by the Department of Revenue Administration that are processed by the Tax Collector. These responsibilities cannot be accomplished in a 20 hour work week. I work many additional hours, which may not always be posted, but know if my car is out front of the Town Office, I am available to help you.

In working with the Board of Selectmen the tax collecting system has now been networked to the Town Clerk's Office allowing more accessibility to the taxpayers, mortgage companies and real estate offices requiring information or wanting to make tax payments on off days when I am in the Town Clerk's Office. This has proven to be beneficial for everyone.

It has been a pleasure working with the taxpayers, the Selectboard, the Administrative Assistant, the Financial Clerk and the Treasurer this year and I look forward to working with them in the future and serving the taxpayers.

Office of the Town Clerk 2010

It has been an exciting year for me, having been elected Town Clerk in March of 2010. There has been so much to learn and I was very fortunate to have Cherie Caputo remain as the Deputy Town Clerk and offer her years of experience training me, which meant no lapse in services we were able to offer and by May of 2010 I had obtained certification as a Municipal Agent for the Motor Vehicle Department.

We have extended the hours this year and will extend them further with the new year, opening on some Saturdays for even better access. My policy is – if my car is parked out front we are there to

assist you (although if it is a vehicle registration the NH Department of Motor Vehicles has to be open).

We have spent many hours organizing records and files, moving many boxes which had been stored at the Library over the years, which are meant to be in the Town Clerk's Office or the Selectmen's Office. This is a slow process as everything has to be reviewed, sorted and stored appropriately.

We are working with a restoration company in hopes of continuing the restoration of the town books (Town Meetings, Inventories, Head & Polls, marriages, deaths, births, and the activities of the Town). We started this project about 20 years ago, having had 6 books restored. We have approximately 18 more books that need restoration before we lose them altogether. These books date back to the late 1700s as well as the 1800s. It is a valuable piece of Grafton's history.

Our responsibilities include motor vehicle registrations, vital records research and preservation, domicile/residency filing, maintaining births, marriages and deaths which transpire in Grafton, filing the purchases of cemetery lots, managing all elections (including preparing the ballots, processing absentee ballots, ensuring all election material is correct and available on election day, testing the machine, recording the minutes of the Town Meeting, maintaining all election outcomes and reporting such to the State of New Hampshire, the media and the candidates, and preserving the ballots for the required timeline. We receive many requests for genealogy information, which is very time-consuming, but rewarding when we are able to locate the information. We are also required to maintain many of the Town records such as the List of Officers, information for the Department of Revenue Administration and information for the NH State Library.

If I had to describe the most often heard phrase in the Town Clerk's Office it would be, "We never had to do that before.". While we do appreciate the "small town concept of doing business" it is important to understand there are rules and laws we **have to** comply with, which often times makes it difficult and frustrating for each of us, but if we don't comply we jeopardize *everyone's* privilege to register their vehicles locally. So please remember – it is necessary or we wouldn't ask!

Cherie and I thank all of the townspeople for the support this year during yet another transition and we look forward to assisting you in the upcoming year.

Cemetery Trustees' Report 2010

The past year was a difficult one for the Cemetery Trustees. There was a resignation at the beginning of the year, which left only two trustees. We also struggled with a lack of funds. The Town provides money for the weekly care of the eight cemeteries, but never enough. We had some difficulties keeping workers. Perpetual care funds come from three trust accounts set up many years ago. The interest earned goes towards care of the gravesites. We also get perpetual care funds when an individual buys a gravesite. Unfortunately the town has not turned over the money for several years. The Selectmen and the Trustees of the Trust Funds have been trying to determine where that money has gone.

Many of the headstones in the older cemeteries are in bad shape. At least 30% need to be repaired. Professional repair costs hundreds, if not thousands of dollars each. We contemplated buying an engine puller to raise the fallen stones, but there was no way to move it on the uneven ground. Even

using volunteer labor, materials could run \$75 each on average. Sixty per cent of the stones need cleaning. We managed to do about thirty while experimenting with the best technique.

On a positive note, we have been cataloging the stones. Some are too faded to read. We have tried various soil/loam/seed mixtures on bare spots, but the dry summer defeated those attempts. We shall see if the melting snow this spring helps. Perhaps someday we can have a well at Pine Grove. The soil in the cemeteries is very acidic and should be limed regularly. The regulations for our cemeteries are being updated so that people have a better idea about what is permissible.

Some of the pines in Pine Grove are unhealthy and will be removed. They are a danger to the graves and to visitors. It would be helpful if the abutters would remove brush from the stonewall, or gave us permission to do so. Some of the walls are being knocked over and some plants have grown so large they are obscuring the headstones.

The Grafton Volunteer Fire Department would like to thank the taxpayers and donors for their continued support. With your continued support, we have a well equipped and well trained fire department. This year we had a formal water rescue course for our fire and ambulance departments. We learned many new techniques that allow us to perform water rescues with greater safety to our personnel. We acquired the proper equipment to insure safety and efficiency.

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We had one structure fire in 2010. This started with a chimney fire that breached into the living space. Rapid intervention by the fire department using our thermal imager and tactical firefighting technique, using minimal water, allowed the family to enjoy Thanksgiving in the morning in their own home. Damage was confined to one room and the chimney.

At a sign of a fire, call as soon as you can. Replace batteries in smoke detectors every fall before heating season. Test detectors monthly. Any detector over 10 years old should be replaced. Carbon monoxide detectors have saved lives in Grafton; please have at least one in your home.

Our main fire truck, Engine 2 required a new transmission computer. This unexpected expense was quite costly. I chose to rearrange our spending priorities instead of using the Town's contingency fund. We came close to the projected budget in spite of this expense.

We would like to add a few additional volunteers to our roster in 2011. This would help increase the availability of volunteers to cover calls 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. Anyone interested in finding out more about becoming a responding volunteer or a support volunteer, please contact the Captain at 523-4623.

VOLUNTEER HOURS GIVEN:

During 2010 the members of Grafton Volunteer Ambulance donated approximately 4,991 hours of their time to provide the residents of Grafton with Emergency Medical Services. This is an average of 526 hours per EMT (some more / some less) and a total of approximately 251 hours by the 4 support members. The average hourly rate of paid EMTs is from \$11 to \$18 an hour depending on experience and level of licensing. At the mid-range rate of \$14.50 per hour, the services provided to Grafton by the volunteers of Grafton Ambulance are equivalent to labor costs of \$72,376.75. The members of GVA are pleased to serve Grafton in this manner and hope to continue to serve for many years to come.

CALL & PATIENT SUMMARY:

From 1/1/2010 to 12/31/2010 our TOTAL # of CALLS was 134, during which 147 patients were treated. These calls are categorized as follows:

Fire Support	2 calls	2 patients
Transport - no insurance	25 calls	27 patients
Transport - with insurance	50 calls	51 patients

AMBULANCE OPERATING BUDGET EXPENDITURES:

The total approved Operating Budget for Grafton Ambulance in 2010 was \$23,780 with \$13,780 being paid from the Operating Budget directly and \$10,000 being paid from the Insurance Revolving Account. Of this \$23,780, expenditures were made in the amount of \$23,742.02 (OB=\$13,774.48 + RA=\$9,967.54). We are pleased to be within our budget even though we had 30 calls more than the 104 calls on which the budget was based.

INSURANCE BILLING REVOLVING ACCOUNT:

The beginning balance on 1/1/2010 in the Insurance Revolving Account was \$21,296.70.

The insurance billing amount received in 2010 was \$28,581.98. (\$31,757.75 - \$3175.77 COMSTAR fees)

Expenditures from the Insurance Revolving Account were as follows: (\$15,426.80)

- 1 Spent \$9,967.54 of the \$10,000 allocated to off-set the 2010 Ambulance budget
- 2 Spent \$4,451.71 of the \$4,800 allocated for the one-time purchase of 2 two-way radios.
- 3 Spent \$1,007.55 of the \$1,000 allocated for the one-time purchase of a required piece of equipment, the EZIO Kit.

The balance in the Insurance Revolving Account at 12/31/2010 is \$34,451.88 with \$10,000 of this reserved and committed in 2010 to add to the Capital Reserve Funds for a New Ambulance. This leaves an amount of \$24,451.88 that is available for expenditures as of 1/1/2011.

2011 planned expenditures from this amount are as follows:

- 1 Off-set applied to 2011 Ambulance Budget to reduce the amount required from tax dollars, \$10,000.
- 2 Reserve \$10,000 toward the Capital Reserve Fund for a New Ambulance.

The total expenditures from the Insurance Billing Revolving Account in 2010 were \$15,426.80, and the total reserved from the Account was \$10,000. This reduced the amount required from tax-payer dollars in 2010 by \$25,426.80.

2010 SUMMARY:

The Grafton Volunteer Ambulance Squad has completed another successful year with 7 EMT-Basics, 2 EMT-Intermediates, and 4 support members which includes 1 ambulance driver. The 134 total number of calls in 2010 is an increase of 24 calls over 2009. There were a total of 147 patients treated. Our members completed 782 total hours of training and spent approximately 1628 hours on calls providing patient care.

The State of New Hampshire Division of EMS added several new equipment/supply requirements for 2011. We met these requirements with the purchase of an EZIO Intraosseous Kit, an *adjustable* Portable Suction Unit, and the newly required supplies. There were also several 'no longer used' items that were finally removed from the list of required supplies which reduces the number of unused supplies we are required to keep current and on-board. We are now in compliance for 2011 with the addition of these items.

There were several sympathetic residents that again made generous donations of supplies and equipment as well as much deserved 'nice to haves' for the EMTs, such as pizza at training sessions. Since the members of GVA receive no compensation for their extensive volunteer hours, these niceties provide a very important expression of appreciation and a moral boost from time to time. Thank you to all contributors. We would also like to thank those who have made monetary donations to the Grafton Ambulance Fund, a private organization whose funds are used to support the GVA Service. (This is not the same as the Insurance Billing Revolving Account). All donations can be sent to the Grafton Ambulance Fund c/o Grafton Ambulance, PO Box 81, Grafton, NH 03240.

We are thankful that 2010 has been a safe and successful year for the members of the GVA service and that we have been able to fulfill our commitment to provide quality emergency medical services to our patients and community throughout the year. Your continuing support is greatly appreciated.

As Captain, I would like to invite any and all Grafton residents to contact me directly with any questions, concerns, rumors, and comments. I would love to have discussions with and provide tours for all interested residents. Your participation can only help to improve the services we provide and educate us about the concerns of the Grafton residents. There is quite a bit of misinformation going around and I would appreciate the opportunity to provide accurate information on any topic related to the GVA services. Road Agent Report 2010

The Highway Department spent the first three months of 2010 plowing, sanding and winging back roads with the trucks and the grader.

Mud season in the spring was a nonfactor so the road department graveled, graded and raked roads. Alone, the Road Agent put in culverts on Sargent Hill Road, Gifford Hill Road, Millbrook Road and ten on Orange Pond Road. This includes digging, installing, graveling and putting on stone headers. Also, the road crew installed culverts on Spectacle Pond Road.

A roadside mower was contracted to mow all the roadsides for the first time since 2004.

The Road Agent and crew spent many hours repairing and maintaining the trucks and equipment at the highway garage by replacing transmissions, a rear end, grader moldboards, tires, a radiator and many other repairs. The Highway Department installed sanders and wings on trucks to get ready for winter.

Because of the many hours without a full road crew, scheduled highway projects could not all be completed.

By the end of the year, the Highway Department saved about \$40,000 of the highway budget to offset taxes.

I would like to thank the people who appreciate the hard work and long hours the Highway Department performs throughout the year.

Trustees of the Trust Funds 2010 Annual Report

2010 was a year of great change for the Trusts. To maximize income we combined Trusts and switched investors for the Capital Reserves. We also realized that in 2004 the Trustees made major changes to the Trust Fund reporting which were incorrect.

In 2004 and 2005, due to a lack of understanding of the Capital Preservation Act, principle amounts of all the Trust Funds were moved to income and much of this was paid out from 2004-2008. The Attorney General's office has instructed us to restore these principle amounts. Therefore we are recommending no interest distributions to the Library Trustees, the Cemetery Trustees or the Medical Fund for 2010 and maybe 2 more years. Remember all 3 of these groups received much more income distributions than they should have for 5 years.

Three of the Trust Funds had balances which were too low to maintain individual accounts. Combinations were as follows: Common Trusts 1 and 2 are now one account. The Ruth Leonard and Barney Flanders accounts were combined with the Kilton Fund and renamed the Kilton, Flanders and Leonard Trust. The Pine Grove account still stands on its own. All accounts are held with UBS which has provided income and growth during this turbulent economic year.

The Capital Reserve accounts were all moved out of MBIA which was yielding less than .35% interest. Hampshire First Bank is holding 9 accounts in 13 month CDs each earning 1.35% interest. We established a \$5,000 savings account at Hampshire First (.5% interest) for the 2010 capital reserve police cruiser contribution. This \$5,000, with interest, will be combined with the police cruiser capital reserve CD funds on October 16, 2011. Lake Sunapee Bank is holding 3 accounts in 7 month CDs each earning 1.15% interest. Sunapee Bank will allow us 1 withdrawal from each of their CDs, which will probably be necessary for the Bridge account.

Only 16 people requested and received their \$15 medical reimbursement in 2010. We voted to increase the medical reimbursement in 2011 to \$20. REMEMBER... Every Grafton resident is eligible to receive this medical reimbursement annually. Just send or bring to one of our meetings a medical (including dental and eyes) bill for each Grafton resident for whom you would like the reimbursement. We will return your medical bill(s) with the check. This is all thanks to our forefathers who wanted each Grafton resident to have medical care.

The MS-9 follows in this Town Report. Due to space limitations, the MS 10 is available from the Trustees by request.

Annual Report of the Grafton Historical Society 2010

This past year we have stayed on focus in pursuing our goals set forth in 2009. To date we have attained about half of them. The center galleries and display cases are 98% finished. Consequently we have begun assembling exhibits on the Grafton Coronet Band, the Eureka Grange, Northern Railroad, Mica Mines & Granite Quarries, Mineral Display, Farm Implements, and Ice Harvesting. Galleries have also been built on the left wall of the museum and exhibits showcasing Grafton's schools, manufacturing, and stores are being developed. In addition we have built shelving and a wall to define our research library. However, much work remains to be done. Next in line on our agenda is to build galleries for our government, post office, thresher, and hobo exhibits as well as develop space for our gift shop/reception desk.

Other ongoing projects have included meeting with the selectmen to confirm a permanent site for our Tramp House, and maintaining the grounds at the Pine School House and the Carding Mill. Limited time and resources have precluded our ability to do more.

At this time we would like to give thanks to some folks who have generously given of their time and donations to help us achieve our goals:

The following amendments were approved at the Deliberative Session held on Saturday, February 12, 2011:

Article #3. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$20,000 to be placed in the previously established Bridge Capital Reserve Fund. Approximately \$.16 per \$1,000.

Article #10. To see if the Town will vote to raise and appropriate the sum of \$8,872 to be placed in the previously established Recreation Field Shelter Capital Reserved Fund. The sum of \$8,872 will come from the unreserved fund balance. Should the donation not be received in 2011, this Article will be void. The Selectmen recommend this Article/ the Budget Committee recommends this article.

Article #19. To see if the Town of Grafton, New Hampshire would support a Freedom of Conscience Act which would accommodate our Rights of Conscience in the way our tax dollars are spent. The New Hampshire Bill of Rights states in Article 4 "Of the natural rights some are in their very nature unalienable because no equivalent can be given or received for them. Of this kind are the 'Rights of Conscience.'" Also, Article 13 "No person who is conscientiously scrupulous about the lawfulness of bearing arms shall be compelled thereto."

The New Hampshire Bill of Rights Article 10 empowers us to make a change "the people may, and of right ought to reform the old, or establish a new government. The doctrine of nonresistance against arbitrary power, and oppression, is absurd, slavish, and destructive of the good and happiness of mankind." It is our duty to defend our rights as conferred by Article 10 and in good conscience we cannot allow the government to use our tax dollars for the taking of life or degradation of the Commons." West Central Behavioral Health 2010

West Central Behavioral Health is the NH designated community mental health center for Grafton, as well as Sullivan and Southern Grafton counties. Our mission is "to reduce the burden of mental illness and to improve the quality of life in our community. We commit ourselves to provide services that are safe, effective, client centered, timely and efficient." Last year, West Central Behavioral Health experienced severe state budget cuts, regional economic hardship, and an increased need for services by uninsured or under-insured clients. West Central Behavioral Health is committed to making quality mental health services available to all people in the communities we serve regardless of their ability to pay.

Our clients suffer from a wide range of disorders and illnesses. These severe, chronic mental illnesses include: psychosis, schizophrenia, bipolar disorder; and all forms of addiction. We also see patients with anxiety, depression, and other impairing but highly treatable conditions. We work with all ages in outpatient clinics, homes, nursing home, jails, schools and a residential supported living program. West Central Behavioral Health offers a broad variety of counseling, psychiatric services, case management and emergency consultations.

In FY 2010, West Central Behavioral Health received an appropriation of \$1,320 from the Town of Grafton. We are grateful for this appropriation that enabled us to provide free and reduced cost mental and behavioral health services to the residents of Grafton who are uninsured or under-insured.

Services provided to residents of Grafton last year include:

- 12 children and their families received 460 hours of mental and behavioral health services from West Central Behavioral Health.
- 27 adults received 373 hours of mental health and behavioral health services from West Central Behavioral Health.

Mascoma Valley Health Initiative 2010

We want to thank the Town of Grafton for recognizing the need for public health at the local level and for your past financial support. As we continue to fulfill our mission and expand our programming, we ask for your consideration of funding for 2011.

Agency Description

MVHI is a nonprofit public health organization serving the Upper Valley of New Hampshire. Our goal is to protect and promote the health of our community. MVHI was formed in 2001 by the Turning Point Initiative, a program funded by the Robert Wood Johnson and W.K. Kellogg Foundations to transform the nation's public health system. We began with the mission of improving the health of the residents of five rural Mascoma Valley towns, and have grown to serve the towns of Canaan, Cornish, Dorchester, Enfield, Grafton, Grantham, Hanover, Lebanon, Lyme, Orange, Orford, Piermont, and Plainfield.

As of 2010, MVHI supports programming in the areas of core public health service and substance abuse prevention. MVHI serves as the New Hampshire Immunization Program regional site. We are also implementing a federally-funded rural health planning grant, the Upper Valley Healthy Community Program, with the goal of improving rural access to primary initiatives in the Mascoma Valley towns of Canaan, Enfield, Dorchester, Grafton and Orange; 1) the Indian river Youth 2 Youth after-school program, and 2) MVHI serves as coordinating agency for the Mascoma Valley Prevention Network, a developing community-based substance abuse prevention coalition focused on reducing youth alcohol and drug abuse.

MVHI is operated by a Board of Directors made up of professionals with experience in health care, education, town government, law enforcement and human services. Our Board represents a number of prominent local and regional organizations including Dartmouth-Hitchcock Medical Center, Dartmouth Medical School, the Children's Hospital at Dartmouth, Alice Peck Day Memorial Hospital, and local business and government.

MVHI has built strong collaboration with school administrators and teachers; local police, fire and emergency management officials; corporations and small business owners; health care providers, community and school nurses; academics and researchers; town officials; mental health and substance abuse professionals; and leaders of regional hospitals and community service agencies. Our goal is to

partner with community members and organizations who share our commitment to community health, to build a strong and effective public health system that serves the needs of the residents of the Upper Valley.

This is the planning year for the 10 year transportation plan. Highway, rail, aviation, and public transportation projects are all a part of the hearing process that the five Executive Council members will be holding. Hearings are held in each of our Districts. Local information from the area regional planning commissions is key to having successful projects included in the proposed plan which is delivered by law to the Governor's desk on December 15, 2011 and then by law to the NH House and Senate by January 2012.

I cannot emphasize enough the urging of local citizens to volunteer for the dozens of volunteer boards and commissions which the governor and Council are required to find individuals to serve on.
